Life Insurance Plans Discussed Today: HOW DARE YOU SAY YOU CAN'T GET AIDS?

Life insurance? If it's something that can save your life, you'd want "in" on it, wouldn't you?

One of the things about AIDS that's become increasingly evident is that most people don't give a rat's ass about AIDS education — until it hits someone they love, when it hits too close to home. And the transgender/crossdresser community is no exception. Friday offers you a big OPPORTUNITY to grab onto some information, input, discussions, and group breakout sessions.

This afternoon's HIV/AIDS program says that, "Yes, here's AIDS, folks, and it's ready to take away people we love - in our families and right here in IFGE — it already has."

The program targets transsexuals, crossdresssers, and transgenders. I went to a similar session in October 1994. Like the one today, it features Dr. Walter Bockting, licensed psychologist with the Program in Human Sexuality at the University of Minnesota — and it was a real eye opener. Discussion particularly centered on the lack of informed and sensitive health care providers. Transgender people have unique health needs and they need to be met by an informed medical community.

What makes today's session so important is the fact that there is practically no specific HIV/AIDS prevention education that targets transgender people and their specific needs. And many people feel that one of the impediments to this is inconsistent education from the medical profession regarding HIV/AIDS. Many family physicians are lacking knowledge and sensitivity to transgenders; hospitals are lax in sensitivity training.

Despite increasing awareness, the public still trivializes transgenders. Discrimination is alive and well in all areas from going to get a driver's license to seeking help for chemical dependency. This discrimination adds to the lack of information available to transgenders and crossdressers.

Back in 1994 at the session I attended, it was noted that the IFGE convention in '96 would be an excellent way of getting



more transgenders involved in education efforts as teachers of their peers. Well, it's 1996, gang, so lets's get going on this! It's your life!

REMEMBER: HIV/AIDS education must come mainly from within its own community.

A "DEFINITIVE" TALK WITH Virginia Prince

I led off my discussion with Virginia Prince with a rather stock reporter-type question: "What do you see as one of your biggest accomplishments?"

'Turns out, the lady doesn't see herself as being responsible for any "big accomplishments." It was like once she decided to live as a woman full-time, one thing followed another in ways she could never have predicted.

As an example, her original group, called Foundation for Personality Expression (FPE) in the Los Angeles area led to sister groups in other cities which eventually turned into Tri-Ess, as part of a merger with another organization.

MAGGIE and IFGE regret the passing of two of its "finest," Jennifer Richards and Gloria Fredericks.

Jennifer, originally from Philadelphia, became active in the gay and transgender communities in Portland Oregon. After moving to St. Louis, she got involved with what was then the St. Louis Gateway Femmes The group continued to grow, thanks to her guidance. Jennifer was the driving force behind the first regional coalition of transgender support groups — Mid-America Gender Group Information Exchange (MAGGIE). She also served the national community as vice-chair of the Congress of Transgender Organizations from 1993-94.

Jennifer died on December 22 at age 44 of AIDS-related complications. Her last major appearance in the community was at the October 1995 Fall Harvest and, says friend JoAnn Roberts who attended, "Her spirit was indomitable."

Gloria Fredericks was recently killed in a work-related accident.

Last October during the National Transgender Lobby Days, Gloria was the only transgender person to actually see and speak with a U.S. Senator; in fact, the Senator was so impressed with her that he left a Russian delegation waiting while he discussed transgender issues with Gloria.

Since then, she became a 1-woman transgender political action committee. Gloria's energy and dedication to transgender activism caught the eye of many of the transgender leaders involved in creating the GenderPAC

"S.P.I.C.E. - The Gift of **Unconditional Love: A Spouses' and Partners'** Meeting" will take place from 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. Saturday, March 30th in the Crystal Lake Room.

Moderators are Annalee G., Frances Fairfax, and Evelyn Kirkland, all members of the ICCLPT - Transgendered Law Planning Board of the Spouses' and Partners' International

Conference for Education. We will be addressing topics of concern to genetic females in committed relationships with heterosexual crossdressers.

Frequently, the most difficult part of dealing with a crossdressing spouse/partner is trying to sort facts from fictions, fears from feelings. Successful coping strategies can be developed when sufficient information is garnered. Our first goal is to offer sympathetic comfort to women who are distressed by what they perceive as a threat to the marriage. Relationship problems can be complicated still further by gender issues.

Our major goal is to help people work through their issues to find reasonable solutions. We provide information and communications skills to heal the wounds and build relationships. Programs on Saturday will include a brief "herstory" of spouse/partner involvement in the gender community, an overview of S.P.I.C.E. 96, and discussion of issues of concern to the participants. Optional workshop on forming a wives/partners support group available upon request.

VIOLENCE, HEALTH CARE NEEDS FOCUS OF SURVEY; IFGE HELP IS REQUESTED

The first comprehensive survey on violence and health care needs in the transgendered community is now underway and YOU should know about it.

The survey is being undertaken by the University of Michigan Medical Center Comprehensive Gender Services Program under the guidance of Sandra S. Cole, Ph.D., who is here at the convention.

This is the first "foot in the water" attempt in understanding and documenting things heretofore swept under the carpet in the area of health care needs and violence in the transgendered community.

While those needs are apparent to all of us, the "powers that be" have no hard, cold data to look at in making assessments on what, if anything, should be done. As Dr. Cole points out, "Society and the government will not believe anecdotes and rumors - only facts."

Without specific documented facts in such a welldefined survey, all existing information is anecdotal \Rightarrow and influences nothing in societal sensitivity, says Cole.

If you're concerned about personal safety in society and improved availability of supportive health care, participate in this survey so that your voice can be heard. Cole states that the survey will consist of voluntary respondents from IFGE, its local chapters, and other sources. Responses are strictly confidential.

Here's a chance to contribute to an important effort to learn about the real issues concerning violence and health care needs and experiences.

Without hard facts, the transgendered community will be less able carry its needs and message to a well-meaning but often confused public.

Cole says the data will provide the medical profession with the ability to detect specific health needs. It will justify funding for training health care providers, to help the medical profession detect life situations, and more.

"The health profession needs to also hear our life stories, says Cole, " and the demographics people will ask, 'who's responding, how old are they, where do they live?"

- ⇒ Your responses will help influence future funding for gender health care clinics.
- ⇒ Your response will help document needs for gender education and how to train professionals to better serve the community.
- ⇒ Your responses will help alert professionals to detect abuse and violence against transgendered individuals and to respond with proper services.

Here's your chance to help us bring new information for social and health care change into the public arena. Solid information that is, according to Cole, "irrefutable."

AUDIENCE INSURRECTION

Gender therapists face a sophisticated clientele, famous for manipulation. ("What!? A hundred dollars an hour for a solid year, and you're not going to give me my letter? Do you think I'm coming to you for my health?" No, that doesn't happen to us very often.)

Saturday morning, Sandra Davis, PhD, gave a presentation entitled "Gender identity disorder is no longer a mystery." Perhaps she should have called it "Gender identity disorder explained." Mysteries demand a *solution*, not an explanation. Her talk met with a disputatious audience.

She began with the child-parent-adult model of the psyche. As we grow, people influence us for better or for worse, and we incorporate them into ourselves as "interjects" -- our perceptions of other people, internalized, which come to the fore when we're being the appropriate part of ourself. When we're being childish, memories of our parents have a stronger influence.

If that first important experience is a woman, we might become convinced we should be women.

And then the comments started.

Another therapist suggested that perhaps theory was being presented as fact here; we might be better served with a few grains of salt.

"Why aren't more men convinced they should be women?" a transsexual asked. "Why aren't more women convinced they should be men? The people who influence us are halfand-half, after all"

A friend-of-the-community asked "Why am I not transgendered? What made the difference?"

One person returned to an earlier question to ask why there were not more transgendered? Dr. Davis said that in her opinion -- and in her practice -- there *were*. Remembering my days of invisibility, I cannot but agree!

In the end, with vigorous audience participation, much was learned. Some of it was not in Dr. Davis' intended syllabus -- but a talk that provokes discussion is in many ways as good as one that provokes agreement.

There was discussion. There was community. The rest is detail.



Warm Fuzzies

"This group has done a *great* job -- I haven't heard a word of dissent. Every group has internal politics, but there hasn't been a hint of that showing during the convention." (following are excerpts of Leslie Feinberg's just-released book, TRANSGENDER WARRIORS.)

"When I say I am a gender outlaw in modern society, it's not rhetoric. I have been dragged out of bars by police who claimed I broke the law when I dressed myself that evening. I've heard the rap of a cop's club on the stall door when I've used a public women's toilet."

"Today, a great deal of 'gender theory' is abstracted from human experience. But if theory is not the crystallized resin of experience, it ceases to be a guide to action. I offer history, politics, and theory that live and breathe because they are rooted in the experience of real people who fought flesh-andblood battles for freedom."

"The earliest written edicts I could find against cross-dressing and sex-change were in Deuteronomy. Did that make Jews responsible for the rise of this bigotry? If hoped not, since I was sick to death of blame."

"While there is no blueprint for the struggles ahead, we can learn both from engaging a common enemy and from the crystallized experiences of the past."

"Each person has the right to control their own body. If each individual doesn't have that right, then who gets to judge and make decisions? Should we hand over that power to the church or the state? Should we make these rights subject to a poll?"

"As trans people, we will not be free until we fight for and win a society in which no class stands to benefit from fomenting hatred and prejudice, where laws restricting sex and gender and human will be unthinkable."

"We have a right to live openly and proudly. When we are denied those rights, we are the ones who suffer that oppression. But when our lives are suppressed, *everyone* is denied an understanding of the rich diversity of sex and gender expression and experience that exist in human society."

A beggar approached. "Sir, can you spare a quarter?"
