
The Roaring '20s January 28, 1988

SEX-CHANGE OPERATION

I have often been asked how I became a TV. Now, for the first time ever, I will reveal my innermost secrets.

It all started when my seamstress aunt started asking me to model dresses for her. Then my cousin thought it would be a great idea if she and I switched roles on Halloween. Now I ask you, What could I do? Later my sisters, ages eleven and twelve, forced me into a dress. Of course, I was too young to resist. I think I was seventeen at the time. When my mother came home and found me in a slip instead of a football jersey, she immediately sent me off to a girls' boarding school -- to teach me a lesson. Naturally I had to wear the school uniform, blouse and skirt, and had to study secretarial skills. However, after graduating, I reclaimed my birthright and resumed a masculine role in society . . . Until one dark and stormy night my car broke down and I found myself at an isolated mansion inhabited by lesbians. In order to survive I had to become one of them.

Three years later, and after intensive psychotherapy, I was back in trousers and on a vacation with my fiancee when we discovered the airline had switched suitcases, and all I had to wear was lingerie and exquisite gowns. On our return, my fiancee's parents met us at the airport before I could change, and so I had to continue the masquerade -- which led to several adventures . . . Finally, I returned home to find that a fire had destroyed the rest of my male clothing and I'd lost my job. The only job I could find was one using the secretarial skills I'd learned at the girl's school. On the way to work one morning I was asked to become a model. The money would pay my mother's doctor bills. How could I refuse?

Just this morning it happened again -- forces beyond my control. After my wife and kids drove off to visit relatives, I found that not one of my suits was in condition to be worn. Thus I had to call in sick, and reluctantly put on a dress. Since I couldn't go to work, I headed for the nearest shopping mall. I ask you, what else could I do?

As you can see, fate has continually intervened in my life. But what if it hadn't? What if aunt, cousin, sisters, mother, school mistresses, lesbians, airlines, fiancee, fires, economic necessity, Freudian impulses, planetary and stellar forces, atomic and subatomic reactions, astrological prophecies as well as the I Ching, had not conspired to make me a TV?

There's still one other factor: it's fun.

A LETTER FROM AUDREY

I have been a transvestite for as long as I can remember. Over the years I have been lucky enough to meet and get to know a lot of others like myself. I don't know how or why, but it has happened.

I have been married to the same woman for forty years now. She knows what I am and about my alter ego, accepts it and encourages me to continue dressing. In fact, she enjoys being around and with the girls. She has helped quite a few of them to be better at their makeup and dressing. She has also counseled some of them as to how to act and live as a female.

I was like many of the girls in that when I got married I figured that I would stop dressing. But, as you know, it doesn't work out that way. It was after we were married for about eight years that I decided to tell her about myself. All I can say is that I consider myself one of the luckiest people in the world to have a woman like her as my wife. She is very understanding about my dressing, as well as the other things that have happened along the way over the years.

We have attended meetings and gatherings and parties with other transvestites and some of the wives. We have also met several transsexuals over the years. The one that really stands out among all the others was Helen Stokes. She had the sex change operation when she was sixty years old. We were very close friends. In fact, she was close enough that our children, who knew about her sex change, called her "Aunt Helen" and our one daughter spent several weekends at her home in San Jose. It was with her help that my wife was able to really understand what my alter ego is all about and to accept it as a part of me. She also learned to use it and me for her own enjoyment and amusement.

For me, being a transvestite is more than just the love of the feel of silks, satins and nylons on my body. It is a way of life that would otherwise be denied me if I were not allowed to express my feminine side. It also gives me emotional gratification.

Over the years I have gone through all the typical feelings and reactions. I have felt guilt and remorse. I have felt elation and joy. I have also felt like an outcast or an oddity. But once I was able to come to grips with myself and learned to live with the fact that I was and always will be a transvestite and not to feel guilty about it, my life took a turn for the better. I did not get richer monetarily, but I was able to relax and get the most out of life and start enjoying myself and others; and I also became more tolerant and understanding of other people.
