#### **Corvette Museum Visit**

About ten of us had a great excursion to Cooperstown on November 8 to explore the Corvette Americana Hall of Fame. We all piled into a few cars and drove to Arlene's place in the afternoon, where she and Karen welcomed us at the door and put out snacks in the kitchen. Arlene is a collector of many things besides Corvettes and stuff associated with Corvettes. including a vast library of videotapes and all sorts of things connected with the Dodgers, when they were in Brooklyn!

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After the museum had closed to the public, Arlene led a convoy down the hill to the empty parking lot and let us into the building. She disappeared into the utility passageway, threw a bunch of switches like the Wizard of Oz, and brought the show to life. As we walked through the halls and stopped in front of each car, a spotlight came on, music popular during the particular model year began to play, and a show or news event of the time appeared on TV. Popular performers and trivia of the era are pictured on the walls.

As described in previous newsletters, each Corvette is in its own room against a backdrop photographic mural scene of Americana, some artfully curved to appear 3-dimensional. Arlene travelled the country, taking the pictures herself, and had the whole museum planned in her mind, down to the last detail, before construction began! With cars from different years dating back to the '50s, the exhibit is like a time Melodie brought a couple of tunnel. suitcases and turned the ladies' restroom into a dressing room, just so she could pose in a different outfit in front of each 'Vette!

#### Dining-Out Parties

Our second and third dinner parties were held as scheduled on October 24 and November 21 at the Northway Inn and were attended by close to ten ladies each time. This last time, we sat in a group in the main dining room, but none of the other diners paid much attention to us, and all enjoyed the meal. Afterwards, most of us visited a bar, at the Northway Inn, Deceptions, or elsewhere. In trying to arouse interest, I have been giving "special occasion" names to these parties, but they have turned out to be ordinary outings. The week before Thanksgiving, the Inn didn't even have turkey on the menu.

The next Dinner Party is set for Saturday, December 19 at 8 pm, again at the Northway Inn. All coming should sign-up by Thursday, December 17 to ensure reservations. Please sign the sheet posted in the Club Room, or get word to us by mail or phone. But if you forget to sign-up, come anyway; they can always fit in a few extra, the dining room is usually not crowded. Since no one other than keyholders has used the Club Room for changing before previous parties, I will *not* promise to open the room that evening, unless specifically requested.

We are planning to continue these dinner parties at the Northway Inn in 1993, starting on January 16, for as long as a sufficient number of people remain interested. The dinners have attracted a number of members who do not attend our Thursday meetings regularly, and we are still hoping to encourage more novices to come. However, we need some new ideas to liven things up; for variety, can someone suggest another restaurant and make arrangements with the manager? When we can count on enough people to make it worth-while, we can invite an outside speaker to join us.

# THURSDAY NIGHTS AT TGIC - Paul K.

Every Thursday night TGIC holds an informal meeting or "Rap Group" at the clubroom or "loft" on Central Avenue in Albany. Many of our members have never attended, so this is an account of a typical Thursday evening; we hope it will encourage more to come.

The club loft is right across the street from a drugstore, and they are usually unloading their truck. There's a security guard over there, too. Pull up and find parking on the street, or cruise a bit farther east to the parking lot near the end of the block on the south side.

Walking up Central Avenue, and up the dark and twisty stairs, can be scary when you are dressed, but you will just be part of the crowd that the local people are used to seeing. A club officer should open the loft by the time announced in the newsletter, but if you find the door locked, wait a while, they may be a little late.

About half of the members attending will come dressed, and about half in boy clothes. Those that are dressed will range in style from jeans and shirts, to business outfits, to disco dresses. People show up whenever they can, dropping in and leaving throughout the evening.

The loft is small, decorated like an old, comfortable rec room, with paneling and well worn furniture. There is a restroom with toilet and sink, a galley kitchen, a kitchen table and chairs, sofa, loveseat, and a chair by the telephone with our answering machine.

One wall has five locked closets for our key club members, who help pay the rent on the loft in exchange for unlimited access and a place to store their things. You may see one of them, or another member, in the process of changing if they can't change at home, or have come right from work.

On most nights there is no pre-planned activity. Most of the people will be club members, but we almost always have a sprinkling of wives and friends. With the comfortable discussions, there is never anything objectionable done at the loft.

Because only qualified members know the location of the loft, it's a safe place. Some members come almost every Thursday, while others will only stop in once a month or less, as their schedule permits. In any case, you are assured of a warm greeting when you enter. Club members understand how it feels to come out, and work to make everyone comfortable.

At the meeting, some members browse through the library of donated books and videos, or through the piles of catalogues that members have brought in, or with newsletters from clubs around the country.

News and gossip of the club and the related community are exchanged, with some people being loud, and others just enjoying the show. People may bring new finds to share with the group, such as the breast forms that one of our members is developing, or a new book or outfit. The talk ranges from very light to very serious, from discussions about makeup and clothes, to problems with wives and family. The more serious subjects often come up only in one-on-one discussions with other members that you have come to know well.

There may be some club business to perform, with Winnie asking for help in everything from stuffing the newsletters to critiquing a new welcoming brochure, to planning the Christmas party. Because all club activities are done by volunteers, the more active members we have, the more fun for all of us.

Sometimes, something special happens; anything from someone bringing wine and cheese for a celebration, to a jewelry party or poetry reading. No one is ever forced to participate, but it adds to the fun.

After about 10 o'clock, many of us head out for a drink, usually to Deceptions, a great dance club, where Thursdays are 2-for-1 night. Some dance, some play pool, some continue discussions, some chat with the women and men there, and others just watch. In any case, it continues the relaxed, safe, trusting atmosphere. Some just have one drink, others stay till midnight, and some don't go home until sunrise.

At other times, we may stop by Club Cabaret, a small comfortable neighborhood bar, or the Waterworks, where Thursday usually means Karaoke. We have had some members rock the club wearing a dress!

Thursday nights at TGIC are a nice mix of casual routine, conversation with friends about topics most of us don't get to talk about everyday, and some fun surprises. If you are a club member, or a "significant other", please feel welcome to drop by, if only to check it out and see if you want to participate on a regular basis.

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# SHOPPING IN THE CAPITAL DISTRICT -Paul K. (Continued from TGIC News Oct/Nov)

#### Accessories

Life is cheap... but the accessories will kill you! Women talk about how much they like shoes, but accessories are still most women's secret vice. I buy them when I find pieces I like, knowing that they will come into play someday if I don't spend too much.

Swank Outlets (Lake George, Rutland, etc.) have Anne Kline jewelry from \$2 to \$32, with most earrings from \$7-10, hair ornaments from \$4-\$8, etc. Good value.

I like the \$10 Watch Company (Saratoga Outlet Village, downtown Lake George) for pretty \$10-\$15 watches. The bigger styles look great.

The dollar stores are worth watching:

-Everything's A Dollar (EAD) (Cohoes, Shoppingtown, etc.) have a big selection of necklaces, and I have hit things like great scarfs.

-Just One Dollar (JOD) (Utica, Onieda) has unique things like cosmetics, and a huge selection of socks, and is one of my faves.

-Everything's A Buck (EAB) (Saratoga Mall, Latham Circle Mall, Poughkeepsie) does pretty well on cosmetics, but poorly on jewelry.

-All for a Dollar (AFD) is the big boy, with stores in many malls. They all look the same, but surprises are possible, as with some nice belts they got in recently.

-Loony Larry's Buck-A-Rama (BAR) (Century II, Columbia Plaza, Saratoga) has some nice jewelry.

-One Dollar Deals (ODD) in Colonie Plaza. is quite odd, but they have an enormous wall of hair ornaments.

EAD, JOD, EAB, AFD, BAR, and ODD are all are based on the new shipments principle. They sell what they can get cheap. You have to keep looking!

Other people are also getting into the act. Afterthoughts (part of Woolworths) has turned their Northway Mall location into a \$.99 treasure trove. Afterthoughts, Claires. Xtras/Accessory Place, Joan Bari/Cachet, and Accessory Lady are all chains that specialize in accessories, and can be a place to look for a special piece or to look for blow out merchandise. Buvers\$mart also has some good jewelry.

#### Cosmetics

There are two kinds of cosmetics for me. Basics like skin care, foundation and mascara, which I tend to get at value places like the RX Place (Colonie Plaza, Syracuse) that have low prices.

For beard cover I like Lydia O'Leary CoverMark, but only Marguerites Hair (Central Ave Albany) sells it in the area, and they aren't too nice. So I use Dermablend (\$11), Cabots (\$6), Cover Perfect (\$3.50), or when I can find it Signature Cover (\$4). I use two layers, of the cover and contour (white highlight, "negro" foundation color contours) and powder, and then a foundation, like Clinique Continuous Cover or Cover Girl Ultra-Finish and powder. There is more to discuss on this topic.

Make sure you keep a fresh mascara around. Stuff can grow in mascara, and it doesn't work right when it dries out, so throw it out after 6 months, and don't use someone's old one. I like L'Oreal Voluminous for night (thick!) and Revlon Long Distance for day, but there are lots of good choices out there.

Color Cosmetics are fun. For most, buying one kit of shadows at Christmas is enough for the whole year, but not for me. I like places like Prestige (Cohoes, Saratoga Outlet Village) for values on Marcella Borgese colors, or watch for kit deals on Lancome.

In the drug stores, L'Oreal (part of the Lancome empire) and Revlon (who make Borgese) have some good values.

In Little Falls, you can hit the LaSalle outlet store for deals on Flame-Glo, Sally Hansen and Lip Quencher products. Full size nail polish at 10/\$1.00 is a great deal. I like the values on hair removal and bleaching products.

Don't forget the dollar stores. Maybelline and Aziza are always around (great for beginners, as both sell muted colors that are almost impossible to screw up), and deals on Revlon are known. At EAD I found a wide selection of Physicians Formula Le Velvet Film foundations, that I pick up in Target or Long Drug when I am out West, for only a dollar. Full size Revlon Blushes and PowerderCreme foundations were in AFD a while ago, and I stocked up on a range of colors to play with.

Sample size kits are great too, like the foundation samples that Max Factor and Maybelline are putting out. Try the coverage, texture and colors. You may find that different foundation tones will let you wear different wig colors. Try the 50%-off rack in CVS for experimental stuff.

Finding a place to do our makeup is hard. Few beauticians really understand how to create different looks, and fewer still understand how to make men look good as women. I have had good success at Mia International in Cosimo's Plaza on Western Ave. in Guilderland.

# CITY OF NEW YORK REGULATIONS

The Albany Gender Project has been contacted by Dana Freedman of New York City, regarding a possible class action law suit against the City of New York. Dana and others have been informing us lately about changes in policy by the City's Department of Vital Statistics as applied to transgendered persons. Apparently the City, which governs and maintains vital statistics reporting independantly from the State of York, has adopted some unusual New regulations among which, we are informed, are the requirements of a psychiatric evaluation for change of name of transsexual persons, even following surgery. This leaves the possibility of violations of open individual rights and unequal application of the law which are just some of the grounds being considered as a basis for a possible suit.

#### What You Can Do:

If you are a transsexual person or a person who lives a transgendered lifestyle, and were born in New York City, who has had problems getting a legal name change registered on birth documents; if you are post-operative and have had problems registering either a legal name or sex change on birth records; if you are anticipating having surgery soon and consequently changing your name and/or sex on your New York City records please contact:
