Esprit de Corps: Pacific Northwest Groups to Host Late May Gender Gala By Elizabeth Walters

 \mathcal{F} or those who think of the Pacific Northwest as a gloomy and foreboding place, where rain is omnipresent and a sunny day causes folks to die like flies, here's some news: to those of us who have visited the area, Oregon, Washington and British Columbia are among the most appealing spots in the world, blessed with wonderful, friendly people and some of the most astonishing physical beauty one is likely to experience.

If you are thinking about making a trip to that part of the world, later this month might be a good time to go: three major Northwest gender groups are combining resources to host a "coming out party" for transgendered men and women in Port Angeles, Washington May 20-24, and it promises to be a marvelous affair.

The gala is called "Esprit 98," and promises "five funfilled days of parties, dinners, classes, special events and lots of fun." It will be held at the Doubletree/Bayshore Inn in Port Angeles, a full-service hotel located on the city's waterfront, a well-known tourist Mecca.

Among other things, organizers have promised special classes on a variety of subjects of special interest to transgendered people, including sessions on make-up and creating a feminine identity. They are also planning special outings to shop at local stores and dine at local restaurants, a "Big Sister" mentoring program for newbies, a wide variety of vendors who cater to those with specialized gender identity needs and — perhaps best of all — a guided trip to lovely Victoria, British Columbia, for tea and garden viewing.

Sandra Reaches Out By Sandra Brewer

By the time you read this you should have received your ballot to vote for our ETVC officers for the coming year. Also on the ballot is a proposed new set of bylaws that strive to preserve the spirit of ETVC while addressing concerns that have expanded since its origin sixteen years ago. Finally, you need to return your ballot to express your preference for the name of our organization in the future; and to make sure we have a future, it would help if you send your membership renewal for another year along with your ballot.

Let me know if you want to join us on TV at KQED in June; I'll send announcement of time, date, and procedure before the event. If you are or want to be an outreach speaker, plan to come to our ETVC Outreach Speakers Workshop planned later in the summer. For the second time in seven years, my area code has changed; it seems they've added the previous ones (415+510) to get the new one. Call me at (925)

Our speaker activity has slowed somewhat, but we've recently spoken to the Castro Lions Club and the San Francisco chapter of PFLAG in addition to a number of presentations at local colleges. Some instructors satisfied with previous speakers call the speakers directly. If you are requested to speak to a class and you want ETVC to be recognized, and possibly receive an honorarium, let me know. I'll give you a description on our speakers bureau to give to the instructor. This also gives them our non-profit tax id number, and encourages them to request an honorarium from their department.

The ETVC web site is at www.transgender.org/tg/etvc. You already know about www.tgforum.com. Look too at www.ifge.org; this has an especially good list and description of several publications, videos, and movies on transgendered subjects. Recent media attention to transgendered topics includes an episode of Boy Meets World which has a boy dressing as a 'babe' to see first hand if women are treated badly by men; he finds out they are. An episode of Nash Bridges filmed in San Francisco features a drag beauty contest complete with a 'freak-out' scene reminiscent of the Crying Game. Finally, a scene in Cybill has the red-haired daughter dressed as a blonde Barbie for a performance; this prompts the comment, "Zoey, you're already a girl; you don't have to dress like a drag queen."

In the April Channel, three paragraphs were omitted from my article SRS Examined Closely describing Dr Schrang's presentation in February. Since these formed an important part of the description of the event, I am repeating them below.

Dr Schrang speculated that flexible dilators that adapt to the curved shape of the neo-vagina better than the usual straight rigid plastic variety could be found at an adult novelty shop. Frequent dilation is needed as long as inflammation and healing activity are present.

At one point, Dr Schrang's presentation was interrupted by an activist in the crowd who seized an opportunity to protest the requirement of therapists' recommendations for the surgery, as well as the absence of programs to subsidize the surgery in this country. Ironically, such programs exist in Great Britain and some other countries, but they are rigidly controlled by the recommendations of therapists.

Dr Schrang follows the Harry Benjamin standards, but he doesn't feel they are carved in stone. His fees are comparable to other surgeons performing the same services in this country. Though this includes only a small handful of doctors, any trend for young doctors to learn the techniques of reassignment surgery has yet to be observed.

Executive Committee Minutes



The monthly meeting of ETVC's Executive Committee was on March 8, 1998.

Madam President called meeting to order at 3:00 p.m.

Communications and Announcements: Kim Stuart has asked about books and/or money due her. The Ducal Court is taking place on Saturday, April 11. Joan Goodnight will be in town to discuss California Dreamin' on April 4. There is a Fund-raiser for the SF Community Center Project. The Sacramento Gender Association will have a show on March 28.

Minutes: Erin noted that in February's minutes, Veronica wrote "individual and singular memberships" when she obviously meant "individual and *family* memberships." With that correction, Leslie moved February's Minutes be approved, Evette seconded and they were unanimously approved.

President's Report: Storage locker fees were overdue. It was decided to empty the locker and store the stuff elsewhere. Nancy Ann must move out of her house by the end of the month and needs to get rid of a lot of old club documents.

Vice President's Report: After looking at the Cotillion financials, it looks as if the club lost around \$2,500.

Secretary Veronica: Membership is 324 of which 80 are new. The newsletter was then discussed. Nancy was disappointed with the photos; she believed the photos were important for the many members

In San Francisco, Call (415) 931-0478 who only read the newsletter and never come to socials. Jamie suggested different software. Sandra thought that perhaps the club should go back to the old schedule of a newsletter every two months. Leslie and Veronica wanted people to be patient and let Elizabeth get used to the new system.

Treasurer: Leslie passed out an account of ETVC's finances. They were lousy. There is no money in the bank and ETVC will need another \$2,000 before the end of the present fiscal year. There are April, May and June newsletters to put out and the ballots, envelopes, officers' statements, bylaws need to be copied and mailed by mid-April. Awards need to be bought and printed for awards/election night. It doesn't look as if there will be a Really Big Shew this year: no place to hold it and no money. On the plus side, the recent request for donations for the computer fund had produced over \$500 in contributions.

Education: Nancy reported that the Dr. Schrang lecture was well attended and broke even. Nothing is scheduled for March. Juana has been putting her efforts into organizing the seminars and speakers for California Dreamin'.

Outreach: Sandra's projected expenses were the phone bill and ads. She could put off the Speaker workshop program until the summer when the club may be more financially secure. She will need a venue though. She and Leslie will speak at the Castro Lions Club on April 1. The club's web address was wrongly published in the newsletter. It will be corrected in the next one.

Social: CyberWorld has closed. ETVC could have Kimo's between 8:00 and 10:00 on the last Thursday of the month for \$3.00 a person. At 10:00, Kimo's En Drag show starts and ETVC members could stay and watch. The general feeling was, since most of the 50 or so members who can be depended upon to show up for each meeting rarely arrive promptly at 8:00, the club would actually be renting a room for about an hour for approximately \$150.00. And then members would be stuck watching the same show every month. This did not seem satisfactory. Evette said that she would check out Thirsty Bear, the Up and Down Club and Giraffe. March, April and May's mid-months are scheduled at Lilo Lounge. March and May's end-month socials are scheduled to be at Café Mars. April's will be part of California Dreaming.

Old Business: Erin asked if anyone was following the Community Center Project, but the view was that the project had stalled. Erin had asked Ronnie Jean to run for Outreach since Telzey did not want to co-chair again. Lulu Blau reported that she would not actively seek the Presidency or Vice Presidency but would not refuse if it were thrust upon her. Ms. Blau then left and Veronica thrust the presidency on her. Leslie said that she would not mind being VP or Prez as long as she could continue having an active part in the Cotillion. Evette announced that she would run for Social Chair and that Darcy would not. Other names brought up for consideration were Q, Kalani, Ayme Kantz, Aqua Marine, Janet Bowman and Dale Carlson. The subject of pro-rating membership dues was raised. The proposal was that pro-rating would take place one time only: when a member first joins. It would be divided by the number of months left before the ending of the membership year. In other words, if the yearly membership were \$30, the prorate amount would be \$2.50 for each month. Leslie motioned for approval, Juana seconded, and the motion was approved.

Adjournment: At 6:30 p.m., Leslie moved to adjourn, Evette seconded it and the motion was passed.

The band is "Cracker" and they are playing at "Slim's" in San Francisco. I am excited, as I have never seen them live. As usual my friends who enjoy music that isn't on the radio can't join me for a variety of reasons. But an opportunity presents itself perhaps for Rachel to go instead. I think about it, but "Slims" in SF is definitely straight and the Santa Cruz surfer crowd fan base from where the band members live may be a bit macho for my taste.

However, I know in my heart that this is a great chance to really bring together my love of live music and my love of crossdressing.

I drive down to San Francisco after work with my car packed and ready to go. I arrive early and do my usual urban guerrilla drag routine inside my car in the parking garage on 11th Street near the club, the safest place I know of. As showtime approaches

But for me and a lot of my TG girlfriends, clothes shopping is -- pardon the term -- a real drag. I long ago gave up trying to find anything in a size 18 in thrift shops, as us hefty girls would apparently rather burn our old clothing than give it away to charity. Moreover, looking for outfits at Ross has become less and less satisfactory, because the Plus-size racks there are usually highly picked-over, and the items that are left would look more appropriate on the head matron in a women's prison.

If you are sick of finding things that fit but don't look good – or things that look good but don't fit -- take heart: there is an alternative. Try shopping by catalog. A number of mail order houses cater to us Plus-size girls with clothing that is stylish, inexpensive and – best of all – made to fit us.

Now I don't mean Frederick's of Hollywood: The size range at Frederick's is too limited and the clothes are – well, a little too exotic for many of us. Nor am I referring to rip-off artists like Michael Salem, where the advertising is as shoddy as the merchandise and the prices are much too high.

I'm talking about places where genetic women enjoy the convenience of shopping by mail or telephone, and where the styles may not be haute couturier, but at least they are attractive and serviceable.

Tops on my personal list is Chadwick's of Boston, which publishes a regular catalog with clothing that runs up to size 16 (plus a limited selection of items in sizes up to 3X). The selection is good, and the prices are definitely in the Ross range: for instance, the current catalog offers a very cute blue denim front-zip jumper in four colors for only \$19. Add one of their short sleeved knit silk sweaters at \$24, and you have a

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Chadwick's also puts out a special catalog that strictly features larger sizes, "Jessica London from Chadwick's." I've purchased several outfits from this collection and I simply love them all. Not long ago I bought a navy blue silk crepe de chine sheath and blazer set from this catalog for only \$79 that fit perfectly. The blazer can be worn with jeans and a pullover for a dressed-down casual look, and the sheath works by itself as an evening dress. Put them together and you have a very chic businesswoman's outfit.

Another outfit that specializes in sizes for us full-figured girls is Lane Bryant, whose retail outlets are probably already familiar to you. Bryant's catalog is loaded with everything from underwear (including some hard-to-find foundation items and incredibly inexpensive panties) to evening dresses, although the bulk of its stock is in sports clothing with a distinctly casual look. Lane Bryant's current catalog features a darling short-sleeved skirt suit for only \$36.99, and loads of cute bathing suits.

Silhouettes is another mail-order company that specializes in larger sizes (12W-34W). Its prices are higher than Lane Bryant or Chadwick's (a linen-polyester jacket, for example, runs \$69, while my entire silk jacket and dress combination from Chadwick's was only \$10 more). But it is also considerably more hip, with a wide array of casual styles designed with the younger woman in mind.

So if you are looking for a new outfit for Spring and finding it hard to gear up for shopping, try the lazy woman's method and place your order by post. If nothing else, you won't be lonely: your mailbox will soon be bulging with catalogs from other women's clothiers, shoe stores, wigmakers, etc., as all of these businesses share mailing lists!
