

SURPRISE GUEST SPEAKS AT SEPTEMBER'S FTM GET-TOGETHER

Billed as a "generic" gathering ("no speaker and no program"), FTM Get-Together #11 held September 24, 1989 turned into a lively, informative meeting when San Francisco psychotherapist Lin Fraser suddenly arrived, with her luggage, direct from the airport, after attending the Harry Benjamin International Gender Dysphoria Association Symposium in Cleveland, September 20-23.

Lin's excitement and enthusiasm were evident as she updated the nine FTMs and one guest in attendance (four FTM members traveled from Los Angeles to come to the Get-Together, held in San Francisco's Women's Building) on recent developments during the Symposium affecting female-to-males.

Lin relayed several important events. First and foremost, she reported that the new microsurgical phalloplasties now being performed (using the radial forearm flap design) are "fantastic," with the appearance of a genetic male, ability to urinate while standing, orgasmic sensation and rigidity enough to allow intercourse. Presentations on phalloplasty were given by David Gilbert of Norfolk, Virginia; F. G. Bouman of Amsterdam; L. Levine of the University of Chicago Section of Urology; and Neal Wilson of Detroit. Such positive reaction to presentations on phalloplasty is something new, as reports from past Symposiums have been quite negative concerning surgical outcomes.

Doctors also described a new technique for chest surgery which leaves no scarring. Called the "drawstring method," it involves removal of the areola, the scraping and removal of internal tissue through this opening, and then pulling together and gathering the outer skin (in the method of pulling a drawstring purse closed). Excess skin is cut around the hole and the areola replaced. Presentations on chest surgery were given by J. Kenney and M. Edgerton of Charlottesville, Virginia; and David Gilbert.

The second exciting development emanating from the Symposium is that "from now on," Lin stated, "it is *fine* for you to be a female-to-gay male transsexual." Apparently the shift among providers is towards a lot less stringent requirements per se for diagnoses of transsexualism. Lin urged female-to-gay males to be sure to refer their doctors and gender providers to the presentations given at this Symposium, which included "Sexual Behavior of Female-to-Male Transsexuals," by Holly Devor of British Columbia, Canada; "Homosexual and Bisexual Identity Development in Female-to-Male Transsexuals," by Eli Coleman and Walter Bockting of Minneapolis, and L. Gooren of Amsterdam; and "Sexual Preference of Female-to-Male Transsexuals," by Ira Pauly of Reno, Nevada. In addition, Dr. Pauly showed an hour-long videotape entitled "Female-to-Gay Male Transsexualism," which received enthusiastic applause from Symposium attendees.

Lin discussed the current debate concerning where to list gender identity disorders in the 4th revision of the DSM (Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders). In the 3rd revision, gender identity was listed among "Sexual Disorders"; and later in "Disorders Originating in Childhood" in DSM III-R. Lin speculated that this will be changed in DSM IV to a separate "Gender Identity Disorder" section. "The main thing we as gender providers should be interested in is: Do you feel more comfortable in a female gender role or a male gender role? The move is to take out sexual orientation completely." However, this change in the diagnostic

manual is only in the planning stages and it will be several years before DSM IV is issued.

Further in the Symposium, a Turkish doctor spoke of the "Endocrine Evaluation of Two Transsexual Sisters," both female-to-males; and doctors from the Case Western Reserve University Gender Clinic in Cleveland spoke of "Variations of Gender Dysphoria in Females." Lin mentioned that Eastern European countries report a ratio of five FTMs for every one MTF seen in their clinics!

"Legal stuff is not good," Lin continued, citing the case of a MTF discharged from the military after 14 years of duty; but, she said, on the up-side, "It is now OK (i.e., not against the law) to crossdress in Texas."

Lin specifically praised the openness and input of "Matthew," an FTM from Chicago who spoke from our perspective. "He was neat," Lin said. "He looked *good*."

The new president of the Benjamin Association is Dr. Jan Walinder of Sweden and the next Symposium will be held in 1991 in Goteborg, Sweden.

Our next FTM Get-Together, scheduled for Sunday, January 7, 1990 will feature Steven Kessler, MFCC, as guest speaker. Steven is a psychotherapist in the San Francisco Bay Area who specializes in conducting men's liberation workshops entitled "The Male Journey." Steven also conducts workshops called "Finding Our Fathers, Finding Our Selves," "A Day with Iron John" (an experiential journey into the presence of the Wild Man), and "Phallos: The Sacred Essence of Masculinity." He moderates support groups for men, and a "Mythology Group" which uses male myths and fairytales to illuminate the journey from boyhood into manhood in order to reconnect his clients with ancient, natural images of masculinity. Steven will address our group on the rites of manhood and the myths of masculinity, and will surely excite a lively discussion among our attendees.

I know I sound desperate but I've been living like a caged monkey for nearly a year now. If any of you can give me any advice on insurance (my company is Golden Rule), I would appreciate it. I have looked into my insurance but couldn't get much information. Just how do you check out insurance without blowing your cover? Remember I live in Mayberry. I have decided for my family's sake and, yes, for my own sake that I not go fully public about this until after I leave. So if any of you should write me, and I hope you do, please send it to Mary Sue. My male name will be Loras. The postmaster would have a fit. God, how I wish I were born in a larger community!

My real concerns are to move, probably to California, so if any of you know of a place for me to stay approximately in May 1990, you honestly wouldn't know how much that would mean to me. I am obviously in the early stages of this, but I am sensible and have good humor and like to be adventurous, especially like to snow ski and, whatever else, get out of the apartment and do things. Presently I am a painter. Is there any good painting possibilities in California?

If anyone knows of a place for me to live when I get there, I would greatly appreciate it. Anywhere in San Francisco, Oakland or Palo Alto. I will be coming in May. If you do write me, I will most likely phone you up. Please send it to Mary Sue Cigrand - I'm not paranoid, just practical.

Dear *FTM*:

Thank you for your newsletter. The names and addresses of the surgeons are very useful to us as it is incredibly difficult to get information over here about surgeons in the States. There is also a great lack of publishing by these people as a lot of them don't wish to be associated with doing this type of surgery. Here the people who do it are not plastic surgeons and really do it as a one-off for a particular individual and therefore techniques are not so good as they don't get a lot of practice. I would like to get my surgery done in the States, but I hope the fees aren't too exorbitant as I'm only a student. I got hold of some references written by surgeons in the States and the U.K. All the articles were illustrated with photos. The difference between the two groups is amazing and frightening. The U.K. surgery is gross and sickening, leaving much scarring while the surgery in the States looks pretty good as does the European's. The main problem appears to be fistulas in the urethra, thrombosis, lack of sensation and lack of function. It seems a question of

whether one is lucky or unlucky. I'm sure there are better ways to increase the percentage of success.

I've now changed over and everyone knows about me which is much easier as I don't have to pretend anymore. What I find difficult is having not yet started therapy but being in a different role, but not feeling or looking any different. I just can't wait for the changes to happen and surgery to be done so I can really get on with my life.

In general, TSs changing these days have a much easier time and get things quicker than 10 years ago. I have friends who have waited 7 years for surgery, mine should be done next summer hopefully.

I'm going to try and persuade the other FTMs here to start up our own group like you have done and try to increase our membership and unite the members more. The FTMs here are arranging a get-together in Manchester on February 10th so I'm hoping as many as possible will come along with friends and partners as well, so we can all meet.

I can write English but I'm a poor speaker of English. Actually almost every *FTM* friend of mine cannot understand English, so I always translate your *FTM* newsletter and send it to them.

FTM! I really enjoy them! Thank you so much. It's wonderful I can feel that there are so many people like me all over the earth. I sent the copies to not only my Japanese *FTM* friends but also Taiwanese ones.

Japan is the most hard country to live for us. Because transsexual surgery is forbidden by the law and we never be able to change our birth certificate (only people of Hermaphroditismus can). Therefore almost every Japanese *FTM* is naturalized as a U.S. citizen or another country after his surgery.

But I love Japan. Tokyo is my lovely hometown. I'd like to succeed as an author in my country. I know it's hard because

Dear *FTM*:

I am the F-M advisor for the British transsexual group, the Gender Dysphoria Trust. I must first say how good and interesting your magazine is and how it would be of great interest to us to keep in touch with your group, so that not only our members who are visiting your area could make contacts, but so that we in return could provide contacts here in the U.K. for any of your members who want to holiday in Britain.

Phalloplasties are very difficult to obtain here and the results generally seem to be appalling. In reality I have to advise people here not to pursue them because the results obtained are so horrific. But we were very impressed by the results we saw in the papers of some of the surgeons in the U.S.A.

If you have any members who have done, or know of any research done, on the legal position and the penal systems' approach to TSs in the States, I would very much like to hear from them. I am a law graduate and am currently doing a dissertation on the proposals for reform of the law in England. In England, TSs suffer from a "dual status" in that we are allowed to take our new role in society, but we are not allowed to get married, to adopt or even retain custody of children, or get our birth certificate changed, to retire at our new pensionable age, or to get the tax benefits of our new status. Further in work, we can be dismissed if our status is discovered after obtaining a job and we have no protection under the equal opportunities legislation. If anyone can help me with my research, I would be very grateful and would certainly provide any remuneration for expenses incurred. I also in return would gladly provide anyone in the States with information which would help their work.

Thanks very much for all your help and I hope this will be the start of a long and fruitful relationship between our two groups.

other Michael. Dillon was totally shattered by this, immediately escaping to India to become a monk. No Westerner before him had ever been ordained a Buddhist monk in Tibet. He died there in 1962 at age 47 of unknown causes, possibly malnutrition.

Just fifteen days before his death, he submitted his autobiography and photo to his publisher, who rejected the manuscript as "unpublishable," as it was felt at the time that a sex-change story was too sensational.

Hodgkinson's book is quite readable, although I found several repetitious passages distracting. I finished it off in three sittings and recommend it to anyone interested in the lives of female-to-males. It is a welcome addition to the pitifully inadequate number of female-to-male accounts.

Unfortunately, this book, published in England, is difficult to obtain in the United States. I phoned no less than ten bookstores in San Francisco, but none were able to order the book for me. 1755 MEMOIRS OF FTM REISSUED

A recent issue of *The New Yorker Magazine* mentions the publication last year of *The Well-Known Troublemaker* by Faber and Faber in England. It is an annotated version of the 1755 memoirs of Mrs. Charlotte Charke, who specialized in playing men's roles on the stage and disguised herself as a man offstage. *The New Yorker* informs us that an American edition of the book was brought out this fall, but so far *FTM* has been unable to locate its publisher or a copy. BODYSHOCK: THE TRUTH ABOUT CHANGING SEX, by Liz Hodgkinson. London: Columbus Books, Ltd., 1987.

Having enjoyed her more recent book on the life of female-to-male Michael Dillon, I was all set to give a glowing review of Hodgkinson's earlier work, *Bodys shock*. And, right off the bat in the 'Introduction,' I was impressed with how consistent Hodgkinson was in including the female-to-male perspective in her general discussion of transsexualism. But further along in the book, many questionable remarks crept into the text that cooled my enthusiasm.

The worst intrusion is the author's admiration for and continuous references to the insane theories of Janice Raymond. Hodgkinson calls Raymond's *The Transsexual Empire* "convincingly and intelligently presented," and cites Raymond no less than thirteen times throughout the book. That alone is enough for me to denounce *Bodys shock*.

The book does contain a chapter dedicated exclusively to the female-to-male which consists mainly of direct quotations from seven FTMs. It also has two pages of pictures of Michael Dillon and one page of another FTM, Mark Rees. And while these were welcomed additions, other statements made me question Hodgkinson's real commitment to the female-to-male perspective. Though *Bodys shock* was published in 1987, she states that "there are, as far as I am aware, no autobiographical books by female-to-male transsexuals" ... Mario Martino's *Emergence*, published a decade earlier, somehow having escaped her. Later, Hodgkinson admits, "In my researches for this book, I have not come across any female-to-male transsexual who was married in the original sex. Nor have I located any female-to-male transsexual who became a mother before the change-over." That shocked me. How hard could she have really looked?

While describing the side effects of testosterone, she states that "female-to-male transsexuals are not usually advised to take male hormone for any longer than absolutely necessary, once irreversible changes have been produced." I can't imagine where she heard such advice; it is well-known and has never been debated that testosterone must be continually taken throughout a female-to-male's lifetime.

Unfortunately Hodgkinson propagates the outdated theory that "all transvestites are male. True, some women dress in men's clothes, even some women who are not transsexual. But it is *never* [Hodgkinson's emphasis] for the purposes of sexual arousal. Women who wear men's clothes do it because, for them, it feels right, or is appropriate to the occasion." I know several *FTM* members who would have much to say in opposition there!

There is also some dicey theorizing about the sexuality of transsexuals in general. The author discusses "heterosexual transsexuals," but fails to specify whether she means "hetero" before sex reassignment surgery, or after. Making matters worse, she ventures to state that "the true sufferer from the condition [transsexualism] is not really interested in sexual performance at all, with members of either sex." Again, I think many *FTM* members would argue that one.

In summary, this book is worth reading, but not as any kind of bible. Too bad; it falls far short of the potential it might have had in being one of the few books available for misinformed friends or relatives.

REFLECTIONS

He crossed the room and stood by the window that was opened ajar letting in the brisk October air. He was wearing oversized clothes. A wool raglan sleeve dark tweed coat, under which he wore double black and white patterned shirts hung loosely about him. Under these he wore a faded black T-shirt which clung to his smooth chest. His pants were worn low on his hips showing the depressions of his pelvis just above the belt which in large brass letters bore the word "BOY." His faded 501's were so worn they took on the consistency of flannel; his left knee torn to horizontal threads. His Dr. Martins were opened at the top, held onto his feet only by an iron chain around one ankle and a bandana on the opposing one. He had his hands half in and half out of his pockets, like he were trying to pry them open with his fingers. At the angle I was looking, I could see behind his dark wire framed glasses his grey eyes and sleepless shadowed sockets. His curly auburn hair, short on the back and sides hung from the top of his head into his baby face. He looked 13.

I saw myself across the room, 5 years into my future; and the money I don't have, spent on the surgery I need to be a man.

You see, I am a female to male preoperative transsexual, who is again contemplating suicide. I made my first attempt when I was 7½ years old. Such is life ... and death.

How do I feel about being a transsexual? "I'm cold, weak and bitter, like this cup of coffee." Cold: like a corpse, being almost dead to the sensations of anguish and misery of not being able to solve my problem as I am not wealthy. Weak: from the oppression of living my life as half a person, and Bitter: from not asking to be born this way. There is no question that I was born this way.

T. S. / CROSSING

Alice B. Theatre is a gay and lesbian theatre company from Seattle. For five days they performed excerpts from three different productions at Highways in Santa Monica, California, collectively titled "Attack of the Zombie Backup Singers and Other Hits." The first and third segments ("Portraits of Iowa" and "Attack of the Zombie Backup Singers," respectively) were original, humorous and well-presented. It is the second segment, "TS/Crossing," which is of interest to the FTM. Written and performed by Susan Finque, it is mainly a movement piece chronicling the journey of an FTM. Finque begins the piece sitting center stage, her back to the audience, bare torso. Stretching, she strikes poses emphasizing musculature. At the side of the stage is a drag queen, mirroring the exact motions, but for opposite effect. Putting on a shirt, tie and sport jacket, Finque now has the stage all to herself. Talking to the audience, she tells about her current life (job, wife, kid) and about concerns, fears. "What are you looking at?" is a question asked several times. In partial answer, she very effectively demonstrates various "types" of walks: Man as Woman, Woman as Man, Woman as Man as Woman, etc. She also questions the future: "What will happen when I die? I live as a man, but will they bury a woman?" Finque has delivered a sensitive right-on-target portrayal of the FTM's thoughts and fears. I had hoped to get the chance to talk with Susan Finque after the show. There was so much I wanted to ask her about, from the reasons for an FTM play to how she hit so many nuances dead-on, but I did not get the opportunity. If you're in Seattle, or in a town where Alice B. Theatre will come to visit, "TS/Crossing" is worth the price of admission.

SANTA'S SEX DEBATED

San Francisco's Court of Historical Review and Appeals ruled on December 13, 1989 on the question as to whether Santa Claus was a man or a woman.

A packed courtroom listened to debate before the 60th session of the good-natured mock court as San Francisco Supervisor Angela Alioto argued that the spirit of Christmas actually came from the legendary Italian figure, Befana, an old woman who delivered gifts to children in Europe on January 6, the Feast of the Epiphany. "It's about time America admits Santa Claus is really Befana, a woman, as Europe has known for hundreds of years," Alioto said.

Public Defender Jeff Brown sneered and scoffed at other witnesses who claimed that Santa was originally St. Nicola, a woman. His expert witness, City College of San Francisco history Professor Lee Dolson, defended Santa's manhood and traced the legend of Santa Claus from the early Christian tradition of St. Nicholas, a fourth-century bishop in what is now Turkey. "I shudder to think," declared Franco Diamond, a psychiatric hospital administrator, "of the destruction it would do to ourselves, our family and our culture if Santa were declared to be a woman."

Municipal Court Judge George Choppelas heard an hour of arguments and joking testimony about Santa's gender, and it was a close call when he issued a Solomon-like decision that reaffirmed the old saint's maleness. The judge, however, added that Santa's spirit "is a universal phenomena and cannot be limited by gender, race or color."
