Jane Thomas Stresses Challenges, Responsibilities for the Transgender Community

At Powder Puffs' October meeting, the Special Guest Speaker was Jane Thomas, Ph.D. She related one of her favorite stories about a class she taught on Human Sexuality. She once posed this question to the students: "If you woke up one day in a body of the opposite sec, not<u>would</u> you live as that sex, but <u>could</u> you?" One of the girls when asked replied tentatively "Yes." She might not like it, but she could probably live as a man. Then, turning to a strapping football player, Jayne asked if he could live as a woman. "For a day only?" he asked. "No, for the rest of your life," was the reply. There was a long pause as the enormity of this dawned on him. "Oh sh-t!" he yelped.

This anecdote illustrates perfectly how men and women view transgender issues. Many women do have the sensitivity to appreciate life for men. Many men, on the contrary, are at a total loss to understand what women experience daily.

"We live in a society that is uptight because of its own insecurities," Dr. Thomas notes. "When men grow up, they have to follow a much narrower road . . . When we crossdress, we make a statement about ourselves and our society. (We) want to be able to express a tenderness and sensitivity that (we) can't express in (our) role as men. We live in a society that doesn't let men express that."

Dr. Thomas looks in some ways like a stereotypical, humorless, lesbian psychology professor: Her blonde hair is styled in an austere pageboy with sharply cut bangs, her nononsense wire-frame glasses fit snugly over her face, and she's attired in a sober black blazer and slacks, with a white jewel-neck blouse. However, in conversation, she soon reveals herself to be a warm and disarming person, frequently indulging in humorous asides.

The difficulty for many transgendered people, she points out, is "you're trying to do this without the education that genetic females have." As a reassigned woman herself, Dr. Thomas jokes that "they didn't give me an owner's manual for this equipment," on things such as how to behave as a woman in public, how to interact with men, etc. But how do genetic females themselves become women? They go through an adolescence experimenting, making mistakes, surviving blunders, learning, and moving on. "Being able to have these experiences in a safe way" is crucial for the transgendered. While there are a lot of books on how to dress, talk, and act like a woman, the only way to learn is to get out there and practice. Could you learn to be an auto mechanic or a surgeon just by reading about it? This principle is the same.

Also, it's important that the entire family be involved in the counseling process around transgender issues. "Excluding people leads to sorrow . . . and I don't think it has to be that way," Jayne notes. Ironically, in many situations, the problem is that the husband is transgendered in a *non-productive* way. One spouse once commented, "I wish my husband was more of a woman; concerned with meeting the needs of his mate, and not just looking pretty." A successful relationship requires COMMUNICATION — TRUST — SELF DISCLOSE — ALLOWING YOURSELF TO BE VULNERABLE.

Children and their being informed is another delicate matter. Jayne is emphatic on the need to <u>not</u> force these issues on them. For the first half-dozen years of a child's life, they are forming their own ideas on gender differences and their own identity. Mixed messages may confuse them.

One member of the group in attendance told this story: One crossdresser he knew was a widower with a five-year-old daughter. The child had periodically seen her father in female attire, and once in a bikini, at a private pool party. She unquestionably accepted all this. together to a public beach, and the father wore his usual male swim trunks. "Psst, Daddy," said the little girl, "Put your top on so they don't see your bobbies!"

On the whole, Dr. Thomas sees many positive developments for the transgender community. While shows like *Geraldo* may present a distasteful view of crossdressers and transsexuals, they do desensitize viewers, who will no longer see it as a menacing unknown. And in the past, when a husband revealed his crossdressing to his wife, the marriage more often than not ended in divorce. Jayne now sees more couples trying to work out these issues. And the importance of what we are doing should not be overlooked. "We're trying to let society get a glimpse of what it means to be a complete human being."

Frederick's Museum of Unmentionables

Long before Victoria had her secret, Frederick had lingerie lovers in the cup of his hand. the late Frederick Mellinger — the prince of push-ups, the guru of girdles, the king of kinky — gave his first name and his life's work to his famous bra-and-panty emporium, Frederick's of Hollywood. As befits one of the true stars of the Walk of Fame, his flagship store on Hollywood boulevard has its own lingerie museum.

You can't miss the store, a glamorama landmark with fuchsia awnings and pink and purple neon, not to mention the unmentionables in the window. The small museum in back opened in 1989.

From whence did this La-La land of lingerie come? And how has "Hollywood" become Frederick's definition as well as its location?

Like a tunnel of love, the exhibit beckons with its sweeping marble staircase curving upward into a pink-neoned hallway, where just a hint of the collections within peeks around the corner. entranced, you enter.

Once inside, you find the social history of post-World War II lingerie, from Frederick Mellinger's silken seduction of a plain-pantied America, to the sexy apparel appeal of stars such as Lana Turner and Madonna.

The museum offers a trip down mammary lane, with exhibits such as "Missiles and Snow Cones," displaying Frederick's pointedly fulsome 1950s bras; and "An Array of Color," a palette of pink and purple push-up bras that reveals how a dash of color can shake things up.

Looking at these alterations in America's undressed code, one is amazed that Mellinger's newly founded New York mailorder company shocked the nation in 1946 simply by creating a line of black lingerie. It hit the white-cotton world like a Hollywood bombshell.

Next came Frederick's push-up bras, merry widows, and later, the bikini (it was Frederick's that brought the scandalous swimsuit to America). Having escaped the trussed-up Victorian corset culture, women now were given licentious license to strap on sexier versions of their grandmother's unmentionables — for bedroom, not ballroom, affairs. The sexual revolution was built on such foundations.

Of course, Hollywood helped too. In tribute, the museum's Celebrity Lingerie Hall of Fame has the bras, slips, bustiers, petticoats and garter belts of Mae West, Zsa Zsa Gabor, Elizabeth Taylor, Cher, Ava Gardner, Ethel Merman, Shirley MacLaine and many other famous figures. Even Tony Curtis has a bra on display (From the film classic "Some Like it Hot"). The queen of indecent exposure, Madonna, is represented by a black bustier with pointy tips that could put an eye out.

From simple mail-order business to a 200-store chain, Frederick's of Hollywood has come a long way, baby, and its lingerie museum reveals this lacy face of fashion at its buxom bust — er, best.

Brain may key male-to-female transsexualism By Malcolm Ritter The Associated Press Taken from the Press-Enterprise, November 2, 1995

Men who want to become women may have key brain structures that are biologically female already, a small study of male-to-female transsexuals suggests.

"It might be an explanation for the fact that those people feel female although genetically they are male," said researcher Dr. Dick F. Swaab.

The cause of transsexualism is a mystery that scientists have sought to attribute to psychology or biology. Experts say they think the condition is rare, but that there are no reliable figures on how common it is.

Swaab and his colleagues examined the brain samples from dead people. They reported that, on average, the size of a certain brain structure in six male-to-female transsexuals was about the same size as what they found in women, and smaller than what they found in gay or heterosexual men.

Other scientists cautioned that the result may have been produced by the sex-change treatments the transsexuals went through.

Still, the study is "opening up a whole new area of questioning and it's adding to all the studies that have come out in the past 10 years pointing to biological factors that influence human sexual behavior," said Sandra Witelson, a professor of psychiatry and biomedical sciences at McNaster University in Hamilton, Ontario.

Swaab is director of the Netherlands Institute of Brain Research in Amsterdam and a professor of neurobiology at the University of Amsterdam. He and Dutch colleagues present the work in today's issue of Nature.

Roger Gorski, a professor of neurobiology at the University of California at Los Angeles, said that going from the finding of one tiny brain structure to an explanation for a person's sexual identity is "a big leap." But the study is "a step in that direction, and I think an important one," he said.

The study focused on a brain structure called the BSTc that plays an important part in rodent sexual behavior and may do the same in people.

Researchers found that, on average, the structure was 31 percent smaller in 11 heterosexual women than in 12 heterosexual men. The BSTc in transsexuals was on average about the same size as it was in the women's brains. Nine gay men had about the same average size as the heterosexual men.

Swaab said he doubts the BSTc itself is responsible for transsexualism. Instead, it appears to be part of a larger brain network that makes a man feel like a woman, he said.

Dr. Thomas Wise, director of research at the sexual behaviors unit at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine, said he is not convinced that the study showed an innate difference in transsexuals.

The reduced size of the BSTc might be due to the estrogen treatments they took to expand their breasts and otherwise feminize their bodies, or from the drop in their testosterone due to sex-change surgery or medication, he said.

Fish changes sex Species alters itself to suit events The Associated Press Taken from the Press-Enterprise, November 14, 1995

A species of fish that can change sex, altering genitalia and behavior to suit social circumstances, has been discovered off the coast of Okinawa, Japanese and American researchers report.

The tropical fish normally lives in groups of one dominant male and several females. If a larger male comes along, the dominant male changes into a subservient female; if something happens to the new dominant male, the largest female becomes a male, even if it was a male once before. It has generally been believed that such changes were irreversible. the fish, a variant of the gobi called *Trimma okinawae*, was discovered by marine biologist Tokomi Sunobe of the Natural History Museum and Institute in Chiba, Japan.

Biologist Matthew Grober of the University of Idaho told a meeting of the Society for Neuroscience on Sunday that a least three species of fish have been identified that can change sex repeatedly when required. Restructuring of genitalia and their brain takes place in about four days.

Grober said he and his colleagues have been able for the first time to induce the 2-inch fish to undergo such sex changes in the laboratory.

The discovery is significant because the brain region involved in the sex change is the same region recently suggested to cause transsexuality in humans, Grober said.

Obviously the major reason these fish keep changing their sex back and forth all the time is that they never follow the Harry Benjamin Standards of Care. Had these fish been required to cross-live for two-years the scientists would never have observed all these fish switching back and forth. By the way, when these fish do change sex, do they ever forget and go into the wrong bathroom? Just kidding.
