THE 1993 IFGE CONVENTION - Winnie B.

For months, I had planned to drive down to Philadelphia for the IFGE Convention on Sunday, March 14. But Saturday was the day of the "Blizzard of the Century", and it took most of Sunday to clear my driveway with the help of a struggling little snow-blower and two human shovellers. By Monday, the main roads were cleared and I made it without incident, except the streets of Philadelphia were covered with packed snow and ice; it took all week to melt. The contingent from IFGE headquarters had arrived on Saturday, one step ahead of the storm, and watched the snow fall from the safety of the hotel.

The trip to Atlantic City on Monday was cancelled, so I joined a group led by JoAnn Roberts to a restaurant a few blocks from the hotel. I had remembered to bring my femme boots, but others were slipping and sliding on the uneven ice, though spike heels that dug in were sometimes an advantage. Upon returning to my room, I found that my room-mate Sharon Ann a member of TGIC from Cooperstown, had moved in with umpteen suitcases, garment bags and boxes of papers. It took *two* luggage carts to carry her stuff. I have known Sharon Ann for 20 years, and we soon settled in comfortably for the work of the Convention.

I was involved with the Congress of Representatives, as rep for TGIC. The first act of business was to confirm the Congress as an organization separate but cooperating IFGE accepting a reciprocal with by agreement. A provisional set of By Laws was approved, including an article containing statements of direction and purpose that were developed at the Convention last year in Houston:

Statement of Direction: Unity through exploration and acceptance of diverse gender lifestyles and expressions.

Statement of Purpose: To promote and encourage diverse representations of our community and to facilitate communications within our community and the community at large.

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More specifically. the Congress is 8 from of representatives gathering transgendered support organizations from all over the world, dedicated to providing a communication channel from their organizations to other organizations. including the IFGE. The Congress will make public statements and recommendations to the transgendered community and the public The Congress will assist in at large. and implementing developing communications among and within the many related member organizations of the transgendered community.

The next act was to change our name to "Congress of Transgender Organizations". The "Bill of Gender Rights" first proposed at the Denver Convention in 1991 was then endorsed by the Congress. Alison Laing was unanimously drafted to remain in the Chair of the Congress for another year.

Other Congress matters included formation of committees, political concerns, some requests of IFGE, and facilitation of regional coalitions. Downstate, the Greater New York Gender Alliance has formed, and is sponsoring Moonlight in Manhattan this Upstate, I would like to see the month. New York State Gender Coalition revived in some form, if only to sponsor meetings like the Autumn Accord held in Syracuse in 1991. To this end I had some tentative discussions with representatives from EON in Syracuse and CD Network in Rochester, but the main stumbling block remains finding people willing to do the work needed to make it happen.

My other duty at the Convention was on the IFGE Nominations and Awards Committee, which is responsible for overseeing the election process for the IFGE Board of Directors and recipients of the Trinity Awards and the Virginia Prince Award. This work having been done previously, the committee meeting was short, mainly a review of procedures. However, I was nominated and approved as new Chairperson, replacing Ellen Summers of Oregon, who will remain on the Committee.

Sharon Ann was much busier - as a newly elected member of the Board of Directors. she was fully engaged in meetings, both formal and informal, day and night all week. and drafting motions on a borrowed laptop computer in our room. I hear that some of the meetings were as stormy as the Blizzard, but things were resolved by compromise, and the Sun was shining with hugs and kisses at the end. I guess Sharon Ann must have done her part well - she ended up as Vice-Chair of the Board and Chair of the Legal & Bye Laws Committee. All this in addition to her work on the Military Law Project - see below. Congratulations, Sharon Ann!

I was glad to see some other members of TGIC show up at the Convention for the weekend. Ed H. appeared with his jelly mounds, and Sasha ventured out for her first big event. Besides the work, we all had a lot of fun, especially at *Chez Renaissance Casino* on Friday night. Hope to see more next year in Portland, Oregon.

TRI-ESS CHAPTER FORMED - Winnie B.

Sharon Ann has also been instrumental organizing the Lambda Chi Lambda in Chapter of Tri-Ess to serve members in Upstate New York. Tri-Ess is a national support group for heterosexual crossdressers, their spouses, families and friends. While TGIC is an "open" group, we can endorse and cooperate with other "closed" groups; there is no reason why our members cannot join and support other organizations as well. In particular, we have supported Jennifer Well's attempts to form a TS group and the Albany Gender Project.

Some crossdressers, especially those seeking acceptance from wives, may feel more comfortable within the restrictions of Tri-Ess; I have been a member for 20 years (including its forerunner FPE). Membership in a local chapter requires membership in the national organization, which publishes the magazine *Femme Mirror*. The intent of Lambda Chi Lambda is to focus on family issues; some initial meetings have been held in Schenectady. Sharon Ann is president and puts out a newsletter, *Cornbury's Closet.* Several other members of TGIC have also joined. If you are interested, contact Sharon Ann or myself. We may arrange some joint meetings in the future.

MILITARY LAW PROJECT QUESTIONNAIRE

An article on the Military Law Project appeared in the Jan/Feb 93 issue of The Transgenderist. This Project is an outgrowth of the First International Conference on Transgender Law and Employment Policy, held in August 1992 in Houston. Sharon Ann , a member of TGIC, is Chair of the Military Law Committee which manages the project. One of the goals of the Military Law Project is: "To assemble a resource file of case histories of transgendered military personnel (TMP) who have served in all branches of the armed forces, including active duty, reserves, National Guard, and retired personnel."

To implement this goal, a 7-page questionnaire has been prepared for all members of the gender community who have served in the armed forces. If this applies to you, please help by completing the questionnaire, copies of which are available in the *Club Room* or will be *mailed upon request* to TGIC. Even if you did not cross dress while in service (or were not discovered), you should participate in the study and contribute to statistics that will show many transgendered people have served honorably in performing their duties without problems. (In this case, the form won't take long to fill out!)

NOTE!! All information gathered is strictly confidential and will be used only for the purpose of studying the issues related to transgendered military personnel and to support efforts to reform military laws and regulations as they pertain to gender issues in the military. Your name and address are optional, and should *not* be revealed if you are still subject to the Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ).

First Reported Transsexual

In The Renee Richards Story, the author attributes a large portion of her interest in transsexualism to the book, Man Into Woman. In this book, the story of Einar Winegar is told, and how the male painter tried to take on female attributes during the 1930's.

Einar's attempt at feminization included the transplant of a uterus and ovaries into his body. Einar died within a year of the operation. From Renee Richards' description of the book, *Man Into Woman* might make interesting reading, due to the desperate measures Einar took.

Just Who Reads Glamour Magazine?

A recent reader poll published in *Glamour* magazine revealed just who reads the magazine, with surprising results. While 75% of the readership is a female reader, 16% responded that they were cross-dressers interested in fashion/beauty tips. The remaining readers were interested in sexual stimulation from the photos and articles.

While the total readership of *Glamour* is not known to this writer, the survey results certainly support the supposition that cross-dressing is a rather widespread activity in our society.

TS BOOK REVIEWS - Laurie B.

A LOW LIFE IN HIGH HEELS, by Holly Woodlawn. St. Martin's Press.

Holly Woodlawn, one of Andy Warhol's "Superstars", takes the reader through a life of glamour, alcoholism, drug addiction, crime, prostitution, wild and wanton sex, and more. Pre-op TS Holly, the star of stage, screen and Max's Kansas City in lower Manhattan (Holly starred in Worhol's TRASH), rubs elbows with Warhol, Jim Morrison of the Doors (whom she accompanies to a gay leather bar), Debbie Harry of Blondie (before her success), Fellini, the Queen of England (the real one, plus some male ones), the forces behind the Stonewall Inn Riot, and many more famous celebrities. In contrast, there is also the desperate poverty of the transsexual community living in the worst sections of the Lower East Side.

Lou Reed's song, *Take a Walk on the Wild Side*, is based on many of the characters in this book, including Holly. On the whole, the book is light, enjoyable, and often amusing reading, if one is not turned off by life on the edge (and often beyond that point).

I WAS A WHITE SLAVE IN HARLEM, by Margo Howard-Howard. Four Walls Eight Windows publishing.

The semi-factual autobiography of un-op transsexual Margo Howard-Howard, who created a family tree (and personal history) for herself. Margo takes us through a life of heroin addiction, prostitution, crime, alcoholism and a host of amusing adventures and interesting characters that portray the TV/TS life of the forties through the nineties. Due to Margo's involvement with the Mary Stuart Society, she rubs elbows with the social elite of Manhattan and also (like Holly) gets to meet the Queen of England (Queen to Queen).

Like Holly Woodlawn's book, the emphasis in this book is on the humor that can be found in living and eking out a living as an un-op transsexual, although the descriptions are often funnier than the actual fact, I'm sure.

SECOND SERVE, THE RENEE RICHARDS STORY, by Renee Richards. Stein and Day.

A very clinical look at the life and relationships of Dr. Richard Raskind, and the up and down road leading to his transsexual change into Renee Richards, the tennis star who was the subject of a TV (television, that is) movie.

Richard Raskind starts to crossdress at two when his sister and mother entertain themselves, and by eight he is getting dolled up and roaming the neighborhood. By eighteen he is extending his trips to include Manhattan. and Greenwich Village in particular. From there, his search for transsexual knowledge takes him to France's TS community, Casablanca for halfhearted attempts at undergoing the operation, the TV/TS support groups of NYC, Dr. Harry Benjamin, and quite a few potentially tragic run-ins with the law and lowlifes while in womanly attire. As a woman (TV or post-op TS), Renee has to deal with a variety of male advances, which is interesting for those of us who venture outside our living quarters.

While the family, sex life and marital problems of Richard Raskind make up much

of the book, and may make for slow reading, because of Renee's training as a surgeon her descriptions of the effects of hormone treatment, grinding away at the Adam's apple, electrolysis, the post-op condition and maintenance requirements for a new woman are eye opening, and appear to differ somewhat from the guidance offered in much of our TS literature. There is also a good amount of humor in the book (such as when Dr. Raskind badly attempts to perform a TV striptease at a Kansas City club, after convincing the locals he is a famous female impersonator). Unlike the other two books reviewed here. Renee does not meet the Queen of England, at least not in this book.

I bought my copy of Margo Howard-Howard's book at the Boulevard Bookstore, and borrowed the other two at a local library.
