Gays Commemorate Stonewall

From a powder blue convertible Cadillac, Queen Allyson Allante waved to adoring fans along Fifth Avenue.

Allante's 1969 classic had been impounded 25 years ago in front of the Stonewall bar during the riots, but it's still in mint condition.

Because the car is her only memento from the riots, Allante, a drag queen from Long Beach.
L.I., said it was all the more important for her to follow the "alternative" parade route, which was not officially permitted, from Sheridan Square to Fifth Avenue, and then up to Central Park.

"It's faaaaabulous. This is the real thing. This parade went through the historical sites of

Stonewall," said Allante, president of the Imperial Queens of New York, a support group for drag queens and their families.

A sanctioned parade that went by the United Nations drew tens of thousands more gays, but Allante and others felt that march was too restrictive and unfair for not allowing some groups, such as the Association, to participate. In a red, sequined gown, Allante led some 7,500 of them up Fifth Avenue.

"They should have a march in front of the United Nations when the United Nations is open! Am I right?" Allante said. In the larger sanctioned parade up First Avenue, there were drag queens as well.

"I'm so happy that I made a difference, a meaningful difference. And I was dressed like this!" said Ivan Valentine, 46, who was part of the original Stonewall riot. He was wearing a rainbow sequined dress, a huge yellow wig, high heels, long fake eyelashes and a heavy layer of bright blue eye shadow and blush.

In the alternative parade, a dozen or more nudists ran up the steps of the New York Public Library and performed pirouettes before the great lions. The leather clad—those in wraps and ones with pierced nipples—marched among the rest of the gays or lesbians, and with those who just wanted to show their pride.

And clearing the way for all of this

was an <u>ACT-UP</u> supporter with a bullhorn screaming, "If you are not a parade marshal, if you are not police, if you are not legal support, then please stand clear. No! Please stand queer!"

One of the not-so-unusual people there, Dorothea Jacob, 48, from Schenectady, N.Y., rode in the "Stonewall Vets" convertible at the front of the parade. She remembered the riots 25 years ago.

"It was very hard for us then. Say, if you were my lover, you would have had to dress as a man or we couldn't hold hands or be seen together in the streets. At the Stonewall it was different, but as soon as you left you had to act straight," Jacob said.

That was not the case during the parade, though, for Radical

Faeries Jim Montgomery and a man who gave his name as Mateo, from Berkeley, Calif. They walked the parade route naked.

"It's comfortable," said Montgomery, a 28-year-old schoolteacher.

The parade did not go by without a protest, though.

Tom Faraci, 41, from Port Jefferson, L.I., stood at 59th Street and Sixth Avenue with a sign that warned gays would go straight to Hell, but that Jesus could save them. "I'm here just to expose their sin, not to condemn them. The only one who can set them free is Jesus," Faraci said.

Then one marcher, half-nude and feeling free, ran up to Faraci and screamed, "Jesus was a faggot!"

Just like June 27, 1969, there was a very Gay controversy! Obvious to everyone, some Gays "still don't get it". Maybe now they will since it has been exposed fully and, hopefully, all will act upon unity instead of dissention, demonization and exclusion—as shadily shown by the "INT"L GAY MARCH COMMITTEE". Well, you do not have a "Gay March" (bad enough they--inside the community--surrendered OUR parade) and "leave out" a majority of the legendary STONEWALL Vets--such as:

And... you do not ever attempt to leave out "THE STONEWALL CAR", which has been in all 24 parades prior to 1994 and was in the "unofficial", and, if you will, illegal, 1969 "march" to the NEW YORK CITY POLICE DEP'T 6th PCT. How many from the "INT'L COMMITTEE OF EGOTISTICAL GAYS" were at that event? The answer is the same as their brazen and rude attitude: ZERO. Many of them do not even know the correct date or day!

Unlike the year-long, no-response, no-return phone calls from the phone-y "INT'L MARCH COMM." (notice to keep the ST-25 logo--which they

T WAS EARLY, NOT EVEN MIDNIGHT, so "Little Orphan Annie" and "Hormona" and "Sissy" and "Twinkie" and "Cross-eyed Sylvia" meandered about, waiting to gussy up, when they saw six cops pass through the door of 53 Christopher St.

"Stonewall" happened next.

Into the wee hours that first weekend of summer on Sheridan Square, hundreds of gays raged against a wall of blue. Their call

became Gay Power.

Out of the rubble of the Stonewall Inn, a riot-gutted gay Village tavern across from the park on a pleasantly warm Friday, June 20, 1969, the foundation for a new civil rights movement suddenly fortified.

Theirs was an inadvertent glory. They were random idlers; young, homeless drag queens, many underage, joining forces with men and some women, young and old.

"None of us shaved and showered to go to an uprising," said Bob Kohler, 68, who was walking his schnauzer, Mr. Magoo, that night.

Some wore blouses and makeup. Others were in madras and loafers, coats and ties.

Some had come over from Wall Street. Others arrived from the Frank E. Campbell Funeral Home dressed in black and emerald slippers. where Judy Garland had laid in state.

Some were outside for a summer stroll. Two hundred others had dropped by for "Aquarius" on the jukebox, a drink and a dance, a \$3 cover, a quarter for two songs.

MIDNIGHT BUST

A little past midnight, the 6th Precinct launched an ordinary evening's ordinary bust, a liquor-license beef.

"It was a big joke because bar raids were common," said Kohler. "You thought, here we go again. ... Nobody blinked an eye."

This night, somebody did.

Williamson Henderson, a popular teen local - Allyson Allante when dressed in drag - whose blue Caddy parked out front was legend, was one of the first the cops arrested, breaking his collarbone.

A bottle was thrown and a brick hurled and the park boys, buoyed by growing le-, gions of gays and nongays. pelted cops with coins, and a trash can was set ablaze.

" 'You better run, Lilly Law!' 'Girls in blue, we're gonna get you!' the boys started yelling," said Kohler.

The cops escaped past the black-painted Stonewall windows and barricaded themselves inside, against shattering glass and a battering-ram parking meter.

Around them, on the narrow Sheridan Square streets. spur-of-the-moment rebels battled the suddenly appearing Tactical Patrol Force formed in the wake of Vietnam War protests - with everything from bricks to lighter fluid and matches and a high-kicking chorus line.

They raged three nights. two others quelled by rain.


"Gay Power" - organized - had come to Mayor John Lindsay's town.

'GAYEST' WEEK IN HISTORY

Today an Indian clothing boutique shares the building with Stonewall, the bar, Next Sunday, as 1 million 25th anniversary celebrators link arms in "the gayest week in' the history of the world," said Henderson, Stonewall will be filled with photographs of what happened then.

The memories of the witnesses are varied.

Did Sylvia Rivera, beloved drag queen, throw the first brick or didn't she? Did her friend, Marcia P. (Pay-it-nomind) Johnson, who guarded Henderson's Caddy, \$3 a night, make it every night to

fight, or didn't she?

Whoever did what, when, there is a common bottom line. As heirs to the struggles over Vietnam and black civil rights, Stonewall combatants walked all walks - "regular, gay people and young drag queens, transvestites and people not even gay," said Henderson.

"This could not have happened in 1959," said history professor Martin Duberman, whose book "Stonewall" is the acknowledged chronicle of those nights.

'NOTHING TO LOSE'

"They were people who had nothing to lose, the runaways, the outcasts, the transvestites, the drag queens." said Jay Blotcher, former media coordinator for ACT UP and Queer Nation. "They were the ones who took it on the chin, defiantly."

"These kids were the real Stonewall warriors," said Kohler. "They were the first to throw things, to taunt. If they had not been across the street, there would be no Stonewall riot."

25 years ago, on the first weekend of summer at Sheridan Square, hundreds of gays raged. Gay Power was born.

The Daily News returns to 53 Christopher St. that night, the account based on Kohler and other witnesses who had, by happenchance, converged there:

■ Henderson/Allante, who doesn't give an age — today a personnel agency owner and

officer in the Imperial Queens of New York, founded in Stonewall's wake — had dropped by for a nightcap.

Jeremiah Newton, 45, now a film industry liaison to the NYU film department, had run into friends from Judy Garland's funeral that day. He needed to lift his spirits.

Mama Jean, today 62, a Connecticut state employe, then in Cookie's, a lesbian bar on 14th St., walked with three friends toward Pan-Pan's, 8th St., to dine on bacon and eggs.

■ Howard Cruse, a cartoonist now 50, high on acid, uptown, then, grabbed a taxi downtown.

"Stonewall was one of the very few places the run-of-the mill gay man could go to dance, which was totally illegal," recalled Kohler, who owns a clothing store on Christopher St. "It even had go-go boys dancing on the bar."

"For a young person who wanted to dance into the night," said Newton, "it was the most wonderful place."

Until June 2, 1969, they did.

DIANA ROSS WAS CROONING

One a.m. <u>Diana Ross</u> on the jukebox. <u>Henderson</u> — "I was there as a boy that night" — danced.

A panicked staffer on raidwatch suddenly flooded the colored dance-floor lights with whites and pulled the jukebox plug. The warnings weren't in time.

"The cops came charging in," said Henderson, arrested for disorderly conduct, resisting arrest and loitering. "They put us in lines, checked I.D.s, which most people didn't have. They started taking people out. Things got nasty."

At Greenwich Ave., Newton heard sirens and saw red bubble lights eerily washing over taunts, cries and shattering glass.

"I looked up at the Women's House of Detention to people screaming out the windows, sticking pieces of flaming toilet tissue out the mesh, alerting us," he said. "The flames falling to the ground reminded me of a modern Pompeii."

A rookie guarded the Stonewall door. "A bottle went flying in a perfect arc, showering him with splinters," said Newton.

Two doors west, said Duberman, the Lion's Head Inn locked up. Apartment doormen barricaded doors with broom handles.

"The cops were in total, absolute panic," said Kohler.

"They retreated into the Stonewall and barricaded themselves."

They somehow commandeered a fire hose. "They opened the door to hose us," said Kohler. "But this being New York, nobody had bothered to check the hydrant. Only a trickle flowed."

Then came the Tactical Patrol Force, and the tension turned from the bar back to the streets. "These cops came out of two buses like robots and lined up in the streets, arms folded across chests," said Kohler.

Newton thought how the hot, muggy air could do no good when he heard more breaking glass and saw cops placing 28 case of beer and 19 liquor bottles into a van.


A young guy asked: "What's going on? I'm straight. I got no place here. I'm going home," said Kohler, who saw him minutes later "being dragged through the streets, covered in blood."

Most of those who saw the light that night have vanished. Marsha P. Johnson's body was found in the Hudson River. Sylvia Rivera moved away. The park boys are departed, many of them dead. Many are lost to AIDS.

Cruse, who grew up in Birmingham, Ala., is writing a novel about the times of civil rights and being gay and Southern, then.

Henderson still drives his Caddy to Stonewall: "I'm always going in there expecting to see someone from a quarter-century ago."

Mama Jean and Kohler went on to be activists: she the grand marshal of the first gay pride march in June 1970, he founding member of the Gay Liberation Front that July.

exploited--away from THEM), in contrast, the symbolic ACT-UP & OTHERS took about one second to "decide". Of course, "YES" they wanted "THE STONEWALL CAR" to rightly lead "THE STONEWALL MARCH". And, so it did. And, so did all the media report in print and on television!

Public officials who supported and marched in "THE STONEWALL 5 AVE. MARCH" included U.S. Congressman Jerrold L. Nadler, former N.Y.S. Senator and Judge Karen Burstein, several representatives of N.Y.C. Councilman Antonio Pagan, among many others. Even N.Y.C.P.D. Commissioner William J. Bratton personally and pleasantly oversaw "THE STONEWALL MARCH."

At 57th St. & Fifth Ave., a truly incredible, historic/herstoric Gay scene and display of unity--at last--was demonstrated. Both marches arrived at that critical junction at the exact same moment in time!! The exclusionary "INT'L GAY MARCH ON THE (closed) U.N.", the offending, ignoring, insulting group, met their overwhelming numbers of excluded and reacting objects.

The former "Big Wigs" quickly pow-wowed and at last "recognizing" the immensity of all those excluded--headed by "THE STONEWALL CAR"--acquiesced and yielded the "right-of-way" to the STONEWALL Marchers. Twenty-five years ago, it was the N.Y.C.P.D. who "acquiesced" to the righteous and determined STONEWALLERS.


Ultimately, in 1994, all converged in a 1.2 million CENTRAL PARK GAY PRIDE RALLY & SHOW, which featured entertainment by the late Judy Garland's great daughter, Liza Minnelli; Gregory Hines (whose brother is Gay); RuPaul (speaking of Drag Queens); Harvey "Torch Song" Fierstein; "Sister Act" Cathy Najimy, Et Al.

More important, there were poignant, hopeful speeches. At the very last moment—after the STONEWALL VETERANS ASS'N "fought" the "INT'L COMM. BIG WIGS" in one of the latter's last-minute, attempted, final insults (they were going to give their own speech on behalf of the ASS'N OF STONEWALL VETS)—Qn. Allyson Allante, with thunderous applause for the STONEWALL VETS, presented the authorized speech composed by the actual STONEWALL VETERANS ASS'N (S.V.A.). Many of the original STONEWALL VETS were on stage with her. It was very emotional and inspiring.

"Thank you, thank you, thank you . . ." the crowd chanted to the VETS of "THE GAY WAR". The War (a series of 5 nights back on June 27, 28, 29 and July 2 and 3 of 1969) sparked "Gay Power", "Gay Rights", "Gay Now" and the entire "Gay Family MOVEMENT". This is what all the real Gay People and the Gay Lip Servicers were actually supposed to be celebrating.

"SOMEDAY WE'LL BE TOGETHER", the last #1 song of the 1960's and a Gay Unity theme for ALL Gay, bisexual and transgender people, Queen Allyson urged its message to the accepting crowds and all includes the victims of THE AIDS WAR-past, present and future. The STONEWALL VETS won the 1969 GAY WAR and ignited the Gay Rights Movement. Now, in 1994, out of necessity, we are urging Gay Unity. Can you feel it?

"STONEWALL <u>26</u>" will be the first year to demonstrate the new awareness, bravery, comradery, determination, visibility and **U-N-I-T-Y**, which are the *real* "SPIRIT OF STONEWALL". Gay diversity was a strength--not a weakness--at *THE STONEWALL REBELLION.* "Go ask ALICE".

What, arrest \$,000 gays?

Mayor Giuliani insisted yesterday that his decision not to arrest gay marchers who paraded without a permit didn't violate his law-and-order stand.

"It is not conceivable that you can

"It is not conceivable that you can arrest 5,000 people without creating an enormous riot, so what you do is you allow them to march," he said.

"The first thing you take into consideration is, how do you create the least amount of damage to other human beings?"

That explanation didn't wash with the Rev. Rueben Diaz, a controversial Civilian Complaint Review Board member.

Diaz, a Giuliani ally who's been under fire for anti-homosexual re-

marks, said the illegal parade was an "abominable display of indecency, and a total disregard for the law."

<u>Giuliani</u> defended Chief of Department John Timoney's decision to allow the Fifth Avenue march after the city denied a permit for it.

3 Some of the participants in the illegal parade, which wasn't sanctioned by the organizers of the main gayrights procession, marched naked.

Giuliani sharply dismissed any suggestion that the look-the-otherway tactic contradicted his gettough philosophy.

He said it was "off the wall" to compare his actions to those of former Mayor Dinkins during the Crown Heights riot in 1991.

In the mayoral campaign, Giuliani blasted Dinkins, saying he let police stand by idly during as rioters attacked people and destroyed prop-

Meanwhile, authorities said the city spent \$1.5 to \$2 million in overtime for cops and about \$24,000 in overtime for sanitation workers for both parades and the Central Park rally on Sunday.
