One Cross-Port lady who was willing to talk with Bobbi was Gina P. Gina is an amazing TV. While standing over six feet tall in stockings, and being a very athletic individual, Gina creates one of the most feminine presentations at our functions. In the past, she shared with us her "coming out" to her mother and the joy which that brought. But I thought that we should try to delve a little deeper and see if we couldn't gain a better view inside our beautiful Amazon, Gina.

T.V.I. Gina, how did you happen to choose your femme name?

Gina: When I was filling out my membership form I had planned on being Jayne, but the show, "Martin." was on the television and he and his girlfriend, Gina were arguing. It was so funny, I decided to use "Gina" because it reminds me of that show and makes me feel good.

T.V.I. If you don't mind my asking, how old are you, and what are your measurements?

Gina: I'm 33. My birthday is September 15. I'm 6'2" TALL and weigh 190#. My measurements are 38 -34 - 41.

T.V.I. Gina, what is your earliest recollection of cross-dressing?

Gina: When I was 3 or 4 my mother would dress me as a girl and walk me around town. When I was 7 or 8 I would go out on my own wearing my sister's clothes and Mom's lipstick and shoes. I also spent a lot of time trying to dress my G.I. Joe in Barbie's clothes.

T.V.I. Do you have a favorite crossdressing memory?

Gina: There are many, but I guess the best so far would be when I showed up at Mom's house, fully dressed, and she didn't know it was me. Another that rivals that incident is when I made photo copies of a friend's children. Somehow my picture ended up in his copies. Now Gina is hanging on his wall. My friends all want to know who "she" is and think that she is "fine." I am so flattered because they have no idea that it is really me!

T.V.I. Gina, how long have you been a member of Cross-Port? And how did you learn about us?

Gina: I have been a member for about a year and a half. I was referred to Cross-Port after a couple of sessions with Dr. Richard Baum who said that he had attended a few of the first meetings.

T.V.I. How long then have you been coming to the meetings?

T.V.I. For you, what is the most satisfying aspect of cross-dressing?

Gina: Just the way it makes me feel. I am more comfortable fully dressed than at any other time. That is also one of the things that still bothers me: I seem to have better times as Gina than I do as my male self.

T.V.I. What most disturbs you as a cross-dresser?

As I just said, I'm happiest as Gina: Gina and sometimes think that I would be better off being a girl. I think that goes back to my childhood and the G.I. Joe episodes. Mom saw me doing this and asked how I would feel if she put my sister's clothes on me? I said, " I dunno!" Next thing I know, she grabs me up and, in front of my sisters and and brothers, starts dressing me in a pink ruffled dress, pink hair ribbons, pony tails, and lipstick. This was early afternoon and she made me stay dressed all day. Well, at 6:00 Dad came home from work. When I saw him coming I hid behind the couch and wouldn't come out when he called for

me. Mom pulled the couch back and there I was, crying. Dad looked at me and said <u>nothing</u>! Since I had been dressed all day my brothers and sisters had already gone beyond the laughing stage. I kind of thought that maybe it wasn't so bad...and besides, I liked the way I looked in the mirror. I began to do it on my own and still love it! But what disturbs me to this day is why Mom did it and why Dad said or did absolutely nothing.

Linda's Corner

I have just returned from *SOUTHERN COMFORT*. This was the forth time for this event, and I havn't missed one yet. Each year they seem to get a little better in both quality and size.

I gave a session and led a pub craw on Saturday night. Beside that, it was pretty much a fun conference for me. Met a lot of new faces, and renewed friendships from past years.

One thing I really did differently, is try to observe how and who ran the conference. With *BE ALL* only nine months away I tried to incompass both good and bad techniques. Actually, *SOUTHERN COMFORT* is ran extremely well, considering they are trying to please so many individual groups.

To give you some comparisons, lets look at the numbers first. Their attendance was 300+ without a doubt. And I will bet another 50 or so just showed up in the bar and regestration area just to party and seek general information. *BE ALL* this year had aproximately 200 attendees, but over 300 when in Chicago the previous year. We expect about 250.

SOUTHERN COMFORT held about 110 sessions, being very strong and specific in M-F, F-M, SO, & TG tracks. We currently only plan about 35 sessions, and ours will be more general and all inclusive in nature. Also, most of their sessions usually ran 60 minutes of which 15 were lost while sessions changed. Our sessions will all be 90 minutes in the afternoon, and 120 minutes in the morning.

We'll have lunch speakers, they didn't. We will probally have more outside activities and more Theme type dinners. Certianly our pool party and boat ride will be one step up on their dinner only, mid-week nights.

Anyone who is interested in working on the BE ALL, and keeping abreast on the progress is encouraged to come to GJ Gaslight's for dinner before our regular meetings.

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Holloween is but a few weeks away. Again this year, a group of us plan to meet for dinner and then head to Dayton's Orgeon district to party with the thousands of other wild and crazy people. As for the past years, we plan to make our home in the Trolly Stop, which is the last bar in the strip.

Last year their were about 10 of us who braved the 10 degree weather and we certianly hope you can join us this year. I'm not sure if we are returning to Pedro's Mexican Restarunt again or not, but they did enjoy us there and I know we all loved it.

This year, I have spoke with several of you about dressing as "Hooter's Girls". I think we could have a real "Hoot!" with this. I stopped down in Newport and told the manager who was sitting in the tee shirt booth that some of us were thinking of going out.
