Upstairs, bows, hugs, court'sies, air-kisses and laughter. And sequins and attitude for days, jewels, glitter, and music, music, music. And more photographs. Particularly for newcomers and guests, it's kind of like art appreciation during a performance piece, with the opportunity to participate (to purchase a title and be presented "at Court").

Not an ordinary drag show by any means, nor for that matter a mere formal dinner- our Coronation Ball is a stylized, ritualized pageant rooted in the elegant ambiance of Europe's ancient royal courts, interpreted through the lens of North American Drag cultural history and our own New York Court, and guided by the vision, personal style and peculiarities of our dear founder, the Widow Norton.

Ritual, poetry and dance nourish the soul, just as much as love, sex, food and water sustain the physical and emotional aspects of our lives. And so it was that course followed course, act followed glorious act, and we all - courtiers and guests alike - came away the richer for having participated.

The Victory Brunch is not only a celebration of our newly elected êmonarchs, though certainly it is that. But more, it bespeaks our victory over despair, boredom, isolation, convention, banality and bad taste. The Victory Brunch is in many ways the final act, the curtain call, or perhaps better, the entr'acte, the bridge. It proclaims our exhibitantion and our pride in having once again produced an unique and memorable evening. And we proclaim together that our community and our Court returns significant personal, emotional and financial support to the agencies which serve and support us all.
