My job was becoming more and more time consuming, and my travel was increasing. So I served notice to CGS. Fortunately, we had attracted and groomed several able and committed people to CGS, so that I felt comfortable I could leave without them missing a step.

Shortly after my announcement, and during the night of the Chi-Chapter election, Naomi announced that she, too would step down for office. She would not run for President. Unfortunately, no one had been warned, and no one was prepared. No one was willing to run that night....the night of the election. Someone nominated me. I declined. I had just stepped down from CGS to take a breather.

We all decided to take another month to sort things out. During that month, several people approached me asking me to run until a permanent President could be found. I agreed to run for the following reasons:

1. Tri-Ess is the first transgendered group I ever joined. I felt a responsibility to help keep it going.

2. I felt I could lay the groundwork for this to never happen again.

3. I felt that with my varied background, I could be the conduit for greater cooperation between the two Chicago groups.

Needless to say, my wife was not exactly overjoyed with my decision. But as always, she was supportive. She is my rock and my strength.

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Gatekeeper of Secret DuPage crossdressing society sets the record 'straight'

While audiences find female impersonation a scream on stage and screen, those men who feel the need to wear women's clothing in real life are not often met with the same response.

Fear of exposure and ridicule by family, friends and complete strangers can lead to overwhelming feelings of guilt depression, alienation and, in some cases, suicide.



"A lot of those people are scared to death," admits Candace Mahne, vice president and outreach coordinator of the Chicago area chapter of Tri-ess, a national support group for heterosexual male crossdressers and their significant others.

"Some are embarrassed," said Mahne, a 57-year-old straight male cross-dresser who has been out of the closet since 1992. "They are afraid they are the only creature like

this in the world and they don't want to live alone. They don't understand it."

Based in DuPage County with a post office box in Wood Dale, Tri-Ess, or the Society for the Second Self, offers a safe haven for the heterosexual cross-dresser.

"Our job locally is to get those people out of the closet any way we can. Bring them into a loving, caring environment where they can accept themselves and go on to be the great people that they can be. That is our, function said Mahne.

Also to have a good time..; I feel God has a good sense of humor when He-She created me."

"Candace Mahne" is the *femme* name chosen by this former DuPage resident who nows lives in Kane County. As vice president of the Chi Chapter of Tri-Ess, "she" is also in charge of membership development and answering the group's hotline number.

As one of more than 40 chapters in the United States, Mahne states the Chicago Tri-Ess chapter alone lists some 300 members.

"My job on the hotline is to convince people who are closeted and very fearful to come to our meeting and meet others just like themselves," he said. Mahne says' most crossdressers know about this desire when they are 5-7 years of age.

"We tend to have the feeling that we were brought here by alien spacecraft to live amongst you people. We put our finger up like E.T. waiting for that spacecraft to bring us home. It is only when we discover- crossdressing organizations [like Tri-Ess] that we know there are other people like us in the world."

Membership in Tri-Ess is limited only to heterosexual crossdressers and their wives or significant others.

"We are considered a closed group for that reason. The open group [Chicago Gender Society] allows heteros, gay crossdressers and transsexuals, both pre-op and post-op. There. has been argument that they want Tri-Ess to change. I have written several strong articles saying that this [closed policy] should not change.

"It is my opinion that you can help those that you are focused in on. We can't be all things to all people. As Dirty Harry says, 'You've got to know your limitations.' I am not a transsexual. I am not a gay male. I don't understand the feelings that they, have gone through."

Most members come crossdressed to the meetings, which are held the third Saturday of the month at an undisclosed hotel in DuPage County.

"We come from all walks of life: lawyers, physicans, professionals people, tradespeople. About 80 percent of us have been married or are married. We are family-type people," said Mahne, who works in real estate.

Mahne has been married twice. His first wife of six years did not know "Candace." When she did find out Mahne says "she thought, all the negative things about me.

"I made a pact with myself [that], if I every got married again I would tell the person upfront. I met somebody, told her, and cross-dressing was never an issue. We were married for 26 years, raised two children and I have three grandchildren. The break-up of [that] marriage had nothing to do with crossdressing; we just grew apart"

For those interested in contacting Tri-Ess, Mahne cautions callers to let him know if the number they leave is a secure line.

"We are not here to break up marriages, we are here to help people accept themselves as they are. We do not force anything on anybody. We try to educate [them] to the possibilities, to get over the guilt and the shame that usually goes with [crossdressing] in the early stages.

It is Mahne's opinion cross-dressers make better fathers, better husbands and better people all around. Because crossdressers are "more in tuned with feelings, we are able to nurture children more easily as most men."

To protect the integrity of the group, all new members must go through a screening process.

"I am the gatekeeper," laughs Mahne. "In enjoining you in a conversation I can tell pretty quickly whether you are one that is going to come with an assault rifle and kill us all, or whether you are genuinely interested in finding out about yourself."

Mahne says after spending a lot of years in the closet (Continued on page 8)

Wigstock: A Personal Reflection on the Movie

Wigstock. Every year around Labor Day since 1984, there has been a rather large drag festival in downtown Manhattan called Wigstock. Wigstock, the Movie, is a documentary of the Wigstock Festival with footage from Wigstocks '93 and '94. It was billed as a tribute to the art of drag entertainment, focusing on the female impressionists on and off stage and the participants in the festival audience.

I wanted to see this movie because I know very little about the gay community (Wigstock is primarily a gay festival), less about about gay cross dressers, and even less about the men who work in the entertainment industry as drag queens. Consequently, I asked Amanda to go with me to see Wigstock, which was playing at only one theater in Chicagoland, the Sony Theater in Pipers Alley.

The evening started out as a perfect outing for us. Amanda looked gorgeous (as usual) in her long black and floral print summer dress and her saucy summer hair do. I felt delicious in my conservative pink empire-waist dress. We had no trouble passing, even with the children and teenagers whom we walked by in the streets. Amanda was whistled at as the wind caught her skirt, and I know I attracted more than one admiring lance. Dinner before the show at a little Italian restaurant was lovely, and sipping a cup of cappacino afterwards at a little outdoor coffee house in Old Town was absolutely delightful.

The movie was another story. If you ever wanted to know the difference between the drag queens and yourself, then this is the movie for you. They are a different breed altogether. If you ever had any doubts about your own gender orientation or image presentation, then this movie should dispel your self doubts. But, there is very little else which would recommend this movie.

Oh, I'm not saying the performances by Mistress Formika, RuPaul, Lypsinka, The Lady Bunny and the numerous others whose names escape me at the moment were not good. On the contrary, some of them were outstanding. Some of the acts were beautifully choreographed. Some were performed with grace and style that any of us would be proud to emulate. Some of the voices (the ones who were not lip-syncing) were of a quality that many jazz or popular female vocalists would envy. And some of the acts were sensitively filmed, cutting back and forth to the performers in and out of drag, from off stage rehearsal to full stage production.

But most of the movie was exploitation, pure and simple. The most outrageous characters were continually being spotlighted by the camera, solely for their shock value. The movie did nothing to dispel the popular conception that all crossdressers are gay, that crossdressers make a mockery of womanhood, and that most crossdressers are basically bizarre and freakish.

Unless the viewer is sensitized as we are to look behind the mask (and believe me, you have never seen such garish makeup), the queens in the movie come across as something less than human. That in its own right was very disturbing to me. But even more disturbing was the movie audience's reaction. They were there to laugh at the freaks. And they got their money's worth. Five minutes into the film, I became very uncomfortable being in the audience because I realized they were not laughing because they enjoyed seeing some rather free-spirited individuals enjoying themselves. They were not laughing at the absurd society we live in which proscribes freedom of gender expression. No... they were laughing at these people, they were laughing at the freaks, they were laughing at what they viewed as less than human.

Quite frankly, I left the movie theater angry. I was angry at the producers. Perhaps they were trying to show the fun of dressing in women's clothes and the wit and humor of the festival participants. But they twisted a potentially meaningful and educational opportunity into an exploitation of our sisters. Now you may not agree that the drag queens are our sisters, but we are all on the same gender spectrum. When one part of the spectrum gets dragged down, we all get dragged down.

And I was angry at the movie audience. I guess I am not that naive to believe that most human beings are empathetic. But to witness such a total lack of sensitivity was appalling.

In my 29 years of experience in hair care and wigs, and 18 years of working with the TV/TS community, many girls have addressed questions concerning the proper care of wigs and styling. I will attempt to answer some questions.

Today's wigs are comfortable and style free. The style is preset at the manufacturer, which means goodbye to rollers, hair dryers, and teasing. Today's wigs are lighter weight and there are many new colors which look very natural. Proper care of your wig will help it to last longer. You must know when to wash, how to condition your wig, and how to dry it.

Guidelines for proper wig care

Wash your wig every 30 days by using wig shampoo. You should need proper wig products. Wig products are very essential. Condition your wig with wig conditioner using two capfuls of conditioner. Comb through wig thoroughly. Rinse with warm water. Brush back of wig forward by holding the wig label. Place wig on a wig block or styrofoam wig form and let dry naturally. When dry your wig will be ready to brush according to wig style. With a little practice you glamor gals can feel comfortable.

Guidelines for wearing your wig

Before putting on your wig, brush your hair back, pin it down, then use hair spray to hold it down.

Use a wig liner nylon cap.

Position ear tabs.

Put on your wig like a bathing cap.

Adjust velcro tab a back of wig, if wig feels uncomfortable or is too loose.

Tuck in ant stray hairs.

Brush wig according to style, don't be shy about brushing it. Take a good look at self in mirror for a total look before heading out on your adventure. If you don't feel wig secure, always use bobbie pins on the side of your temples.

himself, finding Tri-Ess has made his life complete.

"I am happier than I was before. I am free to express my gender of choice, which is female."

Last month, he says he spent 18 out of days dressed as "Candace,' often participating as. an outreach speaker to educational and community groups with an interest in the subject The more Mahne can show that he is "a normal human being, a typical person," he believes the better it will be for all members of the crossdressing community.

At 6 feet 1 inch tall, even wearing 3-inch" heels, Mahne says "Candace" is passable as a woman in public. "She" is also encouraged by the number of new films that are making the idea of crossdressing almost trendy.

"They are becoming trendy. I think that anything that is done in good taste, that brings us out in a good light, [like 'Priscilla, Queen of the Desert'] is fine."

The same, Mahne believes, cannot be said the depiction of cross-dressers on national talk shows.

"I think a lot of the television shows are being done for ratings. I get at least two or three calls a month from the major shows. We turn them down. One wanted a cross-dresser to come out to his wife on national TV. I told him that was my job. By doing it on national TV, you are doing more harm. 'It is like throwing out an atomic bomb.

My daughter found out two years ago - The first question she asked her mother was, 'Is dad gay?' She said no. Then she asked, having seen the shows on TV, 'Is dad a crossdresser?' Then she paid me the best compliment- 'Now I know why dad was both mother and father to me.'
