News was made Monday at:

NORFOLK, Va., where Mario Jaime Escamilla, a member of a U.S. scientific group in the Arctic, was indicted by a grand jury on a charge of second degree murder. Escamilla, of Santa Barbara, Calif., was accused of the shotgun killing of Bennie Lightsy, leader of a weather research team on Fletcher's Island, a floating ice pack 385 miles from the North Pole. A Navy investigator said Lightsy apparently was shot while trying to mediate a dispute of a 15-gallon crock of homemade wine. . . . **LONDON**, where Christine Jorgensen, who made headlines when she changed from man to woman in the early 1950s, said it was only in the last few years that she finally overcame all regrets at having the sex change operations. Miss Jorgensen, now 44, flew into London for the opening of the film "The Christine Jorgensen Story." The former George Jorgensen Jr. said she came close to marriage twice but didn't. She said she lives a quiet life in Hollywood, centered on a few close friends. . . . **ABERDEEN**, S. D., where it was just another school day for the Fischer quintuplets as they marked their seventh birthday. The four girls and one boy, children of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Fischer, are Mary Magdalene, Mary Catherine, Mary Margaret, Mary Ann and James. . . . **PHILADELPHIA**, where a \$3.2 million bid made last week for the luxury liner Queen Elizabeth at auction in Fort Lauderdale, Fla., was accepted by bankruptcy referees. Sale of the ship to C. Y. Tung, Nationalist Chinese shipping magnate, was confirmed at the request of receivers appointed last May when the Queen Ltd. declared bankruptcy. Tung said he plans to convert the liner into a sea-going college and rename her SS Seawide University.



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
