Whippings, Jail For 9 Saudi Transvestites

Riyadh, Saudi Arabia

Nine young Saudi men have each been sentenced to more than lashes and at least five years in prison for deviant sexual behavior, a police officer said yesterday.

A court in the western city of Qunfuda sentenced five of the men to six years in prison and 2,600 lashes. The men are to be flogged 52 times in 50 sessions, the officer said on the condition of anonymity. The four other defendants were sentenced to five years and 2,400 lashes. They are to be flogged 48 times in 50 sessions. There will be a pause of 15 days between each of the flogging sessions.

Police started tailing the nine after reports that they were acting strangely, the officer said. He said police found that they were dressing in women's clothing and engaging in deviant sexual behavior with each other.

Any woman who doubts that there are important differences between us and the guy types, listen to what Yankee coach (and cancer survivor) Joe Torre said when he called up Mayor Rudy Giuliani last week after the news broke that the mayor has cancer:

"Your cancer headlines were bigger than my cancer headlines," he told Rudy.

He was joking, of course. But still -- to which of us blessed with double X chromosomes would this particular form of cancer consolation have ever occurred, even in jest?

Joe Torre's remarks made a bigger impression on me than they might have because I happened to read them on the same day I over heard the following conversation between two preschool-aged males, my son Bair and his buddy Gino:

Mom had just strapped the two of them into the backseat and handed each a box of juice. Vigorous sucking noises ensued. A few moments later I heard Bair's voice from the back seat.

Don't get me wrong here: I know girls can be intensively competitive over soccer, Barbies, boys or math. I myself have been known to go for the jugular in Monopoly. Certainly, like most women, if I'm in a contest, I want to win it. However, as competitive as I consider myself, it would definitely not have occurred to me to turn juice-drinking or cancer headlines into such a battle to be won.

And therein, I submit, in spite of my unscientific research sample, lies the key difference between the average man and the average women. What testosterone does to your brain, apparently, is make you see contests in the same way a thirsty person in the desert"sees" an oasis everywhere.
