"That's nothing," I said, noting a recent purchase, "Where else can you walk down a city street crossdressed carrying a riding crop?"

That's the beauty of Provincetown. A cultured, diverse community, it's reputation for tolerance, to say nothing of its New England charm, is well deserved. While many of us have been out to one of the major dressing events that seem to pop up everywhere, P-Town is the only place where you don't necessarily need an expensive event as an excuse to have fun. Sure there are things you can attend such as the Tiffany Club weekend in June or the Fantasia Fair in October, but the real fun is the Provincetown experience itself.

For those contemplating an en femme weekend (or week), a bed and breakfast is a great place to start. (The Elephant Walk Inn is highly recommended). Target late spring through early fall as the Cape area becomes a ghost town in the winter. Avoid holidays as they tend to be crowded; too much so to leisurely enjoy this beautiful seaside town.

Located at the far tip of Cape Cod, the town consists of two main streets with residential streets fanning out from the harbor. Bring flats - you will do a lot of walking. And bring your credit cards - Commerce Street is filled with countless shops selling everything from handcrafted jewelry, leathers, and fine antiques to touristy flotsam from the sea.
