PRIL ASHLEY, a former merchant seaman who had a sexchange operation and went through a marriage ceremony with Mr Arthur Corbett, heir to a peerage, was the central figure in an historic Divorce Court action.

plained by the judge.J Following the operation Miss Ashley returned to London now calling her-self April Ashley, and dressing and living as a female. In evidence she stated that after the opera-tion she had had sexual re-lations with at least one man. man.

In November, 1960, about six months after the oper-ation, Mr Corbett and Miss Ashley met for the first time. He was then aged 40. married and living with his wife and four children, but sexually unhappy and abnormal.

abnormal. In the witness-box he described his sexual ex-perience with apparent frankness and without ob-vious embarrassment. He was, in fact, an unusually good witness, answering all the questions put to him carefully, and without pre-varication or evasion.

he said that he had had sexual relations with a large number of women before his first marriage. and with others, both dur-ing it, and after it was dissolved in 1962 He also

described his sexual devia-tions. From a comparatively early age he had experi-enced a desire to dress up in female clothes. In the early stages of his mar-riage he had done so in his wife's presence on a few occasions. Subsequently he had dressed as a woman four or five times a year, keeping it from his wife, but the urge continued. With considerable insight he said: I didn't like what i saw. You want the fan-tasy to appear right. It utterly failed to appear right in my eyes. These remarks were highly rele-vant to the .understanding. of the human aspects of this unusual case. In this world he became familiar with its ramifications and its per-sonalities, among whom he heard of Toni/April. as a female impersonator at the Carousel, which he de-scribed as the Mecca f every female impersona-tor"



VENTUALLY, through an Ameri-can transvestite known as "Louise," he got in touch with

her and they met for the first time on Nov 19, 1960, at his invitation for lunch at the Caprice Restaurant. original motive in seeking an introduction to her was essentially transvestite in character, but quite soon he developed for her the interest of a man for a woman woman.

He said she looked like / a woman, dressed like a woman and acted like a woman. He disclosed his true identity to show that his feelings had become those of a full man in love with a girl, not those of a transvestite in love with a transsexual. On the other hand, it was common ground that

later, there was no sexual activity in a physical sense between them at all At the most, their rela-tionship went no further than kissing and some very mild petting At no time did she permit him to handle her naked breasts or any other part of her body His letters to her showed a similar emotional situa-tion, affectionate, vet quite passionless, with continual emphasis on marriage and the pleasure which Mr Corbett felt in thinking of Miss Ashley as the future Lady Rowallan.
