The West Virginia "Man Woman" Must Stand Trial.

Washington, March 16.—The supreme court of the United States today on motion quashed the writ of habeas corpus granted by Judge Jackson of the northern district of West Virginia in the case of Ellis Glenn, alias E. B. Glenn, and remanded the case for trial. This is the "man woman" case which has considerable attention in West Virginia. The woman for years masqueraded as a man under the name of Ellis Glenn. She was tried for forgery in Wood county, W. Va., at the term of court of 1901, and the jury disagreed. She claimed that at that time she was the sister of "Ellis Glenn." At the fall term of court, when she came to trial she claimed that she was being placed in jeopardy for the same offense and sued out a writ of habeas corpus before Judge Jackson. The writ was granted, whereupon Hunter H. Moss, Jr., prosecuting attorney, appealed from Judge Jackson's decision and the court today sustained the appeal.
