

In this issue , we are going to talk about shadows for the cheeks and eyes for the average TV. You must try to remember that you are trying to protray a Normal woman on the street. You shouldn't want to attract attention but to be able to mingle with the crowd and just be one of the many. Your make-up must be good enough to pass the occasional scrutinizing eye and yet simple enough not to attract too many eyes. Also , you must remember that the older a woman is , the less eye make-up she should wear. So we will start at the mature ages and digress from there.........

BETWEEN THE AGES OF 70 years to 50 years: Little if any eye make-up unless you are going to a long gown" event. And even then , very pale shade to match or compliment your attire. Your blusher should be very light pinl to pink rose. Always put on blush as seen in diagram "A".

UNDER THIRTY: Under 30 years its really how you dress that determines how you put your face on. And usually the crowd you are hanging around in or where you're going determines


what you wear etc.

The OTTAWA NON-SCENE with MICHELINE

Not been to many clubs lately. But if you like dancing, and are over 30, the scene here does not look too bright. Not only is disco dying, but even the new wave crowd is shrinking.

Of the gay clubs, which previously had the best disco music to dance to, L'Intendante has closed its doors, Le Trou du Diable, never really got opened properly due to liquor licence problems. La Chatte is having financial problems. It originally opened as a women's (only) club, but then because of insufficient customer support, decided to open its doors on Saturday nights to both men and women. Recently I went on a Saturday night to check it out, and found it closed on that night of all nights! The only gay club in Ottawa, the Coral Reef, is said to be having attendance problems, and is threatening to close soon. Sacs, which was the most popular gay club in Hull, is now said to attract more straights than gays. Disco Reflections (which I previously reported in this column as being one of the area gay clubs) never was gay according to the bar-man there that I spoke to.

Most of the straight clubs that previously specialized in disco are changing to live music. Examples of these are Shannons and the Playboy club. Disco 340 on Elgin St. which I really liked, has closed completely to make way for a large fashionable cafe. L'Auberge de la Chaudiere's La Boite has changed its disco style live music to other types, e.g. Mexican! (The night I was there, the Mexican band did try to play one disco number, but they had the beat hopelessly wrong!)

Recently the new wave scene looked promising here, and a second competing club, the "80's Club", opened. But all too soon, even that closed in favour of "Minsky's Burlesque" strip-tease club! There now only remains the original new wave club: "Rotters", but even that does not have bands booked every weekend night.

Where is everybody? Are they all staying home for lack of money? Or are they all outdoors enjoying the new spring weather?

A FASHION SHOW WITH A DIFFERENCE

Fashion shows are not unusual, especially in spring-time, even if they are held in the swank Chateau Laurier in Ottawa, they are nothing especial to write home about. But this one was special. It was held to a packed house of your typical snobbish straights in the posh but decaying ballroom of that hotel. They had come to see the most fabulous and outrageously beautiful gowns being modelled by a man, a female-impersonator and entertainer, our mistress of ceremonies and fashion commentator for the evening, Peaches Latour. And your Ottawa reporter, Micheline, was there.

This was the fashion show and review "Anything Goes", produced by Theresa Caron, and directed and choreographed by Jean Yves, presented by the Bytown Civitan Club of Ottawa, the proceeds of the show to help fund a group home for mentally retarded children in Ottawa. It was held on Sunday evening, March 30th.

Your reporter wore a new spring Cambridge blue skirt suit. She was escorted by a handsome young man by the name of Glen Paul, suitably formally dressed. (Glen turned out to be my fashion advisor for the evening.) The ladies were each given a daffodil upon entering. In response to a reference to discrimination, they offered to give Glen one as well, but he declined. We thought we would enter early, 20 minutes before the show was due to start, so as to get a good seat; but a couple of hundred other people had had the same idea - before us!

Unfortunately, due to a technical delay, the show started $\frac{1}{2}$ hour late, and even then there were obviously some sound problems. Jean Yves made the introduction in a white formal suit, and introduced some amateurs modelling the costumes used in the various productions of the local Orpheous Society over the past few years, some very pretty period costumes. This was accompanied by painfully out-of-tune live music played by the Ottawa Schrammel Quartet of the Austrian Society. The stage and runway was tricky for the models to negotiate, there being steps up to the stage at the entrance, and then steps down from the stage to the runway. One of the amateur models tripped and fell on her way back to the stage.

However, after this inauspicious start, the show became very professional. The music changed from live to tape. Peaches made her entrance to a wild reception from the expectant audience, complete with audience immitations of the well known "Peaches" bark".

Fashion parades alternated with dancing acts, with a magic act and a singing act thrown in for good measure. The dancers were excellent, both as a group and as soloists. The group's opening number was to the soundtrack of the opening scene of the film "All that Jazz."

The magician, Jacques Dextraze, was weak; but Peaches was something else. The sound troubles were not yet over. She kept her cool when the radio mike failed, though she looked daggers at the sound man (and if looks could kill) It looked as though we were going to be in for a silent fashion show, like the old silent movies, until someone produced a regular cable microphone. The dead radio mic later came in handy for the lip sync (mime) act of Louise Butterfly doing a Genette Reno number.

In the sea of straights, there was one noisy table of conspicuous gays. They were the ones taking all the pictures of Peaches, encouraging her on, and exchanging comments. Also spotted in the audience were two or three of the "street TSs" all done up in their finest for the show.

The mens' fashions were from Classy Formal Wear, and from a new (gay owned) mens boutique on Somerset St. called Des Jardins. The male models appeared to be rather amateurish, and picked for their appeal to (gay) men rather than for their modelling ability. (But then, if you want to sell clothes to men, it could be argued that there is no point in using models that appeal mainly to women.)

The women's fashions were from Flash Cadilac and The Hour Glass, with shoes from Le Chateau. The female models were completely professional. Some of them wore pretty new wave hairstyles and make-up. There were 8 women and 7 men.

Between each act, Peaches changed into a new outfit, as did the models. As an example of what she wore, one outfit was a stunningly beautiful white gown and Marilyn Monroe wig, with two white feather boas.

Flash Cadilac has a reputation here for beautiful clothes and sexy outfits. Their display of sexy bathing costumes was no exception.

Two of the lead dancers from the dance troup did a spectacular number to Manhatten Transfer.

Peaches appeared in a glittering turquoise gown with white boa, and then proceeded to ruin the image by describing the ensemble --- hair:- dynel; lashes:- plastic; tits:- birdseed; hips:- Canadian Tire; but she did admit to having her own nails, and proceded to acknowledge the manicurist.

Theresa Caron then drew for the door prizes, none of which Micheline (to her relief) won.

Following an intermission, the seven dancers, this time in brightly coloured costumes, opened the second half of the show. There were models on bicycles, models carried miniature "toy" dogs, walked dogs on leash, and Peaches appeared on stage on roller skates and did a little number. There was new wave fashion - a dress in pink and turquoise with matching hat.

A couple of young dancers, Serge (looked about 12 years old) and Lynn (she looked about 10) Leblanc did a stock tap dance routine.

Peaches came on in an antique (1920) black "widow" coat (velvetine, full sleeves, with high fur collar) on loan from Michelle Antique.

More female fashion. One of the prettiest was a beautiful flowing see-through mauve dress with red horizontal stripe around the hem and on the belt, with matching shoes. The dress was worn by an otherwise nude model. Other dresses had high side slits as is now commonly seen in Montreal.

The dancers again, this time with taps, sticks and top hats etc., all in black, dancing to what sounded like an original version of the Lennon Sisters.

And then the finale with all performers on stage. Peaches made her final entrance in a silver glittering gown, with white boa again, and the Marilyn Monroe wig, giving an impression very reminiscent of the Supremes.

The show had lasted over two hours. It was ambitious, a good try, but with mixed results.

Dear Editors,

I have two requests for the members of TAM.

Firstly, if enough of us want it, I would like to see a general membership list published and circulated to members (as opposed to the complete mailing list of the TAM journal/newsletter, some of whom presumably are not members.) Naturally, only those who want to be listed would be included. I suggest a telephone survey of members to determine who are willing to be included, and what and how much they would like listed. A minimum listing might include just first (femme) name and telephone number. Depending on the individual's situation, they may or may not want anything up to a complete "open" listing, with full name, mailing or home address, and phone number. I feel that such a list in the hands of all of us is desirable so that we can socialize and make friends outside the bounds of the regular 3weekly TAM meetings. Sometimes we have problems, and just need some understanding body to talk to over the phone. Othertimes we might feel like celebrating, and want to hold a party. It would certainly make such a party easier to organize if we knew how to contact those other girls that you would have liked to have come along. To this effect, I have submitted an advertisement to the editors, which hopefully they will accept and include in the newletter.

Secondly, from time to time we get asked why we are a TV. Not what is the cause of the phenomena, but rather why we continue to exhibit these characteristics. Obviously, we continue because we enjoy it, we like doing it. But what is there about transvestism that makes it enjoyable? Some will say that you have to be a TV to understand that feeling. But how do we explain it to outsiders? Is it just the clothes that become part of a sexual fetishism, or are they just a minor part of an external expression of an inner feminine feeling etc. etc.? Is our genderal identity part masculine and part feminine, both of which at times have to be expressed, in order to relax the inner tensions built up as a result of the conflict?

Some recent research indicates that many gender identity problems may be largly physical in nature, i.e. the identity related behaviour may be caused by actual differences in the brain as compared to the norm, caused by hormone level or type abnormality during brain development in the fetus or in the child just after birth. This subject is apparently covered in Science Magazine (AAAS), 7 September, 1979, p.985; and is reported in a 4 page article in the latest Journal of Male Feminism (1980, No. 1, published by the International Alliance.)

If we want to gain acceptance from society as a whole, it would seem desirable that we be able to explain to them what it is all about (not the chemical or physical causes, but what we feel, and why etc.). We have members in the media. What if they want to write up an effective and supportive article explaining our point of view, one that would gain us public acceptance. What would we say if one of us were interviewed? I think one of TAM's resources should be a pool of background information and ideas on this general subject area. I suggest that we start a forum in this Letters to the Editor column on this subject. Any ideas?

Dear Editors,

Some members of TAM have expressed an interest in knowing where to buy clothes, in which ladies wear stores are sympathetic to TVs. In the summer of 1975, I did a survey of some 103 boutiques and 15 departmental stores in Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto, and Peterborough. (It was a great summer, and lots of fun, trying on all those clothes in all those stores!). The survey showed at that time that 67% were officially in favour of allowing males presenting themselves as men to try on female clothing before purchase. Those same stores that had declined to allow men, presented no problem when the potential purchaser presented herself as a woman to the first assistant that asked to help, i.e. if you go "en femme", the positive result is 100%. (For further details, see Aquarian Age, Toronto, Fall 1975; and Journal of Male Feminism, 1977 Nos.4/5, published by the International Alliance, page 12.) I have noticed nothing since to indicate any change in these statistics. The main barrier to TVs buying openly at ordinary boutiques is not the public or the stores themselves, but fear and apprehension in the mind of the purchaser.

In 1977, the International Alliance for Male Women, in Washington, DC, did a telephone survey of all the boutiques in the Yellow Pages for that area, asking firstly if they minded men buying women's clothes, and secondly if there was any objection to these men trying on the garments before purchase. All the stores responded positively to both questions. As a result of this survey, the International Alliance cancelled its plan to publish a "Business Directory" for TV shopping. If this can happen in a major US metropolitan area, what have we to fear in the more liberal environment here in Canada.

However, what prompted me to write this letter, was a series of particularly encouraging experiences. Have you ever had trouble finding clothes that are long enough in the sleeve? I certainly have. When clothes start becoming important enough to you, and you wear them often enough that it is worth investing in a bit of quality, in clothes that fit properly and therefore look good on you, then it is probably worth spending a few more dollars on a coat or top which has sleeves of adequate length. Such a store is one of the Tall Girl Shops. These are a Calgary based chain of stores stretching from Victoria in the west to (unfortunately only) Ottawa in the east.

Apart from the advantage of fit, they would seem to be particularly sympathetic to TVs. I have now shopped there on a number of occasions. Whether I arrived at the store as Mike or as Micheline, I was encouraged to try on not just the clothes I fancied but also items which they thought would particularly suit me. Usually their advice turns out to be correct. Instead of embarrassed tolerance, one is welcomed by manageress and staff alike with what would seem to be genuine friendliness (I think more than just saleswomanship). They do not hurry you out of the store at closing time. One evening I inadvertently arrived just after they were due to close. Instead of saying "Sorry, we are closed" as most stores would do, they unhurriedly served me for at least $\frac{1}{2}$ -hour.

They really try hard to help. They are willing to alter hemlines to suit. If they do not have your size of a particular style that you like in stock, they are willing to search the stock of their nine other stores and order your size from the one that has it. If you are embarrassed by the presence of other women in the store, they suggest to you that you come on a Thursday evening when the store is least crowded.

The main disadvantage to these stores so far as I am concerned is that they do not take major credit cards. However, they do have their own credit card, and there is one advantage to this in that the credit check is done locally by the store manageress who after she is satisfied that your credit is good, approves the application which is then sent to Head Office. Head Office sees the application in the name of Micheline (and hopefully will provide a card in her name). The local credit check is done in

SEX AND GENDER, GAY OR STRAIGHT ?

The following thoughts were brought out into the open again by the sexual orientation question in the questionaire presented at the last TAM meeting. Specifically "Are you gay, hetero, bi ... etc. as he, and as she?"

We should be asking are we hetero- or homo-sexual separately from are we hetero- or homo-genderal.

Sex is defined in terms of chromosomes and in secondary sexual characteristics such as to what extent and in what form the genitals have developed. In these terms, we are male or female, or even hermaphroditic.

Gender is a state of mind, an identity, a way of feeling and behaving. In these terms, we are masculine or feminine, or even androgynous.

One's attitude to a person depends very much on their attitude and behaviour towards you. If a man treats you as a woman, then you can feel a heterogenderal attraction to that person. An uninformed observer, not knowing your feelings or your genderal self identity, might well regard your behaviour as homosexual. But to the participants, the feelings are hetero and conventional "boy-girl" type.

If a woman then treated you as a man (you might be a bit mixed up at first), but you then might well feel a heterogenderal (as well as heterosexual) attraction to the woman if you are transgeneral, i.e. able to switch your genderal identity according to mood or stimulus. If the same woman were to later treat you as a woman, then a homogenderal type attraction could result between you.

Would that make it a lesbian behaviour/feeling? I am not sure. I do not know if lesbian is a sexual or genderal term. Usually it implies both, as do male and masculine, and as female usually implies feminine etc.

Actually, I have been misusing my sex- and gender-describing nouns in the above. Male and female are both sex-descriptive adjectives and nouns. Masculine and feminine are gender-descriptive adjectives, whereas the corresponding gender-descriptive nouns are man and woman. Hence you might be a male or female man or woman, and you might be a masculine or feminine male or female. I will always remain a male, but I can be masculine or feminine (or androgynous), and I can be a man or a woman. Actually, in the sections above where I said "If a man treats you as a woman", and later: "If a woman treats you as a man....." I had in mind a male man treating you as a woman, and a female woman treating you as a man etc., but actually for the point I was making, whether they be male or female was irrelevant.

Presumably the questioner writing the questionaire had in mind whether you and your partner had the same or different genital equipment. Surely, more important is what you feel yourself to be in relation to the other, not what is physically under the clothes. Or, if you are in bed together, what you feel in your lover's arms with your eyes closed is surely more significant.
