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GUYS & GRACE - Callan

You're a guy. You were raised with guy rules: belching contests, barroom brawls, big hunks of meat, colorful language. These rules, you quickly found out, were the key to getting respect, to moving up the pecking order. You learned how to be rough and tough, how to get what you wanted by going after it.

You know, somehow, that the rules for gals are different. Farting for volume is not usually a skill women work to perfect, though you probably know some guy in your college dorm who was a pro. Women have some other kind of rules.

In fact, most of women's rules revolve not around how outrageous you can be, but rather, how civilized you can be. Women base their success on respect for others, getting what they want without taking it. Women work to find common ground, to put things in order, rather than trying to force themselves to the top of the pyramid. It is almost inconceivable to picture a woman in a T shirt that says: I didn't claw my way to the top of the food chain to eat sprouts.

Women have a set of rules for behavior. It is a complex and varied set, always under change, but it does work for them. One word that can describe this set of rules is decorum. Decorum is designed to offer respect and safety while allowing a context for communication.

Some guys have learned decorum. Guys like diplomats, or PR flacks, or weenies. But most think that decorum is primarily some block to their natural behavior _ that of bears with furniture, as Rita Rudner says. That's great. But crossdressers have an issue. If they want to pass as women, if they want to really express their femininity. they cant just get the clothes right. Nope, just looking like a woman is not enough. Rather, they have to get the attitude right. They have to play their part in decorum, in respect.

One woman who has often attended gender gatherings is appalled at the table manners of crossdressers. "They look lovely, then they sit down and shovel a huge hunk of prime rib into their mouth, seemingly all at once. Its a really jarring picture, pretty lipstick and powerful, chomping jaws." Of course women have learned to eat with decorum, to be lady like. In some cultures it is polite to cover the face while eating, but in ours they make sure that the actual actions of consuming food are as unobtrusive

_ and as inoffensive _ as possible.

Transsexuals usually find that they have to leave gender groups to get on with their woman journey. The crossdressers continue to see them as guys in dresses, and to treat them that way. long after they have begun putting away their guy stuff. It becomes unpleasant to try to deal with the guys. who are still playing guy dominance games, when you want to be out of the game. So what can you do? First, decide what you want to do. If you're happy being a guy in a dress, great. Act like a guy, wear a dress.

If you want to express your femininity, then you better start to deal with what femininity is, not just what femininity wears. People like honesty, and having some guy say "I am feminine - and I'll pound the shit out of anyone who says I'm not!" can seem really disconnected. While your behaviors may not be as blatant as that, if you are into only paying lip service to femininity, cut it out. It's not pretty. Just be a crossdresser, and be happy.

It's not easy to give up all that maleness. You use it everyday, and it works for you. You like it, and your partner probably likes it too. So keep it, but be honest about it. But no matter if you try to be feminine or not, make sure you respect others as they change. The biggest advantage of any gender group is to give people a safe place for exploration of their own gender issues. Through experimentation, they can find what their own path is. This experimentation may seem odd, but gender groups are designed to give us a safe place to explore the odd or unusual we hold inside.

It can be difficult to accept change in others. You may be at a stagnant point, not accepting change in your life, and find it difficult to accept change in others. You may find that other's changes push emotional "buttons" in you that make you uncomfortable and resistant. You may resent other people's changes because you are in a situation where you can't make the changes you want to make. You may disagree with another person's choices, and resist accepting them because you don't approve.

There are lots of reasons we resist change. We resist change away from the male way that we have been trained in. We resist change because we are afraid of the potential effects of change. We may even end up being more macho, playing against our pretty outfit, so that people won't think we are wimps. Yet change is the only constant.

The one thing we must achieve some level of decorum in our expression, not matter how feminine we care to express. This means that we must learn to be honest and gracious in our own presentation and to respect others and their changes. We need to examine our resistance to honesty and respect, and learn to honor others.

One good trick that works well for men is the "What would Cary Grant do in this situation?" technique. If you feel yourself getting angry, or someone else identifies that they are upset with you, just ask yourself what Cary Grant would do in one of his movies. He would find a solution with humor and grace and still be masculine. He would cut to the essential humanity of the situation and get his point across with wit. If Cary Grant doesn't work for you. find someone who does. But one hint: don't try Sly Stallone solutions while wearing a beaded dress. It's not pretty.

There is nothing wrong with being a guy. There is nothing wrong with being a guy in a dress. However, you will find that some grace and a sense of decorum will help not only those around you, but also help you to be more warmly accepted. And that is a good feeling.

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HER ODYSSEY - Jackie

THE MAKING OF TINA (6) - Tina

I am still discovering stuff about my self image. I am the only child of a nuclear family, dysfunctional, but not brutal. The pride of maleness and male sexuality either got suppressed or at least was never addressed. I've never had a strong sense of "maleness", and sexuality was no man's land. no information to be had about it. My father did not take pride in his appearance, he was something of a slob. I rate my father with a 6 out of 10. His self image could have been a 6. I've already told you about my mother. She gets a 3. Her self image was deeply sabotaged, unbearably low.

Both my parents were failures in life by my standards. And what are those standards? By my reckoning at this point, we are here to do three things: 1) Care about our fellow humans (and all the Universe pertaining to us), 2) Discover ourselves, 3) Develop ourselves. My parents did not love themselves very much at all. Their self discovery and self development were absolutely minimal. My mother was a seriously distorted person. My father was totally victimized by her dysfunction. Today, she would have been called a very serious co-dependent. My father went to his death without ever getting unhooked from her manipulations.

Where does that leave me? At least, I should have grown up a co-dependent. I did marry my mother regardless of attempts not to. I am a sucker for manipulation. I see it coming, and even so, I am over the edge and lost it in a moment. This happened in my religious trip and my marriage.

The compulsion to crossdress was always strongest after a period of depression. I needed something to feel good about, and Tina became a salvation from a deplorable self image. That pattern became set when my sex hormones came into play. Now Tina is a necessary part of my self image. Even during those times when Tina was only in the mind, she was there. During the first six months of my religious experience, I even forced myself to not think of cross dressing, but the pattern of compulsion was there. The religious garbage fell apart, but Tina didn't.

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The only way I feel sexy is to dress as a woman. Nothing else does it for me. That alone says more for the existence of Tina than everything else I've explained.

Since I have truly incorporated my feminine persona with a place in my life for her to exist, I feel more whole and balanced as a person than ever before. I feel better about myself, my personal hygiene has improved, and I even found the discipline to stop biting my fingernails.

I have spent a good deal of effort in this biography tearing religion apart and dismissing it as garbage. About two years ago, I had a wonderful and very striking dream. In the dream, I had just come upon a bunch of people living in a community. It was morning. The people were making breakfast and preparing to meet the demands that the day had in store. Everybody was singing in unison, and it sounded so incredibly beautiful. I found myself being flooded with a feeling of intense Joy and Well-being. It was Overwhelming. Then I felt a message that said "Join us. There's a place here for you." For a moment, within me welled up a feeling of "I'm not worthy of this". I broke down and cried. I bawled like a baby. At this point I woke up. I was still with Carole at this point, and I told her about it. I even said, "I wanna die and go there". Then in the waking state, savoring the Overwhelming Joy, I broke down and cried again. My sense of unworthiness was a bit of sadness, but the Joy and well-being was so strongly manifest as to overcome everything. It was awesome and truly wonderful.

It has taken the past two years for me to heal enough to be able to see more deeply what this dream was telling me. I am convinced now that what I felt was a small sample of the love and mercy God has available for us. I am adding this last thought to this story because last night from this time of writing, I thought of that dream and understood right then what I am telling you here. Folks, this life at best is a life of disease and blight. Those of us with some sense of vision are only a little less blind than all the rest. The Bible tells us we perceive dimly, as though through a veil. Especially in this time of moral decay, life on Earth is disease and blight at best.

The capacity God has for Mercy and Love is More than Enough to conquer ALL of this and totally obliterate all hurt and heal completely. Why doesn't God do this? Why does the world continue in deep travail? First, we are responsible for ourselves, and this life is a learning experience. The more we learn about life and ourselves, the more able we are to deal with whatever comes into our lives. It is meant for us to have that responsibility. Also, if we are to make the choice of loving God, that love must be totally and unequivocally of a free will with no coercion and no conditions of any kind whatever, neither of any indoctrination, nor any blindness derived by conditioning. The love we nurture for God must be voluntary, conscious, and 100.000% pure in motive.

I am so glad I am a musician. I will be one forever and ever. Nothing has blown the music out of me and nothing ever will. It is a source of deep joy for me, and one means by which I give joy to others. It is my gift which I pass on. I am a transvestite because I stumbled upon that mechanism to nullify a poor self image, incorporated the pattern into my life, and now it's part of me. I worried about Deuteronomy, 22:5. It says I am an abomination. I'm no longer worried. God's Love, Mercy, and Forgiveness is bigger than all the abomination I can be!!! It is bigger than ALL the grief Man has piled upon himself. What's my future? I don't know, but I'll be growing and learning.

WHY CROSSDRESS? - Callan

Why crossdress? Why do some people feel a strong need to dress up in clothes that society assigns to the other gender? This is a question that people have been investigating for a long time, because evidence of people who express transgender traits exist in virtually every human culture that has been fully studied. From the Native American berdache. to cross-dressed courtiers, like the Chevalier D'Eon, there are a wide range of stories about people who express more than simple male and female roles.

Many people have come up with theories about the causes of this behavior. Some have blamed it on socialization, on the lack of a good gender role model, others on sexual stimulation, such as a first sexual experience with an item of clothing. But today we know that many children show a strong interest in cross-gender play very early in life, usually before the age of five. These children will dress and play at being another gender role. It seems clear that this behavior comes from some cause that is biological rather than environmental, either a genetic difference, or a hormone "shock" in the womb that creates the conditions for being transgendered, for having a need to express themselves as another sex.

It also seems clear that both the intensity of the need and the environmental affect how conditions transgendered children grow up. Key factors include the sexual orientation of the child, parental attention, community pressures, and a child's other traits, such as intelligence and Some have been studying if disposition. environmental changes can be made that eliminate cross-gender minimize or behavior, but it appears that these changes are not effective after about eight years of age.

From this range of factors we get a range of behaviors from fetishistic, where masturbating with clothing is all that is desired, to transvestite, to drag queen, to transgenderist, to transsexual, where the intensity is strong enough that the individual needs to physically change the sex organs to get their body in line with their internal gender. While this is a range. it is not a progression. Most people get to a stage that they are comfortable with and stay there, at least until there is a major change in environmental factors, such as the loss of a spouse.

What every person on the gender continuum shares is the need to keep their cross-gender activity secret, or within very firm limits. For example, while Halloween is the crossdressers "high holy day", and drag shows are an outlet for the gay crossdresser, most activity has to be in secret. Even transsexuals who have had surgery often have to hide their history. The effect of having this "horrible" secret can be very damaging. It often makes people unable to be fully open with their partners. damaging the intimacy of the relationship. It can create a feeling of shame that damages the self image, and leaves a person vulnerable to rage. It may be the trigger for addictive behaviors in the hope that the pain of keeping the true self hidden will be held back, if even for a moment.

The effects of the closet, of having to hide from the world, can be tough. We often see crossdressers who do not look well in their clothes. This can come from the lack of feedback and experience, a resistance to looking good in order to keep their male identity visible. or an interest in sensual clothing over practical. Because the crossdresser only dresses for special occasions, they tend to wear only special occasion rather than everyday outfits. They may also have an unrealistic fantasy image of themselves that blocks out the reality of their appearance.

Most crossdressers need love and acceptance. but this can be difficult. Often, people are shocked and dismayed when they find out someone is a crossdresser, and this further validates the feeling of shame that a crossdresser has. Even if people try to give love and acceptance, many crossdressers reject it because they are not yet able to love and accept themselves. They know that their behavior is "bad" and think that they are bad for having this need that they cannot stop.

Understanding of the persuasive nature of transgender feelings, and of the ways that various people have dealt with it can be very useful for the crossdresser. Many crossdressers find that they only need to get a period of exploration and acceptance out of the way, and then are happy with participation in a support group. For others, organized conventions where crossdressers meet are a good way to explore how others deal with their transgender issues.

It is very rare for crossdressers to decide they need to change their physical sex, though it is very common for them to have fantasies about doing it. When they take the fantasies into the real world, they find that being a woman is about the same mundane things as being a man is about. Being a woman is not all 4" heels and mini-skirts. Most crossdressers find that coming out of the closet, getting an understanding of the realties in a safe and secure environment frees them from shame. and lets them get on with their lives. They find a way to balance the needs rather than swallow them, and become better partners and people because of it.

Most crossdressers who come out of the closet find it a journey of self discovery, of exploring their own inner landscape in a way that most people never do. This exploration can make them more aware both of their own motivations, but also the needs and motivations of those around them. While this period of discovery might be difficult for those around the crossdresser, it will provide life long benefits for both the crossdresser and their partner.

While there is no clear answer to the question of why some people need to crossdress, it is clear that crossdressing is simply "wired" into some people. Those people may have a mild to intense need to explore their gender issues, and the level of the need may change as life conditions, including, for example, family/work demands and age, change. There also has never been a cure for crossdressing. Many therapists treat it like an eating disorder: the requirement will always be there, but it can be managed and integrated into a full and satisfactory life. This, of course, requires that both partners and crossdressers understand and accept the effects of shame that crossdressers feel. and learn to accept transgender as an integral part of a person.

Crossdressing can be a lot of fun, a range of sensual delights and wonderful pleasures. But as long as it is a behavior laced with shame and self loathing, it cannot be something that can truly be shared and enjoyed. Understanding the nature and reality of transgender behavior can help everyone live more easily and happily.
