

ifficult as it may seem to believe, until two short months ago, IFGE's Waltham offices were still in the typewriter age.

There were only three computers in the office, and some antique data processing machine that only kept membership and donor lists. All the bookstore had was an adding machine. There were hundreds of data entry and word processing projects in need of hands to do them. But, when volunteers with those skills came by, all we could do was put

them to work stuffing envelopes or vacuuming the floors. There were no spare PCs to go around.

Happily, that situation has changed due to the efforts of a trio of heroines. First to ring in was California's Jamie Fay Fenton with the donation of a Pentium and a high-speed 486. Next was IFGE's own Abby and Sharon Saypen, with four 396s. Then, like a whirlwind, came Tri-Ess' Dana Danahay who has already bestowed a Pentium and two high-speed 486s, and promises more to come.

These donations were in response to a plea Jean Marie Stine placed in the previous issue of this newsletter (Vol. 2, No. 3). The notice described our plight and the need for several PCs to help smooth out the work flow. The plea specifically requested 396s or above (and the office could still use two more Pentiums).

The response was, as they say, overwhelming. IFGE always knew its members cared. However, this experience is a moving demonstration to everyone on the staff and Board of Directors. It showed how dedicated our members are to helping us continue IFGE's outreach and education to, and on behalf of, the transgender community.

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n the past two years
IFGE has undergone
some radical
changes in personnel and structure.
Some people welcome the changes,
while others
strongly oppose
them. If you are a
leader in the gender
business, and you

initiate those changes, you soon realize that you're dammed if you do, and you're dammed if you don't.

Regardless of how you view the change, our founder Merissa Lynn and all the original organizers of IFGE surely must be pleased. One of the original goals was to create a democratic organization that was stronger than the individuals who comprised it.

Most of us know of now, or can look back to remember, national and local organizations that were basically run by a single individual. I don't want to take anything away from that person's accomplishments, but usually the board or co-leaders are in name only. If and when the leader burns out, or drops from the community, the organization disappears along with them. Just ask the volunteers in our office who try to track organizational information for *Transgender Tapestry*. It's a nightmare of changes.

Put aside the cash flow problems and other negative things you hear in the rumor mill. The facts are, no other non-profit organization offers near the services. Just to open up a full time office with a six person staff and dozens of volunteers and without public money is a feat in itself. Now you add the full time services of a medical doctor like Sheila Kirk, and you rival the best clinics in the city. And IFGE has kept this office going for over ten years.

If the gender community ever hopes to achieve the strength of the gay community, it must continue to combine forces for the greater good of all.

Long time supporters of IFGE have now witnessed a complete changeover of staff personnel, and ninety-five percent of the original board. This shows that IFGE as an organization is self-perpetuating. It's not one or two people, but a membership of like individuals who pursue equal goals. It's people working together and getting things done.

Along with this newsletter you have received a ballot so that your voice can once again be heard. Take a moment of your time and cast a vote for the individuals you feel can best lead IFGE over the next three years.

Also, don't forget about making your reservation early for the Coming Together Convention in Long Beach, CA. We expect a large group so, don't be left out.

IFCE Will Relocate in Boston Area

Volunteer Arms Needed This June!



ue to an astronomical rent increase, the IFGE Waltham headquarters will be relocated by July

1 of this year. A major office/retail complex is being constructed on Moody Street less than a block from IFGE's current location. In anticipation of a business boom to follow, landlords are asking steep rental increases in the immediate area. Along

with other long-time Waltham enterprises, IFGE is seeking affordable office space elsewhere in the Boston area. (Announcement of the new address will be made in the next newsletter.)

The current lease period is up June 30, and the move must be completed by that date. Moving will be a complex process involving a full decade of files, letters and photo archives, plus office furniture, computer equipment, and much, much

more. The assistance of dozens of volunteers will be needed through the entire month of June (and even earlier), if this move is to be made in a timely fashion and with a minimum disruption of IFGE's many areas of outreach.

Financial donations to help defray the cost of the move would also be appreciated. If you wish to volunteer, make a donation, or if you have a van or truck that could be used to assist in IFGE's move, please contact Bobbi Mandell at our offices.

E-Mail Overwhelms IFGE Resources

IFGE's e-mail system was down throughout much of the last three months of 1996. For almost a month in October and again for the same period in November, we could not down load the e-mail we received. By the time we could in December, there was no one available to sort and answer it. IFGE extends a sincere apology to all those who sent e-mail messages during this period that were either lost or went unanswered for months.

Even at this moment, the problem is far from resolved, and it sometimes takes several days for the Waltham staff to reply. There are several interlocking reasons for this unhappy state of affairs. The first is that the volume of email IFGE receives has grown by more than 1000% over the last eighteen months. It is not unusual for us to receive 90+pages in a single day. Meanwhile, we have suffered the loss of two invaluable full-time staff members, Sheila Kirk, and Holly Cross. Nor has there been any diminution of snail mail or phonecalls. At the moment there is no one available to take responsibility for this task. A responsible, computer savvy volunteer from the Boston area, available on a 5-day per week basis is needed. For the duration, staff members will attempt to download and reply to e-mail as expeditiously as possible. Please bear with us.

allots for voting on the 1997 IFGE Board of Directors are enclosed with this newsletter. Please fill yours out and return it. We want to get a high percentage of returns to represent the largest possible number of our members. Note that there are ten candidates and four openings.

This means you may vote for up to four different individuals but you do not have to vote for four.

As you may notice, there is less diversity than we might like among the current nominations. We do have one candidate from Canada. However, we can only list those who are nominated by our membership and who are willing to accept the conditions required to run (these include representing everyone in the community without prejudice, and a promise to attend at least three of four BoD meetings per year). If you know of an IFGE member who represents some TG constituency, please be sure to nominate them when we call for candidates for the 1998 Board. Even when a candidate is not elected, if they represent a unique constituency they will be considered prime candidates for committee and Advisory Working Group members.

An Investment in the Future

s we enter 1997. we cannot but realize that we begin this new year after a year of many major changes. Most

notable has been the reformatting of Transgender, our flagship publication, adding color and more graphics, and designing the magazine for distribution and sale to the general public, thereby reaching the most closeted, isolated and marginal transgendered persons. We have implemented the in-house and traveling bookstore enabling us to supply publications for education to more people in more places. We have upgraded the hardware and software of the system used to generate our magazine (thanks to the generosity of several wonderful individuals).

Perhaps the greatest change has to do with the staff which has undergone about an 80%+ turnover in the last two years. With the changes

in personnel come changes in operating procedure and of course in the office "culture." We hope that IFGE can improve its business operations and management and, at the same time, our sensitivity and responsiveness to our clients and, of course, our members.

Some of these changes have come easily, while others took their pound of flesh. Perhaps the most difficult (and apparent to the outside) has been the upgrading of our publication system while in the process of trying to generate the product. Having been in the data processing industry as both a designer-producer of DP systems as well as a user, this is not unusual. These delays and exasperating experiences are often referred to as the price for automation. Well, we have "paid the piper" and "crossed the Rubicon" and hopefully we are now ready to roll 'em out!

We have many challenges that lie ahead of us. Now that it looks like we have Transgender Tapestry back on schedule, we face the challenge of

increasing the advertising revenue, the subscriptions and the revenue from wholesale distribution. We will have to figure out how to effectively plan and implement the publications sales area including the traveling book store. We will need to improve the Membership Program to make it attractive for people to join, yet financially rewarding to IFGE. (Any ideas?)

Of course we have to do the above and more, all the while remembering that our primary purpose of education, outreach and support to all TG persons, their family, friends. supporting professionals and the public as well, must be kept in the forefront. We will need to produce a first rate convention, support our medical research and our political activism. We could make a list of a hundred legitimate issues and concerns that we might want to address, but we must all agree that we focus on those activities to which we have already committed.

Meet Dana D.

here's a new generation of crossdressers and TG people in general. They're not closeted, they're not ashamed, and they're not just interested in

dressing up to show off their finery. In fact, they're just the opposite.

Today's CDs, TSs and TGs are out, proud and activist. Case in point: Dana of Tri-Ess, IFGE and points in between. Dana doesn't hide her cross-dressing, she proclaims it.

Out in the community only a few years, Dana is already on the outreach trail. Along with a growing number of community members, she's been helping educate others about the TG phenomenon. Recently, for instance, she has spoken at the National Convention on Family Relations and at East Caroline University at Greenville. She also participates in a Tri-Ess program to purchase and donate books on crossdressing and other TG issues to local libraries and universities.

Dana's so high on the TG community she's a member of not one, or even two, but four organizations. As a crossdresser she's extremely active in Tri-Ess nationally, as well as the Kappa Beta chapter of Tri-Ess in Charlotte, North Carolina and the Tau Chi chapter in Texas. Dana's also a charter member of IFGE, convinced that crossdressers can't achieve progress or rights unless the whole TG community achieves progress and rights.

Dana discovered the TG community when she sent off for several of Dr., Peggy Rudd's books on crossdressing thrugh an ad in Jeri Lee's *Transformation* magazine. Learning of regional conferences, she came out for the first time at a Southern Comfort in Atlanta. Since then she says she has attended most major TG conventions.

From there it was an easy step to Tri-Ess and IFGE. Dana reports that IFGE is as much a part of her life as

Tri-Ess. She sees both as vehicles for bringing TG people together to share ideas and strategies and for getting information out to the general public.

When Dana learned that the IFGE suffered a serious computer shortage, she brought her expertise to bear, sending along a total of four — so far. The prize was a Pentium communication

station for e-mail, web-browsing and phone messages, which now occupies a prominent place in our upstairs work room. No less important were a networked pair of 486s that will tie the bookstore downstairs in with the accounting department upstairs, saving hours of lengthy data entry.

Most people would have been content to rest on their laurels after a contribution like that. But Dana is made of sterner material. Not only did she offer to recondition any IFGE computers or computer equipment and bring them up to stuff; she also offered to secure more 486s for us, so that volunteers will have workstations of their own.

As far as the results of her com-

ing out to the wider world as a CD, Dana says, "Come on in. The water is fine." She hasn't had a negative experi-

One of her dreams is to create a video training tape for others who plan to speak to interested groups about TG issues. Such a tape, she believes, would help make community outreach efforts more effective. It would also enable TG speakers to put on more polished, professional presentations.

Dana has many titles, cross-dresser, IFGE member, Tri-Ess bastion, activist, spokeswoman, and more. But around the IFGE offices she's known by a different appellation: Dana, computer goddess. Thanx, Dana, from everyone at IFGE.

ered IFGE's accounts payable was much larger than had been believed. As Alison Laing put it later, "For a few days there, it looked as if we might have to close our doors and cease operations until we could get reorganized."

However, Ms. Cain made a dramatic appeal for IFGE board members to stump throughout the community and raise as much as they could as quickly as they could. The result was a flood of donations, as members of every stripe and economic bracket played Santa with contributions from \$10 to \$5,000. Several individuals, many of whom chose to remain anonymous, made sizable and generous donations. Surprisingly, contributions came not only from loyal, long-time IFGE supporters, but from many of our sister organizations, as well as several individuals who had never contributed to IFGE before. By the end of the year, the worst of the burden had been lifted.

Since many of these donors have asked that their

identity be kept anonymous, we are not listing them all here. But these folks are heroes and heroines in the halls of IFGE!

(While we are expressing appreciation, we must never forget those regular contributors, who faithfully give \$10, \$25 and \$50 on an annual basis and who comprise the back bone of our organizations. We could not keep the magazine going and the mail order book store open without these contributions we would not be able to do the outreach, education, referrals and research work that helps so many people. As one of our staff said, "If we can help save just one life, it is all worthwhile.")

So a heartfelt thank you to Dana, Abby, Sharon, Jamie Fay, and all the other Santas who came through (you know who you are), from all of us involved with IFGE, from all those we will be able to help faster and more effectively, and from our entire membership!
