



Gays' Hard-Won Political Power

Only 12 years ago, when he was the Democratic presidential front-runner, Sen. Edmund Muskie went into a panic when he heard that a New York homosexuals' group wanted to endorse him.

Muskie slipped around to the back door of his hotel to avoid meeting them, asking plaintively, "Why do they want to do that to me?"

My, how times have changed.

This year each of the three remaining Democratic presidential candidates has sought and accepted support from gay and lesbian groups. Each of them has endorsed gay rights.

The 1980 Democratic platform broke new ground by opposing discrimination based on "sexual orientation" as well as on race, color, religion and so forth.

The 1984 Democratic platform to be voted on in San Francisco, the unofficial gay capital of the United States, reaffirms the antidiscrimination pledge and applies it specifically to employment, immigration and military service.

The platform also deplores "acts of bigotry" and "violence" against "gay men and lesbians."

Following up on that, the Democratic Rules Committee adopted language assuring gays and lesbians participation in the party at all levels and membership on each of the party's various committees.

Remarkably, all this was done without uproar. The fear of backlash prevalent in Muskie's time is greatly diminished.

Ann Lewis, the Democrats' national political director, says gay rights is no longer a debatable issue" in the party.

Tom Chorlton, lobbyist for the National Association of Gay and Lesbian Democratic Clubs, says they did it the old-fashioned way — by hard work and political organization.

Starting with the Alice B. Toklas Democratic Club in San Francisco in 1974, Chorlton said, gays and lesbians now have a network of 110 Democratic organizations in 46 states and the District of Columbia.

They range in size, he said, from 30 members in Fargo, N.D., to 560 in San Francisco.

They contribute time and money to campaigns ranging from city council to president.

They endure the boredom of working on phone banks, and they vote.

Polls indicate close to three-fourths of those eligible vote.

The support or opposition of organized gays and lesbians has made a difference in elections in Houston, Sacramento, Philadelphia, New Orleans, Miami, Fargo, New York State, the District of

Columbia, and of course San Francisco and Key West. Fla.

The landmarks of political progress by gays and lesbians are characterized by reaction to overt repression.

Take the Stonewall rebellion. The Stonewall was a gay bar whose patrons endured abuse by New York City police for years until they rose up and fought back one day in June of 1969.

Ever since, Gay Pride days in June commemorate the event.

Anita Bryant's widely publicized campaign against a proposed nondiscrimination clause in the city of Miami aroused many gays and lesbians to come out of the closet in the 1970s, according to Chorlton.

Early on, there was a <u>Gay Liberation Front</u> that worked with the Black Panthers and the Women's Liberation movement.

The landmarks of political progress by gays and lesbians are characterized by reaction to overt repression.

"Even in those circles we were discriminated against," Chorlton said. "In 1971 we formed the Gay Activist Alliance and began to address our own agenda."

The various groups joined in a national network in 1979 and scored their first success in the 1980 platform.

Republican gays have not moved as far, but "they're planting the flag," Chorlton said.

Getting into the GOP platform is difficult because it is being drafted in private by a small group headed by Rep. Trent Lott (R-Miss.).

The gay community is not hostile to President Ronald Reagan.

While uncomfortable over his close alliance with fundamentalist preacher Jerry Falwell, the most vocal foe of gay rights, they remember with appreciation that as governor of California Reagan risked popular disfavor by defending homosexual schoolteachers.


