THOU SHALT NOT CROSS DRESS - Winnie

I spotted an article in the *Times-Union* on August 25, page B-2. The NY State Division of Parole has issued a set of guidelines to monitor rapists and child molesters. Sections of the guidelines resemble a sort of Ten Commandments for those tempted by sexual deviation. At the top of the list of "special conditions", at least according to the reporter, is: "I shall not cross dress or participate in sexual fetishes."

There were no statistics quoted to justify this ranking of cross-dressing as the #1 deviation. In the many reports of actual sex crimes I have read, I have never seen cross-dressing by the perpetrator mentioned as a factor, unless pulling a stocking over one's head is construed to be such. I suppose there may be instances where someone, taking their cue from the Big Bad Wolf, may have dressed up to allay fears and get close to their victim. But this is not someone who *likes* to cross dress, and denial of this privilege would be the least restrictive condition of parole. It seems that the authorities and media reporters cannot get it through their thick skulls that guys who *like* to cross dress *like* women and may want to *be* women, at least part time, or want to have fun with the parody in the case of drag queens. Who on Earth would want to dress up as someone they violently hated? Rape is a crime of violence against women, as the feminists keep telling us.

The utter fiction of sex-crazed cross-dressers has been promulgated by too many Hollywood "slasher" movies. like "Psycho", "Dressed to Kill" and "Silence of the Lambs". This cruel prejudice against cross-dressers perpetuates a myth and makes it difficult for us to gain acceptance from our wives, girlfriends, and family. As well as from ourselves.

There is only one actual case I can recall that even remotely resembles these horror tales. But even more chilling because of the sheer tragedy of the incident, which I believe can be laid squarely at the feet of homosexual / transgender prejudice and the terror of discovery this causes.

It happened in West Germany sometime between the Summers of 1945 and 1950. I was living in England during this time, and spotted the story in a few paragraphs on the inside pages of the *Daily Telegraph*. Must have been a small town, because I didn't recognize it as one of the places the Allies had bombed, which is how I learned my German geography. As best as I can remember after almost 50 years, the gist was as follows:

The body of a young woman was discovered behind some bushes. Stark naked. The medical examiner was surprised. She had *not* been raped. Just a clean, neat strangulation. The police caught a suspect, a young man. Searched his room and found her clothes stashed away. Arrested him and obtained a confession. They were astonished - the only motive seemed to be the theft of her clothes. Not a sex crime. Just an ordinary murder to cover up petty robbery. This has stuck in my mind for all these years because I was then a teen-ager, and racking my brains trying to figure out some way of laying my hands on women's clothes without revealing my desires. I scanned the newspapers for weeks thereafter, searching for a follow-up. But none appeared.

Think about it, next time you say "I'd kill for that dress."

LETTER TO EDITOR - Brittany

Dear TGIC:

You have shown nothing but good faith and honesty with me. I guess I have been dragging my feet about joining and that's not fair to you.

I have been a TV since I can remember and I will always be: it's a good and enjoyable part of me that I would never give up. I have probably been slow in joining mostly because it's almost impossible to get out during the week, so I probably wouldn't be able to attend any meetings. But the desperation and loneliness of not sharing or being able to share this is overwhelming at times, so maybe I can meet someone I can talk to, or correspond with every now and then, and talk about what we all love about ourselves.

The reason I am writing is, I would like some information if possible. I have decided I have to tell my wife of this, and I have to do it in an intelligent way. I have considered the pros and cons. The bottom line is, they are both important to me in their own way. I really can't or don't want to live if I can't have both. We are very close and have a solid relationship. We don't socialize because we are both former drinkers who don't drink anymore. We are on our second marriage and have been together about 8 years. I have told her that there is something I want to talk to her about, to lessen the shock. She is already playing the guessing game. So far, it's been mass murderer, want to start drinking again. She has experience in security and has a reputation for not missing anything. Her mind will be working overtime today and she very well might start to add 2 and 2, such as the chiffon skirt that came in the mail a while back, or the lipstick she found that wasn't hers. When we reach this point I know her main concerns are "am I gay?" or "am I headed for the operation?".

I have to assure her that I am a heterosexual CD and that she is very important to me, and it's not a matter of me not loving her. I really want to make all the right moves and not do anything stupid. In the March issue you mentioned the LCL Chapter of Tri-Ess that meets in Schenectady and that they are more oriented for heterosexual couples. I really want my act together as much as possible. I have read all I can. I don't want to have it be a shock to her. I would also like to have some control if possible.

Also, in your June issue you had an article by Barbara Jean Jasen which was extremely helpful and interesting. I am so scared and nervous that I don't know what will happen or what I will do if the outcome is bad. I can't go on like this, not sharing and hiding, and I can't be content on dressing for a couple of hours every two or three months. Life is too short for both counts, which mean more than anything to me.

Well, thanks for your help and I hope it's not too much trouble.

Dear Brittany:

Your predicament is very common among crossdressers, and shared by other members of TGIC. I am now separated from my wife (for other reasons) and never told her, so I can't advise you from personal experience. However, I have talked to others and read extensively; the consensus is that the wife should be told before marriage. But after 8 years. that advice won't do you any good!

The next best thing is to tell her about your cross-gender feelings and dressing honestly and factually, without showing any guilt or shame (which you may have felt formerly). Have some accurate written information handy, and persuade her to read it before jumping to the wrong conclusions and going off the deep end. If she's angry and wonders why you didn't tell her sooner, plead fear that her reaction might be adverse - it's a Catch 22 situation. Then, when she's ready, it would be helpful to meet and talk with other couples. If you can get to one of the crossdressing "conventions", there are usually special sessions for couples, or wives alone.

There are two good books by Peggy Rudd, the wife of a crossdresser: My Husband Wears My Clothes^{*} and Crossdressing With Dignity. Also, there is The Transvestite and his Wife^{*} by Virginia Prince and Coping with Crossdressing by JoAnn Roberts, who are crossdressers. All are available from IFGE, and two^{*} can be borrowed from the TGIC library.

WHAT IS A WOMAN? - Jackie

About 1980, a few years after my gender reassignment surgery. I was going to Nancy Bernstein Sklar, Ph.D. for voice therapy and a complete feminization, including lessons in how to serve tea. She was also an unlicensed psychotherapist and one of the best I ever had. I was struggling with my identity as a woman. I wanted to know whether I was really, really a woman

Dr. Sklar said to me

"Jackie, what is a woman?"

"Well," I thought, "a woman is a person with a vagina and breasts."

My therapist threw her notebook down in absolute disgust and announced,

"Jackie, I have a homework assignment for you. Get a note pad and clipboard and pretend you're taking a survey for your thesis, if you like. Ask ten women the question "What is a woman?"

So I did. In Grand Central Station, New York.

Typical answers were:

"A woman is lovely, soft and caring."

"A woman is a person who will get married and raise children."

"A woman is incomplete without a man."

But not one woman said:

"A woman is a person with a vagina and breasts."

Today I believe I am a woman simply because I choose to believe I am a woman and I feel good about that and myself.

back wife Now to mУ and her non-recognition of my thoughts and feelings. It's the very same thing. I reacted with flat out rage. Here on paper, after having gone through it, the psychology of it looks so cut and dried. Boy, did I go through Hell learning this! Remember my discussing a paragraph back how blind you are going through it?

Recently, reading a copy of Robert Subby's "Healing The Family Within" (which I highly recommend). I came across the statement that the ultimate message the co-dependent acts out and lives out is "Don't be", (Don't yourself, most certainly don't be be assertive, don't examine your motives). This denial and it is the bedrock of is co-dependency. I've figured out most of Carole's reason for being the way she is, but that's not for me to say here. She rejects the reality of herself so I guess she has the right to reject the reality of others. She certainly rejected me! She is in absolute screaming, granite wall denial! Her life is a mess because she is a mess.

I stuck out the marriage because I took the vows seriously, still having a sense of commitment to God. I have to say that the religious trip and the marriage have quite seriously disturbed my ideas of what God is about personally in my life. Lots of lies have gone down the drain.

We did go to marriage counseling, one counsellor after another. These were county assisted programs. We didn't figure we could afford a \$100 an hour therapist. They all focused on ME trying to find out what MY problem was because I was going through extreme anger and rage. One therapist saw the picture right away and realized Carole was driving me nuts. She was far too brutally confrontive to have any effect on Carole. We went through five therapists because they came and went, not us. The last one I gave up on because he just didn't have any answers. I do not recommend county assisted programs. You must shop for therapy. There's a lotta jerks out there with diplomas and nothing else.

Just before leaving Carole for good, and before making up my mind to do that. I saw the lady who helped me years back, the same one who straightened me out with regard to my mother. In one session. I was describing things and she interrupted me. "Tom, what I hear you telling me is Carole is driving you nuts". ZING !! Suddenly I'm back on course with understanding of what the problem is. Carole is very, very intelligent, and I was convinced for a few years that it was all on my shoulders, and what a load it was! It was Carole's problem all along. My reactions, and only that, were my problem. I compulsively left again and again until I left for good. I now understand that to be inevitable. No healing would occur with her.

Concerning my transvestism and Carole, I told her about it when we got serious together, and it was no big deal with her. She even wanted to explore it with me in our sex life, but as I said, I was under this religious conviction not to crossdress.

In September 1991, I left Carole for good. I had been compulsively leaving for the past couple of years. I've learned that compulsion is very subtle, but still an inevitable driving force. Nobody holds a gun to your head, and nobody is taking over your arms, or legs, or your brain, but resist and resist, and you're gonna do it anyway. That's compulsion. Sometimes it's identified only through 20-20 hindsight.

I got a room in Schenectady. After a couple of months by myself, my head cleared, and as I've said, I began to see how Carole's behavior fits into the pattern of a co-dependent in deep denial. The most significant lesson I've learned from the marriage so far is to see clearly what a horrible, serious debilitating crippler denial is.

There is another extraordinary syndrome I want to discuss. During my religious trip, I had the "Night Terrors". There was a different reaction to the deep emotional stress of my marriage. I had experienced a genuine "Jekyll and Hyde" phenomenon. This was so real to me, the only thing missing was the potion. In the "Hyde" state, my whole mindset changed, along with my countenance and body language. It was a truly schizoid experience. This was an approximately monthly occurrence for five of the six years of my marriage. It took the first year for it to build up. I very rarely was able to see it coming. Most of the time, I would be sticking it out. Then I would change, and getting away was the only thing to do and all else mattered not. Any opposition to this ENRAGED me. I am just about dead certain this happens to a lot of other guys enmeshed in domestic violence situations. Studies of domestic violence situations have shown cyclical violence episodes. I attended night class domestic violence therapy courses during my marriage. It did little good because it never addressed the real problem.

Another mechanism I've learned about through personal experience is the self image. At various times I have been given nicknames that stuck to me for prolonged periods. Two of the best examples were my college days and my hippie days. The college was only two years, being a community college. The hippie thing lasted years, and years, some of that still in existence today in certain places among certain people. My character and personality seem to flourish much more readily under an assumed name when used constantly instead of my given name. It's as if my given name, Tom, is irrevocably associated with a suppressed, inferior self image, and taking another frees me from that stigma. Guess what's happening with Tina these days, she's flourishing. Tom isn't doing so bad either now that piece of psychology is unearthed.

I also mentioned before that compulsion to dress up was strongest after a prolonged period of misery. The "alter ego" of the whole persona of the transvestite certainly provides an escape mechanism out of a battered self image.

So how goes it now? I've been out of the closet as Tina for about two years now. I've done stuff that I've fancied all my life, and for many years figured that I would never really do that. Not just going shopping and passing, but cultivating places where I go repeatedly as a woman, and I am accepted with no problem. It's a blast and a high. Do I get read? Yes, on occasion. My sense of who and what I am is healthier and stronger than ever before, so being read is no big thing at all.

Of course, I am still going through changes, and there are more changes to But now there are more pleasant come. changes than bad ones. I have even received healing through dreams. A while ago, in a dream the message came through to me "That farm is gone, isn't it. It's not there, it's gone. I can't go back, I sold it and the new owner tore the old house down and built his own place. It's gone and there's no going back." I've been dreaming of being back on the farm two or three times a week for God knows how long at this point. Finally the message got to my subconscious where the dream stuff comes from. Finally, my subconscious has gone from denial to acceptance of that loss. Dreams can be a tool of healing. I am going to wrap this all up with a little synopsis out of the journal I keep as, and for Tina.
