followed with the Crying Game and Mrs. Doubtfire. The year 1994 gave us Just Like a Woman, and 1995 is sending Wigstock, Dr. Jekyll and Ms. Hyde and Wong Foo our way. On the surface, the 90's are shaping up to be the Golden age of Transgen Cinema.

But it won't last forever.

Hollywood uses and then discards people and ideas like kleenex. The name of the game is MONEY; once an audience gets bored, the powers-that-be have to move on. so many genres have come and gone: westerns, spy thrillers, exorcistbrand horror shows, disaster licks, disco movies, etc. Each ran its course, to be replaced by the next fad.

Our "search" committee has looked at four or five places, but none seems to be quite right for one reason or another. Our name badges should be ready by the November meeting. We have a couple of clip art drawings which should make nice badges. We're just waiting until the October meeting to see who is still with us.

There were a couple of issues which I forgot to bring up at our July board meeting. One was vendors, the other was the women who attend our regular meetings. First of all the vendors. We really miss them at our meetings. It has become very apparent that we really need them at our meetings. Our two Vendor Nights, last September, 1994 and this year, were two of our largest attended meetings. The Board needs to make this a priority issue in 1996. We need our vendors at the meetings to help bring in the membership.

Next, but not last, are the wives. We need to make these lovely ladies feel more comfortable at our meetings. Over the few months before I took office, all I heard was the women didn't like to be at our meetings. But I never knew why until I asked. These women just wanted to feel like they were part of the group. Whenever we had new members and their wives, I was always relying on Betsy R. and Shelly C. to be at our meetings to talk with these woman. But, I can't ask them to be at every meeting. They have their own families and lives to think of, too. So we must all pickup the slack here and try to make all the ladies feel more welcome. The members of Powder Puffs were right to be tough on the past Board of Directors. All these issues had been forgotten and overlooked in the past. We are busy working on these trying to make Powder Puffs one of the premier social support groups in the country.

But, now its time to turn the tables. We, the Board, feel we must get tough on the membership. Only just a little though. It's that time of the year when its time to pay the dreaded Annual Dues. Lately we've just been bringing in enough money to pay for the hotel and food for the meetings. We still have other expenses to pay. Joan, our treasurer, took a 12 month average of our income and expenses. We are running at about an average of \$80 short each month. Joan has been picking up the postage and printing costs for July, August and September. She has only been reimbursed for July and August. I have charged the food for the August and September meetings on one of my credit cards. We are starting to get some membership renewals, but we need more. So if you haven't paid your dues yet, please do so. It's only \$30 per year. Remember, if the dues haven't been paid by the October meeting, you'll have to pay the higher meeting rate of \$15. Plus, you'll have to be dropped from the mailing list and lose other privileges of membership.

I'm not trying to be mean, but running this organization takes money as well as time. Remember, one of the primary functions of Powder Puffs is a social support group for the newcomer and significant other. We really need to keep the "welcome mat" open for them.

The haves & the have nots of the gender community By Melanie Yarborough

Like it or not, there's a very real division in our community. It's something few will speak about openly — the division between those who can pass as female in public and those who can't.

Some of us have that lucky combination of height, weight, build, and a natural feature — androgyny. And some of us simply look too masculine and will never look completely female. Life isn't fair. But some are also brilliant music composers, NBA stars, or Nobel-Prize winning physicists, and some of us aren't. Like I said before, life isn't fair.

Those who can pass are idealized in our community. They're the objects of envy, put up on a pedestal, and sometimes achieve leadership positions. I, myself, am arguably one of the lucky ones who benefits from this division. I'm 5'3", 128 lbs with my own hair and pierced ears. In public, I've been able to blend in as a short, curly-haired bespectacled woman.

But because of this, I feel I have a special responsibility to speak out against it.

When we overemphasize passing, we stop being an organization and become a PAGEANT. An organization exists for empowerment and education; a pageant exists for ego gratification. Organizations accomplish things; pageants achieve little.

Being trangendered means (unfortunately) being egocentric. We're self-focused because we have to be; carrying around this painful intense desire to dress/live/surgically alter ourselves to be the woman we weren't born as. But I'd like to see people talking about the Speaker's Bureau, providing support for spouses, helping sisters just coming out, and educating the straight community on who we are.

I've beaten this drum on this so often it looks like it's become "Melanie's Soapbox." But I'll say it once again, "We're a good community. BUT WE CAN BE A BETTER ONE."

Why it's Great to be a Girl

Females have much greater freedom in what we can wear

When your daughter opens her closet each morning, she probably faces a dizzying array of selections. Weather permitting, she can choose to wear a long dress or skirt, a short dress or skirt, a split skirt, overalls, jumpsuit, leggings, jeans, pants, sweater, blouse, T-shirt, vest, bodysuit, and on and on. In the past few years, it's even been perfectly acceptable — if not the height of fashion for a female to appear in public wearing a tuxedo, a tie, a man's shirt, or even his boxer shorts. Males, on the other hand, have only a fraction of the choices when it comes to attire.

Females haven't been always so lucky. In the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, women were required to wear long, hooped, ground-sweeping skirts for modesty's sake, and were expected to have slender waists, which they played up or faked by wearing numerous hot, itchy, scratchy petticoats under their skirts and by cinching their waists six or seven inches smaller with the help of a tortuous corset reinforced with whalebone. And that was it. You had to dress like that no matter how bad the weather, how

muddy the streets, or how physical your labor. (Remember Scarlett O'Hara out in the field in that "as God is my witness" turnip-eating scene?)

The winds of change began to blow in the early 1850s when Elizabeth Smith Miller, who loved to garden, designed an outfit to make it easier to do that. The outfit consisted of Turkish pantaloons partially covered by a belted tunic and a skirt that fell four inches below the knee (a *scandalous* length!). Miller wore it while visiting her cousin, feminist Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Stanton's friend Amelia Bloomer, who in 1849 founded America's first women's rights newspaper, the *Lily*. Bloomer loved the outfit and promoted it in the *Lily* as part of her crusade for dress reform, which she felt was essential since hoop skirts had gotten so ridiculously wide that it was hard for women to go through doorways. When other American newspapers also began to publish pictures and stories about the costume, they mistakenly credited Bloomer with the design, which explains why that style of trousers became known as bloomers instead of millers. Soon bloomers were more fiercely debated than slavery across the United States.

While bloomers were undoubtedly more practical and comfortable than what was then fashionable, they did not last. It seems that women who wore them — including Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton — were literally laughed off the street, had rocks thrown at them by angry males, and were ejected from public establishments. By 1853 even the bravest souls gave them up — except for Bloomer. She insisted on wearing them into the 1860s, and even after she, too, dropped them as street wear, she wore them while cleaning her house.

It would be another 100 years before wearing trousers became acceptable for women. Even so, Bloomer's campaign sent hoopskirts — at long last — on their way out of fashion, and more practical attire for women became available. Bloomer died in December 1894, campaigning against alcohol and for women's rights up to the end. "But the crusade for which she will longest be remembered," says Jules Archer in his book *The Unpopular Ones*, "is the one that eventually liberated women to move about freely and comfortably as men — often more so — in slacks, short skirts, shorts, bikinis, and miniskirts."

Gee, the part about being laughed off the streets, having rocks thrown at them and being ejected from public establishments has a familiar ring. Maybe what they needed was a Hose and Heels Club or Virginia Prince, herself (just kidding). I guess we forget that women have had to work very hard to get their freedom of expression in dress. Maybe there is a lesson in this story for us. Cyndi
