



Ted Larson's Pantomaniacs '71 Revue, a new type of show full of comedy, music and dancing. The entire show is a production of the art of pantomine at its finest, featuring beautiful impersonations of top performers, past and present.

Ted has appeared extensively throughout the eastern and mid-western United States, performing in cities such as Chicago, Philadelphia, Boston, and New York, Working in the road company of "Hello Dolly" and with the Theater-in-the-Round, in addition to several off-Broadway productions.

He has also performed in George Bernard Shaw's "Dark Lady of the Sonnets," in which he portrayed William Shakespeare, and has toured with several night club revues including the nationally renowned "Funtastics" and the revue that rocked the famous Living Room in Boston, "The Hilarity of HirFi."

He was producer and director of the revue "Fabulous Fakes," still being heldover at the Forest in Philadelphia for its third successful year.

From the original cast of nine, Ted chose Jesse DeVille, Emore Dubois, and Bryan Andrews to accompany him on a national tour.

Jesse, prior to joining the Pantomaniacs, appeared in several Gold Coast hotels and night clubs, performing as a singer, dancer, and comedian extrordinaire. He is best known for his fabulous impersonations of the great Babra Streisand, Julie Andrews, Carol Channing, and Marlene





Dietrich, all of which he masters to perfection.

Emore Dubois has worked as a top professional model, appearing in fashion magazines all over the U.S. including Playboy, (not, unfortunately, as the center fold). He has been given many awards and titles for his very talented impersonations. He has also made several guest appearances in leading motion pictures and is currently under contract with Paramount Pictures to appear in "The Fame Game," from Rona Jaffee's bestselling novel.

Bryan Andrews appeared in several hotels and night clubs all over South Florida performing modern dances to delight weary eyes. Ted Larson saw him, was impressed, and asked him to come in with the Pantomaniacs. He did and has

been a vital part of the show ever since.

Ted then brought the Pantomanias to South Florida and they have delighted and enchanted crowds from Miami Beach to Pompano Beach, appearing in renowned hotels and night clubs such as the Dunes Hotel, The Shelbourne Hotel, Roney Plaza, Burleigh House, the Jade Winds, Surfside, and the Red Carpet Supper Club until they came to South Florida



The Pantomaniacs also perform at many benefits and charity fund-raising projects such as the American Cancer Society and The United Fund.

After this South Florida tour, the Pantomaniacs are scheduled to go to the New England Area,-mostly Boston and Cape Cod,-for the summer months, and then to return to South Florida next winter.
