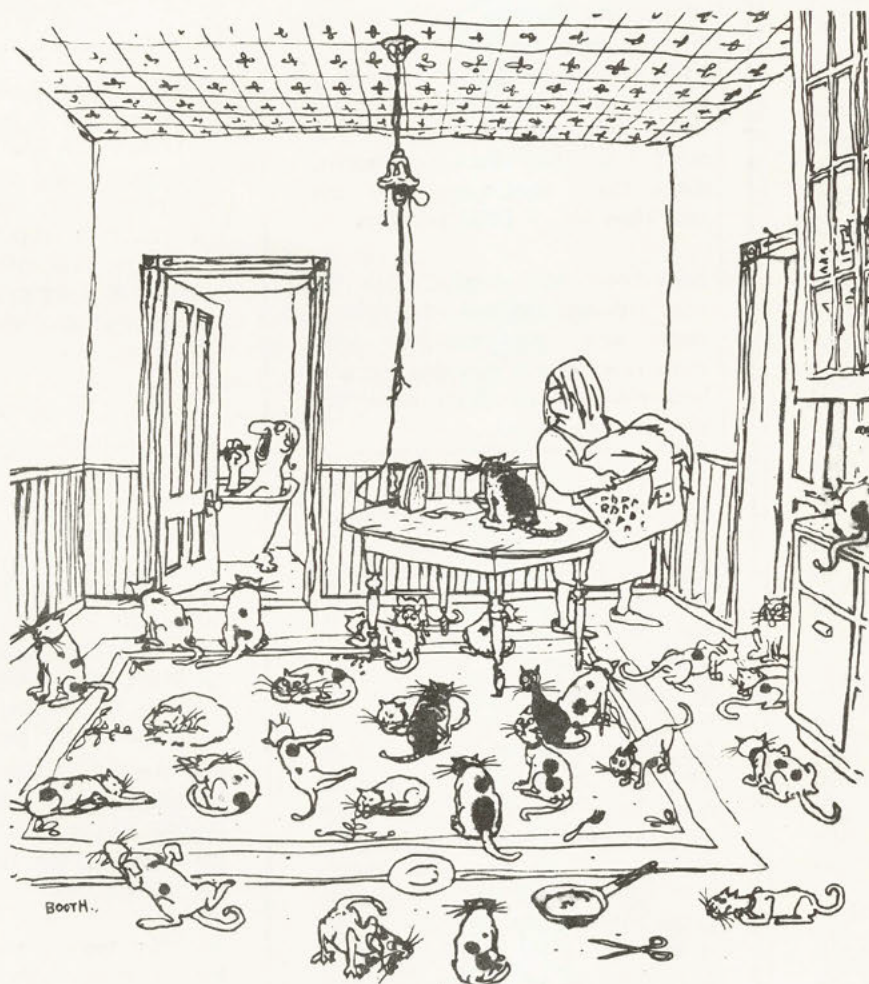

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SPEAKING OUT

NATIONAL LEADER DISCUSSES TRI-SIGMA'S FUTURE --

IT'S GOALS AND OBJECTIVES -- IMPORTANT CHANGES IN THE SORORITY

There are a number of things that need to be considered at this time. I hope that you will pay particular attention to what follows because what will be examined and discussed will not only be important for the year 1980 but in the years to come.

An item of importance which needs your immediate attention is the National Convention to be held again this year in late September. You will find more details about the convention in another part of this issue of the FEMME MIRROR. However, I do want to say that this gala event will be held once again in that wonderful city of NEW ORLEANS. Those sisters who attended last year will vouch for the grand time that they had there. It was an eye-opener for those who have rarely gone out 'dressed'. I hope that more of our sisters will attend this second annual convention. I especially appreciate having Linda (Tx-8-D) and Cindy (Ca-58-P) assist me in all the work and planning that is necessary before this convention can be held. Both sisters have been of great assistance and volunteered to work on this year's convention. I will keep you informed of their progress in each edition of our newsletter.

In this issue of the FEMME MIRROR, you will read of Ruthann's (Wi-14-M) contribution in the form of a News Release which I hope that most of you will help in sending it to your local newspapers. If we all put our shoulders to the wheel we should get a lot of publicity for our sorority and no doubt come up with many new members. But you've all got

to take a little of your time to help me out!

And in the matter of 'help', I need a sister who has the TIME and TALENT to act as Director of Communications. This person will be responsible for all advertising on a national level. I have had some help in the past by interested sisters but something always has crept into their lives to prevent them from continuing with the job. However, I CAN say that we

have been very successful in the past with our national advertising. I really need the assistance from some sister who is available and who isn't already busy doing something else for our sorority.

I should also mention that the Director of Communications will also be responsible for a Speakers Bureau. This subsidiary of our sorority will consist of chosen and qualified sisters who will be available to speak at colleges, medical gatherings, on radio and television and other places. The Director will also be responsible in locating capable writers who will be able to effectively communicate with the news media. Now, you can see that this job is a most responsible one and will take a most dedicated sister to do the work. And, it will take a lot of work! But, it can't take NEARLY the time that I gladly put in each week for all you gals out there. I recently estimated that I put in an average of twenty hours a week for Tri-Sigma and do NOT receive any remuneration other than payment for some of the expenses I incur.

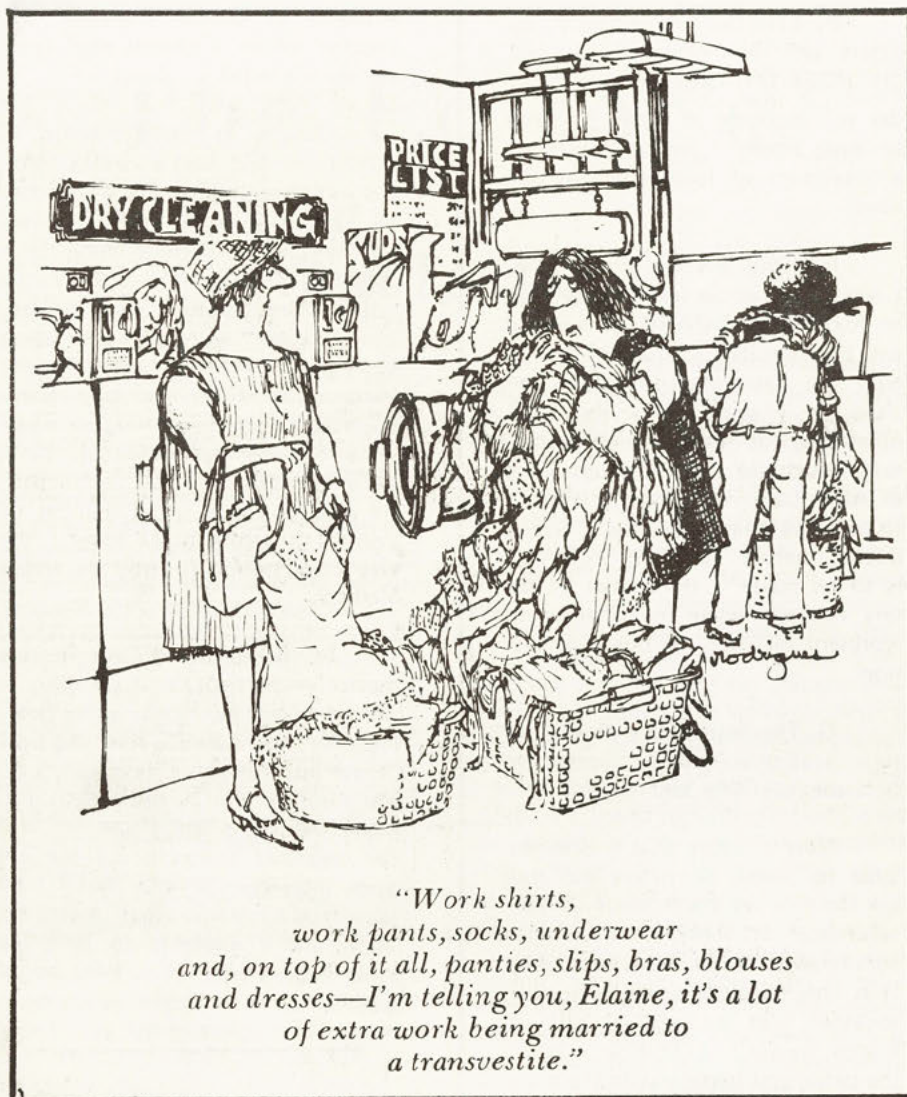
There is the matter of



"other" organizations. The question might be put -- "WHY SHOULD I BELONG TO TRI-SIGMA IN THE FIRST PLACE? WOULDN'T I BE BETTER OFF AS A MEMBER OF THAT OTHER TV ORGANIZATION OR THE ONE I HEARD OF WHICH IS JUST STARTING UP? WHAT DOES TRI-SIGMA OFFER ME?"

This series of questions and the "kind" of answers we are able to give our questioners will greatly reflect on the type of growth that we will enjoy in the future. For unless we can convince transvestites that OUR sorority will do MORE for them and is more beneficial for them, than it will just be a case of being one among many organizations -- all claiming to be the best organization for hetero Tvs. So, at this time it might be appropriate for you to hear of my general feelings in regard to WHY Tri-Sigma is the BEST of all the organizations for transvestites.

To begin -- one thing that sets us off from "other" organizations is that we do NOT accept other than heterosexual Tvs. This automatically makes us "one of a kind" and not an organization composed of a jumble of assorted Tvs who really are NOT compatible. We must always remember that MOST of us are married and nothing bothers a wife more than to have a cute



point out is that most chapters having been allowing prospective members to attend several chapter meetings for quite some time. The feeling of many people is that it is time to legitimize such practices.

C. Still another thorn in the side of many members and leaders has been that after joining the organization late in the year, they have had to come back around the beginning of the next year and pay another year's dues. Even though they were given back issues of the FEMME MIRROR and of the directory many felt that they had got the short end of the stick. And, as a result, many members have not renewed their membership.

D. A source of irritation to many sisters has been the use of £8.00 out of each £20.00 in dues

which has been given to Virginia for the old directory. A large amount of sisters have felt that that such a large amount of money given for such a "poor job" was just not right and that the directory could be put out much less expensively. There was a certain amount of feeling that Virginia was being paid over and above the actual cost of putting out the directory and they felt that this was not fair to those who work without any compensation. They felt that spending over £3000.00 a year for the directory was way out of line.

E' A minor source of complaint has been the £1.00 charge by Virginia for forwarding letters to members. To many writers, it has been a case of throwing many dollars down the drain because not all sisters will reply.

RECOGNIZING that these problems have been actually hurting the organization rather than helping, I contacted most of the leaders not so long ago and discussed these matters with them and made some suggestions of what might be done -- suggestions which have been given to me for the past several years. I asked these leaders to comment on the "proposed changes" that I had outlined and indicated that I would discuss the comments with Virginia at a later time.

Almost all of those who received my questionnaire and set of proposals made an effort to comment on them and these comments were later compiled into nine pages of matter which were then sent to those who participated. Virginia and I also discussed them -- a number of times. I favored the changes and Virginia did not. Soon after, Virginia indicated that perhaps it was time that she retire as co-leader and that I should carry things on. But before retiring she wanted to send a questionnaire to all members. Unfortunately, the questionnaire that was sent out to all members was preceded by a somewhat emotional outpouring by Virginia which caused some people to feel that many sisters would be negatively influenced. In addition, it was felt by some that the "other side" was not at all represented in whole. I also discussed with Virginia the matter that two or three of the "changes" were NEVER under consideration as regard to a change in the first place. I could not understand why she would want to distort what the original proposals were about. Some sisters felt that by adding additional "changes" of a most controversial type, that this would negatively influence those who filled out the questionnaire. It was felt that such people would feel that the organization "was going to the dogs" and possibly vote negatively against all proposed changes.

And now I am announcing the following changes to begin April 1st. These changes are for the benefit of the organization and although a few might think we have surely "gone to the dogs" I earnestly believe that such is not the case. After all, I certainly do not

want to harm an organization in which I have been doing 90% of the work since its inception.

A. As of April 1st, instead of having inquirers PURCHASE the book Understanding Crossdressing, we would, instead, recommend that book highly and GIVE those prospective members a new booklet dealing with transvestism and Tri-Sigma Sorority. To this end I have asked Ruthann (Wi-14-M) to assist me in producing this new booklet. The booklet will discuss, in some detail transvestism from many points of view with an attempt to help educate the reader. The booklet will also discuss our place in the world of transvestism and will also point out who is eligible for membership as well as pertinent points which we wish to make in regard to our sorority. The important thing here is that no more can people point the finger and say that we are out to make money through the sale of a book.

B. As of NOW, we will allow the visitation of non-member Tvs to chapter meetings PROVIDING that they have been interviewed by someone within the chapter FIRST. They may attend as many as three meetings. After that, such individuals must become members of the NATIONAL organization if they wish to continue meeting with the chapter.

C. As you have been recently notified, we will have a new type of Directory for 1980. This directory will contain pictures and a "profile" of each member. I believe that this new type of directory will be a big plus for our sorority and that it will encourage more members to correspond with others. It is nice to "see" those with whom you write,

D. Effectively immediately, each member will be given a 12 month membership. Thus, the new member who joins in October or even in December will NOT have to renew again until a full year later - thus having a full year's membership. This should eliminate the many complaints of those who join in the late months of the year.

E. Effective immediately, all letters will be forwarded at NO CHARGE! This is being done in order to encourage all sisters to write to each other. I would appreciate a maximum of four letters at one time.

F. Within the next few months, I will select certain leaders to 'sit' on an ADVISORY BOARD. This Board will be consulted in matters dealing with the national organization and although I will retain the right of making the final decision in matters brought to the attention of the BOARD, I also realize that it is BEST to have the opinions of those on the Board before a final decision is to be made. I think that all sisters will appreciate my attempt to represent all parts of our organization.

G. The basic policy of who can join Tri-Sigma will be limited to heterosexual males, only.

Now I realize that it is impossible to please all sisters and thus ask for the support of all of you, regardless of whether you agree totally with what you have read. It is only through all of us working together that we will be able to march forward in unison -- bringing peace and happiness to the many Tvs and wives out there - people who are still searching for an answer to their 'problem'. Please do your part in helping Tri-Sigma grow. We can do it -- if YOU help!!

Research Minded?

There are a number of professionally articles covering transvestism which have appeared in various 'Journals'. I believe that our readers would welcome the opportunity to read such articles if we could locate them.

It has been suggested by one of our sisters (an M.D.), that some sister who is close to a medical library (usually near a medical school) might be able to help. Several of such 'journals' are the

Archives of Sexual Behavior and another which I cannot read from our sister's letter.

Usually at these medical libraries one will find an Index Medicus which will refer the researcher to various journals which include writings about various subjects -- including transvestism. After the articles are located and copied, your Editor will get permission to publish them in the Femme Mirror. Our sister said that many journals include something on transvestism every few months. And, if our researcher (s) is diligent, she can go back for a number of years and locate other items - the way being pointed out by the Index Medicus.

So help your Editor in this matter -- perhaps a sister who is retired might be interested in helping. It's not hard to do and will prove interesting as you get into the swing of things. And, of course, many librarians are eager to help the beginner researcher. There are some interesting articles that I have seen and I know that there are many more available to someone who digs them out. How about you?

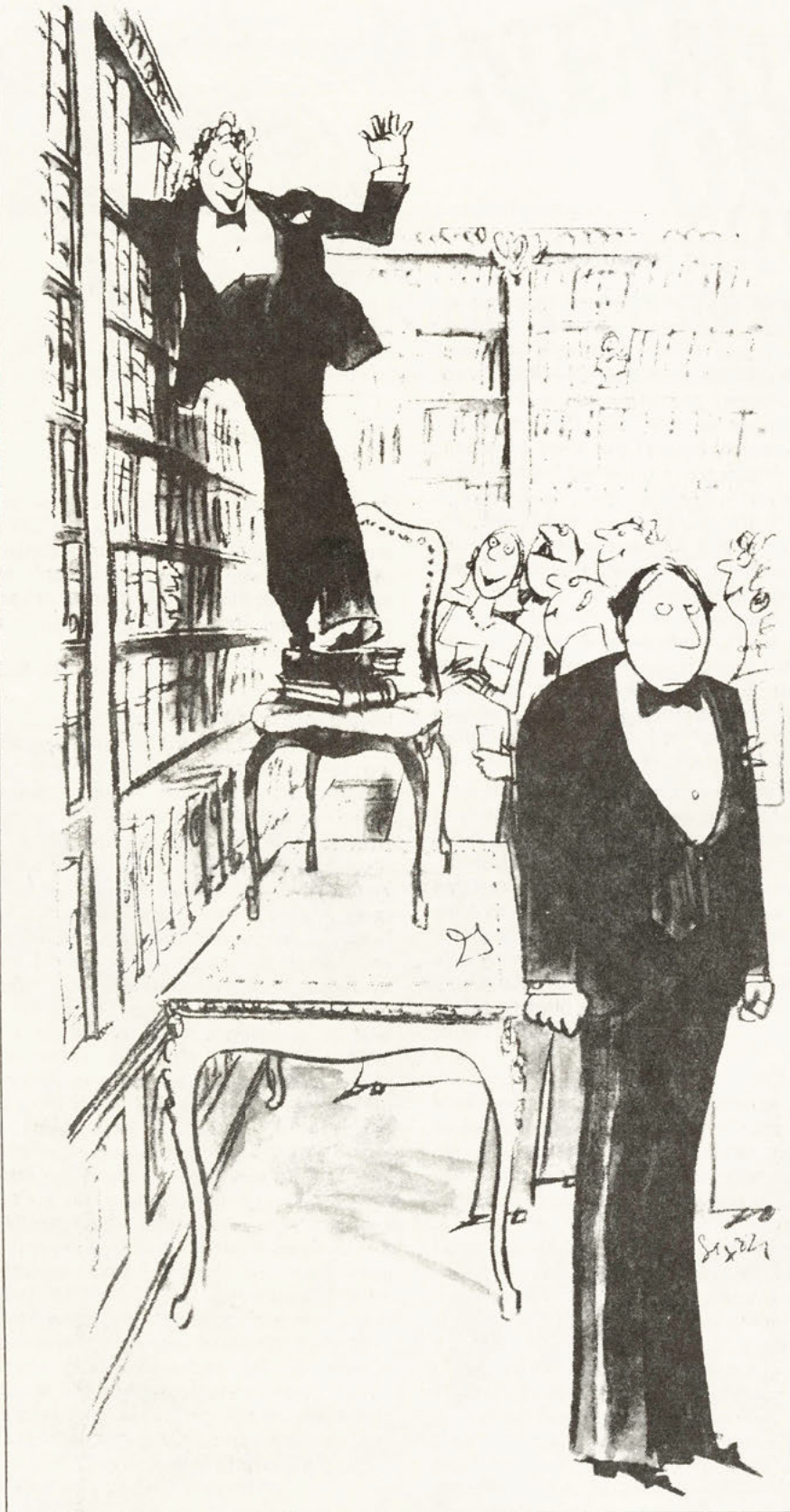
Dear Carol:

My husband went to a psychiatrist last summer who sent him for tests and told him that he was probably a trans-

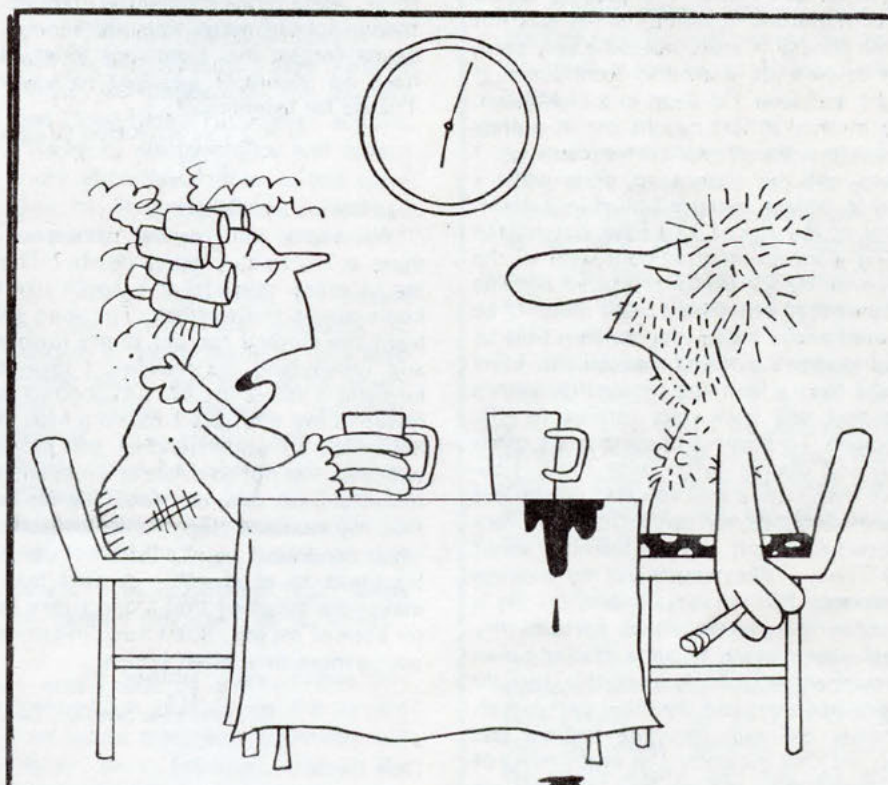

I'm confused in some areas and scared for the future. He gets upset when we discuss certain matters which is understandable. He stopped going to the psychiatrist because he didn't like the way she handled things — she got to talking more about his finding a condo for HER (he's in real estate) than his own problems. We've told no one about this with one exception. I saw Nancy Hunt on the *Phil Donahue Show* and called in. Later we contacted her my mail and she suggested a Dr. Sandughi, who works with Tvs and Ts's.

Nancy and my husband have gone to see this doctor and appear to feel comfortable with her. We have also given my husband a femme name — Karen.

However, I am getting more and more confused. Religiously, I'm Catholic and even though we're not very religious we do worship God in our own way. What does the church have to say about this?

If he does decide to tell his family about his being a Tv is there anything legal that can be done by either side of the family to take the kids from us since I am going to try to abide by him.

Our children know nothing about his crossdressing since Karen only dresses at

Say the word "Sorority" and the last thing that most people will think of is an all-male organization. But this is not your ordinary sorority. Called the Society For the Second Self, it exists to help the heterosexual male transvestite (TV) -- men who have a recurring desire to dress in women's clothing.

"Tvs are really up against the wall in our culture," says Virginia Prince, co-founder of the Society and long-time Tv rights activist. "Nowhere are ignorance and taboos more entrenched than in this question of gender identity -- what it means to be a man or woman."

Prince feels that all people are born with the potential to behave in both feminine and masculine ways, but that social teachings (from parents, teachers, friends, the media and others) force us to be one or the other. "These teachings are so basic to our concept of ourselves," she says, "that Tvs, feminists and others who challenge the limits of gender are seen as a threat."

On another plane, Prince sees transvestism challenging the sexism that values masculine qualities more highly than feminine ones. "We somehow see man's embracing femininity as a humiliating step down. He no longer 'wears the pants' in his family or in society," she says, "and that threatens our entire con-



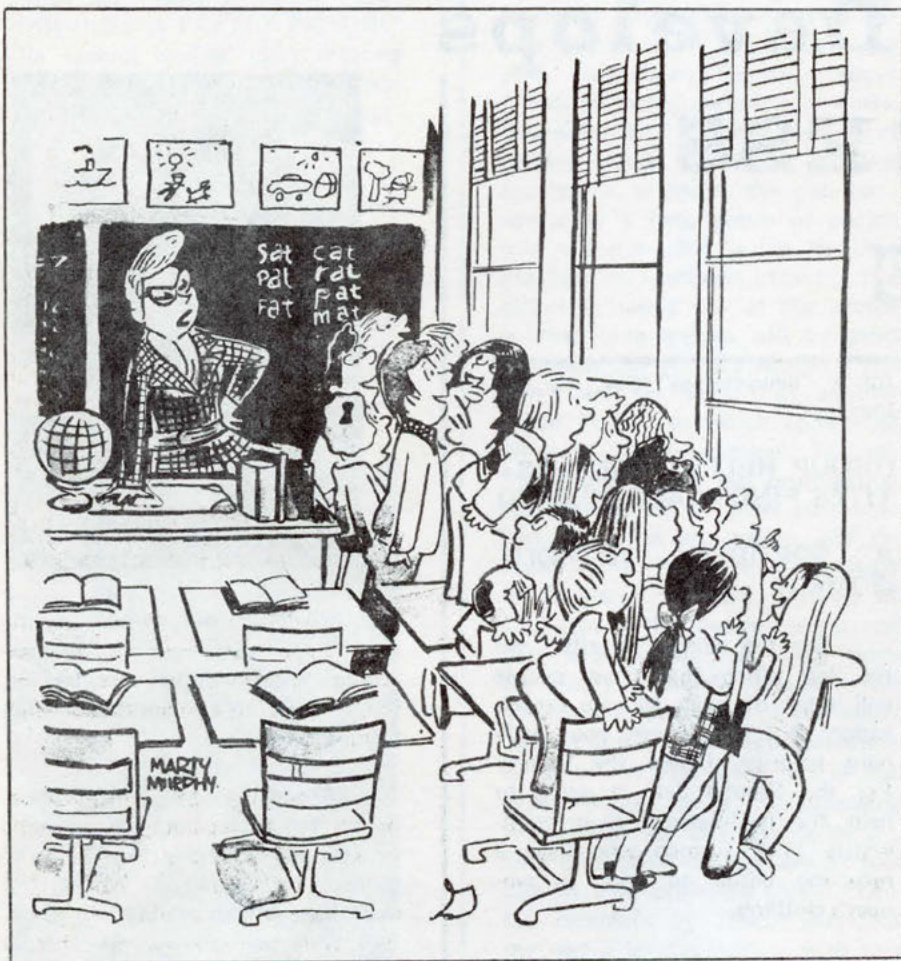
cept of social order. Women, on the other hand, can "step up" to masculinity with much less risk. In fact, these days it's considered high fashion."

According to Prince, most people fail to separate the concepts of sex and sexuality from that of gender, to separate maleness/femaleness from masculinity/femininity. "Most people assume that a feminine-acting male must be gay or must want to be female," she says.

Prince feels that most authorities now agree that Tvs are most likely to be heterosexual and readily accept and assert their maleness. Says she, "It's also important to distinguish the Tv from the transsexual (TS). Where the Ts feels trapped in the wrong body and wants to change sexes, the Tv knows he's a male but wants to express the feminine side of his personality and to have some experiences that, in our society, are available only to women."

Another source of popular confusion is the invisibility of the typical Tv. "Most people have no contact with the average Tv," says Prince. "That Tv is intimidated by most peoples' hostility. He could easily lose his job and in some places even be arrested."

Prince reports that many Tvs keep their crossdressing a secret from their closest friends and fam-

ily. Some even avoid close relationships entirely, fearing that their partner would inevitably discover and reject their feminine side.

As a result, Prince says, "Most people see entertainers like Jim Bailey or Craig Russell, or gay drag queens being outrageous or soliciting for sex, or hear about people robbing banks in drag, and they think that this is what Tv's must be like." But, she says, "in almost every way that you can imagine, Tv's are just like other men. Family men, in fact or in their hopes. They're all races, religions, nationalities, ages, sizes, occupations, income levels. You name it."

The cause of transvestism remains largely a mystery, to the medical profession and to Tv's themselves. For instance, researchers have found that most Tv's come

from families lacking a strong father presence. But they are unable to explain why other sons in that same family, or sons in similar families, don't become Tv's.

The question of "why" is a popular discussion topic among Tv's. "We can talk about how it makes us feel," says Carol Beecroft, the Society's other co-founder and now it's national leader. "We can talk about what it does for us emotionally and even psychologically. We all know the sense of comfort and relief from tension that it brings to us. But none of us really knows why it's happened to us and not others."

Beecroft feels that Tv's don't DECIDE to become Tv's, at least not consciously. "It's just a strong urge that we all have and the only decision, really, is whether we sit on it or let it all out," she says.

Letting it all out is where the Society For The Second Self comes in. Preaching Tv self-acceptance and dignity, the Society provides its members with a nation-wide network of heterosexual Tv friends. It has also established local chapters which have regular gatherings for area members and their wives or girlfriends.

"We're really excited about the growth of the chapters in the past year," Beecroft says. "Chapter meetings give our sisters a safe place to go when they're dressed, and give them and their mates a chance to see and feel first-hand that Tv's are really as likeable and respectable as anyone else."

Transvestism is often a cause of domestic tension that frequently ends in divorce or separation. So a prime Society goal is to promote mutual understanding and accommodation between the Tv and his mate. Says Beecroft, "We hope that our literature, books, and chapter meetings can help break down the women's misconceptions and fears. We also encourage our sisters to meet their mates halfway. We think it's working in enough cases to keep us at it."

Besides direct service to its members, the Society also works to break down Tv stereotypes. Beecroft recalls that "a couple of years ago we ran a letter-writing campaign to a noted newspaper columnist. She had counseled an obviously upset Tv wife that her husband was probably homosexual and that she ought to 'grab her hat and run.'" Beecroft reports that by the time the Society's campaign had ended, the columnist had checked in with some medical experts and changed her tune. "These days," says Beecroft, "The counselor tries to calm the wife's fears about her husband's sexuality and suggest counseling for the wife if she continues to be upset."

However not all counselors or medical experts are as neutral or as knowledgeable about transvestism. Beecroft reports that the medical establishment still tends to classify Tvism as a psychological disturbance.

Beecroft sees this attitude changing as experts gain more information. "What they don't realize," she says, "is that they only see the most disturbed Tvs and generalize about the rest of us on that basis. Our research shows that only a small minority of Tvs have ever sought any serious psychiatric treatment for their cross-dressing, and that many of those that have feel that it was a waste of time and money." Beecroft adds that the majority of Tvs that she has contacted would like to INCREASE their Tv activity, rather than ridding themselves of the desire.

Beecroft is quick to point out that "this doesn't mean that Tvs don't have their problems." One indication of the inner torment that many experience is the "purge". The Salvation Army and Goodwill have no idea of how much of their women's clothing comes from guilt-ridden Tvs," says Beecroft. "Few Tvs are able to entirely escape the guilt and shame that's heaped on us by society. Many of us have sworn off cross-dressing at least once, and thrown away or given away our entire wardrobes. Only the desire to dress eventually returns, and we're back into rebuilding our wardrobes once again. Most experts," continues Beecroft, "agree that there is no known "cure" for transvestism."

The Society, then, offers its members a positive alternative to the rather negative popular view of Tvs. A hope for the purging of purges, so to speak. It's outlook recalls that of other recent American social movements. Just as the movements for black dignity, gay pride and women's liberation did, the Society is saying that the Tv's main "problems" are popular attitudes that put them down and make them feel embarrassed for being who they unavoidably are. The Society is saying that rather than seeking the elusive and essentially illusory "cure", Tv's can and should seek peace of mind through self-acceptance and mutual aid."

Conservative estimates place the American Tv population at about 3% of all adult males, or

over 6 million men. Clearly, the Society, with about 500 members, still has a long way to go. Says Carol Beecroft, "We've come a long way in our first few years, especially in building up our internal ability to serve our sisters and to expand. I think we're ready now to start multiplying like rabbits."

There is, perhaps, a touch of irony here. The current resurgence of college sororities, once the finishing school for female students of the feminine ideal, is being accompanied by the growth of a sorority without any women members. A sorority dedicated to making femininity accessible to all people. As our culture staggers into 1980, it appears that yet another set of social stereotypes may join the ethnic, racial and sexual stereotypes that these past two decades of change have piled up along the roadway. LIFESTYLES EXPO -- CHI members participate in seminar in Chicago.

Several months ago, four members of CHI chapter, Karen (II-3-M), Rachel (II-14-B), Sharon (II-25-H) and Ruthann (Wi-14-L), participated in a Lifestyles Expo held in a meeting place in Chicago. The purpose of chapter involvement in this seminar was to inform both professionals and the general public of the realities of crossdressers. Subjects covered by our gals were: Who we are; what we are; what we want; what we do not want; and the purpose of Tri-Sigma.

Attendance at the meeting was good and the girls were kept busy for most of the nine hours there. At the request of the sponsoring organization the girls came as their 'brothers' because the city of Chicago still has rather archaic laws on the books prohibiting

crossdressing. In retrospect, according to Donna, this worked out well, as people approached Tri-Sigma's booth with open minds to ask what we were all about and discuss our point of view intelligently, rather than look upon us as curiosities. Aside from answering a lot of questions, literature from Tri-Sigma was available as well as several photo albums. Many people that the girls talked to seemed puzzled at first by the word 'cross-dresser' but responded readily to the term 'transvestite.'

Lengthy conversations were held with women. As a general rule, men apparently did not wish to seem to interested in the subject of "dressing in women's clothes" but the women wanted to understand why we wished to be like them, how we felt when dressed, how we shopped for clothing and why we wanted to take it upon ourselves the 'difficulty' of being a woman.

A conversation was held with representatives of Chicago's Gay community who informed the girls that they get many calls and letters from "straight" crossdressers who are looking for any kind of contact and these leaders wanted to know if CHI chapter could work out a system of referrals with them.

A couple who ran a computer dating service spoke with the gals, and though they were interested in what they had to say, and seemed willingly enough to work crossdressers into their program, it was generally agreed that this was wishful thinking and not too feasible at present. They inquired where they could get more information about Tri-Sigma;

The girls concluded, after speaking to several other people involved in alternative lifestyles (who were admittedly more experienced with such seminars than were our girls), that the mood of moderate toleration found in certain major cities is not indicative of the feelings of the nation as a whole and should be looked upon as an exception to the rule and as isolated incidents. They felt that we have a long way to go if we are to overcome the Anita Bryants of the world and gain any measure of acceptance

from main-stream America. They felt that those who can, must leave the comforts of our hotel rooms and mail boxes and get to work, and quit leaving our collective tasks and responsibilities to the Carol Beecroft's of the world, who must face society virtually alone. All in all, the day was well spent. They helped educate some people, made some personal contacts that could be helpful in the future and were perhaps able to steer a few of our unknown sisters in the right direction. Beth's SUPER Weekend

Friday morning, I got up and enjoyed a pot of tea sitting in the sunlight that was pouring in the windows. Decided to take a bath and do my legs. At this point I should mention that I have always worn high necked dresses/blouses, and sweaters simply because I do have a bit of hair on my chest. I have considered taking it off before, but had not worked up the courage. Well, Friday was the day. I use Nair and have always been very careful with it (as the article in *Femme Mirror* pointed out). I put tiny bits of tape over my nipples to protect them and went to work. I was totally astounded and pleased with the results. Went and got my copy of Virginia's *How To Be A Woman Though Male*, and studied the section on how to use the medical tape to produce cleavage. Experimented a good deal and was very surprised with the results. Tried on each of my nightgowns, both of which have low necklines. The appearance was very pleasing, and I immediately decided that I had to take this still fur-

ther. In other words, to do my thing. Set the camera up on a tripod, made sure I had enough film, and did a thorough cleaning job on the room where I was going to take the pictures. Then took the tape off.

Had lunch and then laid down for a restful two hour nap. Got up and then bathed again. Used the tape, modifying my efforts again. *Very* careful makeup job, evening style with very dramatic eyes. Put on my under clothes including a low cut cleavage bra which I filled out with the smaller of Virginia's bust inserts. My closet gave me nothing to show off the cleavage except two blouses that could be unbuttoned -- tried on both of them and took pictures of each outfit. Then I really began to get the hang of things. Next was a black, one-piece bathing suit which I wore with four inch black patent leather shoes -- then the nightgowns, taking pictures all the time. Then to my GG's wardrobe -- she is smaller than I am but her back sip gowns could be pulled on far enough to make a very pretty picture from the front. Selected four gowns and one jumpsuit from her wardrobe and went to work. I really thought that the jumpsuit would be my favorite and tried it on first. The effect was very good -- sleek and slender -- many pictures again -- then started trying on the gowns. It turns out that my favorite was the simplest one -- full length in a lightweight, very dark purple crushed velvet -- deep V neckline edged with a two inch border of white satin. I had opened a bottle of white wine during this little escapade, and posed some of the shots closeup with me raising my wineglass. Finally, at two o'clock (a.m.) Sat Saturday morning, having made a large dent in the bottle of wine, and having taken 72 pictures I had accomplished what I set out to do. The tape and the makeup quickly came off, and I got into a nightgown to relax a bit before going to bed.

Saturday morning -- up very late, pictures to the drug store (brother), groceries, and then to a department store where I bought 40 pieces of Corning's Corelle ware and one of Ultima's "Face Case." One of the local Tri-Sig girls and her GG had invited me over to dinner that evening and, of course, I went dressed. My black blouse that I like

so much and a grey, mid-calf full skirt, and my black high boots. I had left the two top buttons of the blouse undone — this was noticed as was the lack of hair and both were commented on. I responded by unbuttoning the third button (shameless hussey that I am, did you chuckle?), and this blew both their minds. Then came the questions, how did you do it, what did you use, how is the tape put, is it uncomfortable, etc, etc. Dinner and drinks were very pleasant as they always are with those two girls and the evening went by entirely too fast.

Sunday morning, up and enjoying both my tea and the Sunday papers. One of the outfits in my wardrobe is a maternity outfit. Acquired it as a result of an article in *Transvestia* No. 83. Maureen Warfield was featured as the leading lady in that issue, and in an article she described her fondness for dressing up in maternity clothes. I got rather curious and wrote to her through the contact service asking her to explain exactly how she did it. She responded with a lovely three page personal letter, and included nine pages of diagrams, templates, comments, etc. Following her instructions I had experimented with this before — but always for short periods of time — two hours or so. Sunday morning I recalled that in the article Maureen had mentioned that she once spent an entire week, 24 hours a day, wearing the outfit, and how at the conclusion of the week she felt totally locked into the role. It has taken me considerably less time than that — I put this outfit on Sunday morning at about 8:30 and as I type this it is 2:30 — 30 hours later. I find the role definitely different — (believe me, if I was a GG I'd be on the "pill") by following Maureen's instructions for a full term pregnancy and by making the breasts

suitably large and heavy you add 25 plus pounds to your body. Whenever you walk, and you don't really walk — just sort of waddle, your shoulders are back, and your pelvic area thrust forward to compensate for balance. Very low heeled shoes are necessary and you find yourself sitting down and resting a good deal. Any sort of activity poops you out in a hurry. As an example, after I did the dishes last night, I had to sit down. I was very happy yesterday afternoon to just sit and read or work on my latchhook rug.

Virtually every movement you make is very awkward, and some movements must be planned in advance. You quickly begin to understand and appreciate the feelings and problems that a GG encounters even in the simplest of activities. As examples — sleeping, going to the bathroom, giving yourself a sponge bath, getting up from chairs or from a bed, and just plain sitting at a table. This is definitely a rather unique experience. But it is also one that I would have reservations about suggesting to any other TV. I am now wondering how I am going to feel when I take this outfit off.

Some of Maureen's comments were very interesting. Apparently she goes everywhere during her "pregnancy," and she stressed the fact that to do so you must be absolutely perfect since people tend to be more talkative, and your movements are inhibited. Since I tend to be very cautious anyways, this outfit has definitely been confined to the apartment. No one has seen me in it, although I have taken some pictures.

She also remarked that any appearance in front of my GG in the outfit or any discussion of it would probably be unwise. I agree totally. She indicated that most TVs would regard such an outfit as being one which a transsexual would

wear. I see the logic to her statement and suppose that I could agree with it, but I know that is not how I feel. To my mind each of us wishes to experience those things that a GG does, and this is one of those things. Perhaps I am oversimplifying the subject, but never-the-less, it is my impression.

I am going to be rather unhappy if I have to go to work tomorrow — I have enjoyed this weekend totally.

SEX CHANGES AND THE REAL WORLD

Sex change operations -- while they may do wonders for a certain tennis player's career -- produce a lifestyle far from the Nirvana envisioned by many applicants for the operation, according to a follow up study by psychiatrist John Meyer of the John Hopkins Hospital. Meyer followed 32 persons (including 24 biological males) who received the operation and compared them to 66 (52 males) who did not have the sex change.

While he found little difference between the two groups in levels of socioeconomic advancement and emotional stability, Meyer did detect a postoperative pattern common to most who went through with the change: during an initial phase of elation extending from two to five years, such patients are often exhibitionistic, seekings of jobs calling for considerable bodily exposure. After that period, however, most are 'overtaken by the painful realization that nothing has really changed except certain elements of bodily configuration.'

Preexisting emotional and personality problems reemerge and the patient begins to realize that he or she is only 'facsimile' of what was hoped for. "It's highly questionable," Meyer says, "whether sex realignment per se could be considered personally and socioeconomically rehabilitative."

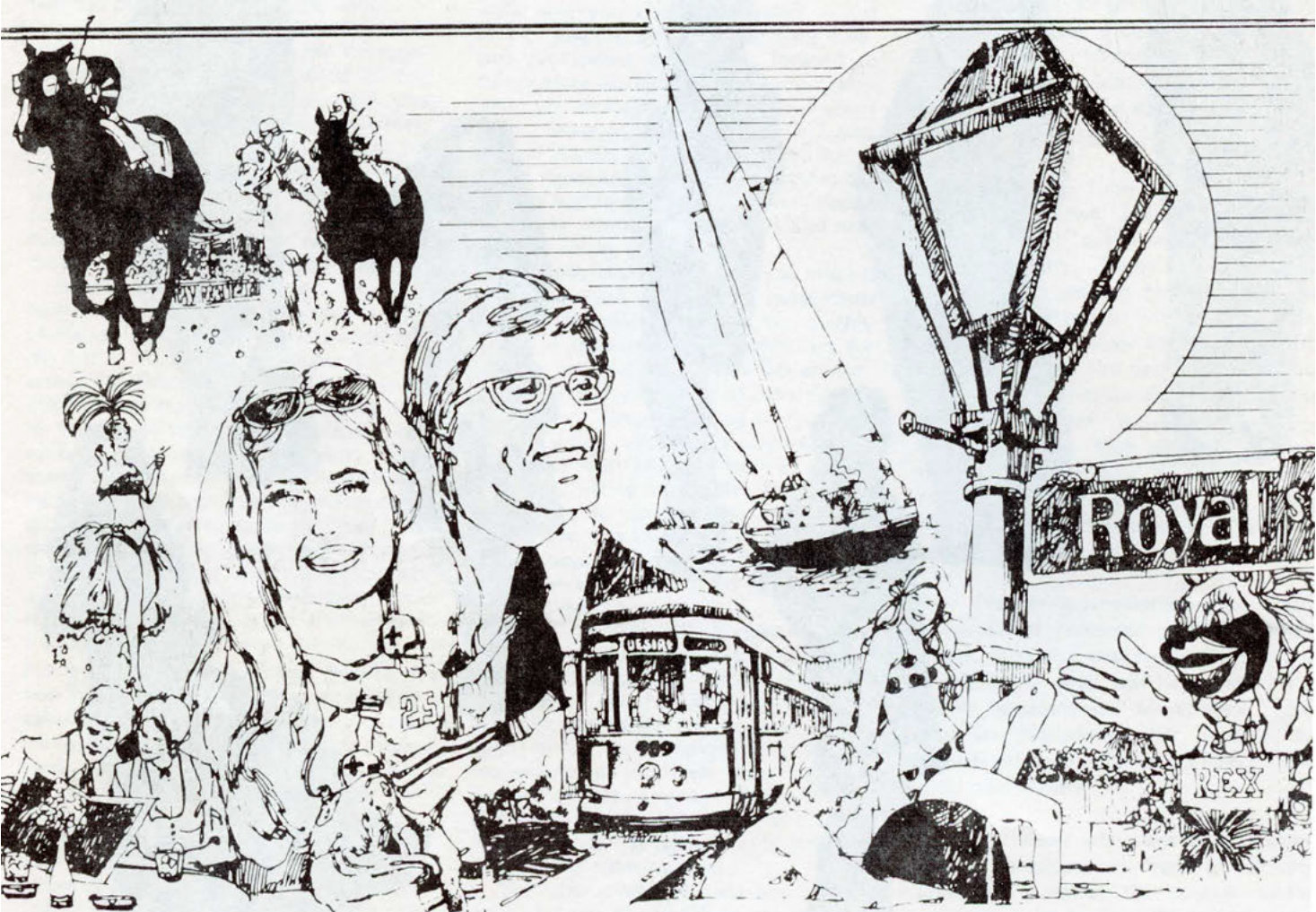

I have personally observed wives who have been very upset because of thoughtless things said by "transsexuals". I have seen members stay away from meetings because their wives were so annoyed. I have seen the family life threatened by such thoughtlessness. Unfortunately, this has happened even at Tri-Sigma meetings when one of our regular TV members suddenly decided that "he" was really a "she"! BINGO!! There goes another wife - all the way to a "D" category. I have had many members throughout the world tell me personally that the MAIN reason they belonged to TRi-Sigma in the first place was because we only admit heterosexual TVs. And because I believe that most heterosexual TVs do not want their wives upset and disturbed, we will REMAIN an organization for the heterosexual TV - only!

So, how else are we different? Well, of all organizations for TVs (assorted and all), only Tri-Sigma has a well organized headquarters with authority delegated in the field to leaders such as Division leaders, Regional Coordinators and chapter leaders. True, there are "independent" organizations usually consisting of one chapter and at least one other "national" organization in existence, but none of them have the organizational structure that we have been able to form and, as a result, no organization has

been able to obtain the large amount of dedicated sisters that has Tri-Sigma -- dedicated sisters who freely give many hundreds of hours of their time each year for the benefit of those whom they serve!

I also have been able to observe the "periodicals" which other TV organizations put out. NONE of these other organizations put out a periodical with the professional quality, look and contents that you see in the FEMME MIRROR. And while mentioning our magazine I wish to thank Karen (Ca-30-G) for all the help that she has done for our magazine in an effort to raise the professional standards of the FEMME MIRROR. Due to some personal problems which have forced her to give up her position, your Editor and national leader has taken over the work of getting the FEMME MIRROR out. This issue is quite late but it has taken me a considerable amount of time to get organized so that I could assume Karen's duties. Since I am interested in doing a professional job, like KAREN, I have personally invested in an IBM electronic Composing machine which certainly helps keep the standards high. This issue of the Mirror was typeset by your Editor as well as pasted up for the printer. This composing machine is a wonderful thing - and is expensive as all heck! It ran me almost £9,000.00. The expense of the machine is MINE and not Tri-Sigma's. I hope that you will feel that this issue of the FEMME MIRROR is in keeping with the calibre originated by Karen. You will note that this

issue is a DOUBLE issue in order to get us up to date.

And the "programs"..... I do have goals and objectives for our sorority since we are not merely a social organization. I want to have our sorority serve as a source of inspiration and assistance for heterosexual TVs. As an example, I have recognized the need of our sisters to locate stores where they can shop without embarrassment. This is because I know that this need is uppermost in most of our member's minds. That is why I recently announced the development of a "letter" which can be sent to various shops and stores with the intention of securing their assistance in helping our sisters. And, already, we have had a number of stores return the little questionnaire on the back of the letter. So we are acquiring more and more places where you can shop with comfort. We'll have more if YOU do your part in mailing out the letters to businesses.

An additional need is the development of chapters within the national organization. We do have a number of chapters, old and newly born, serving the needs of our sisters in various areas. More are gradually being formed.

And, of course, our "forwarding service" is being modernized and you will learn more about this as you continue to read. This kind of service is a needed one and is best developed in OUR organization.

I still have visions of doing more for the wives -- more than we have been able to do so far. I have experimented in the Los Angeles area with a Sunday afternoon gathering of husbands and wives and where no crossdressing was allowed. Interestingly, the gatherings were successful. I know that the wives really liked the opportunity to get to meet other wives and to know our members as men! But we need to translate this pilot program into something on a national basis. But, I cannot do it all and I need a dedicated sister to assist me in this particular program. After all, a happy wife usually means a happy TV and perhaps even an "accepting" wife! I know HOW to do it,

but am limited because of the time I already put in and thus await for a volunteer. How about you? But, what "other" organization is even thinking of such things? ONLY Tri-Sigma!!

And there is the matter of the "escort service" which I know would be greatly appreciated by many sisters. What I have in mind is the locating of females who would not object to going out with our sisters on shopping excursions and dinner dates. We have so many single TVs who would love to have the sympathetic assistance of a female who would help them with their hair, makeup and in the selection of clothing. I know that we need this program and so do you! But, again, I need help. We have already located three or four such females without even looking (one just wrote to me recently from the state of Washington -- she really wants to go out with our sisters).

A brief word about my work -- like you, I work for a living. In my case, I have a Property Management office downtown and that takes about 45 hours a week -- sometimes more. I also put in a considerable amount of time in publishing TRANSVESTIA as well as getting out the orders and doing the paper work involved with CHEVALIER PUBLICATIONS -- which I now own. I already mentioned that I put in an average of 20 hours a week with Tri-Sigma work. There is very little time available any more for me to assume any more work. As it is, Norma and I do not get much chance to get out with the exception of going 180 miles to Los Angeles for the Alpha Chapter meeting. So, I certainly do need some assistance from more sisters.

All TVs need some sort of a social life as a Tv. Recognizing this Tri-Sigma sponsors a national convention. At this convention the sisters are allowed to live as girls for a number of days. They are taken on tours and often mix with the public in general. The experiences of those who participate in such activities are never forgotten.

So as to those aforementioned questions you earlier read, I say to

such people, "read what I have been saying and, after that, look around and ask yourself, 'What is there that compares favorably with Tri-Sigma in meeting the needs of heterosexual transvestites?'"

SO -- WHERE DO WE GO FROM HERE?

The year 1980 should see some interesting changes in our sorority as well as a healthy increase in membership. The reason for this optimism is that there are going to be some needed changes made in policy -- changes that have been needed for a long time. NONE of these changes will hurt the sorority or its members and none of the changes will decrease the security system within the sorority.

A discussion of these changes and the reasons behind them might help the reader appreciate why it was necessary to make them in the first place.

For some time there has been an under-current of complaints by many sisters -- especially those who belong to established chapters. Among those complaints we can list the following:

A' The requirement that prospective members must PURCHASE the book UNDERSTANDING CROSSDRESSING' before being allowed to join our sorority. There have been a number of very highly qualified sisters who would not buy the book either because they were already familiar with its contents or felt that the purchase of the book was merely a "ripoff" so that someone could make some money in the sale of the book. We certainly have lost a number of good people that way!

B. Another problem has been the policy which restricts attendance at chapter meetings to members only. There have been hundreds of times when qualified prospective members wanted to have the opportunity to visit a chapter meeting to see if our organization was suitable for them. But they were turned away EVEN though someone in the chapter could vouch for their qualifications as a heterosexual TV. We have lost additional members that way. What is interesting to
