On June 27, 1969, the single most defining moment in the history of the gay and lesbian civil rights movement occurred at the Stonewall Inn from the concept that gay men and lesbians could attain full recognition and participation in all aspects of our society.

This concept was based on the fundamental principle that an individual can be a part of this country, and contribute to its richness, diversity, wealth and growth regardless of their race, color, creed, national origin, religion, or sexual orientation.

In the twenty-five years since the Stonewall rebellion, New York State has demonstrated progressive leadership in: establishing the first, ongoing, statewide office of lesbian and gay concerns, the appointment of open lesbians and gay men to instrumental policy making positions within New York State's government, a comprehensive and compassionate response to the AIDS epidemic, and the support of service organizations that reflect the true spirit of the lesbian and gay community. But there is still much to be done. Discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation still exists, violence against lesbians and gay men still exists, AIDS and the discrimination that it engenders still exists.

This month the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Stonewall rebellion is commemorated in New York State with a tribute to the past in honor of the brave men and women who fought against prejudice, hatred and violence at the Stonewall Inn; an acknowledgement of the present with a rally and a march on the United Nations to affirm the human rights of lesbians and gay men in the United States and throughout the world; and with a spirit of commitment to a future of full participation and recognition of lesbians and gay men in all aspects of our society.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Mario M. Cuomo, Governor of the state of New York, do hereby recognize June, 1994 as

NEW YORK'S HOMETOWN NEWSPAPER

T WAS EARLY, NOT EVEN MIDNIGHT, so "Little Orphan Annie" and "Hormona" and "Sissy" and "Twinkie" and "Cross-eyed Cyn-Kia" meandered about, waiting to gussy up, when they saw six cops pass through the door of 53 Christopher St.

"Stonewall" happened next.

Into the wee hours that first weekend of summer on Sheridan Square, hundreds of gays raged against a wall of blue. Their call

became Gay Power.

Out of the rubble of the Stonewall Inn, a riot-gutted gay Village tavern across from the park on a pleasantly warm Friday, June 27, 1969, the foundation for a new civil rights movement suddenly fortified.

Theirs was an inadvertent glory. They were random idlers, young, handene drag queens, many underage, joining forces with men and some women, young and old.

"None of us shaved and showered to go to an uprising," said Bob Kohler. 68, who was walking his schnauzer, Mr. Magoo, that night.

Some wore blouses and makeup. Others were in madras and loafers, coats and ties.

Some had come over from Wall Street. Others arrived from the Frank E. Campbell Funeral Home dressed in black and emerald slippers, where Judy Garland had laid in state.

Some were outside for a summer stroll. Two hundred others had dropped by for "Aquarius" on the jukebox, a drink and a dance, a \$3 cover, a quarter for two songs.

MIDNIGHT BUST

A little past midnight, the 6th Precinct launched an ordinary evening's ordinary bust, a liquor-license beef.

"It was a big joke because bar raids were common. said Kohler. "You thought, here we go again. ... Nobody blinked an eye."

This night, somebody did. Williamson Henderson, a popular teen local - Allyson Allante when dressed in drag - whose blue Caddy parked out front was legend, was one of the first the cops arrested. breaking his collarbone.

A bottle was thrown and a brick hurled and the park boys, buoyed by growing le-, gions of gays and nongays. pelted cops with coins, and a trash can was set ablaze.

" 'You better run, Lilly Law! 'Girls in blue, we're gonna get you!' the boys started yelling," said Kohler.

The cops escaped past the black-painted Stonewall windows and barricaded themselves inside, against shattering glass and a battering-ram parking meter.

Around them, on the narrow Sheridan Square streets. spur-of-the-moment rebels battled the suddenly appearing Tactical Patrol Force formed in the wake of Vietnam War protests - with everything from bricks to lighter fluid and matches and a high-kicking chorus line.

They raged three nights. two others quelled by rain.


'Gay Power" - organized had come to Mayor John Lindsay's town.

'GAYEST' WEEK IN HISTORY

Today an Indian clothing boutique shares the building with Stonewall, the bar. Next Sunday, as 1 million 25th anniversary celebrators link arms in "the gayest week in' the history of the world," said Henderson, Stonewall will be filled with photographs of what happened then.

The memories of the witnesses are varied.

Did Sylvia Rivera, beloved drag queen, throw the first brick or didn't she? Did her friend, Marcia P. (Pay-it-nomind) Johnson, who guarded Henderson's Caddy, \$3 a night, make it every night to

fight, or didn't she?

Whoever did what, when, there is a common bottom line. As heirs to the struggles over Vietnam and black civil rights, Stonewall combatants walked all walks - "regular, gay people and young drag queens, transvestites and people not even gay," said Henderson.

"This could not have happened in 1959," said history professor Martin Duberman, whose book "Stonewall" is the acknowledged chronicle of those nights.

'NOTHING TO LOSE'

"They were people who had nothing to lose, the runaways, the outcasts, the transvestites, the drag queens," said Jay Blotcher, former media coordinator for ACT UP and Queer Nation. "They were the ones who took it on the chin, defiantly."

"These kids were the real Stonewall warriors," said Kohler. "They were the first to throw things, to taunt. If they had not been across the street, there would be no Stonewall riot.'

25 years ago, on the first weekend of summer at Sheridan Square, hundreds of gays raged. Gay Power was born.

The Daily News returns to 53 Christopher St. that night. the account based on Kohler and other witnesses who had, by happenchance, converged there:

Henderson/Allante, who doesn't give an age — today a personnel agency owner and officer in the Imperial Queens of New York, founded in Stonewall's wake — had dropped by for a nightcap.

Jeremiah Newton, 45, now a film industry liaison to the NYU film department, had run into friends from Judy Garland's funeral that day. He needed to lift his spirits.

Mama Jean, today 62, a Connecticut state employe. then in Cookie's, a lesbian bar on 14th St., walked with three friends toward Pan-Pan's, 8th St., to dine on bacon and eggs.

Howard Cruse, a cartoonist now 50, high on acid, uptown, then, grabbed a taxi downtown.

"Stonewall was one of the very few places the run-of-the mill gay man could go to dance, which was totally illegal," recalled Kohler, who owns a clothing store on Christopher St. "It even had go-go boys dancing on the bar."

"For a young person who wanted to dance into the night," said Newton, "it was the most wonderful place."

Until June 27, 1969, they did.

PTRE SUPREMES DIANA ROSS WAS CROONING

One a.m. Diana Ross on the jukebox. Henderson — "I was there as a boy that night" — danced

A panicked staffer on raidwatch suddenly flooded the colored dance-floor lights with whites and pulled the jukebox plug. The warnings weren't in time.

"The cops came charging in," said <u>Henderson</u>, arrested for disorderly conduct, resisting arrest and loitering. "They put us in lines, checked I.D.s, which most people didn't have. They started taking people out. Things got nasty."

At Greenwich Ave., Newton heard sirens and saw red bubble lights eerily washing over taunts, cries and shattering glass.

"I looked up at the Women's House of Detention to people screaming out the windows, sticking pieces of flaming toilet tissue out the mesh, alerting us," he said. "The flames falling to the ground reminded me of a modern Pompeii."

A rookie guarded the Stonewall door. "A bottle went flying in a perfect arc, showering him with splinters," said Newton,

Two doors west, said Duberman, the Lion's Head Inn locked up. Apartment doormen barricaded doors with broom handles.

"The cops were in total, absolute panic," said Kohler.

"They retreated into the Stonewall and barricaded themselves"

They somehow commandeered a fire hose. "They opened the door to hose us," said Kohler. "But this being New York, nobody had bothered to check the hydrant. Only a trickle flowed."

Then came the Tactical Patrol Force, and the tension turned from the bar back to the streets. "These cops came out of two buses like robots and lined up in the streets, arms folded across chests," said Kohler.

Newton thought how the hot, muggy air could do no good when he heard more breaking glass and saw cops placing 28 case of beer and 19 liquor bottles into a van.


A young guy asked: "What's going on? I'm straight. I got no place here. I'm going home," said Kohler, who saw him minutes later "being dragged through the streets, covered in blood."

Most of those who saw the light that night have vanished. Marsha P. Johnson's body was found in the Hudson River. Sylvia Rivera moved away. The park boys are departed, many of them dead. Many are lost to AIDS.

Cruse, who grew up in Birmingham, Ala., is writing a novel about the times of civil rights and being gay and Southern, then.

Henderson still drives his Caddy to Stonewall: "I'm always going in there expecting to see someone from a quarter-century ago."

Mama Jean and Kohler went on to be activists: she the grand marshal of the first gay pride march in June 1970, he founding member of the Gay Liberation Front that

Queen Allyson, you are that wonderfully unique person who has a respected history in the community and exemplifies identity and pride in one's being. Long Live the Queen!




