SEX-CHANGE doctor Jerri Bean has spoken for the first time of her amazing new life as a woman.

The 6ft 5in father of three told how, under her new identity, she **By SYLVIA COLLIER** 

is still living with her family.

She revealed how the Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr Robert Runcie, helped her through her incredible transition. And she talked of her battle to stay in a seaside town as a respected family GP.

Former amateur racing driver Jerri, 42, wore a white blouse, printed cotton skirt andhigh-heeled sandals as she told how, as Dr Jerome Bean, she had secretly yearned to be a woman.

> "It started very young, but I suppressed it for years and years," she said.

> Finally, the slim, greyeyed doctor decided to have a sex-change operation.

At first, the decision caused tremendous problems with his wife, Jennifer, and the children, aged 18, 13 and eight.

## **Invited** back

Dr Bean, of Broadstairs, Kent, said: "We agreed mutually that I should move out, and I went to stay with friends.

"Later, my family invited me back. That was a very joyful time. Now the family unit is as close as any."

Dr Bean became deeply religious after her operation. Using her new name, Jerri Nicole, she was confirmed by Dr Runcie at St Peter's Church, Broadstairs.

"The situation was



explained to Dr Runcle and he was super," she said.

Now she is concentrating on a GP practice shared with three partners at Broadstairs medical centre.

Patients were astonished when she first sat behind her desk in women's clothes. One said: "She's a marveilous doctor and very brave to stay here."
