
Real Mona Lisa Portrait Is Discovered! An exclusive report.

The art world was shocked today over the announcement by Italian officials of the discovery of what is purported to be the <u>real</u> portrait of *Mona Lisa*.

Readers of this newsletter may recall that Volume 1, number 1, carried a story about an art historian who concluded that the portrait we know as *Mona Lisa* is in fact a portrait of Leonardo DaVinci in drag. A computer analysis of the *Mona Lisa* and of a self-portrait of DaVinci showed a high degree of correlation in facial features bewteen the two paintings.

Now the real story has come to light due to the recent discovery of a letter written by DaVinci. The letter describes in excruciating detail the agony that DaVinci experienced over the commission to paint Mona's portrait. (She was the daughter of a prominent Italian businessman.-Ed.) To Pass Or Not To Pass. Some Thoughts by JoAnn Roberts

I so often hear from TV sisters about how they went out somewhere and "passed". They are so excited that they were able to be out in public and be themselves that I just don't have the heart to tell them the truth. The truth is that very, very few TVs are able to pass. What is happening is that the girls are confusing social tolerance or indifference with being accepted as a female. More often than not, John Q. and Jane Q. Public are too wrapped up in their own worlds to notice us as we "pass" by them. If we have done a good job of makeup and our clothing is appropriate for the time and season, they will assume that we are what we appear to be; women. That, however, is not passing as a female. One slip is all it takes to jar the attention of the casual observer into the realization that something is amiss, and that you ain't a miss.

At the risk of creating unnecessary labels, one can postulate a series of stages which, with a great deal of practice, can lead to passing. The first stage is one which I just described, being casually mistaken as a female. The next stage

is when your appearance can withstand close scrutiny, say from within two feet of another person. The third stage is more difficult, but obtainable for many, and that is a brief conversation. If you can reach stage three you're doing great and you probably are one of those people who really can "pass". The next obvious stage is to be able to engage in prolonged conversation and not have your listener "read" you. The last and ultimate stage occurs when you are accepted for a female regardless of your mode of dress.

Now think about this. It takes most transexuals about two years of living full time as a woman to develop their new personas. They spend 24 hours a day working on their movements, actions, speech patterns, etc., so that they will be able to live and work within our society and be accepted as a female. Isn't it a little presumptious to assume that a TV who gets out in public once or twice a year, or even once or twice a month, is passing? I have had sisters recount to me their exploits in shopping malls or downtown areas and I tell you they would not fool my three year old niece into thinking they were women.

So what happens? They delude themselves into believing that they can now go anywhere, anytime when crossdressed. And, the next time they get "read", they're crushed.

The goal that both TVs and TSs should be working toward is one of self-confidence and internal validation. I have heard stories about TVs who "look down" upon those who do not appear totally feminine and I have heard stories about TSs who have committed suicide because they could not make the grade as a woman. In both cases these people are overlooking the more important aspect of self worth. Your value as a human being is intrinisic and not in any way related to whether or not you can pass.

Being the best you can be is a laudable goal in any endeavor, but "passing" should not be the end all of your existence. The question to ask is, "Can I pass for a Human Being?" When the answer is "YES", then be proud of yourself!

Transvestites and pre-operative transsexuals in Greece last month [FEB] formed a political party which they hope will stem the tide of police harassment against crossdressing men, the *Philadelphia Gay News* reports.

Haralambos Tamoutsides, a 6foot gay TV in his late 30s who is also known as "Aloma," was elected president of the Panhellenic Non-aligned Movement for Equality. He said that since the first case of AIDS was reported in Greece in 1987, the police have stepped up their harassment of the crossdressers, many of whom work as prostitutes. Police said more than 100 of them work in the Athens area alone.

The group has applied to the Greek Supreme Court for official recognition. In their application, the five-member executive board for the Panhellenic Non-aligned Movement for Equality pledged that they will not undertake any actions against the state and that they will not try to overthrow the county's democratic regime.

Greek transvestites and transsexuals who work in the sex industry already have organized an unofficial union. In addition to holding regular meetings, the union sponsors and annual ball and a beauty contest.

Looking for a special treat for yourself or for someone special? Then how about the Panty-of-the-Month club?

Former model Lila Williams started the business two years ago and already has more than a thousand subscribers in all 50 states. For \$16.50 per pair per month (or \$32.50 for the deluxe membership) "members" receive a pair of nationally known panties guaranteed to be worth more than the monthly charge. Many subscribers have

the panties sent to someone else.

Although Williams says the service is designed for men who want to give something special to their wives or women friends, women could also use the service for their crossdressing spouses.

Williams says that most of her subscribers are men and that the average customer is a 37-year-old married man. It is probably a safe bet that some of those "average" customers are buying panties for themselves. That wouldn't surprise Williams who recognizes that its more fun to buy and wear panties than briefs. "There is so much more range of color and style in panties than in briefs," she says.

And speaking of "unmentionables," Fredericks of Hollywood reports that 75 percent of its customers are men, and that most mail orders are placed by men. Hmmmmm.

Danny LaRue, the British female impersonator whom Noel Coward called "the most professional, the most witty, and the most utterly charming man in the business," is writing his biography. It will be called From Drags to Riches.

A Colorado woman was recently acquitted of first degree murder charges after she testified that she killed her transvestite husband hours after she heard him having sex with a man because she was afraid that he would infect her with AIDS.

Kay Eichheim told the jury that after she heard her husband having sex with a man who was never identified, she became despondent over her fear of AIDS, and that she took a gun in to the bedroom where he was sleeping, intending to kill herself, Instead, she said in a report published in the *Philadelphia Gay News*, she pulled the trigger while the gun was pointed at his head. Although no evidence was presented that confirmed that Daniel Eichheim had AIDS or had been exposed to the deadly virus, the jury in rural Weld County, Colo., an area just south of the Wyoming border, apparently believed that his sexual activities put her at risk.

Eichheim's crossdressing, although a surprise revelation at the trial, was well-known to his wife of 27 years. According to testimony, when the two went shopping, Daniel would comment on women's clothes that would look good on him and also fit her. Photos of him crossdressed were presented at the trial.

Kay testified that she "endured" her husband's bedroom activities. But the couples's daughter told the court that her mother once confided that the pair enjoyed a wonderful sex life.

An Air Force physician stationed in San Antonio, Texas, is facing military charges after he was given a traffic ticket and police found him in drag.

While he was reportedly cruising a San Antonio bar area, the 28-year-old captain was pulled over by police for having expired license plates. When stopped by the civilian authorities he was wearing a denim miniskirt, a matching blouse and hat, black lace stockings and high heels. He told police that he was crossdressed on a bet, the *Philadelphia Gay News* reports.

San Antonio police turned him over to military authorities who later said that he would be charged with violating Air Force regulations.

IFGE Convention 88 Report

I don't know that I can give you an accurate picture of the 1988 IFGE convention since I was very busy while I was there. I am sure I missed a lot of activities. Upon arrival, Alison Laing and I checked into our room and immediately began to get ready for the Wednesday buffet/social/orientation meeting. I met many new people and had a chance to renew some old aquaintances. I spent a lot of time with the people from ETVC and the Chicago Gender Society.

Upon introduction I received many supportive comments about the Renaissance News and the editorials on IFGE. As a result I was conscripted onto two IFGE committees, Publications and Marketing. Both of these met for almost a total of 8 hours each during the course of Thursday, Friday and Saturday. We made a number of recommendations about the Tapestry and marketing, some of them pretty radical. I could not stay for the entire Board meeting on Sunday, so I don't know the outcome of the recommendations. If I hear soon. I'll let you all know.

We really kicked off the convention Thursady with three one-hour sessions on How To Form An Organization. It was well attended and Gloria Peters of ETVC did an excellent job of assembling panelists and useful materials. I also participated in panels on Marketing and Networking. Alison's "Positive Action" session was a big hit since it was one of the few sessions to have view graphs and handouts. Her session inspired several people to brainstorm their own positive action projects. One group from Canada, TAM, is going to try to raise money for a Universal Unitarian Church that was burned down by a disgruntled and disturbed TS in Montreal.

My session on "Producing A

Quality Newsletter" was lightly attended but enthusiastically supported. Again, overheads and handouts helped. My panelists were Wendi Danielle (A Rose, Az), Gloria Peters (ETVC, Ca), Linda McKim (CHIC, Ca), and Jan Rupard (B&P, Tx). They also did an outstanding job of discussing and explaing their approaches to their newsletters.

On Friday morning I spent most of my time in the professional sessions with Ariadne Kane of the Outreach Institute. Over lunch we discussed some mutually beneficial projects (more on those later). The professional sessions which were opened to general attendence were packed, particularly the Niela Miller/Mariette Allen session and Dr. Docter's session. I think this points out the need to get the two cultures into a mixed medium for better communication. (BTW, Mariette announced that she has a publisher for her book!)

I understand that the D&S panel was very good as were the TS rap groups. These were scheduled Ad Hoc and still attendence was high. IFGE needs better coordination for next year and has to put more emphasis on the TS community and personal development to maintain a good balance.

No, it wasn't all work and no play. The Chicago Gender Society provided a bus tour of Chi-town which stopped at the famous Baton club and other welcoming sites on Thursday night. Friday night a bunch of us invaded a little bar called Charlie's Angels and had a marvelous time. And again, after the banquet on Saturday, the hard-liners went off to the wee hours of the morning. I could not keep up with Alison and soon gave up trying. That girl has more energy than any three people I know!

Other events of interest: Merissa received the 2nd Virginia Prince Award for Lifetime Service to the community. I honestly and sincerely believe she deserves it. Now, if she would just let go of a few reigns, we'd make a little more progress. But the "piece de resistance" and "coup de grace" for the entire convention was honoring Christine Jorgensen at the banquet on Saturday night. Sheila Kirk had us all sign a scroll and it was presented to Christine after dinner. She was a marvelous speaker and was very proud of us and proud to be with us. I will always remember shaking her hand and having a chance to chat with her, however brief it was.

So, you are probably all wondering about all the noises I made prior to the convention. Well, to be honest, there are still problems. The production of the Tapestry is still in the Stone Age, at least for the next issue, which Merissa promised would be out by April 1. Tapestry does have a computer and PageMaker, but I'm not sure that they know how to handle either. So, we've still got nuts and bolts problems. I have been assured that anyone who paid for a four issue subscription will receive four issues. If some of our recommendations are accepted, look for some changes in the schedule and format of Tapestry.

The convention format needs to be overhauled before it will be interesting to the mainstream of our community. There is just too much organization stuff that was rehashed from last year and not enough personal or professional development. IFGE learned the same hard lesson that we learned about the professional community; not much response because of poor marketing and short lead times.

IFGE as an umbrella organization has some serious kinks to work out before it will be embraced by the majority of groups around the country. For example, I could not find anyone with a copy of the continued on last page

According to designs debuted at the International Men's and Boy"s wear Trade Show in Paris this February, males will sport a feminine look this coming fall and winter.

Flowers will be a major motif in menswear. Paul Smith, a British designer whose traditional clothes are popular with young professionals, showed vests decorated with lilies of the valley and other blossoms. Other designers present models wearing shawls or scarves draped over their pinstripe suits. Soft bow ties, lace hankies tucked into hip pockets, ruffled shirt cuffs for day wear, and crocheted suit lapels also blurred the line between men's and women's fashions, according to a report in the Philadelphia Gay News.

So, how does it feel to be a trendsetter?

Be thankful that you weren't a crossdresser several hundred years ago. Back then some of the standard beauty practices used by women could have made you sick or possibly killed you. For example:

Constitution or the By-laws, Board members included. That is ludicrous! The Board voted to increase its size from 15 to 21 and I am still trying to figure out that rationale.
