At the beginning of the new term for the ExCom, I think it would be appropriate for me to make a statement concerning how I see the current situation and how I see the ensuing year playing out. Heading into the 1998-99 term, the ExCom has not changed dramatically. Darcy, Erin and Telzey have stepped aside and have been replaced by Lulu and Nicole. Our outgoing ExCom members should receive a hearty vote of appreciation for all their hard work, accomplishments and dedication.

The fact that most of the ExCom members have reenlisted I think speaks for the dedication and determination to get the job done. Although the last two years have not always gone the way we would have liked, I am very pleased to have been a member of the ExCom and to have been a part of a very heartfelt and dedicated effort to realize many exceptional events (education seminars, on the town events, pride participation, KQED fundraising and other outreach efforts, Cotillion and Cal-Dreamin' to name a few).

It is encouraging and important that our membership is closely following the current situation and that many of you are voicing not only encouragement but also your concerns and criticisms. The ExCom is to be held accountable by and to the membership. The opposite side of that coin of course is that we can not do it alone. We need the help of all who have time and/or resources to give.

There are many who could carry on their transgendered life without ETVC. But would it be as fun? Could we lose ground? What about our many sisters who depend on the strength of the group to help them sustain their awakening and to find hope? Imagine San Francisco without a leading transgendered group. The truth is that ETVC is a marvelous place to connect and to grow. The ExCom has no intentions of allowing this organization to go out of business.

So where do we go from here? We need to reverse our financial difficulties. We need to have a stable and attractive venue for our socials that can attract more response and that is worth the cover charge. We need to sustain the quality of our newsletter which is the voice of our group/community. We need to operate the cotillion without losing money and to be sure of what it is we are trying to accomplish with the event. We could be more visible in the community, take a leadership role in advancing the transgendered agenda and be a better partner in the LGBT community (we win or lose together).

Are we getting anywhere in regards to these issues? The response to our new venue (Charpes) in May was very positive. You'll have to come out to a social to see for yourself. Ayme Kantz has taken over for Elizabeth as the editor of The Channel and has been instrumental in cutting the cost dramatically. I also sense that the newsletter will be very lively under her editorship. I have reserved the San Francisco Design Center Galleria again for the Cotillion. The challenge is to make it work financially. The benefits are obvious to anyone who attended last year. Dianna is doing a great job as Miss ETVC as did Dale the year before. The Pride Parade was in June and the Aids Walk is on July 19. I'll see you at ETVC.

individual calling the hotline or writing a letter saying they can't be more active, but what if you tried this idea and here's how it would work. We need volunteers on our Committees: Education, Outreach and Social. Surely there's somewhere that you can offer a contribution, no matter how small. Short on ideas but have a little spare change? Cut us that tax-deductible check - our Treasurer will be happy to send you a receipt.

A new name is a good start. And the new ExCom has a lot cookin' on the stove already. But this is YOUR club, not ExCom's and their peripheral supporters. Like I told a new member recently, you're only going to get out this as much as you put in to it (a clumsy way of saying you reap what you sow). So please, dear sisters...give of yourself if you can; it will all come back to you.

And Speaking of ExCom...

In an effort to keep all of us a little bit more up-to-date, I hope to coordinate ExCom's monthly meeting better with my publishing deadline so that we can print the previous month's Minutes instead of the two-month lag we're currently experiencing. By the August issue, we'll be a bit more caught up with current goings on.

And as you know, we have a new Executive Committee for 1998-99. The end of month social on July 30th would be the perfect opportunity for you to meet them. Charpes seems to show promise as a venue where we may be able to negotiate a more permanent recurring event for them (check out Nicole's article on page 10). If we can show up in strength and let their management know that we could provide similar numbers on a monthly basis (or more?), our search for Chez Mollet II may be over. 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May 98 ExCom Meeting Minutes

The monthly meeting of ETVC's Executive Committee was at 2:00 on May 10 at Lisa Ronald's. In attendance were President Erin Souza, Vice President Leslie Bailey, Secretary Veronica Smith, Treasurer Lisa Ronald, Outreach Co-Chairs Sandra Brewer and Telzey Adams, Education Co-Chairs Nancy Cupps and Juana Smith, and Social Co-Chairs Darcy Leopard and Evette RoqueLaurie.

The Meeting was called to order at 2:15 p.m. Communications and Announcements: There were very few announcements. The Closet Ball had been postponed. Darcy moved that April's Minutes be approved, Sandra seconded; they were unanimously approved.

President's Report

The storage locker had been cleared out. A lot of things were dumped and Erin now has some posters that were housed there. Erin thanked everyone for their help during her administration for the last two years and also for their participation in California Dreamin'.

Vice President's Report

Leslie's tax accountant could do ETVC's taxes for around \$600, cutting the tax preparation fees in half. But it was pointed out that the present tax person was an attorney with expertise in tax law. Leslie saw her budget to be around \$12,500 with almost all going to the Cotillion and around \$500 going to the Parade. She wanted to get an earlier start for next year's Cotillion. She had reserved the Design Center for February 6, 1999 (and was placed on the waiting list for January 30). The subject of concessionaires was broached. Nancy wanted to get the food preparation out of ETVC hands. It was a headache and not remunerative. Because the Cotillion was being discussed, Sandra passed out a critique of the Miss ETVC judging process. The ExCom did not discuss Sandra's critique at the meeting.

Secretary' Report

Membership is 327 total with 83 new. Veronica passed out her projected budget. Depending on what shape the newsletter would ultimately take and what breaks the new editor could get on copying costs, the Secretary's budget varied widely (between \$4,252 and \$8,104). It was again suggested, but again not definitely decided, to alternate an eight pager with a sixteen pager, thus maximizing the postage savings but at the same time providing monthly service to the club. If this is indeed the final decision of the ExCom and Editor, then the Secretary's budget should be around \$5,437 (or about half of what it was two years ago).

Treasurer's Report

Lisa wants yearly budgets and 60-day projections of expenses by the 5th of every month. Nancy asked if she wanted projected revenues also. Lisa said she wanted everything, every month. Juana wanted a donations list and Lisa printed it out. A break was taken from 3:45-4:15

Outreach Committee


Melissa, Sandra and Telzey had met to discuss advertising. It has become very expensive in some of the usual local publications. The Guardian would come to around \$2.500 yearly. The Bay Times was free but did not bring many in. TV Epic brings people in and is cheap. Frontiers has ETVC listed. Juana wondered what the cost was in neighborhood newspapers such as The Independent. Sandra proffered the concept of having sympathetic reporters (if any could be found) who would profile ETVC, thus providing a lot of free publicity. Nancy suggested that hot line volunteers should routinely ask, "How did you hear about us?" Erin brought up Bob Davis' suggestion about post card sized ads to be left in bars and promising locations. Erin asked about getting listed on the Web under City Search or Sidewalk.com. TG Forum lists ETVC. Telzey had no specific figure, but her experience has been that half of the callers she talks to on the hot line had discovered ETVC on the Web. Nancy emphasized again that the Net was the future and suggested that the officers make better use of the valuable service Q was willingly providing. The officers should give Q as much information as often as possible for the web site. Miss Q has been energetic, proactive and diligent.

Leslie, Melissa, Sandra, Diane and Anne have had recent speaking engagements. ETVC was invited to participate in a panel discussion on Saturday, June 20. ETVC will participate with KQED's pledge night on Wednesday, June 24, 1998 (and she would like 100 envelopes to do a mailing to interested parties). ETVC and FTM will share an information booth in the Civic Center during and after the Gay Freedom Day Parade, June 28. Sandra had penciled in July 25-26 for her Outreach Speakers Workshop Program. Juana had arranged for ETVC to be listed in the Lavender Pages.

Education Committee

Nancy and Juana tentatively sketched the next 10 months of educational programs. June – Robin Dea and Hormones; July – Dr. W. Henkin and S/M; August – C.C. Parrot and Shoes (at the Holiday Inn); September-October – Dr. Meltzer/Dr. Ousterhout and SRS/facial surgery; December - off; January – Cindy Martin(?) and fashion; February – Juana wanted to create a TG panel discussion; March – Augusta Moore and deportment. Juana wanted to create a study group to discuss TG issues and writings. She would like to meet one Sunday a month at a coffee house starting in July. Erin asked if ETVC would still use Kimo's, but Leslie wanted to plan some events at Charpes to establish more fully the club's relationship there.



WHAT'S IN A NAME? PLENTY!

Ever gotten annoyed when dressed femme and people call you "he" or "sir"? What if they do it deliberately while you're dressed? Does it matter to you which pronouns people use for you? For a transsexual, ever had a day when you feel like if one more person refers to you as the wrong gender you're going to lose it?

Now let's consider something even more practical. The ETVC name. It essentially says "this is a group for transvestites".

Now let's get personal. I don't identify as a transvestite, but I have in the past. Would it bother me if people think I'm a TV? Not really, but they'd be getting a more limited idea of me based on a label. They'd miss out on the fact that I'm a femme, questioning, bisexual, pansexual, part drag queen, part glam queen, part tomboy, part gay, male-tofemale pre-transition transsexual! (The last term, p.t.t., is one I just recently started using and feel fits me the most. 8-) So, is this group for me? Well, I feel it is and other members tell me it is even though the name does not. It's like San Francisco's LGBT Community Center — their online website is "http://www.sfgaycenter.com", which speaks primarily to those who identify as gay. Do I care if people think I'm gay? No, but they miss out on my richer more accurated self-identifications. So please, I urge everyone who is an ETVC member to strongly consider changing the name to TGSF. Let's make this club a more diverse and open place where transgenders of any and all persuasions can come to a place they can call home.

ROXANNA REPLIES...

I appreciate your response to Ms. Robinson and agree with most of what you write. This continual drawing of divisions between different TG expressions and approaches which make some more important or "serious" than others is both tiresome and counter-productive. Just because one is a part-time CD doesn't necessarily mean a lack of serious concern and involvement with TG issues and activities. Yes, I know there are plenty of silly and self-indulgent social TG's (read crossdressers), but I also know many flaky TS's and other 24/7 TG's. So what. All of us, regardless of category or style, pursue that which is most meaningful and important to ourselves. To be directed or scolded by a uniform code is just more of the same B.S. Isn't it some kind of oxymoron to be a conforming TG?

As to ETVC's financial woes, it's a good first step with a far less expensive newsletter. Maybe the current June issue is lacking in some graphic arts flair, but what is really important is the content, the information and communication, and especially the "Our Readers Respond" pages. Having readers' points of view helps to break away from the month to month sameness of the "official" point of view.

I also commend you and the other Officers and members who have been so generous with your credit cards and moneys to keep ETVC afloat. But unless some of you are independently wealthy I see this at best a temporary stopgap measure. What must be realized, and this is where I am critical of the Executive Committee and other prime movers, is that ETVC has been in a state of emergency for the past several years with a declining membership and shrinking revenues. It has made no financial sense to me then that it has been a business as usual approach and a smaller and smaller bank balance. To continue with \$10,000 Cotillions,

Social Committee

The ExCom definitely wanted to make end-of-the-month socials profitable again. \$5 and \$7 will be charged at the door from now on or a hat will be passed about for donations. Sandra and Nancy both felt that club business and announcements at socials helped foster a sense of community within the club. The idea of having a theme each time was discussed, but it was hoped that future themes would be more participatory, with the members bringing the elements. For example, Nancy suggested that ETVC could have a Black and White Ball (as another club has done); that way the members could model their "thematic" outfits. Erin suggested that "modeling" itself was a theme with which some of our members could definitely involve themselves (did someone say DiDi Mau?). Leslie discussed a complex fundraising scheme involving beans and bowls which she will need to explain more fully sometime later. The May social is ETVC's birthday social and cake should be served. It was also suggested that rather than charging for this social, requests for contributions should be made.

Old Business

Erin wanted to know how the ExCom felt about California Dreamin'. It was reported that most of the vendors had a good and profitable time. The few exceptions would probably not be asked to participate again. Darcy was pleased with organizing the club crawls. They just about broke even and were thoroughly enjoyed by the girls who went on them. Nancy said that at \$10 a person, the rented mini-bus with four locations was a bargain and if ETVC did something like this in the future more could easily be charged. Darcy will create an outline for the person who might put it together for California Dreamin' 2000. Juana, who organized the seminars, made a lot of friends and got to know some previous acquaintances much better. Chapter 9: The Morning After

Waking up with a body that was finally right was the most wonderful experience of my life. I had had so many dreams and desperate hopes of just such an occurrence going back to childhood, but this was real. True, I was in a hospital, far from home, a bit uncomfortable, and connected to more than a few alien devices, but it was over and I had made it.

Day 2:

Eat, sleep, read, sleep, read, eat, ... While everyone should have the opportunity to experience life as a cat, there must be an easier way! Still, it was nice to have no responsibilities other than to rest and sail the dreamy Demerol seas.

Day 3:

My first taste of freedom. With the compression device off my legs and my IV disconnected, I could finally leave my bed and take a shower (those cotton-mesh hospital panties itched!). While my mind said that I was ready to stand on my own two feet, my body had other ideas. As soon as I finished bathing, I all but collapsed into the chair as the world wobbled precariously under my feet. So, it was back to being a cat for most of the day.

Day 4:

My morning shower left me tired, but the floor remained solidly underfoot. Officially discharged and now a "guest", it was time to start managing my own recovery. Following the advice of one of my "big sisters", I began a routine of walking the corridors for 15 minutes or so (the world-famous "Portland Shuffle"), returning to bed for a short nap, reading another chapter in my book, and then back to walking.

Day 5:

As my strength slowly returned, I continued my routine, but found that the nap was unnecessary - simply resting in the chair was enough. That evening, the enormity of what I had been through caught up with me at last. As I let go of the extreme focus that I had maintained over the past two years, relief washed over me, releasing the pent-up tension. Who I was before was now gone forever, and I was irrevocably committed to life as a woman. While this was a time of new beginnings, it was also a time to mourn what had been - after all, he did have his good points. So, I had a really good cry, and went to sleep.

Days 6 and 7:

With increased freedom comes increased responsibility. Time to assume more aspects of my care, which meant learning all those aspects of personal hygiene that my mother

never imagined she would ever have to teach me. I finally understood what the words "front to back" truly meant, and they quickly became my new mantra. I also realized that I had never realized nor appreciated just how ridiculously easy men have it.

Day 8:

"I'm free!" That refrain from the rock opera Tommy was the day's theme song. With the catheter finally removed, I at last felt fully human. What a joy to be able to move more than a meter in any direction without having to re-attaching my tether, or hang the infernal contraption off my waistband.

Day 9:

Homeward bound. It was a happy/sad occasion. The nurses and Dr. Meltzer's staff had been so wonderful to me, and I was sorry to say goodbye. Still, I was eager to be home and start my new life.

I had expected that my surgery would give more confidence in the public restroom, facilitate joining a gym, and open the door to the possibility of an intimate relationship. What I had not expected was the extent to which I felt changed. Finally I was complete, and no one could deny my femaleness. While I still get a questioning stare now and then, I really don't care anymore whether anyone is reading me or not.

Things Your Mother Never Told You About SRS

Recuperating after SRS both in the hospital and at home can be rather unpleasant at times, but a little knowledge and preparation can significantly facilitate recovery. The resources on the Internet and the information supplied by your doctor or hospital are very helpful, but they can be out of date and they don't always tell you everything that you need to know. The following observations and suggestions are based upon my experiences at Eastmoreland Hospital in Portland, Oregon during the first two weeks of April 1998. Your results may vary.

Before - things to do and bring:

If the hospital offers a guest or convalescent option, take it! Your meals are included, you avoid trips to the doctor's office for removal of stitches, packing, etc., and it's very comforting to know that help is immediately at hand should complications arise. Even if someone is going to stay with you, it's not that much more expensive, better for you, and easier on them. However, if you do take the guest option, be sure to let your friends know - technically, you will be officially discharged, and so calls and floral deliveries may not go through.

Eating a low-residue, high-fiber diet (fruits, breads, plenty of water) for several days prior to surgery can help make the bowel preparation regimen less of an all-or-nothing proposition, and might even avoid a middle-of-the-night dash for the bathroom.

Those infamous hospital "gowns" are not what you want for walking the corridors to get your exercise. A loose skirt and top is nice, but a long, one piece nightgown is easier to manage – particularly during those first few days out of bed.

The cotton-mesh "panties" supplied by the hospital are very uncomfortable. In fact, they itch dreadfully after only

a few hours. Kotex makes *Personals* disposable panties that are much more comfortable. Bring at least nine pairs, and remember that you will be quite swollen, so choose the larger size if in doubt.

Once you begin caring for yourself, you will be washing your hands every few hours, so be sure to bring a supply of your favorite hand lotion.

During your stay in the hospital or at a nearby motel with a friend:

As soon as you can stand on your own two feet, start walking. Listen to your body, but try to walk for at least fifteen minutes every two hours. This will not only speed your recovery, but also make your stay less boring. And don't worry if they threaten to charge you for wear and tear on the carpet – they're just kidding.

Walking around with your catheter bag exposed is considered a *faux pas*. The trick to hiding the bag involves hooking it to your waistband, and covering it with a long, loose nightgown or skirt and top. The cotton-mesh hospital "panties" won't support the weight of even an empty bag; the Kotex *Personals* will. A skirt waistband also works well, as does a safety pin through your nightgown near the waist.

Between the pre-surgical bowel preparation, continuous administration of various antibiotics, and stool softeners, most girls will develop a mild to moderate diarrhea. Yogurt will help replenish your internal flora and fauna, and baby wipes will not only make clean-up easier, but also protect against and sooth any resultant irritation.

After you go home:

Keep eating at least one container of yogurt per day until things return to normal, and use baby wipes as needed.

Moderate exercise is still important, so get up, get out, and take a walk. Continue to listen to your body, and avoid anything strenuous - especially heavy lifting.

By now you know why women use at least twice as much toilet paper as men, and you consider it to be perfectly normal. Make sure that you have at least six rolls on hand when you get home, and don't wait until "the next time" to change an empty roll! You will also want to have a supply of panty liners, and the Kotex *Personals* are still a good idea until the oozing subsides.

Having a handheld shower unit is a true blessing, and something that men just can't appreciate. If you don't already have one, get an add-on kit at your local hardware store – they vary in price between \$40 and \$60, and take less than fifteen minutes to install.

Whatever you do, do not neglect your dilating! Walgreens sells "multi-purpose disposable underpads", similar to the "Chux" pads used in the hospital. A package of 40 "chair size" pads retails for about \$7.50 plus tax. Surgilube can be ordered through your local pharmacy without prescription. A case of twelve 4.25 ounce tubes retails for about \$12.75 plus tax – significantly less than the cost of most "personal" lubricants, including plain KY.

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CHOICES

Introduction

Few of us plan our transition. It just seems to happen, as if we had turned a corner and bumped into ourselves coming the other way, though there were signposts all along the way. Suddenly it is impossible to go on with life as it is, yet we are un-, or under, prepared for whatever comes next.

If you question whether you are a candidate for living full time as a woman, put aside your doubt; the very fact that you wonder means that you are. This isn't to say that living full time as a woman is inevitable, only that its possibility should be considered with as much foresight as possible.

If you were going to take a solo sailing voyage around the world, you wouldn't wait until just before departure to sign up for sailing lessons. Well in advance, you'd learn all you could, consult with experts, buy and outfit a vessel, and practice. Should the greatest voyage of your life be taken with any less preparation? Yes, it's been done. The successes make for great stories; but they are rare compared with the abundance of shipwrecks that you don't hear about.

This presentation will not tell you how to solve your life's problems, but to pass on some lessons I learned through dumb luck, other people and a little study and thought, and to encourage you to make your life's choices—especially this *most* important one—as conscious as possible.

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ELEMENTS OF TRANSITION

...Personal Resources The Beginning Before the Start

Does transition to womanhood begin with living full time (or, as the therapists call it, "The Real Life Test"), or does it start with the realization that crossdressing does not resolve, but only intensifies, your gender conflict; that perhaps the fantasy of living as a woman isn't just a fantasy but a cry from within. Does transition really begin with a thought?

I prefer to think of transition as having two parts. The first starts with all the preparations that lead up to full time living, ending as you launch the second phase: your first day as a woman. The journey may end with any number of possible out-comes, happily or unhappily, from returning to life as a man to sex reassignment surgery; but the ending is often told in the beginning, and the beginning is a thought.

A couple of years ago, I ran into a friend I had lost contact with nine years earlier. "Joel," I said, "what are you doing these days?" "I'm a medical doctor," he said. "A doctor! I had no idea..." "I know. I never said anything because it always sounded pretentious. I was in my mid-thirties and just felt like a loser. Then one day, I opened up to my cousin about my silly dream and she said, 'Why don't you just go for it?' And I said, 'But by the time I became a doctor, I'd be 42 years old!' And she said, 'How old will you be if you don't become a doctor?'"

You may, or may not, some day live as a woman, but you can start your voyage of discovery right now. In ways that nobody but you has to know, take a step, a little, tiny step. If it feels right, take another step, and another. Who knows where the road will lead.

SEXUAL ORIENTATION AND GENDER IDENTITY

There seems to be a tremendous amount of confusion surrounding the dimensions of sexual orientation (gay, straight or bi-sexual) and gender identity (transsexual, transvestite, cross-dresser, drag queen). In doing trainings of professionals and talking with lay audiences I explain that these aspects of human beings are completely independent of one another. Just as non-transgenders can be gay, straight or bi-sexual, so to can transgenders.

The question that persists in many people's minds, even TGs, is whether transgenders are gay, straight or bi-sexual when they are crossing (living, dressing, etc.) as compared to their orientation when living in their societally-assigned gender role. Have I lost you yet?

The confusion is due to our language as well as the poorly understood concept of the immutability of one's sexual object choice even as the expression of gender identity changes. I suggest people forget the terms gay, straight and bi- for the moment because they are purely relative to the the person's gender. If an individual is in transition it is difficult to get a handle on this concept. Instead, let's focus on the gender of the trans-person's desired object - male, female or either.

At this point, we need to address the varieties of transgender expressions. Transvestites (also referred to as crossdressers), are almost always males who are attracted to females, although some may also find men attractive. When they crossdress they maintain their attraction to the gender they enjoy when not dressed.

Transsexuals may be men or women who may be attracted to men, women or either. As the transition from their societally-assigned gender to the role they are more comfortable in, their sex object usually remains as it was pre-transition. The exception to this pattern occurs in the case of individuals who are so homophobic that they had only allowed themselves relationships with those of the opposite sex. Transition may release these people to experience a relationship with the gender they truly are attracted to, and ironically, to maintain a heterosexual life style. Now, I'm sure I've lost you!

Let's see if we can tackle the language that identifies sexual orientation. A male-to-female individual who lived a heterosexual life before transition will most likely continue to find women sexually attractive. However, her sexual orientation will appear to have shifted from straight to gay, though she remains attracted to women throughout. A female-to-male who was attracted to women and identified as a lesbian, will usually maintain this attraction, but will re-identify as straight. Trans-people who were attracted to both sexes have the easiest time of all, linguistically-speaking, for they remain bi-sexual.


Of course, transitioning is a complex process which throws many aspects of one's life out of kilter and requires a re-balancing of many systems. Certainly, sexual orientation is not immune. Next month's article will deal with the impact of this process on sexual orientation.
