

Miss Jorgensen Is Also Miffed At Agnew Quip

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Christine Jorgensen believes that even if Vice President Spiro T. Agnew doesn't respond to her demand for an apology, he may be more careful in the future about using a private citizen's name in political speeches.

"I think it will have an effect on him in the future," Miss Jorgensen said Sunday. "I suppose that's politics. But one shouldn't bring private citizens into it."

Miss Jorgensen, 44, who was a GI in the early 1950s before a surgical sex change, sent a telegram of protest to Agnew's Washington office after he called Sen. Charles E. Goodell, R-N.Y., "the Christine Jorgensen of the Republican party."

Agnew has not responded.
