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ROBERT HARRISON

Bob was born in Boston. His parents liked Provincetown and they brought him here on vacations. He enrolled at Harvard in 1941 and graduated in 1947, with time out for the US Navy in 1943-45. Part of his naval career was spent at a college in Montana, and part as an ensign on a subchaser in the Caribbean. After the war a friend bet him \$10 that he would "not last six weeks" in the elevator business. As a result, Bob got a job with the Payne Elevator Co. and worked there 21 years, starting as a mechanic's helper, then a licensed elevator repair mechanic, and finally becoming chief estimator and office manager.

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Bob met his present partner, Hal Goodstein, in 1958. Ten years later, upon retiring from Payne, he joined Hal in the advertising business. About 1965 he and Hal bought the first house (three apartments) in the complex which is now Hargood House. Gradually, as properties became available, they added apartments, bringing the total to 19. By about 1970 the hotel business had grown to the point at which a move to Provincetown was indicated. Their advertising business was phased out.

Bob has been active in civic affairs. He was appointed to the Zoning Board of Appeals in 1975 and has been chairman since 1978. He is a director of the Center for Coastal Studies and a director of the Provincetown Chamber of Commerce. As president of Outreach Institute, he is very supportive of all of the Institute's activities.

From May to October an average of fifty house guests keeps him busy. For relaxation he and Hal travel to remote and unvisited places, most recently southern India, Indonesia, and China. Souvenirs of these trips add drama to their apartment at Hargood House.

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
