SURVEY REPORT

Majority of Tri-Sigers did not participate in Virginia's survey

The following are the results of a survey taken earlier by Virginia. Unfortunately, a majority of the members (60%) did not participate. Thus the results are from a minority (40%) of members who did return the questionnaire.

Question No.1: This dealt with the way that prospects could be admitted into Tri-Sigma. In general, this question was similar to the questionnaire sent to the leaders. Would future prospects have to read the "Understanding" book or, instead, be sent a free brochure dealing with the Sorority

TAKING THE "PILL"?

You've heard the "yummy" things about taking female hormones, so now here is another viewpoint from a California sister who took Premarin for some months.

This is being written to my sisters who are thinking about ing female hormones. There have been many articles written about thus, but as one who did not listen or pay attention to what I had read, I embarked on an experience with Premarin.

At first I felt that I could control my intake, but before long I found myself taking them sevena days a week. I soon lost my iniative to do things — I felt tired much of the time. My breats hurt often and continued to grow.

Having breasts isn't as much of a "trip" as you might think. You must remember that most of your life is being a man in this world — which does not approve of men having breasts. So, although I finally got into a size 36-B bra, I found that I couldn't wear my male T-shirts and sport

shirts any longer because I was so noticable. And since my breasts had gotten so large, I needed to wear a bra for support all the time. And, let me tell you, this is hard to hide under any shirt.

As a male that enjoys my feminine role about 40% of the time, the idea of wearing a bra every day isn't so exciting as it used to be. The trying to hide the bra from curious people is always difficult.

I'm off the pill now and looking forward to getting my energy back and to being as feminine as possible without the hormones.

Sisters, you will get nothing but problems when taking hormones, unless you are single and do not care what people might about you. Breast forms, such as Carol handles, are better and not nearly as much of a problem.

and Tvism in general? The results, expressed as a percentage of the total 100% of the membership are: 21.2% wanted no change and 18.4% wanted the brochure.

Question No.2: This dealt with WHO could belong to a local chapter. This question was not included in the questions sent to the leaders. It stated that national membership automatically made a person a member of a chapter . Participants were to choose between a new member being automatically included as a chapter member or, the person having to go through an interview with a representative of the chapter. The results, expressed as a percentage of the total 100% of the membership are: 22.2 were in favor of combined national and chapter memberships and 17.3% wanted to have such members qualified through an interview.

Question No.3: This dealt with the question of allowing non-Tv members several meetings before officially joining. This was

similar to that sent to the leaders although the question submitted to the leaders included the statement that such non-members would have to be interviewed before they attended a meeting. The results, expressed as a percentage of the total 100% of the membership are: 25.6% did not want non-members attending chapter meetings and 14.2% wanted non-members to attend for at least one meeting.

Questions No. 4 and 5: These dealt with items which never appeared on the original questionnaire to the leaders and had to do with the requirement that new members had to sign their real name and address and, the allowing of other than heterosexual males into the organization. These items were never under consideration for a change by any of the leaders. The results, expressed as a percentage of the total 100% of the membership are: 32% favored both questions and 8% took a negative position.

How To Build A Basic Wardrobe

You have the same potential for dressing your body as effectively as the next TRi-Sigma sister. The only real trick to doing it is to know your body objectively. Then and only then, can you learn what looks best on you.

Although diet and exercise can reshape you to some extent, you will be short, tall, average, or whatever ALL your life. Even though you may control your weight well, the pattern of distribution will continue - if you tend to put on weight around the hips or stomach, that tendenancy won't change. If your shoulders are broad or narrow, if your arms are long or short, none of this will change. Now is not a minute too soon to learn what works best for whatever it is that makes you YOU. In this section of the Femme Mirror you will find suggestions for making the most of some common body facts. Each issue of The Femme Mirror will contain information which will help you appear better and make it that much easier for you to 'pass' in public.

HOW TO BUILD A GOOD BASIC WARDROBE!

Think of a good basic wardrobe as a solid core of clothes that can be worn for your everyday life. If you've picked them well, these clothes will be your good friends and support you in all that you do. A little further

on in this discussion I am going to tell you what I believe should be a basic day and evening wardrobe for every crossdresser, but first, think about your particular clothes needs. If you're like many crossdressers, you probably find yourself buying for occasions or an impulse RATHER than building a good workable wardrobe. I suggest that you try this little experiment first, then base your clothes buying on the results.

The easiest way to assess your life in terms of clothes is to think of it as a pie with different slices for all your needs, the size of the slice corresponding to the importance of that area of your life. If, for example, you like to get out 'on the town' as often as possible, a large slice of your pie will be devoted to clothes suitable for such activities. Think of your Tv lifestyle and the clothes needs each part of it generates, then draw your own pie. If the largest slice doesn't correspond to the bulk of the clothes hanging in your closet, you have "what to wear?" problems. Start solving them by





filling in with clothes you can wear for this part of your life

You will also find you wardrobe pie useful in budgeting your clothes money. The biggest most important chunk of you clothes deserves the largest part o your budget. Conversely, the smallest may need the leas amount of money. For mos crossdressers, evening clothe work out to be a small slice of the pie. Evening clothes however, are beautiful and tempt ing - and often expensive so you may find yourself over buying here. The result can be failed budget and clothes you may not wear enough to make then Try to make you practical. spending correspond to your rea clothes needs and you'll find budgeting easier. After all, it' hard enough to pay all the bill in your male life without wast ing money or things that you can rarely use in your Tv life.

Once you've arrived at the clothes categories necessary fo YOUR To life, the next step is the clothes themselves. I've worked out two basic wardrobes one for day, one for evening and I believe they will work fo Tv because the choice represebt enduring styles for any crossdresser - styles which hav great flexibility. Use these ward robes to figure out the numbe of each item you yourself need depending on how you have slice your particular wardrobe pie

BASIC DAY WARDROBE

The clothes pictured on the following pages represent the backbone of a wardrobe for almost any crossdresser. It works for one who stays mostly at home as well as a sister who loves to get dressed up and go out shopping and to dinner. The difference in these life situations is reflected in the QUANTITY of the various items, but ALL would be represented in a wellbalanced, workable wardrobe. A crossdresser who goes out quite often will own more skirts, good pants, and jackets, while the sister who stays mostly at home will own more casual clothes, although we all know that the 'stay-at-home sister does love pretty, feminine clothes, too.

BLAZERS: A couple of these will be the most useful items in your wardrobe. A blazer can finish a skirt, pant or dress look; it can make many items work for day or P'M'

The Single Breasted Blazer: Very classic, good over skirts, pants or dresses. Looks well open or closed. Besides putting the finish on a look, it can replace a coat in spring and fall — any blazer can.

TheDouble-Breasted Blazer: Classic, good over skirts or pants. Looks best buttoned, rather than open. Navy is the most basic color.

The Shirt-Jacket Blazer: More casual than the other styles, this one looks best over casual pants or skirts. It is usually worn open, rather than buttoned.


The Belted Blazer: This is a tailored choice that gives a very finished look to skirts — not the best choice for pants. Since it's belted, it's not usually worn open.

A-LINE SKIRTS: This easy-fitting skirt is useful for almost all daytime occasions — because of its body-skimming fit, it causes a few figure problems.

Yoked A-Line: This version fits slimly over the stomach, is softened by fullness at the hip. It works well with blouses tucked in and sweaters worn pulled down over the hip.

Classic A-Line: Slightly softened with tucks or darts at the waist, this is the more classic of the two. It works well with blouses tucked in but is not the best choice with sweaters because tucks add too much bulk.

SLIM SKIRTS: These skirts work well for any daytime activity. Slits or pleats give them walking ease. They are not as figure concealing as A-Line or dirndl skirts.



Classic Kick-Pleat Skirt: With the kick pleat in front, this skirt has all the walking ease you want and good casual style. It works equally well with sweaters or blouses.

Slit Skirt: Side slits (or a rear slit) give this skirt walking ease. It works well with blouses tucked in and especially well with sweaters. If the slit is too deep, it can be too revealing for some daytime occasions.

Side Kick-Pleat Skirt: Pleats are concealed in side seams to give walking ease. This style is more dressy than the other, looks well with blouses or sweaters. SOFT DIRNDL SKIRTS: These full easy skirts are wonderful figure concealers and look well for all daytime occasions. They are good day-into-evening choices, too.

Full Dirndl: This style has tucks or gathers at the waist to add fullness. It looks well with blouses tucked in. There's too much hip fullness for most sweaters.

Modified Dirndl: Less full, this style works well with blouses or sweaters. It is the most classic of the dirndls.

CLASSIC SHIRTS: These shirts are among the real staples of your wardrobe; you'll wear them with skirts or pants, under jackets or own their own.

Classic Long-Sleeve Shirt: This is the most classic of shirts, but in a silky fabric it can go anywhere, even to an elegant restaurant.

Shawl-Collared Shirt: This is classic but slightly more dressy than the notched collar style. It can be long or short sleeved and can go anywhere.

Shirt With Contrasting Collar and Cuffs: This is the sportiest of the shirts. Though you can wear it with skirts, it looks especially well with casual pants.

Tie-Collar Shirt: In a silky fabric, this is the dressiest of the classic shirts. It can be worn with pants or skirts, but if you wear it with pants, don't pick the sportiest ones.

CLASSIC SWEATERS: These V-neck or neck sweaters are perfect tops for skirts or pants. Depending on the knit, they can look sporty or dressy.

Crew -Neck Sweater: In tweedy or cabled knits, this can look very sporty. In solid colors and fine-guage knits, it can look dressy. Can be worn alone or over a shirt.

V-Neck Sweater: Cabled or tweedy styles look most sporty. Solids and fine-guage knits look dressy. Wear it with a shirt underneath or, for a more dressy look, without, Try adding a scarf or a neckless.

Cardigan Sweater: This can be worn as a jacket with a blouse under it or, for a more dressy look, alone with a scarf or neckless.

TURTLENECK SWEATERS:

Classic Turtle: The turtleneck here fits snugly and looks more tailored. It works well with pants or skirts.

Cowl-Neck Sweater: The cowl-neck turtle has a loose-fitting neck, it can be draped softly. It works well with pants or skirts.

TAILORED PANTS: These straight-leg pants, are tailored classically enough to go almost anywhere during the day — from the office to a community meeting to lunch out. Their effect depends greatly on how casual or dressy a top you put with them.

Pleat-Front Pants: The front pleat of these very versatile pants give softness and help conceal large hips. Worn with a silk shirt the pants can be dressy; with a turtleneck sweater, they're casual.

Classic Straight-Leg Pants: The most classic daytime pants, these work with blouses or sweaters. Because they fit snugly through the hip, they aren't as concealing as pleated pants.

Classic Corduroys: Cut like jeans but in a corduroy fabric, these pants are



durable but good looking. Great with sweaters.

T-SHIRTS: You can't have too many of these wearable favorites. Wear them with skirts or pants, for every casual occasion.

Classic V-Or Crew Necks: Whether V-necked or crew, T-shirts are the first choice with casual pants or skirts. They are the 'other half' of a pair of jeans.

CASUAL PANTS: For casual daytime wear, you can't beat these styles. They're good at home or for outings like shopping or informal

lunches.

Drawstring pants: These are sligh more dressy, especially if you combine th with a silky shirt. If you're wearing a swea try tucking it in.

Jeans: Jeans are the 'uniform' for casual occasions when durable good looks in order.

SHIRTDRESSES: These are daytime w robe staples to wear absolutely anywh Wear them alone or under a jacket, to wor to church, to dinner out.

Classic Shirtdress: Long-sleeved,small collared, this is a classic, versatile dress to wear alone or under a jacket for more polish.

Shawl-Collared Dress: Still classic, this shawl-collared style is slightly more dressy. A good choice for day into evening wear.

Short-Sleeve Version: Trim classic lines keep this dress in the shirtdress family. Short sleeves make it a good warm weather choice and give it day-into-evening possibilities.

Soft Shirtdress: With a soft shoulder line and soft, full skirt, this dress is feminine, versatile and a good day-into evening choice. It looks sporty and appealing with a turtleneck underneath. A jacket would add polish.

WRAP DRESSES: This style wraps and ties and has a soft, feminine appeal. A wrap can go just about anywhere, has the ability to move from day-into-evening looks.

Classic Wrap: Slim, long-sleeved and classic, this dress has as much versatility

as a shirtdress. A scart or neckless dresses it up.

Short-Sleeve Wrap: Slightly more dressy, this soft-skirted style is good for all kinds of daytime wear. Can work well in the evening, too.

Soft Wrap: With soft sleeves and a full skirt, this is the dressiest version of the wrap dress. It works equally well day or evening. Tweedy fabrics give it a more casual feeling.

CLAIRE (NY-208-S) TELLS US "HOW TO MAKE CHOCOLATE MOUSSE"

I am a new sister in Tri-Sigma and I am interested in making others happy. Since I enjoy cooking, I would like to share with my sisters my most successful receipe: a CHOCOLATE MOUSSE. So get ready, gals, and you can even smell the delicious dessert.

18 SERVINGS.

1/2 pound of sweet chocolate (2 large Hershley or Nestle) 6 eggs separated 3 tbs of water

1/4 cup of sweet liqueur, such as Grand Marmier, Amaretto.

Melt the chocolate in a double boiler; keep it hot.

Put the yolks and the water in a heavy saucepan and place it over a LOW heat while beating vigorously and CONSTANTLY with a wire whisk — until it gets the consistency of a hollandaise. While beating, add the liqueur. Remove from the heat and fold in the melted chocolate. Scrape the mixture into a mixing bowl.


Beat the heavy cream until stiff, adding 2 ths of sugar. Fold into the mixture.

Beats the whites to snow point, adding the rest of the sugar and fold into the mousse.

Spoon the mousse into a crystal bowl and chill until ready to serve. Keep refrigerated.

To serve, garnish with whipped cream and grated chocolate.

Claire says that she hopes that our sisters will enjoy making the Chocolate Mousse as much as she does — but be careful, she advises, it is delicious AND very fattening.

Dear Carol:



Don't Let This Happen To YOU

All Tri-Sigma sisters should pay careful attention to the following article by a sister who was arrested while 'dressed.' There are a number of places where our sisters should be especially careful when they go out crossdressed. Not all law enforcement people are understanding about 'dressing.' Many are extremely ignorant about transvestism.

Many of us have read of an incident where a crossdresser has been picked up by the police and put behind bars, It is sort of a nightmare for a of us and we certainly must subconsciously remember this and hop that we never wind up the same way. Unfortunately, this type of it cident DID happen to one of our Texas sisters — JESSICA TX-7-B and she has been gracious enough to allow us to publish the terrib account where SHE was picked up by the police, while dressed, and take to jail. . It is hoped that our sisters will be careful and not never be placed in such a predicament.

The police report went as follows: Beechnut Substation Date: 3-27-80 — Subject: Arrest 3-21-80 M----B----; At Station: 8:3 P.M.;; Allowed to call wife: 9:30; Released in lieu of bond: 11:20; Bon Sheet Agreement: No. T-106324 - Dressed as the opposite sex \$203.50 No. T-106323 - Failed to identify as witness \$53.50; Arresting Officer J'F' Cessna and B'R' Baker. Cessna was the driver and the search of ficer to sign the form; Other officers present — Hill, Perret, Swain, Vale tine, Aldrich. (Subject was) confined during the course of the day cre shift change, with many officers present to witness. Did not get an other officer's names. Suggest that duty roster can show names of a present.

Statement by JESSICA: I was stopped and searched at th Westwood Mall around 8:00 P.M. Officer, after hearing my male voice immediately got out of the police car and put his hands all over me saying that he was searching me. He took my drivers license before search ing me. On the way to the station they both made rude remarks about me although it was Cessna who did most of the talking. He asked if got my kicks out of dressing, what my wife thought about it, was SH masculine, and did I like to suck a h--- d--. Cessna talked about gays an queens and described past runins he had been in with such people. Whe we arrived at the Police Station, Cessna told me to stand outside while h gathered the officers that were there to look at what he had caugh The booking officer could not find a law pertaining to me so they calle the Vice Dept. and they advised them on how they should book me Cessna continued making jokes at my expense - took some picture out of my wallet - and asked me who they were. He told a story abou two queens who he arrested and how he fooled his partner by saying that they were hookers and that they would do what he wanted in order to stay out of jail. He said that his partner then felt them and then h burst out laughing

One officer said that I looked better than the girl who had taken out the night before. I told the officers that I had an appoin ment at the Texas Research Institute for Mental Science but received n comment. I was put in the lock-up area while questions were asked Another officer came in and searched me again, taking my purse, earring rings, and searched through my wig and took my falsies. The bookin officer asked another officer if he looked good with the falsies. Th search-officer then told me to take down my slip and asked me, after pointing, what was there. I heard another officer say that perhaps

should not have been arrested.

I was allowed to call my wife and after that was put in a cell but switched to another one after it was found that the water was not working in the first one. From time to time, various officers would come over to look me over — some made very rude remarks. When my wife eventually arrived, the police asked how she put up with me and was she a "guy" also. They even asked her if she got turned on by me when I was dressed.

When I was allowed to leave, I told them that I had never seen such unprofessional conduct in a police organization. As I was escorted from the cell, one officer walked in front of me, swinging his rear end and hands, in parody of a woman. After my comment about the unprofessional conduct, I was not given the final papers to sign and my belongings were taken back and out behind the counter. I was told that I was going to get my picture taken to show just how professional they were - so that I could not win a court battle. was directed to the lock-up area and an officer brought out a camera and took five pictures. They wanted me to remove my wig out I refused. I held my hand down as they took the pictures, trying to mess up the pictures as much as possible. Finally I was allowed to sign forms and then left. I had never been read ny 'Miranda' rights! I was not given the names of the arresting officers when I asked for them.

On March 26, Officers DeLacruz and Hill came to my home it 11:30 to return my purse and its belongings.

Jessica said that she felt that our Tri-Sigma sisters might be nterested in the event.

She said that she, naturally, vas very upset about all of this nd made a number of phone alls. TRial was initially set for pril 4th at 6:00 P.M. but was escheduled two weeks later. he was eventually referred to ay Hill of KPFT — 90.1. He as the General Operations Mgr

and suggested that Jessica contact Phyllis Frye, who was a transvestite. Phyllis lives as a woman, although she is also married to a very understanding female. Phyllis, in turn, put Jessica in touch with two attorneys — Martin Schwab (Texas Human Rights) and Patty O'Kane, a feminist lawyer. Phyllis also suggested that Jessica contact Johnny Gayen, a Houston City Councilman.

Johnny Gayen called the City Legal Dept, and talked to the City Attorney. Shortly thereafter, charges were dropped and I did not have to go to court. I contacted Patty O'Kane and retained her as my attorney as the bond as payment for her services.

During this time I also contacted the American Civil Liberties Union and spoke to someone who directed Jessica to Patrick Wiseman. Mr. Wiseman just happened to be challenging the Texas Penal Code No.21.06—a law covering, among other things, crossdressing. This law is in effect in Texas and city governments can and do use this law to define anything they want in their law books.

In Houston, dressing as the opposite sex is one definition of this penal code. Jessica states that she is happy to report that this law is now being rewritten to allow Transsexuals to carry an I.D. card to keep them from being arrested. But, all in all, a note of leniency has been added towards cross-dressers. On March 29th, Jessica was a guest speaker on station KPFT 90.1 for about 15 minutes. She discussed her arrest and her lawyer, also there, spoke about the legal points.

Jessica and Patty O'Kane went to court on April 23, and the two arresting officers were also there. This meant that the city attorney had been misinformed as to the disposition of the case.

Jessica's attorney, Patty, told the city prosecutor that they would appeal the case, if convicted. The prosecutor dropped the charges and told the officers they could leave. Jessica says that for her this was a victory in that the city knew that the law was discriminatory and they did not want to pursue the matter. She subsequently received a letter on May 12, from the city attorney, saying: "Enclosed are the originals of your jail blotter and arrest card. These represent your 'record' resulting from your arrest on March 21st. It has now been expunged."
