Welcome...

...to what many of us hope will become a recurring event where both members of the transgender community and members of the professional care-giver community can exchange ideas and information.

The first International Congress was held February 22 - 26, 1995 at the Airtel Hotel in Van Nuys, California. It was the brain-child of **Drs. Vern Bullough**, **Bonnie Bullough** and **James** Elias at the Center for Sex Research at the California State University, Northridge. The event was planned to be a one-time activity. However, for many of us who attended that historic first, there were too many good things, too many fruitful dialogues, too many new understandings to just let it be the only time it would happen.

After speaking with several of my peers and receiving encouragement, I came home to suburban Philadelphia and with the support of **Dr. William (Bill) Stayton** and the members of the **Renaissance Education Association**, **Inc.**, we announced the **Second International Congress on Sex & Gender Issues** with the blessing of the organizers of the first congress.

I believe we've developed a program that will educate and inform on many differnt levels. Our goal is to explore sex and gender in all their facets; clinically, socially, medically, and psychologically. We have some very serious clinical programs and we have some lighter fare that will interest just about everyone for balance. We also expect to generate some controversy and healthy argument.

One of the highlights of this Second Congress is the Magnus Hirschfeld Exhibit, 75 Years of the Institute for Sexual Science, produced by The Magnus-Hirschfeld-Gesellschaft e.V. This exhibit contains unpublished documents, photographs and texts of Magnus Hirschfeld, the sex researcher who coined the words "transvestite" in 1910 and "transsexual" in 1912. The exhibit is composed of 65 panels in several sections telling of Hirschfeld's theories of sexuality and the effect these theories had on pre-WWII society.

I'd like to thank several people for bringing this event to reality. First is my event co-chair, Dr. Bill Stayton who provided encouragement, support, and guidance throughout the process. Second are the Program Co-chairs, Sheila Kirk, M.D., and Vern Bullough, R.N., Ph.D. They did an excellent job in designing the program and Dr. Kirk deserves additional thanks for getting us Dr. Gooren's team from the Netherlands. Next, I want to thank the Renaissance team of volunteers working the event, most notably Angela Gardner, Jessica Brandon, and Christie Hutchins. I'm especially grateful to Claudia Wrede in Germany for bringing the Hirschfeld exhibit to my attention, to the partners of 3-D Communications, Inc., for providing the seed money, and to Patty Klein, M.S., for making sure it got here to Philadelphia. Additional thanks go to Melissa Foster, Karen Adler, PPOC, and IFGE for getting the display into the country.

Counseling in Genderland: Workshop Part 1 Niela Miller, M.S., LCSW, LMHC-Acton, Mass.

The focus of this workshop is on the counselor's experience and self-exploration as well as on gaining some understanding about working with gender-exploring clients from a humanistic perspective. We look at the development of our own gender identity, prejudices and beliefs about gender, ability to shift from a medical model ("You are sick; I am here to make you well") to an educational model ("We are here to learn and to discover how you can have a happy and productive life based on well-informed choices") based on the client's goals for the future and on his or her strengths. We also explore the larger community and social context and the many resources currently available. We introduce some methods and materials from the arts and humanistic psychology for working with gender identity explorers.

A full range of primary care, medical, mental health and surgical services are provided.

The main components of the NWGI are: Body Habitus, Vulva, Urethra, Vagina, Ano-Rectal, and Prostate. A higher index is related to a better physical gynecological outcome.

Working With Patterns Of Diversity Within The Transgender Community Sandra L. Samons, D.C.S.W., University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, Mich.

This presentation will set forth observations of transgender issues with regard to level of functioning, presenting problems, recurring patterns of defenses and of adaptation as observed by a mental health clinician with extensive experience working with people who have transgender issues. This will all be done in an attempt to illuminate what is and is not characteristic of this population and with recognition that this is a representative sample of the transgender population who presents for treatment rather than of the population as a whole. Still, this may be sufficiently characteristic of that portion of the population to be useful from a clinical prospective. This sample includes clients who identify themselves across the spectrum of transgender identity and therefore does not narrowly address a single segment of that population and does not separate out subgroups.

Side Effects of Cross-Sex Hormone Treatment

On the basis of 20 year experience with cross-sex hormone treatment in 1500 transsexuals we have reviewed our clinical files with the purpose to describe side effects. In general the side effects are minor but vary with hormonal regimens. The most significant side effect in male-to-female transsexuals is venous thrombosis and pulmonary embolism In female-to-male transsexuals no serious side effects of androgen treatment have been found. Androgens induce in them, however, a shift to the male cardiovascular risk profile.

The Second Opinion-Challenges & Opportunities

Given the significance of gender issues in a patient's life and the irreversible consequences of gender-reassignment procedures, the second opinion serves as an important safeguard to help insure that treatment decisions are arrived at through a thorough, reasoned decision-making process. In addition to serving as a safeguard against a possible error in clinical judgment, the second opinion evaluation can serve as a valuable intervention during the patient's ongoing process of discernment. Although often perceived as a potential barrier to a desired goal, the clinician providing the second opinion has a unique opportunity to validate the patient's gender experience, reinforce work done in individual therapy, and highlight areas for further personal growth.

Plenary Session: Professor. Louis Gooren, Amsterdam, Netherlands — New Insights in the Origins of Transsexualism

Transsexualism is a mysterious phenomenon. In biomedical terms it is best conceptualized as a variation in the normal sexual differentiation process, the process of becoming man or woman. From the beginning of this century it has become clear that the sexual differentiation process is not completed with the formation of the external genitalia but that also the brain undergoes a sexual differentiation process into male or female so that future sexual behavior matches the other characteristics of sex. Transsexualism is probably a crossing over to the developmental track of the other sex, so that brain sex does not correspond anymore to the other criteria of sex. Such a crossing over to the track of the opposite sex occurs also in the earlier steps of the process of sexual differentiation, for instance in the androgen insensitivity syndrome and the congenital virilizing adrenal hyperplasia syndrome and several others. This theory is corroborated by recent findings that the bed nucleus of the stria terminalis in the huam hypothalamus has a female size in male-to-female transsexuals.

The likelihood of a post-operative transsexual woman being orgasmic has historically been about 50%, or lower. Certain surgical technics seem to improve these odds significantly, but better studies are needed to enable surgeons and patients to make informed choices. Turning to reproductive issues, sperm banking prior to hormone therapy is an inexpensive means of presenting future reproductive options for transsexual women (MtF). For transsexual men (FtM), the options are more limited and more expensive; but emerging technologies may soon provide additional choices. Consideration of reproductive options should be part of the Standards of Care for transsexual persons.



The Hirschfeld Exhibit

Das erste Institut fuer Sexualwissenschaft (The first Institute for Sexual Science)

In 1919 the German sexologist and sexual-reformer Magnus Hirschfeld (1868-1935) fulfilled his wish. He opened the world's first "Institute for Sexual Science" on July 6, 1919 in Berlin-Tiergarten. The political context of the Institute was the general reform movements at that time and the liberal political climate in the Weimarer Republik.

The scientific framework was biomedical research into human sexuality. Soon after its opening, the Institute became a gathering place for scientists, German and foreign politicians, and for the Berlin public as an advising and practicing institution.

People who suffered for physical and psychological disturbances could finally get medical help. The so-called "Sexual Transitions," i.e., homosexuals, transvestites (a term, which he coined) and hermaphrodites, got support and were able to manage their lives.

About 40 people worked at the Institute in various fields: research, sexual counseling, sexual enlightenment of the population, and medical treatment of sexual transmitted diseases. The Scientific-Humanitarian-Committee — the first homosexual organization — and the World League for Sexual Reform all had their offices at the Institute.

World War II Brings Trouble

From the beginning Hirschfeld and the Institute were denounced as Jewish, social democratic and immoral. In 1933, the Institute was raided by the Nazis. Hirschfeld watched in a Parisian cinema the burning of his books at the Berlin-Opernplatz.

Hirschfeld unsuccessfully tried to reestablish the Institute in 1935. He died shortly thereafter on May 14, 1935 at the age of 67. The original Institute buildings were bombed during the war in 1943. Since then grass grows where the Institute stood.

Down But Not Out

The Nazis failed to erase Hirschfeld's contributions to sexual science with the burning of his books. His scientific methods have had a peculiarly lasting influence on American sexology. Some of his collaborators at the Institute, such as Walter Grossmann and Arthur Weil, pursued their work in the United States. Hirschfeld visited the U.S. in 1892 and again in 1931 where he influenced American researchers.

Harry Benjamin, a friend and colleague of Magnus Hirschfeld, went on with his work on transsexuality in New York. This area of research had only been resumed in Germany in the 1960s because of this "detour" in sexual science.

Pioneering sexual scientists like Alfred Kinsey use the questionnaire technique developed by Hirschfeld, between 1899 and 1925, for his research about the sexual behavior of American women and men. Moreover sexual biologists today in the U.S. uncritically refer to Hirschfeld's tradition, which will be one point of the American version of the exhibit.

The Exhibit

The Magnus-Hirschfeld-Gesellschaft e.V. produced the exhibit "75 Years of Sexual Science." It shows unpublished documents, photographs and

texts from the Institute for Sexual Science. The exhibit consists of 65 panels (100 cm x 70 cm) and is structured in five sections.

The House

The House illustrates the architecture and history of the Institute building, its location in Berlin-Tiergarten, the structure of rooms and their use.

People

This shows coworkers of Hirschfeld, guests, visitors and tenants.

Theory & Practice

This is the most comprehensive section. It provides a summary of the important works and the theoretical orientation of the coworkers. Its core is Hirschfeld's "Sexual Transition-Theory" and its effects on forensic, enlightenment and counseling.

Sexual Reform

This section shows the politicization of Hirschfeld's theory in order to cancel the statutes "175 RStGB" (punishment of homosexual acts) and "218 RStGB" (punishment of illegal abortion).

Destruction & Exile

The last section shows the rising denunciation of Hirsch-feld from 1919 till 1933, including the vandalization the Institute and the burning of Hirschfeld's books in 1933 at the Berlin-Opernplatz. Hirschfeld's exile in France is illustrated by pictures and texts of his diary.
