# Changes made to national by laws Board votes on new policies and project

The national board of directors, while correcting a few inconsistencies in the national by laws, also approved a number of changes at the November 18 board meeting.

The most significant change provides for the re-election of the executive officers of the corporation by the entire board of directors. Other changes create a new board position of Director-At-Large, and give the board the authority to fill vacant positions from the general membership. The annual meeting has also been changed from December to November in order to avoid conflicts with holiday activities.

These changes will permit the board to develop, implement and continue its long term outreach projects and to provide more effective services to the chapters.

None of the changes approved affect the local chapters in any way. Chapters remain self-governing and continue to have representation on the national board.

In addition to the by law changes, the board also approved two new national policies. Policy NP-3 recommends that the Managing Director should not serve more than a one year term, unless there is no new candidate for the position. Policy NP-4 states that no member of the board shall receive a salary nor shall they receive any compensation for services rendered, except for legitimate reimbursement of expenses. The Chapter Handbook will be update with these changes.

At the same meeting, the board reviewed a major new project for the group, MONA-mail. This project will set up a voice mail system for use by chapters, members and affiliates. A voice mail system will permit a caller with a touch tone phone to access a variety of information about Renaissance. Chapters will be able to remotely update their activity information, members will be able to leave each other voice messages and new callers will still be able to get basic information on the group. Renaissance may offer mailbox space to other groups and commercial enterprises on a rental basis. Trudi Henry was responsible for developing the project plan.

Overall, it looks like 1990 will be a great year for Renaissance.

## Veteran's Day Results are in

The October issue of the Renaissance News carried a call for transgendered veterans to share their personal stories and achievements for a media event that would spotlight our contributions to the nation. The target date was Veterans Day. Yet, Nov. 11 has come and gone and nothing happened.

"Basically, I screwed up," said Paula Jordan Sinclair, Renaissance director of outreach. "I didn't give people enough time to respond. About a dozen veterans did send the information requested, but I was hoping for a much larger response. I personally know of several veterans who didn't respond, perhaps because there wasn't time. Next year I'll issue the request much earlier."

While the responses didn't generate the kind of impressive numbers that would be needed to make headlines, they did show that transgendered people have played an important role in America's defense

## Are you lonesome tonight?...words of wisdom by Sharon M.

On a recent Saturday night I sat home alone for the first time in years. My four year old son was ill and his mother kept him for the weekend. What to do? I sat on the sofa looking through the *Philadelphia Inquirer* entertainment section, considering which TV to switch on: the football game or Sharon.

"To Hell with football," I thought. I'll spend all day Sunday watching the Eagles. I've never gotten crossdressed and gone to a club alone. The thought seemed a challenge. With my first Renaissance meeting confidently behind me, I was ready for new excitement.

I showered, shaved, and tugged on three pairs of pantyhose. After applying war paint, I squeezed into my favorite black dress. It has a low back, reaches to mid-thigh, and has a habit of slipping off my shoulders. It clings in all the right places too.

As a man, I couldn't care less about clothes. My wardrobe has been acquired through Christmas and birthday gifts. My favorite clothes are t-shirts and old jeans.

Sharon is quite the opposite. It takes about 30 minutes in front of a

mirror to bring her alive. Part of my joy as Sharon is enjoying her appearance. I have a seven foot tall antique wall mirror in my living room. The room is completely bare except for the mirror and a fireplace. Sharon is the only person who ever uses the mirror.

Using the living room means turning on a light and revealing my form through lacy curtains to my neighbor's view. The young woman who lives next door is a snoop. On occasion she's told me what programs I was watching on television. Using the mirror is a delight, but the risk of detection is a discomfort.

Getting out of the house is always an adventure. I wasn't in the mood for donning wig and heels in the car, and opted for the mad-dash down the driveway to the barn. Inside the barn there is safety. As I fumbled with my keys, for about the zillionth time, I cursed the secret lifestyle of a transvestite.

Speeding up the street, I found myself rising back up in my seat. As a man, I drive my Porsche through the center of town with a certain amount of smug pride. My car is a curse, though, when I'm dressed. I stick to dimly lit back streets, charting a course that avoids street lights and stop lights.

On the previous night I had gone to my girlfriend Lynne's home in Philly to show her a new outfit. Cruising down Castor Avenue at night is like driving in broad daylight. Fortunately, I'm far from home so there's little fear of detection. Consequently, my attitude is completely different. I zip down the windows and turn up the stereo. Give me a pair of sunglasses and I'm ready for "risky business."

Once I was out of my town and speeding up the road toward New Hope, I began to relax. I thought of Lynne, and knew she'd be angry when she learned what I'd done. See, I've only been dressing for a year. Unlike most transvestites I didn't discover Sharon alone; it was with Lynne and with her encouragement. She was with me at my first Renaissance meeting. Without her Sharon would never have existed. Going out without Lynne, therefore, seemed wrong.

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### Dog Daze...can it get worse than this? Paula Jordan Sinclair

As confident, proud cross-dressers, we know that we shouldn't worry about being spotted by people on the street when were are dressed in the clothes of the other gender. We've read those columns in the *Renaissance News* about being "read," and how we should act if some uncouth person points at us and says in a voice more appropriate at a sports arena than on a boulevard, "Its a man!" Yeah, we all know those things, but deep down inside we still want to pass, right?

We spend hours on our hair and make-up. We search through our closets for just the right outfit that doesn't make our shoulder look too broad or our hips too flat. And when we finally step out of the house confident that *this* time we'd fool our own mothers, some jerk in a pick-up truck drives by and makes what can best be called an impolite remark. But as bad as that is, have you ever been read by a dog? I have, and let me tell you, it isn't the most complimentary way to start a day.

My neighbors keep a large Labrador in their back yard. Our yards are open and so the dog can see all the comings and goings over at my place. But instead of just watching, this beast feels the need to comment on every movement. We're not talking a yip or a yap. This is serious

barking. The Hound of the Baskervilles should have barked as loudly. His barking is reassuring if someone were climbing over the fence, but it gets annoying every time I walk out my back door. Fortunately, the dog eventually learns that the guy who comes out of my door isn't going to do him any harm. But the dog has a short memory, and if I have been out of sight for a while, the dog starts barking as soon as I set foot outside. After a few gentle reminders (like shouts to "shut up!" and dirt clods hurled in his direction) beast allows me to enjoy my garden in peace.

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### Discoveries: The Facts About Transgender Behavior — Part 4

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### Transgender Issues

People who exhibit transgender behavior must deal with a number of personal and social issues. These issues can cause emotional problems, even physical problems until they are dealt with in an open and honest way.

#### Personal Issues

At the personal level, transgendered people often have very low self-esteem, especially in early childhood. These feelings come from an "inner" knowledge that their gender role/identity does not fit their sex. They often experience guilt about their feelings and almost always feel extreme loneliness. The loneliness comes from not being able to share their feelings with other people. They "know" they will be rejected by friends and family because they are "different". Add the

additional stigma of erotic arousal, as in the case of most transvestites, and they begin to believe they are "sick". They carry this burden of guilt silently. In some cases, the burden is so great that they turn to substance abuse (alcohol or drugs) as a means of relief from their guilt and "sickness". In reality, transgendered people are not "sick", just different. Unfortunately, simply being different, even in today's society, can still be a significant source of inner conflict.

It all boils down to fear of rejection and loss of love on discovery of transgender feelings. Everyone needs to be loved by someone. It tells us that we are worthy human beings. No love means no worth. Worthless is equal to being "bad". Bad people deserved to be punished. If no one is punishing us, we feel guilty, which is a form of self-pun-

ishment. Yet, we are driven by our feelings and often reject love when it is offered because we feel unworthy. The trick is to break the chain.

Transgendered people must realize that there is an inherent goodness in each of us and that sex, sex role, sexual preference, or gender role/identity have nothing to do with whether we are a moral, ethical or just person. (The recent preachersex scandals should give you a hint about apparent behavior and moral/ ethical standards.) We must learn self-love first, so that we can share ourselves with others and accept love in return. The things we fear the most are often only those barriers which we create in our minds ourselves.

There will be rejections to be sure, as there will always be people who

Perhaps the nation's first avowed transgendered political candidate lost a bid for the Houston City Council last month. Charles "Kathryn" McGuire, a transvestite who reportedly lives full-time as a woman, came in second in a threeway race to represent the city's District C which includes the heavily gay Montrose area.

While incumbent Vince Ryan won the endorsement of the gay Montrose Voice, the paper applauded McGuire's courage in campaigning as a transvestite. Her gender role played only a small part in the campaign. McGuire said the attention she did receive as a transvestite was positive because it was free publicity.

"I had a lot of people stop me and say they admire me and are going to vote for me because I had the courage to run," McGuire said before the election. "They think we need a good man."

By the way, her primary campaign issue was the redevelopment of a housing area in her district.

Another major story recently concerned a transsexual's change of heart more than a decade after having the operation.

A Missouri town was surprised when one of its two pediatricians announced that she was a man until her 1978 sex change, and that she was eventually going under the knife to become a man again.

"I was born a male, and I was raised male and I feel that's the way I'll be most contented," said Dr. Janis Ashley, 38. "I want a mate and a family. If I don't change, I'm faced with life without the potential of having a mate."

People in the town of Sedalia have rallied around Ashley, although there have been some reports of crude jokes made behind her back. Neither the parents of her young patients nor authorities at the hospital where she practices said the sex change-back would affect her professional standing.

She tells her 4-year-old adopted son Michael "that I am his mommy and I will always be his mommy, but I'm also his daddy." She added that she has consulted a child psychologist on how best to deal with confusion expressed by Michael or her child patients.

Ashley said she has begun taking male hormones and will eventually have reconstructive surgery. She provided no details about the surgery that changed her sex to female when she was 25.

"I guess this is no secret now," he said. "I love Angie very much. She's a sweet lady." But Bailey has no plans to ask the stunning blonde to marry him. He also has no plans to add an Angie Dickinson impersonation to his act. "I'd never do an impersonation of her—she'd kill me. But we did talk about it jokingly one night."

Back when Bailey was a little boy (and perhaps learning how to walk in his mother's high heels), Milton Berle was entertaining television audiences with his unique brand of female impersonation. would rather be ignorant than to have their own values challenged and possibly overturned by enlightenment. Rejection may come from anywhere—family, friends, and/or spouse—and these must be dealt with on a case by case basis. To our great surprise and relief, many transgendered people do not find the rejection we assume will occur on revelation.

### Family Issues Spouse

Most transvestites, and many transsexuals, in an effort to fit into society's predetermined gender role will marry and some even start families. For transvestites, we hope that marriage and a "normal" sexual relationship will help us to stop crossdressing. For transsexuals, marriage may be an attempt to "fit in". In both cases, the transgender feelings of the individual are not shared with the spouse before or immediately after the wedding.

It is very rare for a spouse not to discover the transgender nature of their mate at some time. Sooner or later they are either told by us or they find out by accident. Almost always, the initial reaction is negative, if for no other reason than something of great importance to the relationship has been hidden. The next typical reaction is to assume that we are homosexual, followed by fears of sexually transmitted disease. (It is stereotypical how a gender issue becomes one of sexual preference and then one of morals and ethics.) If homosexuality is not an issue, the next step for the spouse is to seek professional help to have us "cured" or "fixed". Unfortunately, too many counselors and therapists have only book knowledge of transgender issues and probably very old knowledge at that. In general, transgendered people cannot be "cured", although there are some individuals who will benefit from therapy. Most, if not all, TVs and TSs, do not want to be

"cured"; they just want to stop feeling guilty. With a lack of positive results from therapy, a spouse becomes frustrated and angered.

The way to deal with your spouse is by honest and open communication. It is only right that a transgendered person inform a prospective spouse before the marriage. But as such is usually not the case, once the issue is out in the open, only honest, straight talk will resolve problems. It is only the most exceptional spouse who can fully accept a transgender partner with no problems. Most every other spouse will fall somewhere from tolerance to total rejection. The ability of a spouse to tolerate transgender behavior has a lot to do with their own self-esteem. (See, there it is again.) The problem is similar to the one of the transgendered person themselves. The spouse who derives their selfworth from their mate will have the worst time with a relationship that does not fit the accepted social definitions of husband and wife.

For transvestites there is hope that the marriage and relationship may continue. The issue of crossdressing must be addressed head on and compromises must be made on both sides. If the marriage is strong in all other areas, it will most likely survive the discovery of transvestism. The spouse must realize that the need to crossdress will not go away and so it must be accommodated in a way that does not interfere with the rest of the relationship. The transvestite must understand that the spouse has rights and feelings, too, and the accommodations must go both directions to be successful. For example, the ground rule may be no dressing at home when children are up and about. The agreement must be a "win-win" deal for both parties.

For transsexuals there is little hope that the marriage can continue as before. There are legal problems and, eventually, physical barriers. It has been known for two partners to remain together after the reassignment of one, but it is rare that such a relationship is permanent. The best hope is to get the issues out so that an amicable separation can be arranged. It serves the interest of neither party to prolong the agony any longer than absolutely necessary.

### **Parents**

Parents of transgendered people need special care and feeding. Most of our parents were raised with very traditional values (i.e. rigid), particularly when it comes to gender roles. They can be terribly shocked and dismayed with their child who now displays transgender behavior. Part of their feelings are due to the constantly changing values of our society, which may leave them longing for the "good old days." If your parents feel this way about the world around them, they might just be better off not knowing if their child is transgendered. You have to make a trade between the potential anguish you may cause them and your own feelings of guilt for not being open and honest with them.

Transvestites definitely have this option of not making disclosure to their parents A transsexual, on the other hand, really has a difficult decision to make and it is probably best to tell them as soon as possible.

The initial reaction from a parent is usually, "Where did I go wrong?" They must be told that it is not their "fault", that likely nothing they did or did not do was the direct cause. Next will come the questions about sexual preference, again. The most important thing to impress upon parents is that you, their child, are still the same person they raised, with the same moral and ethical values they tried so hard to teach, but now they know something special and different about you that they never knew before. And, they have a chance to show that parental love transcends gender roles.

I couldn't believe all the cars in the Cartwheel parking lot. I'd heard the 'Wheel was busy on weekends, but I wasn't prepared for this. It was easier to find a parking spot at the "Dead" concert at JFK.

So I tried the Raven. I'd never been inside Raven Hall, but I'd heard that we were accepted there. I parked and sat for a couple minutes fussing over my makeup. Finally, with a deep breath, I got out of the car and walked toward the bar.

My heart started beating rapidly. I found myself looking for "sisters." No one. Four men stood talking by an entrance. There was a second door by a pay phone. I headed away from the group and stood outside the door for several minutes. Peeking through the window I

could see it was packed inside. Again, no femme faces anywhere.

Trembling, I opened the door and entered. The crowd was shoulder to shoulder. The only clear space was right where I stood at the door. Three guys turned their heads in unison. I was certainly getting attention, but positive or negative, I hadn't the slightest idea.

I began to lose my nerve. An older man was gawking at me. My confidence ebbed. The place seemed like a truck stop without waitresses. I felt like the only woman in a three mile radius, completely out of place.

I fled and headed toward my car. Behind me I could hear two men jabbering. As they drew close, I overhead one of them say, "My goodness, broad shoulders." I knew the remark was directed at me and I cringed hearing their laughter.

I sat in my car and thought if I were a true woman I'd cry. The last time I cried was four years ago when I first saw my newborn son. Those were tears of happiness. Now I felt incredibly alone. I drove home pondering what I'd learned. When dressed, we're more vulnerable. To put yourself in a precarious situation, alone, is a big mistake.

My feelings of fear and rejection that Saturday night did not leave a scar, but it did make me realize that when my next free Saturday night comes along, it'll be spent either with Lynne or a "sister" at my side.

One recent weekend, and after a long absence from my garden, I had one of those retraining sessions. After reestablishing my identity to this canine skeptic, I spent a peaceful morning doing some necessary yard work. In the afternoon, I got dressed up, complete with long red wig, full makeup, a dress and heels. In short, a costume as different from my gardening clothes as night is from day. This, I thought, would be

the perfect way to enjoy the fading afternoon light in my garden.

As I opened the back door, I immediately remembered the vigilant yet forgetful dog, and planned my feminine response to his unwelcome attentions. For example, how would I throw those dirt clods as a girl? But instead of raising a ruckus that could be heard three blocks away, the beast simply looked at me with an expression that seemed to

say "Oh, its you again."

While I would prefer to believe that this response showed the dog to be the tolerant sort who recognizes the validity of transgendered behavior and who is committed to the rights of the individual, deep down inside I know that the creature simple read me for what I was—"that guy over there wearing a dress."

- Build Trust. You must have complete trust in your team members. If you find you can no longer trust someone, you need to make the tough decision to remove that person or the morale of the rest of the team is at stake.
- Don't solve every problem yourself. Facilitate the problem solving process but let your team

gain self-esteem by arriving at solutions themselves.

- Set standards. Don't condone incompetence or laziness. Weak links impair an organization. Replace those people who do not make effective contributions.
- Provide vision. Be an agent for change. If you are not good at long range planning, add people to your team that can. Look for the innovators.
- Be visible and available. Get to know the people in your organization. Talk with them and get feedback. Give praise where due. Don't just be visible, be approachably visible.

- Maintain a sense of humor.
   Take everything and everyone seriously except yourself.
- If you make a committment, keep it. Never renege on a promise.
- Be a good communicator. You must be able to teach your team the skills you have and share your insights and experiences with them.
- Set high personal standards ofintegrity. Never compromise your principles. Of all the qualities a leader must have, integrity is the most important.

We say "used to" because the Tempe, Ariz., resident last month pleaded guilty to a charge of burglary for entering a neighboring yard to snatch women's underwear. He is suspected of having committed similar crimes for the past 10 years.



It was recently revealed that one of Spain's most popular matadors, Salvador Sanchez, had a different sort of secret regarding transgender work clothes. Moments after he was fatally gored by a bull in the Pamplona bullring, doctors cutting away his bloody "suit of lights" discovered that Sanchez was really a woman.

News reports quoted a life-long friend of the matador as saying that as a little girl, Olivia Andrade dreamed of being a bullfighter. But because the profession is closed to women, Olivia became Salvador at age 15 following the deaths of her parents.

Nine years ago Sanchez married, and he and his wife later adopted two daughters. His wife was quoted as saying that throughout their marriage the couple slept in separate rooms and "never had sex because Salvador said he needed his strength for the bullring."



There were still more surprises in Europe. This year's competition for Miss Italy turned chaotic when it was discovered that Miss Naples, Lisa Visonti, was actually a man named Vincenzo. Journalists later discovered that the stunt had been staged by the Milan-based gay magazine Babilonia..



Now its time for an exercise in hypothetical logic. Suppose Salvador and Vincenzo were in Cleveland, Ohio, on a Saturday night and wanted a drink at the U4ia night-club. Would they be admitted? Well, under the club's dress code, Vincenzo could get in, but Salvador would be turned away. The club requires that women wear dresses or skirts, but also admits men wearing dresses or skirts.

According to manager Rob Farinacci, women in pants are bad for the club, but he refused to say why. Former patron Bynnna Fish (yes, that's her real name) says that the club, which is not a gay bar but has a mixed clientele, actually discriminates against lesbians. "This is unacceptable," she said. "They will allow men in drag to enter, but not women in drag."

Sources in the Cleveland gay and lesbian community claim that the bar encourages gay males and crossdressed men so that the club's "tourist trade" has something to gawk at.



Women in pants, Italian beauty queens and matadors aren't the only people who aren't all they seem to be. Take Episcopalians, for instance. Janice shared this item

from a church publication with us.

A letter-writer to the publication's "Dr. Church" advice column quotes a Newsweek item that said "you won't find stiletto heels on an Episcopal woman." The writer, without disclosing his or her gender, says, "I sometimes get a hankering to swish about in a pair of stilettos. Would that compromise my Epsicostatus?"

"Yours is a delicate question," Dr. Church replied, tongue firmly planted in cheek. "As a rule, shoes are a good guide to religious affiliation... Presbyterians favor stiff, stout brogues... Quakers and Unitarians are into Birkenstocks... For Southern Baptists it's cowboy boots." But high heels are "hard to identify with any reputable Christian group."

combat duty of some of my sisters, I am proud of my time in the Navy," Sinclair said. "I hope that next year we can collect the amount of information that will enable Renaissance to show that transgendered people

are a dedicated and are as patriotic as other Americans. This will help to break down some of the stereotypes that bind us."


PHILADELPHIA — We are very, very pleased and proud of our sisters in the 3R recovery group here.
