Membership has steadily declined (we've lost over 100 members since I served on the ExCom four years ago). Fundraising opportunities have been reduced (no booth at the Pride Parade, etc.). Expenses seem out of control.

If you've been reading the Minutes from the ExCom meetings, you know by now that we lost our collective shirts (OK, blouses...) at the Cotillion this year. What once was ETVC's biggest money maker of the year has turned into a millstone around our necks. How did this happen? Wasn't a budget followed? Weren't there alarm bells going off somewhere? Who's responsible for this fiscal irresponsibility? I feel like taking to task the outgoing ExCom for this colossal blunder, but after speaking with a number of them recently, I have to admit that there are valid reasons why this happened. And don't get me wrong. The Cotillion serves ETVC very well in establishing bridges between GLBT organizations around the Bay Area. It certainly says "we've arrived," but is it worth it? Sure, everyone had a great time and it's generally agreed that it was the best Cotillion we've ever had, but it also used to represent thousands of dollars in income for ETVC and a tidy donation to a favorite charity (for which we used to get some nice PR). Can we continue to justify the expense of hosting the event if it puts us so deeply in the red? And we weren't the only losers; Project Open Hand must have certainly been disappointed. Frankly, it's inexcusable, and some of our members agree - I've published in this issue letters that express these sentiments much better than I ever could. Please read them. And the next time you see Leslie Bailey, give her a huge hug and then bend down to kiss the ground she walks on, because without her extremely generous donation, we could've been in deep do-do.

Should we re-evaluate the focus of the Cotillion? Instead of a glorified beauty contest, intent on electing a figurehead, perhaps we should use the opportunity to recognize our members instead. And considering the financial trouble we're in, a re-evaluation of the model on which ETVC is based might be in order, and that boils down to one fabled name in our storied history: Chez Mollet. The group was founded entirely around this establishment - it offered good parking, a private area for meetings and events, good food and drink and low operating costs. And ever since the Chez closed down, ETVC has been trying to emulate that arrangement. Clearly it has not been as successful as we'd all like. A lot of energy is expended in trying to find an establishment that caters to our members' needs (and there are a lot of them!), as well as ExCom's to fund the coffers, so we'll be hard pressed to find a situation that will please everybody. But how to solve the problem? I certainly don't have any easy answers, and it's to our membership that we must turn. Somebody out there has got to have a string to pull somewhere, a rapport to pursue. After all, we are a non-profit organization. Wouldn't it seem reasonable to use that to our advantage?

Fundraising and Bylaws

Long term members who've taken the trouble to read the Bylaws may have noticed a few changes. One of the conditions of our non-profit status was that the general membership meet once a month to conduct club business, hence our end-of-month "socials." By eliminating this requirement and installing an Annual Business Meeting, the focus of ETVC's mission has certainly shifted. The opportunities for member input have been cut back, but the revised Bylaws now stipulate that we publish the time and location of each month's ExCom meeting so that any member of good standing can attend. I encourage you to do so. The next meeting is on Sunday, June 14, at Leslie Bailey's home in Albany, 527-5398/524-7759; 3:00pm.

The membership needs to get off their collective pantied fannies and go above and beyond. Valerie Valeska set a fine example for us all by contributing an extra donation along with her membership renewal. If you can, consider doing at least as much. ETVC needs it. Join a committee. Organize a fundraiser. Volunteer to help at events (and show up on time!). Encourage new members to join. Support our advertisers. If no one is collecting entrance fees at events, seek out an Officer and give it to them. We need to rely (for the time being) on the honor system, so pay your door fees and renew your membership on time. If you can't give your money, give of your time.

Part of what I offer to keep the wheels turning and trim expenses is to voluntarily imageset this newsletter and negotiate with a printer friend of mine (many thanks here to Harry at International Minute Press, Mission & New Montgomery) to produce this and ensuing issues at cost. By doing so, I've had to change the format of the *Channel* from 11x17 sheets to the letter-size stapled tome you now hold in your hands, but in doing so have realized a 36% savings in production costs. Perhaps when we're healthier financially, we can revert to the nicer format and put this puppy on a press, but for the time being, it's the Xerox machine for us.

And since this is, after all, your newsletter, I want you to feel free to send me material for publication. Articles, photos, ads – whatever. Email me your files: MissAyme@aol.com. Save text files as "RTF" (Rich Text Format). Mac or PC is fine. Typed articles should be laser printed preferably (use a serif font like Courier or Times) or typewritten, doublespaced. Whatever you've got, send it to me. I'm only here to push the buttons and make this look as good as possible. I typeset 'em as I see 'em. If it's publishable within our guidelines, I'll print it. We need to hear from you. There's a lot to discuss. We're in trouble and you've got to help.

Name Change

Acronyms, acronyms! What's up with that? Do we have to have an acronym that means something to everybody? It's been sixteen years with the handle we've got, it's widely recognized and firmly established, and even if it (admittedly) doesn't work any longer, do we really need to go there considering more immediate matters? If we must have an acronym, my vote goes to Bay Area T-Girls, or BATGIRLS Just think of the merchandising possibilities! TRANZ with a "Z" would work, with a nice flashy Z in the logo, meaning everything and nothing at the same time. If we must have an acronym, let's keep the one we've got.

The New Year

So now we've got a new ExCom coming around the corner. A few from the existing one are staving on for another term (Goddess bless them!), but clearly their work is cut out for them. The Budget must be first and foremost in their minds as we approach the new fiscal year. We need to support them and offer advice, encouragement and ideas. Show up at the next ExCom meeting and get involved with the business of moving ETVC forward. We cannot rely upon a small handful of dedicated individuals to drive ETVC as we try to recoup and regroup. This is my call to you, the membership, to get involved somehow, some way. If you've got an idea, forward it to the appropriate Committee Chair or better yet, volunteer to drive it to fulfillment. Offer to make a presentation at one of our Educational Seminars. A lot of us are on email - let's find a way to use it to our advantage so we can communicate with our leaders and with each other. ETVC is a member-based organization so that's where our real power lies. A lot of what happens next for ETVC is going to depend entirely on you.



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EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES April 1998

The monthly meeting of ETVC's Executive Committee was at 2:00 on April 5. Communications and Announcements: Andrea's surgery will be completed in Portland on April 10; Juana was scheduled to fly up there and bring her back.

The Minutes: Sandra mentioned two changes in the March Minutes: she wanted Training program changed to Workshop Program and Lyon's changed to Lions.

With those corrections, Sandra moved that Minutes be approved, Leslie seconded and they were unanimously approved.

President's Report

The locker was still not emptied and ETVC may have to pay for a portion of April's rent. Erin, Leslie and Juana met with Joan Goodnight about Cal Dreaming. Q, Kalani, Ronnie, Gina and Dianna have declined their nominations. Leslie will ask Michele Garcia and Alexis.

Vice President's Report

Leslie had already personally paid all losses incurred by the Cotillion. With the Cotillion over, Leslie wanted to get together with Miss ETVC for Pride Day preparations. She was unsure if the parade would be televised. Beer and merchandise booths would again be catered; there would be no opportunity to make money.

Secretary's Report

Veronica reported that membership was 325 of which 81 were new (compared to 379 & 93 last year). Ayme Kantz had agreed to replace Elizabeth as editor. However, the budget for the newsletter was still not made clear, only that it had to be as inexpensive as possible. Veronica wanted the newsletter to look good: it represented the club and had a great tradition to be maintained. One suggestion was to go back to the format of The Channel and Channel 2, keeping monthly information coming to the membership but at the same time alternating an expensive production and mailing with an inexpensive one, the difference between 8 business-like pages and 16 more fun pages. Ayme definitely thought she could get cheaper copying, and might even get copying donated. But cheaper and/or donated copying might mean going to 8* x 11 inch sheets as opposed to the 11 x 17 inch sheets. Ideally, the budget might go from over \$9,000 last year to around \$3,000 this year, and at the same time, double the number of issues. If the newsletter could generate around \$3,000 in advertising, it might actually pay for itself.

Outreach Report

Telzey reported that there was little advertising except in TV Epic (which runs her picture) and that the hotline was picking up. Diane and Ann Giles had 17 speaking engagements during the last academic year. Sandra had recently spoken at Modesto Junior College and at the Castro Lions Club. Sandra would most likely hold her Speakers Workshop Program in late July. Sandra is now focussed on the June KQED pledge night and another speaking engagement in Solano. When asked why there were hardly ever any ETVC speaking engagements in San Francisco, Sandra replied that SFSU instructors had their own TG favorites upon whom they always called.

Education Report

Juana wondered if ETVC offered too many educational events. But Nancy thought the seminars were great outreach. She pointed out that Dr. Schrang's lecture brought in 75 people, 60% of whom were not members.

Social Report

Leslie had checked out The Thirsty Bear as a possible location for socials and determined that it might be suitable for mid-months but definitely not for end-months. Erin said that the April social was taken care of because it was part of California Dreamin'. This led to an appraisal of ETVC's social situation.

The March social was not a success. Café Mars gave the back room (thought to have been reserved for ETVC) to a party that actually paid for it (imagine that!). ETVC was stuck in corner of the middle room beyond the pool table and behind the eight ball. Officer nominations and acceptances were made amidst much noise. Socials used to be ETVC's biggest single money-maker, previously generating something like 40 percent of the club's total income! Leslie definitely wanted to make socials into money-makers again. Leslie suggested Charpes (on Gough Street near Hayes) for May's social. The back room there can comfortably hold 45 and is set off so one could place a table at the door and charge. Charpes has a grill with dependable food and (especially important to Leslie) a bartender who gives good margarita. The May social is ETVC's annual social with awards and voting. Erin would get volunteers to count the ballots. Nancy suggested that the votes be put on a database. Juana believed that someone should organize who would work the door and table because it was necessary that Lisa Ronald not get stuck with it again as she always does. The June Social has traditionally been when ETVC did The Really Big Shew and had been tied-in with Gay Pride Week celebrations. But because there was no dependable venue and no money, this year it will either be cancelled or at least tabled. The July social was usually Friendship Bingo. Juana suggested Karaoke. Leslie thought that perhaps RGA and ETVC could have a joint Halloween party maybe at Carla's in San Jose. Sandra offered her place; Sandra has lots of room, but she does live in Livermore.

Old Business

Name change suggestions will be put on the ballot.

New Business

Awards were discussed. Adjournment: At 7:00 p.m., Leslie moved to adjourn. Nancy seconded it and the motion was passed.

AN OPEN LETTER

Dear Sisters,

I have just finished reading my May newsletter and I am appalled! It is an absolute shame that the organization that we owe so much to is in such condition. I should clarify myself. I am speaking about what I read in the ExCom Minutes. Yes, I read every word in every report.

I just did some calculation arithmetic and guess what I came up with? OUR Club is \$2,500 in the hole for the Cotillion that everybody just Loved. We do not have any money in OUR bank account. We will need another \$2,000 by year's end. Guess what? Are you aware that with 324 members that is only \$13.89 per member?

FROM SOMEWHERE IN THE FUTURE by Melissa Robinson

I remember when it was necessary to have Outreach to help our brothers and sisters. It was a time when The Others had to be taught about the transgender community.

Of course, that was many years ago. Back then, in 1998, the transgender community needed to advertise the existence of support groups. The majority of transgendered individuals were not affiliated with the tiny support groups. These individuals were defined by the passe terms of "closeted" or "in the closet."

From a survey of ancient records, this must have been an exciting time for the pioneers at the leading edge of the transgender movement. These pioneers were a minority within the tiny transgender support groups. Many members of these groups quickly forgot how it had felt to be without a support group, and placed all their energy into self-indulgent socializing, quickly dropping any pretense to provide an outreach service to the community. These individuals felt comfortable during their social activities, while remaining "in the closet" for the majority of their existence.

These "social-TGs" did not realize that the lack of a comprehensive outreach program only slowed down the transgender movement, resulting in a prolonged time in the closet.

In contrast, the Outreach Pioneers understood that an expansion of the member base could only help all those unknown closet-cases as well as those who believed they were in some small way out of the closet. It was a long and hard climb for the outreach pioneers. They found their biggest hurdle to be disinterest by the social TG's, even from those who held official positions. The yearly budgets allocated sums for advertising and outreach, and then overspent those sums on social events for the few, ignoring the many in need. The sums for advertising disappeared and were made up in some small way by the dedication of the too few pioneers.

Yes, it was an exciting period for the pioneers. They saw and experienced small-mindedness and ignorance, but their vision of a better tomorrow kept them strong.

A RESPONSE TO MS. ROBINSON from Secretary Veronica

I'd like to address some of the points made by Melissa in her story. Since Melissa wrote a futuristic allegory, I have to guess as to what she means exactly. But I assume when she refers to "social TGs" who hold "official positions" and who waste the support group's budget "on social events for the few" that Melissa is chastising the present ExCom officers for blowing so much dough on the Cotillion. She further implies that the present officers have spent so much of the club's resources on money-losing socials that it has hindered the ability of the "Outreach Pioneers" to connect with closeted TGs, an effort which Melissa suggests is ultimately more important than any silly shindig.

I don't like Melissa's dichotomy between "social TGs" and "Outreach Pioneers." Just because some of us like occasions to wear frilly dresses does not mean we are not committed to connecting with as many of our sisters and brothers as possible. I had nothing to do with the planning of the Cotillion, but I was proud that ETVC could pull off such a distinguished affair. The truly diverse crowd looked as if it had a grand time and I thought it was damn-fine outreach, too. The Cotillion reached a wider audience than any previous ETVC event; it was filmed, edited and televised half-a-dozen times. True, it was only on public access, but still, my Cotillion tape is a delightful showcase for our group and is presently being borrowed by my co-worker. How many more will see it? And the Cotillion did not actually cost ETVC anything because Leslie Bailey, the event's producer, personally covered all of the Cotillion's losses. In the past year, Leslie put more than \$3,000 of her own money into ETVC's coffers. Leslie is not rich and she has sons in college, but she is extremely responsible and more firmly committed to this organization than anyone I know. Leslie could never fit into Melissa's scheme of outreach pioneers vs. social TGs because Leslie does both outreach and is also one of the most sociable TGs around. By placing Leslie's contribution into perspective, I come to my second point.

This past year we had less than 330 individual and family memberships, so ETVC received around \$8,000 in dues. At the same time, the newsletter cost over \$9,000, tax preparation fees were \$1,200, insurance was over \$1,000 and there were lots of other costs like state filing fees, postage, copying, and so on. Because there has been a serious cashflow problem with the club, the typical operating procedure is for ExCorn officers to put all expenses on their credit cards and hope to be paid off when the club can afford it. Darcy Leopard not only spent all her spare time searching for safe and fun places for her sisters to meet, but she also carried the Halloween losses on her credit card for months. My credit card has paid for the last couple of newsletters copying and mailing. As of this writing I've not been paid back for the last issue, and The Channel you're holding right now has been paid for by my other credit card, because the first one is maxxed out. Nancy Cupps, who bought a computer, scanner and printer for the club's use, works very long hours at her job and has also worked long hours with Juana to produce the Education seminars. And Melissa must know how much Telzey and Sandra give to this group. President Erin and the rest of us have presented ourselves

Chapter 8: 'Twas the Night Before...

Where did all the time go? The last time I looked, my scheduled SRS date was still weeks away! Run down the checklist as I pack - have I forgotten anything? Do I really need all these toiletries? Where did I put my airline ticket? Aarrgghh!

Emotionally, I knew that I was ready to take this irrevocable step - I had left the trappings of a male existence far behind, and was quite happy with and successful in my life as a woman. There was nothing to go back to, and my focus was on the present. I had never been as sure of anything in my life as I was about having SRS - I had only the anxiety associated with being in a hospital, away from friends and family. The logistics, however, were another matter entirely.

Having read all of the material in Anne Lawrence's Transsexual Women's Resources pages on the Web (http://www.mindspring.com/~alawrence/index.html) and having chatted with several of my "big sisters", I thought that I had everything under control. Unfortunately, I neglected to factor in going off hormones three weeks prior to surgery. Not the most pleasant experience, it certainly complicated rational thought during that period. As my estrogen level dropped, I quickly acquired a constant companion - a nagging headache just at my threshold of awareness. I also experienced my share of mood swings, night sweats, and the odd hot flash. On the plus side, though, the excess water weight that I had carried for the past year finally evaporated.

The week just prior to-my surgery was totally frantic. One moment I was the excited child who couldn't wait for Santa Claus to arrive; the next I was the harried parent wondering how they were ever going to complete their holiday preparations in time. Since I would be off work for almost a month, there were so many projects that had to be completed, delegated, or mothballed. On the home front, I had to:

- Plan my grocery shopping in such a way that most, if not all, of the perishables were consumed by the time I left
- Ensure that my house cleaning and laundry was done, so that I would return to a clean apartment and fresh clothes
- Make arrangements for someone to pick up my mail
- Collect all of the items that I would need to take with me (mostly documents and toiletries)
- Obtain all of the items that I would need upon my return

The day preceding my surgery was busy, but in many ways boring and tedious. The LiquiPrep regimen, which began with breakfast, put a definite crimp in my meal and my snack choices, and also restricted my activities a bit. My pre-op appointment turned out to be the highlight of the day, while filling my post-op prescriptions at the local pharmacy turned out to be my last real excursion for quite a few days. I drank the LiquiPrep itself at the prescribed time (remniscent of Schwepp's Bitter Lemon), and made sure that was back in my hotel room by 7:00 pm to avoid any risk of an "accident". I set both the hotel's bedside clock radio and my personal travel alarm for 4:00 am - I was not going to oversleep! Despite the anticipation and my excitement, I fell asleep quickly, and slept through the night with no unusual dreams.

The morning of my surgery I managed to arrive at the hospital a few minutes before my scheduled 6:00 am appointment time. Naturally, they weren't quite ready for me, so I took a seat in the waiting room and calmly read the book that I had started on the flight up. Upon reflection, I can't be sure if that demonstrated fatalistic acceptance of or complete detachment from my imminent, irrevocable, lifealtering surgery. No matter - it helped keep my apprehensions at bay.

I still couldn't believe how relaxed I was as they wheeled me into the operating room. The anesthesiologist looked down at me and said, "Andrea, I'm going to put you to sleep now." I felt a burning sensation in my hand, heard a soft roaring in my ears, and then was totally unaware of anything until I woke up in my hospital room. It was dark outside, and a nurse was checking my vital signs.

"Hi," I said. "Did everything go okay?"

She assured me that everything had, so I smiled and drifted back to sleep...

special cross-dressing conference. More and more transgendered individuals have chosen to bend, shift or break the arbitrary, culturally-enforced links between birth sex and gender expression. More individuals see themselves as different, not better or worse, just different and find some level of gender non-conformance appropriate in their daily lives.

In a seemingly incongruous statement he indicated that support sessions sponsored by the groups were continuing to increase. More professionals who understand transgender issues are trained and available to help anyone who is struggling with gender related issues. He explained that it was a watershed moment to be able to switch emphasis from purely social programs to those that offer needed psychological support to members troubled by a gender identity disorder. He concluded that while there are real personal problems that need treating, the number of societal-induced problems continue to decrease.

Here's one last related article from the Green Bay Wisconsin Press Gazette dated May 1, 2028...

Years ago when the Packers traveled to San Francisco we used to comment on the interesting characters in California. Now we have them here in Wisconsin and they don't arouse nearly as much attention. At yesterday's game, with the balmy weather, one of our male sports reporters wore a short dress to the game, and I have to confess that he has great legs! Time was that any guy who tried that at Lambeau Field wouldn't live to see the second half but now it just seems almost normal.

Last week my best friend and I went out for drinks and he confided that he had been having job problems and didn't know what to do. He cried. Know what? It was okay. In fact it made me feel like more of a friend to be able to be understanding and supportive. A month ago at my impending 50th birthday, I admitted to my wife that I was afraid of growing old. Instead of laughing she was very loving and we had one of the most intimate evenings I can remember. In retrospect, those old macho stereotype days weren't so good after all. I no longer consider showing emotions a sign of weakness. Instead it's a sign of being more human. Quite an improvement, even here in Green Bay.

So what does this all mean? As we move beyond simply finding a place to dress and gradually push down the walls of our carefully constructed closets, society sees and understands us better and begins to accept and even emulate some of our traits. Eventually we become such an integral part of the fabric of society that we cease to exist as an independent, definable group. Some scoff and say that can't be, but George Bernard Shaw saw a similar type of vision when he said, "You see things; and you say, 'Why?' But I dream things that never were; and I say, 'Why not?'"

Oddly enough, our common bond is in our differences. We have struggled more to understand and accept ourselves. Because of our struggles we can be more sensitive to the struggles of others. Through our sensitivity we can infect society. Once they catch understanding and acceptance there is no known cure. I say, "Why not?" What do you say?

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1997 RETREAT REVISITED by Juana and Veronica Smith

A little more than a year ago, the ExCom officers determined that it was necessary to spend time together and away from distractions so as to concentrate on establishing goals for the next year. Ten goals were listed, including finishing a project that had languished for nearly a decade under previous ExComs. The following is a short analysis of how well or ill this ExCom has done.

Publish A Year Long Calendar Of Events

During the retreat, the officers pencilled in a full year's worth of events. Although dates were tentative, the publication of ETVC's 1997-1998 schedule in the first edition of *Channel 2* was a benefit to members who needed to plan well in advance.

Promote ETVC's Visibility

Cindy Martin and Jamie Fay Fenton's generosity allowed ETVC to have a free website, and the energetic and beautiful Miss Q created and maintained a webpage. Telzey recently reported that half the people she talks to on the hotline had found the number on the web. Juana got ETVC to participate in the first Tranny Fest, a week of transgender events including the first West Coast Transgender Film Festival. Miss ETVC Dale Carlson, Andrea Drane, Janet Bowman and Erika Von Valkyrie performed during the Freedom Day Parade. The Cotillion was broadcast on television for the first time. And ETVC was one of the sponsors of the major national event, California Dreamin'.

Search For New Social And Mid-Month Venues

Darcy Leopard's strenuous searches allowed ETVC members to enjoy diverse venues such as the Lilo Lounge, Cafe Mars and Cyberworld Cafe. And The Cat Woman organized Saturday events at Cyberworld and the G-Spot. Ms. Leopard, Bree Wood and DiDi Mau checked out the logistics of creating club crawls at California Dreamin'. However, within the minds of most veteran ETVCers lingers the exemplum of Chez Mollet, a combined bar, restaurant and meeting hall that was inexpensive and had good parking. That dream spot has not been fulfilled.

Increase Communication With Membership

The ExCom determined that a survey of the members was needed so as to understand their concerns. Sara Warren created a survey filled with pertinent questions and the ExCom edited it. Then Sara Warren copied it and sent it out. The results were tabulated, analyzed and published in *Channel 2*. At the same time, a fuller form of the ExCom Minutes was published so that the members were able to see the decision-making process and be made aware of the organization's problems and advances.

Review, Revision and Reworking of the Bylaws

Nearly a decade before this ExCom took office, it had been determined that ETVC needed revised bylaws. A committee was formed and an outline drawn and there it sat for nine years. At the 1997 Retreat, this particular ExCom decided that updated Bylaws was a worthwhile goal. Within six months after the May Retreat, dedicated ETVC volunteer Brenda Altman, Esq., had completed a draft of completely revised bylaws. Through further work by the ExCom and especially by Sandra, Erin and Veronica, a finalized version was put forth for membership approval.

Organization Name Change

In an effort to represent the membership more inclusively, members submitted name change suggestions and a ballot was sent to all members for consideration. Results will be posted in the next newsletter.

Improve The Quality Of Education Seminars

Previously, the Education Committee was expected to produce 18 Education Seminars a year. This requirement usually led to the quick burn-out of the Co-Chairs and Committee. Nancy and Juana determined that neither the membership nor the committee was served by this expectation. Therefore, they decided to work on improving the quality and limit the quantity of seminars. This innovation has stimulated more interest and greater attendance.

Expand The Newsletter To Include A Supplement

It was thought ETVC would benefit with more timely information. This was especially critical when event venues became more difficult to secure. *Channel 2* was the result. After five issues, it was suspended when *The Channel* went to a monthly format.

Increased Participation In Civic Activities And Creation Of A "Tip Sheet."

ETVC currently does not have enough volunteers to organize this level of membership participation or to help the ExCom create and update a tip sheet. Anyone who wishes to help out with this, please step forward.

As we look at what this ExCom has accomplished in one year, we feel that this group has done well during some rough times. There are certain things we did not see, such as the financial difficulties that have plagued the club and the inability to find a stable and suitable social venue.

The only drawback was that the bar was sma and packed with people. We took a seat in back by the pool table and had a drink. We had heard from someone at the Cotillion that Krystel (from SGA) had gone to a place called the G-spot, so off we went. When we arrived the first challenge was finding a parking spot. During the circling for a parking spot we lost Chelsea and Camille. Eventually we found a spot and started down the busy road towards the club. As it turns out the club is called the End-up but on Saturday night (ladies night) it is called the G-spot (or Girl Spot). This is important because if you see the sign from one side it says End-up and if you see it from the other side it says The G-spot. We were circling in a direction that showed the End-up side of the sign and we were looking for the G-spot, good thing one of the girls in the back looked back at the other side of the sign as we went by.

We paid the rather steep \$6.00 cover charge and went inside. The G-spot has to be the best place we have found in San Franciso thus far. It has a dance floor and is about one half the size of the Faces in Sacramento. Across from the dance floor is a separate higher stage where an exotic dancer performs. There were at least 2 bars and an outside area in the back. The restrooms don't even have gender identification signs, so all genders were using both. They could use a few more bathrooms there, at times the lines were getting a bit long. We danced until the place closed around 2:00 am. It was allot of fun.

Since the Cotillion, my wife and I have been to Faces in Sacramento 3 more times. It is just too much fun to miss. In addition I was at the SGA talent contest at Josephs last month. This was a fun event as well. SGA rented the club section of Josephs and had many performers including the ETVC royal court, Di Di Mau, and the ETVC President. I still think the best way to do the Sacramento experience is to start with the SGA dinner at Josephs and then go to Faces afterwards.

We have also been to DVG at least 3 times since the Cotillion. This appears to be the best venue for talking to other members. Even though it is held at a club, there is no loud music. The club has several small tables which allows you to move from one group to another and talk to most of
