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WILMA'S VIEWS

SEEKING ACCEPTANCE:

What emotional force that drives the crossdresser to follow a course that can lead to great personal humiliation and loss for himself and family, which he also pays a considerable price in guilt feelings. To overcome thei he is greatly desirous of acceptance by his wife or girlfriend and by society as a whole. Such acceptance is difficult to obtain. Society is greared to reject any suggestion of femininity in a man. I am aware of the redeculous extrems to which some people can carry the destinction between what is masculine and what is feminine. The indivedual wife who wants to understand, has a difficult time because she is thinking in female terms while the crossdresser is a male trying to identify with e femininity. As a male he doesn't understand women. He is trying to identify with his man's concept of woman and is trying to identify with a women who does not exist. The things he craves most in his femininity are not that important to his wife, as a womenshe cannot comprehend how they could be so descreable as to justify the disrupting influence they have on there lives. A woman likes nice clothing and wants to appear attrac-tive. to the wife her role as a wife and as a mother are much more important. tive, to the wife her role as a wife and as a mother are much more important. Nowhere in fiction which portrays the crossdresser being able to assume the feminine role in appearance in domestic chores or bussiness accupation or as X the passive partner in the sexual role, or no expression of a desire to assume a maternal role. The woman likes nice clothing for the appearance they create but gets no thrill out of putting on or wearing feminine clothes. She cannot understand why the girdle and high heels she can't wait to take off are such of compulsive desire to her husband. In her sex relations where the spiritual pleasure plays a greater part in her pleasure than it does in the mans pleasur it is difficult for her to feel she is submitting to her aggressive lover when she has a mental picture of him in femininr clothing. Were it possible for a man to be transformed into a beautiful female - to live the life as a woman, most of them would be very dissapointed, and would long to be men again. Society and nature put many restrections on women that men would find difficult to adjust to. When you say you honor women by wanting to be like them you must remember you are selecting those aspects of femininity which appeal to you and discarding the rest. A woman cannot do this and may have difficulty accepting a understanding the concept of the woman that YOU are trying to potray. I do not view the plight of the crossdresser without compassion. I sense the urgency and the magnitude of the emotional force which drives him. But I think this force is so strong as to tend to make him selfish. In seek-ing acceptance from his wife he may forget that her psyche, her social pres-sures and her perjudices may compell her to reject this transvestism with a fury equal to his need to pursue it. He may be required to have as much understanding as he hopes to receive.

DIFFERING OPINIONS:

I have been asked if I would print material of differing opinion of my own, I have done so in the past and will do so again. I make only one reservation. The philosphy of this Journal is that <u>PEACE OF MIND</u> is the important thing in the life of a TV and that it cannot achieve this in an inviroment of loneliness, guily and fear. Therefore this Journal and club exists to find the TV to assure him, he is not alone, help him to conquer guilt and fear by help² ing him to understand and to accept his femmeself. Now there may be various ways of accomplishing these and I'm pleased to print the ideas of others. However I draw the line at using the pages of the Journal to foster "Sick -Sick - Sick" philosophy that some expouse. If this being grounds for accusayions that "I only ptint views that agree with my concept," then make the most of it! I've worked to long, and far to hard, and have been through too much to establish this Journal, to give a certain statue and respectability to want to undermine its works just to gain the approval of those who prattle of "open mindeness." Just as freedom does not require granting license to undermine the source of freedom, so open mindeness does not require opinions distructive of the very medium that permits their expression. So with the framework of helping people toward understnading, acceptance and happiness I'll print anything, weather I agree or not, but only if it will serve these ends.

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THE UNDIE WORLD OF CAROL T. - THE FOUNDATIONS OF FEMININITY Regular readers of the Journal have probably read a couple of articles by me on (1) the beauty, fun, and art of daily feminine underdressing, (2) a TV's guide to lingerie shopping in the Capital District and (3) a buyers guide to intimate apparel catalogs. I have received some very positive feedback and would like to hear from any of you concerning the subjects I address. I trust Wilma will forward any personal coorespondance until my address is in your directory. I am very interested in and feel quite qualified to discuss the UNDIE WORLD and I'll keep writing, if you keep reading-s pecial thanks again to Wilma for this beautiful opportunity for all of us to keep in touch and share our femininity.

Every so often someone says something that starts my mind searching for inner motovations for my femininity. This happened the other day when I received what has come to me to be the ULTIMATE feminine compliment. It was so simple - but my wife said "you have a very nice figure." Wow, the words still ring like music in my ears. I've received many com-pliments to my femininity over the years- you know "lovely hair", "nice lipstick", "pretty dress", "love your blouse", "neat stockings", etc, etc, but none had ever hit me quite the way that one did. Why, I wondered? I think, after much thought, that my FIGURE IS <u>ME</u> and a very important, basic and visable statement of my femininity, and I'm very very proud of it!

Over the years I have often reflected upon my intense and ongoing interest in underfashions. Why have I set up files on the subject, done much research, written to the companies, subscribed to catalogs and trade journals- why indeed have I spent thousands of dollars on every imaginable feminine undergarment??? Much of the answer lies in my serious commitment to my own femininity and a great desire to carve a nice FIGURE from less than desireable material. OH YES, I jog and do situps, bust exercises and watch my weight but apparently what my wife was seeing in a sweater and jeans was a "nice FIGURE", not a good makeup job, sexy lingerie, pretty skirt or even my hairless chest, underarms and legs. She saw my small but well defined and shaped breasts, a flat stomach, high round derriere and small but decernable hips. I diden't even have lipstick on! On this particular evening I had, in fact, rather hastily chosen a contour cup 36A Warners bra, bikini panties and a padded girdle from Fredericks. And that was it. I haden't spent hours selecting just the right underfashions or hours on makeup or outerwear, wigs etc. Hell the bra and girdle were different colors! NO wonder, I thought, no wonder I own 50+ brassieres, dozens of girdles, cinches, basques, merry widows etc. It was all worth it, I had, according to a well trained and critical feminine eye- A NICE FIGURE. What a great feeling. The point is my NICE FIGURE is mostly a result of the proper underfashions worn correctly at the right time. Lets see if you too can catch the feminine figure fever, I hope I can help.

It's a wonderful feeling to be all dressed isn't it? Makeup, wig, jewelry, perfume, shoes, dress, stockings, you know, ALL dressed. To act, to speakin a feminine way, to discuss feminine things, are all fantastic. But what about that FIGURE? Isn't it really the FOUNDATION of your femininity. Remember when bras and girdles were called foundations? That was a pretty good definition and more descriptive than "intimate apparel". My panties are "intimate" but my brassiere is a true FOUNDATION. My garterbelt is sexy and indeed "intimate" but my fanny forming girdle is a FOUNDATION to my FIGURE. Without the right foundations you will never optimize your figure. If it took me \$10,000 and 15 years to get a "NICE FIGURE" maybe I can help you do it quicker and cheaper. Yes, I know, a decent bra runs \$12-\$20. I own a couple of \$50 bras and a \$175 merry widow but you don't have to go that far. What you will need are a few basic facts about what foundations can and can't do for your figure and to know what is available. I'll be covering these subjects in considerable detail as long as Wilma (and you) continue to find them interesting.

Let's take a quick look at some of the things we can look at during the coming months. Starting at the "top", the brassiere is probably the most little understood garment in the history of feminine clothing. Studies show that MOST women wear the wrong size bra. In my travels I happen to have made the acquaintance of a brassiere designer who was most helpful and taught me that there is a bra for every woman on earth but most never find it. Of course that just deals with the BASIC bra, not a wardrobe of brassieres which every woman should have. One reason for this problem is that many woman simply don't care. They have enough breast to fill a cup and they wear a bra to hold up their breasts-period. The small breasted girl (that describes most of us I trust) has an entirely different set of circumstances and wears a bra for entirely different purposes. To enhanse the breasts, or to shape them, to lift them, to form cleavage, to pull them or point them. Did you know that 82% of bras sold are in AA, A, or B cup sizes. That means most women have very specific missions for their bras to which the bra industry has responded in a most comprehensive way. There exists today FIVE TIMES the selection of just eight years ago. Most woman aren't burning their bras anymore, they're buying record numbers.

And what about waist cinches. More around than EVER. They're sexy and even comefortable. Merry Widows Oh how I love em. They're in the WARDS catalog. Yes girls it's more fun and exciting than ever before to learn about, shop for and wear foundations. And you just might find a NICE FIGURE too. See you next month, Wilma willing,
