A Personal Reflection on the 2nd GenderPAC National Transgender Lobby Days

On May 4-6, Toni Monzo and I traveled to Washington DC to participate in a truly remarkable event, the 2nd GenderPAC National Transgender Lobby Days. Reminiscing about the week, I can say that I had some good experiences, and some great experiences. It was about educating those who make the laws of this nation about a minority that has remained invisible for too long, a minority that is time and time again is singled out for ridicule, discrimination, and violent hate crimes. By the time it was over, Toni and I had visited the offices of every congressman and senator from Illinois. We left copies of GenderPAC's national transviolence survey with most, and It's Time, Illinois' report on discrimination and violence with all. And I felt that we made some real friends on the Hill.

The most emotional experience for me was our meeting with Congressman Jesse Jackson, Jr. From the start, this meeting was handled with the greatest respect and courtesy. I had been working for about two weeks getting the meeting set up. Hillary West, who set up the meeting, met us at the door and introduced herself. She was anxious to meet me after we spent so much time on the phone together. She is a lovely woman, and I felt some sort of bond with her. Then the legislative assistant, Rodney Emery, came out and introduced himself, and said that he would be participating in the meeting as well. A few minutes later, Congressman Jackson came into the reception area to greet us and we all went back to his office for the meeting.

This is where the magic started. I had been going through a set routine with the other congressmen's staff people. But this was not a speech or a routine. We immediately clicked and entered into a dialog the likes of which I never thought myself capable of doing. His mind is so quick, his logic is so clear, he was immediately making connections that should be made. We discussed Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, and the fact that US Courts had ruled that we are not covered in that Act. And he was right with us. This was personal to him. This was the connection to the civil rights movement of his father, and he understood our struggle. It was magical, and it was emotional.

We talked about the hate crimes. Rodney participated in this discussion. He knew about the overkill murders of transpeople. He knew about the mutilation killings. And we talked about the ones in Chicago, specifically the ones documented in our report. In the end Congressman Jackson asked what he could do to help us, and we requested a letter to Attorney General Janet Reno to help us document hate crimes. Of course he agreed, he put his staff on it immediately.

What else could he do? We talked about ENDA (Employment Nondiscrimination Act) and our non-inclusion in the bill. He turned to Rodney and asked, "Do you mean they are not covered in ENDA?" Rodney could only shake his head and inform him that we are not. He asked what could be done about that, and I just happened to have a proposed amendment to ENDA, for gender variant people, just looking for a sponsor. We discussed the political realities of the 105th Congress, and the fact that such an amendment may not be the best thing to introduce now. But he was definitely interested.

We left that office on an emotional high. Joy from finding such a strong supporter and friend. But for me, the most powerful feeling was the tie to the entire civil rights movement and the struggle for freedom. As Jesse Jackson, Jr. said in that meeting, "As long as one person is denied human rights, none of us can be really free."

(Note: On May 5-6, about 45 transpeople from all over the USA converged on Capitol Hill in Washington DC for the 2nd GenderPAC Lobby Days. At the end, nine congressmen had signed on to a letter to Attorney General Janet Reno urging her to have the Dept. of Justice track hate crimes against gender variant people. The letter was presented to the Attorney General's staff in a meeting on May 13. This was the first time any members of congress had gone on record supporting transgendered people.)

And as I was walking back to my friends I was walking on air. I was amazed at how I felt. I was happy, I was excited, I was thrilled. I was a woman.
