Marsha P. Johnson, black transvestite survivor of the 1969 Stonewall Rebellion, Andy Warhol model, internationally acclaimed entertainer with the Hot Peaches Review, Anvil icon & a legendary hooker panhandler on Christopher Street & the West Side Highway was found floating in the Hudson River at the foot of Christopher Street late Monday afternoon, July 6th.

Marsha, a much beloved fixture in the Village for many years, was wearing men's clothing & had apparently drowned three or four days earlier, thur duy for the body was so badly decomposed that surviving family members - brother & sisters, Robert, Jean & Norma Michaels of Elizabeth, N.J. - were not allowed to view either the body or photos thereof for identification purposes. Fingerprints were used + the vehains then cremated.

While foul play has not been ruled out, Marsha - whose given name was Malcolm Michaels Jr. - just before disappearing early thursday morning,7/2, gave bouquets of flowers to close friends & family members, disposed of his personal belong<sup>i</sup>ngs & commenced displaying the excessive religiousity which had been the harbinger of previous psychdtic episodes.

During his last breakdown during the fall of 1991, Marsha described seeing his long deceased father "in the water on the bottom of the river." Although certain Marsha was <u>incapable</u> of intentional selfdestruction, Randy Wicker & George Flimlin, with whom Marsha had lived in Hoboken since 1980, theorize Marsha once again thought he saw deceased loved ones in the river or floating on the clouds above & Toward simply walked to join them.
