

Malcolm Michaels, 46

Malcoim Michaels, a legendary Christopher Street transvestite who called himself Marsha P. Johnson, was found dead floating in the Hudson River on Monday, and was believed to have drowned accidentally a few days earlier, friends said vesterday.

Michaela, 46 - who preferred both the name Marsha and the use of the feminine pronoun "she" - led a roller coaster ride through three decades of Pride Day two years ago with a ride in the limougay liberation. He participated in the Stonewall sine that leads the annual parade. Michaels wore a Rebellion of 1969, worked as a model for Andy suit and tie. Warhol's "Drag Queens" series, and spent most of his life as a prostitute and panhartier on Christopher Street.

At the core of a life that could redefine the word "turbulent," a longtime friend, Richard Skinner, found a "wonderful, warm and coen person" who

befriended an astonishing variety of people. In the 1970s, Michaels was occasionally at odds with the mainstream gay liberation organizations, which did not necessarily accept his image as "a frumpy housefrau one day, all gisttery and in heeis the next."
