Dear Friends:

It is hard to believe that 27 years have passed since the Stonewall uprising occurred. I was then a Congressman, and Mayor John Lindsay presided at City Hall.

In those days, as you undoubtedly recall, gay bars were more likely to be private clubs because of the harassment that existed at public bars frequented by gay men and lesbians. The Stonewall incident was unique in that it involved an unwarranted police assault directed at the gay community. In this case, a private club was invaded by police officers bent on embarrassing the patrons. It was not enough to harass gays and lesbians in public bars: Those in positions of authority at the police department decided that they would harass gays in private clubs as well.

Instead of submitting, those in attendance that night fought back and taught not only the cops, but the entire City of New York, a lesson in courage. You stood up and defended your rights and the rights of others of similar persuasion. From that moment on, this city saw a change in what the gay community, and fair-minded heterosexual men and women as well, would tolerate.

They banded together and caused major changes in the Lindsay administration in its attitude toward the gay community. No longer would the police be permitted to entrap gays and then prosecute them in criminal court for alleged sexual solicitation.

When I became mayor in 1978, I issued an executive order within 30 days of my inauguration which prohibited discrimination by city government against individuals based on their sexual orientation in employment and housing. I also began the long and difficult task of persuading the City Council to enact legislation which would prohibit the private sector from engaging in discrimination based on sexual orientation in employment, housing and places of public accommodation.

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This year marks the tenth anniversary of that legislation which I signed into law in 1986. While I'm proud of the contributions that I made toward ending discrimination based on sexual orientation, nothing can compare with the courage demonstrated at the Stonewall bar 27 years ago when the persecuted said they would not run and defended their rights to peacefully assemble. The city and its 7.5 million residents are in your debt.



The "Songs of The STONEWALL", created, prepared and styled by the renowned Vet, Williamson Henderson, and published by the Imperial Queens & Kings of New York, Long Island & New Jersey, have been catalystic gems yet a mostly over-looked Gay history subject ---until now! These STONEWALL Era songs of the Gay Community are a historical, social and cultural---besides musical---factor. There was even a (non-recorded) "STONEWALL Girls" song with "We Are What We Are" type lyrics and Rockettes-type choreography.

Rock 'n' Roll had ELVIS, THE BEATLES, THE STONES, JANIS JOPLIN and JIMI HENDRIX. By the way, only one of those five fit in with the Gays---surprise, ELVIS! The Black Civil Rights Movement had the verbal "sounds" of MLK, Jr., Malcom X., Et Al. The Gay Revolution had the "sugar 'n' spice" of MARTHA REEVES & THE VANDELLAS ("We've Got Honey Love"); the determination and pride of SHIRLEY BASSEY's belter anthem, "This Is My Life"; the Gay comradery of THE FRIENDS OF DISTINCTION ("Grazin' In The Grass") and the classic, upbeat romanticism of CHRIS (androgenous) MONTEZ ("Time After Time").

The Gay Rights explosion (a "Chain Reaction") also had the fun 'n' dance yet thoughtful, provoking and inspiring sounds of DIANA ROSS (every Queen's idol & most King's ideal) & THE SUPREMES w/ their "(You Better Make Way For) The Young Folks", a national flipside favorite and youth anthem which popularized by first being played in the Gay clubs. BARBRA STREISAND, fresh from winning an upset "Oscar" in March 1969 for the prior year's Gay favorite, "Funny Girl", followed up with "Hello Dolly" songs being previewed in 1969 and the radio promotional record of "Before The Parade Passes By". An instant anthem (even more symbolic each year since) for Gay People. Of course, THE STONEWALL jukebox had it. Ironically, 25 years later, BARBRA performed in Manhattan during "STONEWALL 25" anniversary week. Indeed, she paid homage to "STONEWALL" and sang "He Touched Me".

Incredible, multi-gender and multi-racial SLY & THE FAMILY STONE---always hot in the Gay clubs (ask his protege, PRINCE)---was perhaps the most all-encompassing, unifying, gritty and barrier-breaking maestros with their Gay-oriented "stand-up/fight back" anthem, "Stand!". With a pounding dance beat and timeless "act-up" lyrics like, "Stand, in the end you'll still be you, one who's done all the things you've set out to do" and "There's a midget standing tall and the giant beside him about to fall", how could a Gay Revolution not have occurred in 1969?! A quarter of a century later, "Stand!" is still a "Gay Power" rally. Ask "Act-Up"!

Astrologically-speaking, <u>THE STONEWALL</u> Era was in the heat of "The Age of Aquarius"—whether you were into The Zodiacs or not. "Hair" was the #1 Broadway show. The Fifth Dimension's medley record of "Aquarius" and "Let The Sunshine In" was from "Hair" and it was very #1—everywhere around The World. Oliver (the singer), fruity British import and obviously Gay, made it to "numero uno" with his "Good Morning Starshine". Supremely speaking, DIANA ROSS & THE (super duper) SUPREMES appropriately had the #1 song at THE STONEWALL when it was raided on Friday nite, June 27, 1969. The song was about astrological signs (all are chanted in the background). The song was gayly interpreted as very "boy-lookin'-for-boy/boy-gettin'-boy" aggressive as Ms. ROSS declared "No Matter What Sign You Are (You're Gonna Be Mine, You Are)". To say the least—along with its groovy, bump 'n' grind beat—it provided meet-someone-new confidence to even the shyest Gay guy—or gall

Reflecting upon and reviewing the "Songs of THE STONEWALL" and recognizing that these songs were played there---and at most Gay clubs throughout the nation---constantly and with the emphasizing ingredients of dancing and singing to them, the message of the music was a powerful catalyst for change. Even the titles were self-explanatory: individualistic "It's Your Thing (Do What You Want To Do); romantically promising "(I Love You) More Today Than Yesterday (But Not As Much As Tomorrow)"; economic reality advisory "Don't Let The Joneses Get You Down"; social peace advisory "Put A Little Love In Your Heart"; psychological strength advisory "Only The Strong Survive"; political change advisory "Crystal Blue Persuasion"; even a religious spiritual, "Oh, Happy Day", and, of course, Ol' Blue Eyes' be proud/ be different/be yourself inspiration, "My Way", the eternal anthem.

Unfortunately, there are no real Gay-oriented songs in the 1990's. Worse yet, Gay People (and their non-Gay counterparts) basically do not even ask each other to dance anymore. Fortunately, there are the timeless "Songs of The STONEWALL", which do and must live, sing and dance on (and on and on)......"Imperially Yours",
