PFLAG SEEKS TG PRESENCE

This is the year that PFLAG (Parents, Families, and Friends of Lesbians and Gays) will probably vote for Transgender inclusion. I have been working toward this goal since 1992, as an open, non-transitioning transgendered person.

Many PFLAG chapters have large numbers of transgendered persons who regularly attend meetings. This is not the case in the Seattle area. Perhaps there are too many other support groups, perhaps people are too complacent, or perhaps people just do not feel welcome. While there are occasional problems, PFLAG people work hard to create a safe and affirming meeting place for all GLBT people.

One might ask "Why be bothered with PFLAG?" It is a national organization that also has affiliations in many other countries. PFLAG takes a stand on the issues that affect us, regardless how unpopular they may be for the general population. PFLAG can bring meaningful, national attention to transgendered persons and their problems. And most important, half the people you will meet at PFLAG will not be GLBT.

All transgendered people are welcome at PFLAG meetings. While we can always use activist volunteers, there is no special requirement to do or say anything in particular. Everything at meetings is strictly confidential.
