Excuse me for being so bold as to attempt to impart some wisdom at this moment, but I would like to pass along a few very interesting and very different observations that have meant a lot to me over the past two years.

1. Do you have the nagging sense that time is running out and you're falling short of your promise and your goals?

2. Do you equate losing your youth with losing out?

3. Could your gnawing sense of letdown be simply a garden-variety rut? If your life hasn't gone where you thought it would, was it your action that held you back or your thinking?

4. Have you tried mentally separating yourself from your cultural moment? If it was OK in the sixties to join a commune until you figured out where you are heading, isn't it OK in 1998 to work temp jobs until you set your goals?

5. Are you confusing yourself with your job?

6. Do you believe in the power of selftransformation? When you've taken positive steps to direct your own path, has life pulled an astonishing variety of pleasant tricks out of its sleeve?

7. Have you tried making a tiny life change to see how it will angle your destiny in a fresh and unexpected direction?

8. Do your old dreams need a makeover?

9. What's stopping you? Which will be harder -- trying to change now, or later on accepting what you have chosen by default?

10. WHO'S stopping you? Have you downsized your life dreams to correspond to someone else's version of you?

11. Are you choosing comfort over challenge? That's your prerogative -- but has it occurred to you that the restlessness you feel may be your psyche sending up a flare?

12. When was the last time you felt scared, not scared by hearing heavy footsteps coming down a dark street, but the scared that comes from attempting something you're not quite sure you could pull off?

13. What did you wish for the last time you blew out the candles on your birthday cake? Did it come true? Can you make sure it does before your next birthday?

14. Can you tell the difference between inner obstacles and outer obstacles?

15. Have you talked to someone who has clambered out of her rut and lived to tell the tale?

16. Are you willing to endure the painful but transient struggle of giving birth to yourself? Can you accept this struggle for what it is, signs of a life beginning to bloom?

News Briefs

Billi-Jo Wolf in Rochester NY is looking for assistance in fighting a Custody and Parental Rights action for transman Andrew 1999. If you have contacts or wish to help, please contact Billi-Jo.

A 64-year-old woman who was born a man, legally changed her name to Diane and is undergoing a sex change, was elected to the Broward County, Florida, Democratic Party executive board of directors. "I'm a transsexual," said Diane Arnold, a father of three and a retired security supervisor for the state of New York. "Living as a woman is something I thought about for the past 50 years...I fully intend doing all this because I feel that it's not me that counts. It's the guys and girls coming up later on I'm trying to say to them that if you want to do something, DO IT. You're not dirty, nor are you crazy. Just do it like the Nike commercial says. [I want to] help someone...say, '[If] she can do it why can't I?' "

"When I first presented an award at GLAAD, it was in somebody's living room, like in Encino, I swear to God. There was like eleven of us. ... I walked in today and I was completely mindblown -- Sharon Stone and Whoopi Goldberg and Melissa Etheridge and k.d. lang and Tom Hanks. I mean, not that celebrities make it but I think it's a symbol of how it's outreached out to -- it's the universe now..." --Actress Kathy Najimy at the Gay & Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation Media Awards April 17 in Los Angeles.

In London, the accused former banker turned up for court dressed in a coral blouse, form-hugging red skirt and black heels, the picture of femininity and urban fashion sense. After a pause and a coy smile for waiting photographers, Peter Young went inside to face the judge. The former fund manager -- for the record, he is a man -- is charged with fraud in one of the most sensational scandals to emerge from London's financial district in years. [Gee, now it is a defense?]

In the halls of the local high school at Morgan Hill, California, the words "faggot" and "dyke" were routinely uttered, about as often, Alana Flores remembers, as "hello" and "goodbye." Flores is 20; together with five other former students of Live Oak High School in this half country, half suburban town south of San Jose, she is suing the Morgan Hill Unified School District, claiming that teachers and administrators ignored pervasive anti-gay abuse. One of several such actions filed around the nation, the lawsuit represents the latest frontier in school harassment issues--a legal front that gained ground this week when the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that school districts can be held liable in similar cases involving extensive sexual harassment of students by one another.

Charles Pierce, a female impersonator renowned for his characterizations of such glamorous Hollywood legends as Bette Davis, Mae West, Tallulah Bankhead, Gloria Swanson and Joan Crawford, **died on June 2, 1999.** He was 73.

The film 'It's Elementary: Talking About Gay Issues in School" opens with footage of Sen. Robert Smith (R-N.H.) protesting gay and lesbian "filth"--in the schools. He waves documents and warns about the dangers of such "trash." Smith is then juxtaposed against a third-grade classroom, where children discuss the same issue. One small, brown-haired boy has this to say: "Who, like, really cares if you're gay? It's like barely nobody knows in the world. It's, like, what's the big whoop?" Written and directed by Oscar-winning documentarian Debra Chasnoff and produced by Helen Cohen, 'It's Elementary" first aired on public television stations across the country during June.

[I personally like the article "YOU TOO CAN BE A TRANSSEXUAL." It takes a lighthearted poke at this serious subject, both M2F and F2M, and the humor is quite refreshing.]

Commenting on the state of GLBT people in Turkey, Lambda activist Yigithan Yenicoglu explains, "Historically, there has been a sense that Turkish authorities own people's bodies. Certainly today some people are penalized for openly 'owning' their sexuality or gender. If you are a male-to-female transsexual, for example, it's very hard to get a job other than as a prostitute. If you are a young woman, you are generally treated like a third-class citizen with few rights. If you're a gay man, you are treated as though you have a mental illness. And if you are a lesbian, you don't really exist."

[Here is a very interesting comment on M2F TSs becoming involved in the feminist movement:] Although they are born as males, female transsexuals have little access to the privileges of being male. When they start to live openly as women they are harassed, intimidated, rejected and isolated for doing so. Because female transsexuals also suffer from sexism, their experiences become intertwined with those of all women in a sexist society. This is an objective basis for their participation as equals in the feminist movement.

An MCC church in Kansas City organized a prom for GLBT youth.

Transvestite Thai kickboxer Parinya Kiatbusaba wore a ports bea at his last fight to protect his newly-grown breasts. [Excuse me, do you suspect that, perhaps, he might really be (gasp) transsexual?]

In October, 1997, James Hormel, an openly gay San Francisco philanthropist was nominated to the post of Ambassador to Luxembourg. Senate Republicans, led by Majority Leader Trent Lott, R-Miss, stalled his appointment, questioning his moral fitness solely on the basis of his sexual orientation and outspoken support of lesbian and gay causes. On June 4, 1999, Clinton exercised his prerogative to offer Hormel a recess appointment (as he did with Civil Rights Chief Bill Lann Lee), while Congress is out of session. Hormel becomes the first openly gay ambassador to serve his country.

Over the past decade, Israel has quietly placed itself among the most advanced countries on gay civil rights. "We made a total revolution in the law," says Menahem Sheizaf, head of the Agudah, Israel's main gay and lesbian organization, who also runs one of the largest lobbying firms in Israel.

"They [the media] are driving me into becoming a spokesperson for transsexual issues. Whether I like it or not, they ask questions and I am answering. But I don't want to carry anyone's flag, and as for human rights ... I do not like to deal with titles [labels], this community or that community. I think we are all in the human-being community. So why divide us? I would like people to deal with freedom, not just homosexuals and transsexuals, because I would like people to not deal with sexuality, just with intelligence and personalities of human beings." --Transsexual Israeli pop diva Dana International, winner of the 1998 Eurovision Song Contest, to Australia's Melbourne Star Observer, April 30.

On June 11 the White House issued a proclamation recognizing the month of June as Gay and Lesbian Pride Month.

A surprising outbreak of intersexuality has been found in several species of animals in California.

Canada's Supreme Court ruled May 20 that Ontario's family-law definition of 'spouse' as a person of the opposite sex is unconstitutional.

On June 14, Congresswoman Jan Schakowsky (9th District, Illinois), became the first Member of Congress to officially recognize gender variant people when she amended her own office nondiscrimination policies to include "gender self-image or identity."

Q: Mr. Slatery, you went on a rather elaborate honeymoon, didn't you?

A: I went to Europe, Sir.

Q: And you took your new wife?

Q: How was your first marriage terminated? A: By death.

Q: And by whose death was it terminated?

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This is a short essay about how my spirituality helped me come out to my parents. I offer it in hopes that other people struggling in the way that I was may find it helpful.

I started hormone treatments In December, the next step in my transition from female to male. I was excited about taking this step, but I also knew It would force me to confront my parents with the truth about my gender identity, a topic we had never discussed. Even if I said nothing, the changes in my body would eventually give me away. I thought it only fair to let them know ahead of time.

Telephoning or writing them a letter seemed too impersonal a way to broach such an intensely personal issue. I wanted to do it face to face. But my parents are not the slightest bit gay-friendly, are rigid and intolerant, and are emotionally distant. I was afraid that no matter how I broke the news to them, the scene would be ugly, traumatic, and painful. I was so stressed by the prospect that when I damaged my car just before Christmas, one of my first reactions was, "Oh, good! Now I don't have to deal with my parents!" And yet I knew I couldn't put it off forever. Going along- with the family fiction that I was "normal" was corroding my sense of integrity as surely as battery acid on skin.

My second chance came in February, when my mother held a party for my grandmother's 98th birthday. Before I left on the four-hour drive, I packed copies of PFLAG's "Our Trans Children" and a flier for the nearest PFLAG chapter. I didn't know how I'd use them, but thought I'd find an opportunity over the 24 hours I'd be at my parents' house.

I'd hardly arrived Saturday evening when my father warned me I'd better be "sociable" when the guests came the next day. This is a long-standing sore point with me-- I'm an introvert in a family that prizes "small talk" as the supreme social skill. The next morning at breakfast, my father complained bitterly about the incompetence and stupidity of the assistant state attorney general, who was opposing him in a legal case he was handling. The tantrum would have embarrassed his grandchildren, and I fled the room as soon as I could. A little while later, as I was leaving for church, he chewed me out again, for not paying enough attention to my nieces and nephews. I was feeling thoroughly battered as I slunk into a pew at the local Episcopal church. (That's another mark against me: I'm the only one in the family who dared to leave Catholicism and become a practicing Protestant.) The service helped lift my spirits, but I was still hurting, so I stayed a few minutes longer to read three of my favorite psalms: Psalm 27 ("Though my father and my mother forsake me, the Lord will sustain me"), Psalm 37 ("Commit your way to the Lord and put your trust in him, and he will bring It to pass"), and Psalm 40 ("Your righteousness have I not hidden in my heart; I have spoken of your faithfulness and salvation").

Finally it struck me: I am a good person regardless of what my parents think of me. God does not check in with my parents before deciding whether or not to love me. If my parents attack me as antisocial, I don't have to let that attack ruin my self-esteem. God and I know better what kind of person I really am.

Strengthened with that knowledge. I went back to the house, where my relatives were arriving. As the day vient on, I realized that the quiet moment I was looking for to out myself was not coming, and would probably never come, since about the only times I see my parents are at major family functions.

Shortly before I had to leave for the long drive home, I hit on the idea of leaving the PFLAG literature and a note on my father's desk, and asking him and my mother to read it later. It was not a plan I had ever considered before. But it worked. They found the literature a few days later, called me, and we discussed it calmly.

I was disappointed by how tepid their reaction was. "We always knew you were different," my mother said glibly. My father wanted to know which public bathroom I would use. Still, I felt as if I'd taken a big step toward growing up. Once out to someone, you're out forever, and I'd let my parents know they no longer had the power to define me or ignore who I am.

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In retrospect, it was probably the least confrontational, traumatic way to handle my coming-out. I'm perfectly willing to give the credit to whatever higher powers are watching over me,
