

TRYING TO SOLVE IDENTITY.

Defense Has Finished in the Ellis Glenn Trial.

Parkersburg, W. Va., July 23.—The defense has rested in the Ellis Glenn case and rebuttal testimony has begun. The end is almost in sight after a trial which has already made over 20,000 typewritten pages.

Charles Cook, who was the jailer when Ellis Glenn was first brought here, testified, under cross-examination, that she had a big scar on the back of her head when she first came, which could easily be seen when her hair was short. He said there were no hairs growing out of the scar.

Charles T. Caldwell, Glenn's chief legal adviser, testified that he found a small bald spot, but no scar on the back of her head.

Doctor Gail Samuel's, another witness for the defense, stated on cross-examination that he had found a small scar in the palm of Ellis Glenn's hand, where Elbert was said to have had the deep cut.

Miss Agnes Riley, Ellis Glenn's friend, who accompanies her frequently to trial, testified, unwillingly, that Glenn wore false teeth, which it was proven that Elbert Glenn did. The defense proved by several witnesses, however, that Ellis Glenn is not the same person as Elbert, the color of hair and eyes, and the shape of the face being different.

While the defense rested and the rebuttal has begun the defense has two more witnesses who will be allowed to testify to-morrow.
