OUTREACH - They really do want to know

The last couple of months have been busy for outreach. Between the Quad-S reception and several speaking engagements we have been very active in public. We have also kept up our continuing projects and hope members will take advantage of them as well.

On October 18 Thalia and Evelyn spoke to Dr. Don Schneider's undergraduate Human Sexuality class at the College of Notre Dame in Belmont. In contrast to the large class that our speakers encountered at a recent SF State discussion, this was an intimate class of a dozen students.

Their questions were thoughtful, wide-ranging and very supportive. We talked about our childhoods, our relationships,

our families, where we buy shoes and how we live day to day. If you have ever thought of public speaking, small classes are a good place to start because students are open, warm and generally a lot of fun. For them to find out that we aren't freaks and are probably their friends and neighbors is important and they do want to know about us.

It was particularly gratifying for both us and the class to have Joyce there as she provided the spouse's perspective on a relationship with a cross-dresser.

We later gave a presentation to Dr. Anna McQuinn's graduate Sexuality class for students who are preparing for examinations to qualify themselves as licensed marriage, family and child counselors.

We felt it was especially important to reach potential therapists. These are the people to whom individuals and families may bring cross-dressing conflicts. It makes sense to make sure they have some idea of what our community is about. These were older and more experienced students and their questions were more in-depth but still very supportive. On this occasion the ETVC speakers were Evelyn and her wife Joyce, Thalia and Liana appearing as Eric. It was particularly gratifying for both us and the class to have Joyce there as she provided the spouse's perspective on a relationship with a cross-dresser. Also, as the majority of the students were women, it was good to have a woman on the panel who could speak to a woman's concerns about partnerships with other than traditional gender roles.

As a group we spoke about our childhood experiences, our working toward self-acceptance, our families and a range of other topics including the Rocky Horror Picture Show, which one student who had counselled young people had found was a way of exploring non-traditional gender roles. We were on for over three hours, but no one in the class asked for their usual break, and the discussion continued down the stairs and out into the parking lot. The level of interest was very high and it was extremely gratifying to be able to help those who may some day help one of us.

ETVC member Lou Sullivan continued to be a mainstay of the Institute for the Advanced Study of Human Sexuality's panels on

On Nov. 21 Susie Keels appeared on Jan Black's Journal on KCBS Radio. Susie spoke about transsexual issues and shared the microphone with Dr. Paul Walker, a well-known friend of ETVC and respected psychologist who has worked with transsexuals for many years.

Besides public speaking, we have begun some test advertising: placing ads in various Bay Area alternative newspapers as part of a continuing program to reach out to those of us who haven't

heard about ETVC. We intend to run the ads and then, based on the responses, choose the most effective papers.

Thalia is also surveying other gender groups to find out their experiences with promotion, advertising and public speaking. We hope to find out what has worked well for our sister groups

and to use their successful tactics as well as avoid those that have been less valuable. We also plan to write up the results and feed it back to the participating groups to strengthen all our groups' efforts.

The continuing projects have been proceeding quite nicely, too. Lauren has put together an updated list of the video library holdings. If you made it to Outreach Night you may already have a copy. Otherwise send for one. Martina, besides being the able Social Committee co-chair, has been keeping the article library in good order too. Check out the latest listing for something you might have missed. Either library is always ready to accept new materials. To help out and contact one of the librarians.

The International Support Directory is still in process. Seems that just when we're ready to go to press there are "just a few more changes"... Suzanne is in charge of the Tip Sheet and always looking for more submissions. Those of you who started lists on Outreach Night can still help by getting them in now...Martina and Kim are still running rap groups monthly in San Jose. Check the calendar for more info...Telzey has been working on getting our name out via articles in local and national special interest papers.

On a personal note, as you probably know by now, Kaye has resigned as our Coordinator and Kim has volunteered to replace her. I can't think of anyone more able to coordinate this organization having worked with Kim on this committee these past few months. I have grown a lot with her help, been buoyed by her enthusiasm when I felt overwhelmed and I think we have gotten a lot done. I'm sorry to see Kim move on but I feel Outreach's loss is the whole group's gain. - Thalia

(Linda is the father of three, a boy 11, a girl 8 and a girl 3. This appeared originally in Inner View, a newsletter for Cross-Port, Cincinnati.)

Before the first child got old enough to know what was going on, I was quite an active cross dresser around the house...I could freely dress around the house in whatever and however I wanted. I really had it made. I had found true peace of mind between my two selves and I wasn't sure if I wanted or could give it up.

We (Linda and her wife) both felt they should have it explained to them as soon as they could understand it. We didn't believe I could have kept everything secret and hidden well enough, that sooner or later (the kids) would find out. We also considered what if they found things that didn't seem right. and if so what conclusion would they come to, perhaps years before we found out they already knew.

We also realized that truth and honesty are the stepping stones to a good relationship in both a marriage and close family. We wanted out children to grow up knowing that we keep no secrets from them, and we hope they will never feel the need to keep one from us...

...As our first child got older we told him that most fathers don't dress this way. We emphasized the fact that this was a family secret and that no one should be told...They all seem to take that so-what attitude.

I believe it probably bothers my son to a degree. After all, he's in junior high and it's very important to have a manly father to brag about. He's just at that age when everyone wants to look and act like the other guy. I hope this doesn't last too long.

Some men keep their feeling all bottled up inside never letting the girls all the way out. I'm sure everyone has good reasons for doing so, it's just that I believe one can never be truly happy until this is done. I think one's happiness is reflected in everything one does...Therefore I justify my dressing around my family. I feel good about me and it shows.

No, it's better kept private

What would a child gain by learning that their dad enjoys wearing women's clothes? In my opinion, not much besides confusion, conflict and the unnecessary burden of having to keep a "family secret."

I would never presume to speak for all the TV fathers out there, but I have not told my kids about my dressing and frankly see no need to. Certainly it might make things a little easier for me, but other than that I see no benefit for the rest of the family.

This is not intended as criticism of those TV dads who have spoken to their kids, more power to them. Certainly if I dressed all the time, or needed to, I might feel differently.

But like many of us I am a part-time dresser, who does drag a few times a month and goes out to the ETVC socials for my public excursions. At this level of dressing, there is virtually no chance they would encounter me dressed.

Since that is the case, what is the point of causing them possible confusion and conflict.

There are other reasons for my not telling them, but first and foremost is the question of secrecy. Sadly, the great intolerance towards TVs in this society makes it imperative for most of us part-time dressers to keep our activities from our employers, neighbors and so forth.

This creates a conflict: we know our dressing is not wrong, yet unfortunately most of us must keep it secret. The question here is do we burden a child with this conflict. I see this as a burden, since the child would be asked to keep quiet about something which itself implies that their father is doing something that isn't quite right.

There is also a "need to know" aspect.

I like to use the example of sex education: A child needs to know the truth about sex, for example, but does the same child need to know the intimate details of one's particular bedroom interests?

Do they really need to know that I am a TV? Well, there are lots of things about me and my wife that my kids don't know and they seem no worse for it.

Think about it this way: do you really know everything about your own parents? Do you want to? Do you really need to know their every wart and secret? Does this mean I have to be somewhat discreet when I do dress? Sure, but that's hardly enough reason for me to open up my closet door to my kids.

The Transsexual Phenomenon

Dear Duckee,

It is time for a serious talk with your mirror! Figure out who exactly you're dealing with, i.e., what part of your own inner psyche, and explain that however nice it might seem to be a knockout, the Goddess gave you other gifts this lifetime: courage, integrity, wit, health, children, love, money, whatever they might be in your case.

Dear Prunella, Products help, but most important is protecting your skin from the elements. Sun, wind and intense cold do more to wrinkle your skin than anything else.

CROWNING GLORY

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In a continuing dialog with Kimberly and Renee it was proposed as fact that we are all female at conception (Oh blessed be!) and via different sets of hormones some stay female and others transmute to male.

While pondering this topic, I was attracted to the October MS magazine cover photo of the Olympic sprinter "Flo-Jo" where there is an article, "Chromosome Count" by Alison Carlson, on the sex-testing of Olympic women athletes. Now grab your garters girlies and check this out.

"Normally, the female chromosome pattern is XX and the male is XY. some people have internal organs of the opposite sex due to a birth defect. Estimates of incidence range from one in 1000 to one in 4000 births. Some hermaphrodites, who are born with both male and female organs have the female XX pattern and there are men who have

the XX chromosome pattern, although these are extremely rare."

There are children "born with the male chromosome pattern and testes but an impaired ability to either produce or respond to testosterone. Most are raised female and, if necessary, treated surgically and hormonally to correct their abnormalities."

As psychologist John Money explains in his book "Sexual Signatures: On Being a Man or a Woman", the easy assumption has been that there are two quite separate roads (to gender identity), one leading from XY chromosomes at conception to manhood, the other from XX chromosomes at conception to womanhood. But...scientists are uncovering a different picture. The fact is that there are not two roads, but one road with a number of forks where each of us turns in either the male or female

direction. You become male or female by stages. Most of us turn smoothly in the same direction at each fork."

He emphasizes: "The difference between male and female is not black and white; it is a biological continuum. Any dividing line is a matter of contest. Once the chromosomes have given their message to the embryo to develop testes or ovaries at the first fork in the road, they never again play a role in in the process of sex differentiation. Hormone levels, internal and external organs, and overall body build all have greater influence on gender. The label boy or girl has tremendous force as a self-fulfilling prophesy."

Next time I'll explore the social and political implications and address the question: Why not have endorphins for breakfast?

PASSING COMMENTS

On the way out of the reception for the Quad-S convention someone asked our Ginny if the poker social that was scheduled for the same night was still on as there were so many ETVC members at the reception. She replied that the poker game was still on and that many of those attending would probably not even think of doing something so public as appearing at a reception. She stated that for some who come and dress at the poker game it is the only time they get to dress outside their homes. They show up in "drab" and put on their finery for those brief few hours, then undress and go home.

This set me to thinking about what kinds of services the group can and should be providing and also if we haven't, in a way, set up a kind of hierarchy where those of us who dress a lot in public are seen as "better" than our more closeted sisters. I think it would be wonderful if everyone who wanted to could dress any time, but this is America in the '80s and we seem to be slipping back towards more tradition-bound gender roles.

Those of us who choose to be more public with our cross-dressing are not better people than those who choose to remain out of the public eye. We are simply more willing or able to put up with the reactions we produce. Of course, there is always that Holy Grail of "passing" to spur us on. So magical and

yet so often unattainable.

For those who choose to remain closeted or those who have tried going public and have retreated I hope ETVC can provide the peace of mind of belonging to a group of supportive friends who will accept your decisions free of the snobbishness of the "passing elitists".

I would like your response to this and other issues. How can this organization best serve all its members??

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Make Up Tips from a Pro

Jim Ponder, a professional make-up artist from Richard Stead Enterprises showed about 25 ETVC members some great tricks of his trade at a special meeting on Oct. 15 at the Chez.

Using Anne as his model Jim's explained the basics of effectively transforming the male face to an attractive female visage.

Summarizing, here's what Jim recommended:

Beginning with a clean face, shave as close as possible and then use ALOE VERA as a non-alcohol astringent. All drug stores carry this. For beard cover, use DERMACOLOR CAMOUFLAGE CREME. This fantastic opaque oil-base foundation and many of the other special products he recommended are available at California Theatrical Supply, 130 9th St., San Francisco. It's expensive, but well worth it.

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For more information: Please send \$2.00 to Mirage Box 6678-U Glendale, CA 91205 For this and all other theatrical cosmetics (or any make-up) talk to store personnel about what's appropriate for your skin color. Jim recommended spreading Dermacolor just on beard areas, but you might try spreading it thinly over the whole face for evenness. All else you will use is water based. Set the Dermacolor with translucent Kryolan powder.

Then with a damp sponge daub on pancake powder. He recommends MAX FACTOR PANCAKE, but you might also consider high quality MEHRON CAKE MAKEUP. For eyebrows and eyeliner use Aquacolor applied with a stiff thin paint brush. Apply blusher with a soft brush and use the blusher around the frame of the face and along the jaw line to contour and soften. Use sparingly. Do your eyeshadow, remembering to use the darkest color in the crease over the lid. After applying lipstick, go over the whole face with translucent powder.

One final tip: practice, practice, practice.

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
