I-677: A MAJOR VICTORY

Although I-677 lost at the polls, the gender community won a major victory. Never before has a state-wide measure included protection based on gender identity. And this inclusion didn't come from a 'radical' group but rather from a mainstream organization which has attained access to the highest members in State office. This access wasn't gained easily and wasn't gained recently. We all owe a great deal of gratitude to Marsha Botzer, Activist and Founder of Ingersoll Gender Center.

Marsha has never been one to toot her own horn. She doesn't write articles about her accomplishments or publish position papers on her views. What Marsha has done for the gender community over the past 20 years, she has done in the name of Ingersoll. Over that time, Marsha has quietly gained access to very influential people. She worked many hours over many months talking one-on-one with past governor Mike Lowry, present governor Gary Locke, members of the State legislature, and influential members in the GILBT community. Only someone with 20 years of history and experience could have pulled off what Marsha did. And the battle was much more uphill than any of us realize. Everyone feared that inclusion of gender identity would spell sure failure at the polls.

Well, I-677 did fail at the polls. But in the aftermath, analysts are blaming a conservative voter turnout due to I-676 and I-685, not the gender community. That spells likely inclusion of gender identity in future initiatives and legislation aimed at attaining fair and equal rights for State citizens.

Please remember to thank Marsha for accomplishing what no one else in the gender community could have achieved.

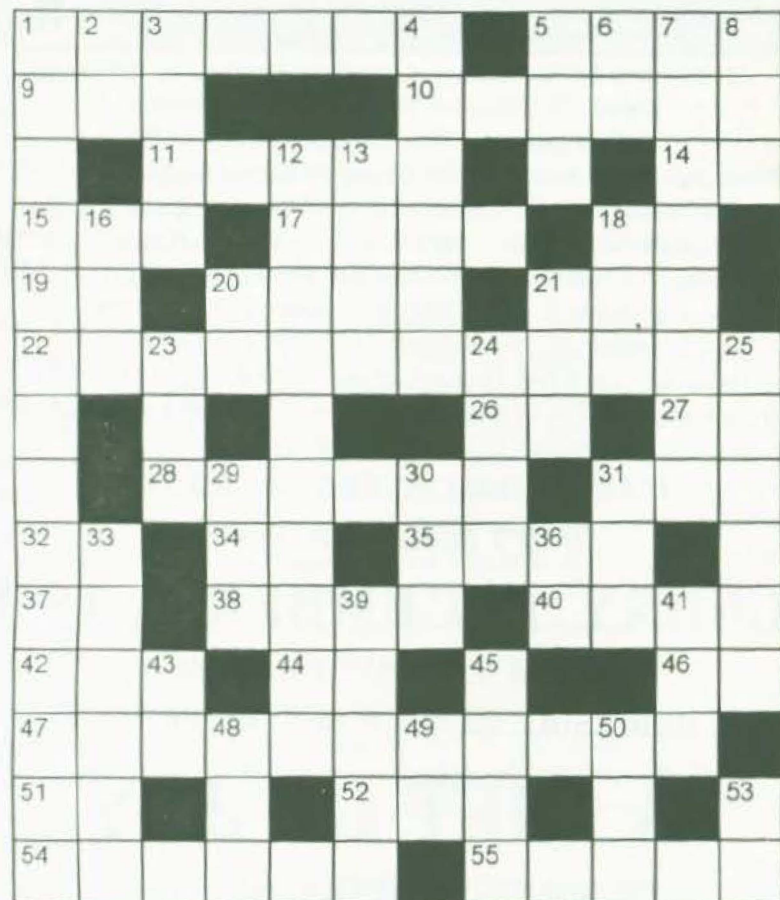

COMING TO INGERSOLL By Linda

We arrive at the door of the Center from all over the country. Many of us started on the journey many years ago, some just last week. Some come for a visit, others find a home. We all share one thing in common. The need to express ourselves openly and without fear. Being Transgendered is not easy for most of us and the Ingersoll Center is a place that accepts and supports all of the rich diversity in the gender community.

A year or so ago, I walked up the few short steps of the walk to the secluded building, took a deep breath, muttered to myself, "What are you doing, girl?" I fixed my makeup and skirt and walked into the Friday night meeting. I had been to the meeting the night before to sort of, well, you know, check it out. Denise was the facilitator of the "rap group", a meeting with no apparent structure, which means she was there being herself. She is a warm, friendly, accepting and not pushy woman. Just the way you would like your sister to be if she isn't already like that.

Someone said "Hi" and invited me to join them. A couple of members were chatting with Denise about going "full-time," whatever that meant (maybe they were students!) and some chatted about the drive up from Tacoma, how their wives were 'dealing with it' and life in general. I am sure the topics were all very important to each person at the time, but what seems the most important to me about the night was the feeling of safety and belonging I felt with these strangers. They understood and I hadn't said anything.

Personally, I didn't get to this first meeting easily. I had been in therapy off and on since I was 24 -- A total six years attempting to deal with, avoid, rationalize, not talk about, and generally being miserable most of the time about my gender discomfort. The counselor I was seeing, a truly wonderful woman, had recognized my gender dysphoria about two years before. She had suggested that I might want to call Ingersoll Gender Center and maybe seek a gender specialist. Well, I called four times over some months and listened to the message. Finally left my phone number and someone called me back later that week. They were very helpful and answered my questions and invited me to an open meeting.

Finally, I went directly from work. I got lost and tried to call Ingersoll from a phone booth at the International House of Pancakes near the Center. Surprisingly, Marsha Botzer answered, and gave my directions and when I asked if I could come even if I was so late. She warmly said, "Of course, come on over." I have been coming to Ingersoll ever since.

That was 14 months ago. I have been to many meetings, and now talk about going "full-time" soon myself. The Center continues to amaze and support me along with so many others with a full spectrum of gender resources. I have met so many wonderful men and women who are, to some degree or another just like me. Remembering that "Birds of a feather flock together." Many of them even become like the Beautiful Phoenix, transform themselves, and fly away to new lives, self-accepting, courageous and free.

HEY, GOOD COOKIN'!

Turkey Soup

What to do with left-over turkey? Here's an easy recipe for a wonderfully hearty soup, and in the process you can use up those few veggies which would eventually turn gray-green and fuzzy before you were forced to throw them out.

Ingredients:

Left-over roasted turkey cut into large (1" square) chunks

Any left-over cooked veggies

the left-over gravy from your turkey dinner

1 1/2 - 2 cups of frozen veggies of your choice

One cup of pasta of your choice

2 cans of fat-free, low-salt chicken broth

Poultry spice, salt and pepper to taste

Preparation:

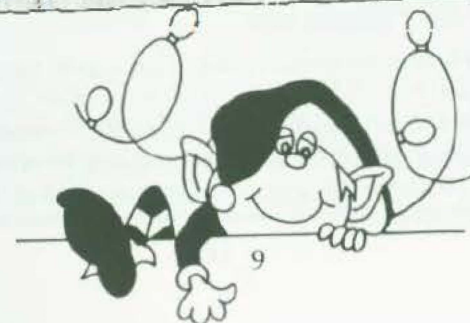
Using a large pan, put all ingredients (except gravy) in and put on the stove and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and allow to simmer for 20-40 minutes to make sure that all the flavors blend and 'marry' and pasta is 'al dente'.

Just before serving, add the gravy in small amounts until the liquid in the soup is thickened to suit you.

Serve with a warm loaf of French bread or some of those rolls you cooked for Holiday Dinner.

For a different taste sensation, after you ladle the soup into the bowls, put a large dollop of cranberry sauce in the center of the bowl! Try it! It's delicious!
