DISAGREED

Jury in Ellis Glenn Case Failed in a Verdict.

PRISONER'S IDENTITY

Serious Bar to an Agreement --Another Effort Will Be Made to Solve the

Mystery.

Parkersburg, W. Va., July 31.—The Ellis Glenn jury disagreed and was discharged yesterday afternoon. It stood seven for conviction and five for acquittal, though on one ballot eight voted for conviction.

Two things prevented a conviction. One was that, owing to conflicting testimony, part of the jury did not think the identity of the prisoner had been proved "beyond a reasonable doubt," and the other was that part of the jury thought the forgery had not been positively proved.

Several times the jury came into court and reported that they could not agree, but each time they were sent back. Once they asked instructions as to what would constitute a reasonable doubt and as to what would be necessary to prove forgery, showing that these two points were those on which they could not agree.

Ellis Glenn was released under her old bond, but will be required to give a new one on Thursday. It has been reported that in the event of disagreement the case would be nolled by the state, but such is not the case. Another trial will be had, although not in this term of court.
