CHICAGO - A family with three boys who dress and live as sisters was described today as the nation's first case of triple transexualism.

The report further confuses the roles of environment and heredity in a problem that finds individuals with a body of one sex and the mind of the opposite.

A group of investigators from the Hall Psychiatric Institute at Columbia S.C., said transexuality ually said transexuality tally occurs in only one son, the youngest.

The oldest of the three, Murray/Mary, 26, began showing interest in feminine clothing as a small' child. With the aid of hormone therapy, she passes success-fully as a woman, "dates men, likes to be petted and cuddled but avoids sexual intimacy," wrote Dr.Robert

F. Sabalis in the American 'hermaphrodite'," Psychiatric Association said. Journal

Manhattan's mania for funky nostalgia

HAVE you heard about the drag race Û

Female impersonators have become Female impersonators have become the rage. The staid old Plaza Hotel has installed a drag revue, "Manhattan Fol-lies," in the Persian Room. Another drag show, "French Dressing," is doing land-office business at Shepheard's in the Drake Hotel on Park Avenue. Yet anoth-er, "Zou," is the Blue Angel's current attraction attraction

These fashionable night spots are running neck to neck in impressions of Judy Garland, Marlene Dietrich and Carol/Channing. Even the inimitable Bette Midler has her imitator.

The trend in funky nostalgia is, of course, a keynote of the seventies and New Yorkers can't get enough of it, as if drag were a natural way of life.

The theater, too, has its transvestite hit, "Camille," which everyone told me not to miss when I was back East recently.

It is indeed one of the best and

only because he looks a bit like William Bendix and is the only hairy-chested Marguerite I've seen.

Nevertheless, Ludlam gets right into the role and stays with it. He's obviously studied the old MGM movie of "Camille" and patterned his performances after Greta Garbo's, giving it the same huskyvoiced, bare-shouldered, long-necked intensity

Ludlam is almost credible, since he's a very skillful performer with a splendid gift for mimicry. He somehow makes us forget the ridiculous aspect of his portrayal, which surfaces in hilarious asides to the audience, like Marguerite's comment that she could never go back to the "cucarachas and ratones" of her impov-erished girlhood after the luxuries of a courtesan's life.

An extremely clever comic, Ludlam never misses a trick, yet he's never out of character. And he's directed the play with a lot of sincerity, considering how nuch he's kidding it.

While the mid-19th century French period is preserved in the settings and costumes, Ludlam's adaptation is very free and shot through with anachronistic humor, some of it quite coarse, but much of it slyly funny.

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funniest shows in town, though it's performed on a stage the size of a goldfish bowl at the tiny Evergreen Theater in Greenwich Village.

The production is by the Theater of the Ridiculous, a much-acclaimed and prolific company, which has achieved status and respectability through grants from the New York State Arts Council and the National Endowment to the Arts.

They work independently and gener-ally do original shows with titles like, "Turds in Hell," "Whores of Babylon." "Eunuchs of the Forbidden City" and "Hot Ice.

Needless to say, they specialize in hip satire and, more to the point, low-comedy camp, which is the basis of their "tear-jerker" version of Alexandre Dumas' play, "Lady of the Camellias."

Since Dumas' old chestnut is ripe for camping, the Ridiculous troupe has a field day with "Camille" adapted and directed by Charles Ludiam, who also plays the lead role of Marguerite Gautier.

His portrayal is extraordinary, if

Not all the female roles are played in drag. Lola Pashalinski makes Prudence, Marguerite's fair-weather friend, a di marvelously bitchy harpy.

But Marguerite's faithful servant, Nanine, is drolly caricatured by Jack Mallory who looks like a drag Marjorie Main.

The leading man is Bill Vehr, whose Armand Duval is effectively straight-faced. The company, which has been together since 1967, has a distinct ensem-ble style, sort of Mad Magazine out of the old time melodrama old-time melodrama.

Ludlam, who's one of the troupe's founders, doesn't ordinarily take drag roles. His "Camille" is remarkable and shows real genius.

I don't know any other actor with his range for farced-up tragedy. Even Mar-guerite's death scene is a howl.
