A RTHUR Corbett, husband of sex-change model April Ashley, was found in a coma last night a few hours after a court had officially ended their marriage.

A Spanish maid found Mr. Corbett, 50-year-old son of former Chief Scout Lord Rowallan, lying unconscious in his villa at Marbella, in Spain.

He had a head injury. It is thought that he had been lying face down on the living room floor for 16 hours.

Flane He was taken to hospital in Malaga, where he was still uncon-scious early today. A triend, Mr. Guy Sitwell, said: "This is a complete mystery. Arthur had been due to catch a plane from Malaga to London on Sunday night for the Divorce Court hearing. "The doctor tells me that he may have suffered a fail. But we shall not know for sure until he comes round." The last person to see Mr. Corbett was a Dutch girl friend. Miss Carla Harvey, who works in a boutique in Marbella. She said: "I saw him on Sunday afternoon and he told me he was going home to get ready for his flight to London three hours later." "He seemed quite cheerful, and showed me his plane ticket." Miss Ashley was a man and granted Mr. Corbett a decree of nullity. The judge's summing up in-cluded intimate details about Mr. Corbett's own sexual deviations. He had been attracted to April in the first place because he was himself a transvestite who liked to dress up in women's clothes, the judge said.

But the marriage was a dis-aster and, although they were officially man and wife for seven years, they actually lived together for only fourteen days.

But until I hear more details I do not want to comment further." Miss Ashley was planning to appeal against the judge's verdict that she was a man. "I cannot function as a man,". Miss Ashley said.

A judge ruled yesterday that she was, is and always will be, a man.

The verdict was a shattering blow to the tall, girlish, graceful Miss Ashley, who seemed to the outside world to have really become the woman she longed to be.

She now knows that not all the beautiful clothes she wears, nor the drugs she took to make her breasts grow, nor the sex-change operation she had ten years ago, can make her dream of complete femininity come true in the eyes of the law.

Miss Ashley, wearing a colourful Russian peasant-style outfit, said after hearing the decision: "I'm absolutely shattered. I feel in a state of limbo.

^A I hoped one day to adopt children. Now, until the law is changed, I won't be able to.

"You can only be what you function as — and I can't function as a man." The verdict on 34-year-old Miss Ashley came in the

Judge's summing-up after a 16-day hearing in the Divorce Court in London.

Mr. Arthur Corbett, son of former Chief Scout Lord Rowallan, had claimed that his seven-year-old marriage to Miss Ashley was void on the grounds that she was a man at the time of the ceremony.
