REV. T. G. STEWARD, D.D.,

#### One of the Brainiest of Our Men. Prepared for The Freeman.

Rev. T. G. Steward, D.D., the subject of this sketch, was born in New Jersey in 1843. He comes of a tough, long-lived stock. He entered the Philadelphia Annual Conference in 1864, and after spending nearly a year at Camden, N. J., was transferred to South Carolina, laboring at Beaufort, Summerville and Marion in that State, and then going to Georgia, where he labored four years—one year at Lumpkin and three years at Macon. In the former place he purchased and improved church property, is he had done also in Marion, S. C., and in Macon erected the beautiful church called "Steward's Chapel," a large and costly building. While in Macon he filled the po sition of cashier of the Freedman's Savings and Trust Company, and also engaged quite largely in the sale of cotton on commission.

In 1871 he was tranferred to the Philadelphia Conference and appointed to Wilmington, laboring two years in that city with marked success and taking an active part in politics, being at that time a member of the State Central Committee of the Republican party. In 1873 he was appointed Corresponding Secretary of the Church Missionary Society, and as such visited Hayti and opened missionary connections with that island. From 1874 to '77 he preached with fair success in Bridge Street Church, Brooklyn; from 1877 to 1880 at Zion Mission Church, Philadelphia, remodeling the church both as to building and condition of honors. He also nearly completed a course mand of ex-Lieut. W. R. Keys. Their exepassed in Frankfort, completing the church there, and then went to Wilmington again, where he completed what is said to be one of the finest churches owned by colored people in the United States. In 1883 he was sent to the Union Church in Philadelphia, and before the year closed succeeded in inducing his congregation to buy their present property on Sixteenth street.

Dr. Steward is quite well known as a writer, although he has published no large books. A small essay published by him about a year ago has a tracted considerable attention on account of its style and the learning it displays. He is a fair Greek

which he is quite thoroughly acquainted. The degree of D.D. was given Mr. Steward by Wilberforce University in 1882. Last year he was elected to the position of Professor of Theology in that institution, but declined the position. On graduating from the Seminary in 1880, the Dean and Professor of Divinity reported to the Board as follows: "In the senior class, Mr. Steward, a minister of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, who now completes his full three years' course with us, has particularly distinguished himself. His essays are of the very highest order both for style and for philosophical and theological accuracy and reach." He adds, "I have had few men under my instruction, in any classes, who have so thoroughly mastered the subjects and the system of Christian theology as Mr. Steward has." The whole Faculty unite in saving: "For character, demeanor, scholarship, fidelity and ability, he takes the very highest rank. His accurate thinking, his range of study and his felicity of expression combine to promise distinguished usefulness in any sphere of labor to which he may be

Mr. Steward's published thoughts are "The Divine Attributes," "Death's Hades and the Resurrection," "Sermon on the Incarnation" and "Memoirs of Mrs. Rebecca Steward." None of these have attracted so much attention as the essay on "Death," etc.; which has been commented upon by very fine scholars and spoken of as a very creditable production. He is engaged upon a standard work on "Theology," hopes to finish in the course of a few years
