There he is ... Atlantic City's 'other pageant'

ATLANTIC CITY, New Jersey (AP) -- The flowers and dime-store crown were real. Nearly everything else was fake, from the eyelashes to the cleavage to the lip-synched songs.

Miss Tenee won the crown, was given a dozen roses and Welcome to Atlantic City's other beauty pageant, the one for headed down the bulb-adorned runway as the crowd sang a reworked version of "There She Is," the Miss America stanmen dressed in drag. dard.

Seven blocks and a world away from the stage where Miss America 2000 was crowned Saturday night, the Miss'd America Pageant lampooned its famous older sister with a raucous, gender-bending spoof funny enough to bust a girdle.

Held annually on the night after Miss America's crowning, Miss'd America provides a sarcastic antidote to the apple-pie sincerity of the real pageant.

The swimsuit competition? A nauseating display of chunky thighs and muscular arms. The musical production numbers? Over-the-top atrocious. The evening wear contest? Outright hysterical.

The only serious thing Sunday was the cause: The event raised more than \$15,000 for support programs run by the South Jersey AIDS Alliance.

"It's the wildest show this side of the Boardwalk," said Bill Mattel, the alliance's former chief executive.

Wild, indeed.

There was Miss Sallotta Tea, who squeezed 240 pounds into a sequined black cocktail dress and opera-length black gloves. Down the runway went Miss Tea, pushing a cart



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loaded with goodies and warbling a version of the title song from the musical "Cabaret."

"Life is a big buffet, my friend. So come to the big buffet," sang Miss Tea.

Then there was Miss Tenee, a 6-foot-3 inch, 205-pounder, who began a talent segment in a purple Afro wig and brown velour dress. That soon disappeared, revealing a silk chemise.

The capacity 600-person crowd was a mix of gay and straight, casino workers and local politicians, Miss America Pageant hairstylists and female impersonators.

Not that there wasn't some authenticity to the proceedings.

Miss America 1998 Kate Shindle, who spent her reign promoting AIDS advocacy and needle exchanges, sang "My Man" during the show.

"As far as I'm concerned, what's any pageant without a former Miss Whatever singing Streisand?" she said.



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FOR A BETTER YOU...

Q: Where is blush supposed to end? I've read that it's supposed to start on the apple of your cheeks, but where is it supposed to end? Should it go right up to your hairline? Just under your eye? Help! I've started something I can't finish!!!

A: With makeup trends and seasonal looks changing all the time, I like to stick with a classic approach. They may be doing crazy blush stripes or huge Raggedy Ann circles on the fashion runways, but I always like the natural look you get from applying blush on the apples of the cheeks. Here's how to get that natural look.

Whether you choose powder, cream or gel blush, you want to have the right tools to get the best application. Powder blush needs a medium size soft blush brush that is a bit larger than the fullest part of your cheek. Cream and gel blush should be applied with your fingers, and then blended out with a sponge if you like - I just use my fingers.

To get a natural "flushed" look, blush looks best on the apple, or most rounded part, of the cheek (you can see it when you smile) and blended back to the hairline. Take care to apply the majority of the color to the apple, then soften any edges with a brush or your fingers so the color blends seamlessly.

If your color is too dark or goes on to heavily, dust some loose face powder over it, use a sponge or puff to blend it out lighter, or use a tissue to pick up any excess color.

Finally, for the most natural look, choose a color that complements your skin. If you have golden undertones, try a peachy shade, whereas rosier skin will look better with a pale pink or rose tone.

Revlon ColorStay Liquid Lip

I saw an ad for this in a fashion magazine and immediately put in on my list for my next trip to the drugstore. I was pleasantly surprised by the number of color choices and actually had a hard time choosing among several that were pretty and seemed right for me. So often there is such a limited choice or everything is a variation on pastel pink! The color I ended up with, Mimosa, is a medium rose with a hint of shimmer (very subtle) that for me is just a shade or two deeper than my natural lipcolor. The consistency of Liquid Lip reminds me a bit of Maybelline Lip Polish - it's not glossy but instead more dry and velvety. This dry quality makes it easy to apply and fill in your lips without worrying about going outside your lipline and making a mess like a gloss can.

In terms of wearability, Liquid Lip feels the most comfortable of all the ColorStay lipcolors. It sets to a finish that you can't really feel (almost like you have nothing on) and lasts well through most food and drink - except anything oily, which is always death to "long-wearing" and "transfer-resistant" products. The first time I tried Liquid Lip it lasted all morning and early afternoon, only coming off when I had pizza for lunch. Every other time I wore it, it lasted through regular food and drink, kissing, etc. with no problem. I think I have finally found a comfortable, non-creamy lipcolor that I can wear everyday without getting it on my clothes or on my daughter's face. This is a definite winner in my book. (Editor's Note: I tried it & it does what it claims to do. I like it.)

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Bem Sex Role Inventory

The BSRI is the product of Sandra Lipsitz Bem, who has been interested in researching sex roles since the early '70's. The Bem Sex Role Inventory attempts to indicate the degree to which a person is culturally influenced by gender roles. Unlike the Moir - Jessel Brain Sex Test, the Bem does not directly assess biological gender/sex differences.

Gender expression is formed by both biology and culture. Culture develops stereotypical behavior models based on averaged observations of natural and biologically induced gender traits, these traits are in turn affected and altered by the cultural expectations. The end result is a feedback loop, with culture arising out of an observed biological basis, and then affecting the development of an individual as they grow to express their biology.

The Bem test indicates the degrees of absorption of cultural definitions of gender, as reflected in the user's personality. Since the gravitation of an individual to certain sex role behaviors is based on their internal drive, it might be said that the Bem test is an indirect measure of gender identity.
