t's hard to believe we're talking about Gay Pride already. Wasn't it just yesterday we were stumbling out of the Palladium on New Year's Day? Or was it Memorial Day? The past five months may have passed you by, but we thought we'd preview some of this year's Pride festivities a little early so you can start making plans for the biggest gay holiday of the year.

Despite what you may think, Pride isn't just about dancing 'til dawn. New York City offers plenty of cultural events, too, such as **The Center**'s annual **Garden Party** on Monday, June 24th. Your s50 ticket gets you an evening of outdoor entertainment from an extensive roster of gay luminaries. For more info, call 620-7310 x358.

Really, what would the week be without Heritage of Pride, the official organizers of Gay and Lesbian Pride? The main event—the Gay and Lesbian Pride March—will be pretty much the same, kicking off at noon on Sunday, June 30th. The march will run down Fifth Avenue and through the West Village, as always. Pride Fest '96 will move from the waterfront back to its previous home on the streets of the West Village— Washington between Christopher and Spring streets. Construction at the piers will force the celebrated **Dance on the Waterfront** to move slightly south to Canal Street. Tickets cost \$20; get them early by calling 80-PRIDE. All events will be held Sunday, June 30th. (No location has been announced for the annual **Pride Rally**, which is slated for June 23th. We'll keep you posted on that one.)

Other dancing options include Intrepid III on Saturday, June 29th. Tickets cost \$50-\$60 with music by the legendary Frankie Knuckles. Call Circuit Tix at (800) GAY-3433. Also on June 29th: 451F Productions in association with GMHC presents Colossus at Roseland with Boy George at the turntables. Can you believe it? Tickets cost \$40/\$50; call 727-0368 for information. We're thankful that The Center's Lesbian Pride Dance will move from the BMCC campus to the more accessible Irving Plaza (17 Irving Place). Tickets cost \$15/\$20 after June 14th; charge 'em at 620-7310 x343. On Sunday, Octagon will open for Climax featuring the music of Susan Morabito.

The Chelsea Piers complex will be open Sunday, June 30 for Dance on Manhattan II, a gala event presented by Jason McCarthy and Marc Berkley to benefit Broadway Cares/Equity Fights AIDS. Restaurants will be open late to accommodate the party-goers, who'll no doubt spend most of the evening (6pm-1am) dancing outdoors to DJs Carlos Pertuz and Warren Gluck. You'll also get free admission to Bumpl at Palladium. Tickets are s45 until June 15, s55 after and s65 day of, available from Circuit Tix (800) GAY-3433 and Raymond Dragon.

Last but not least, the whole world will probably be lined up outside **Bump!** on Gay Pride night, with super-DJ **Junior Vasquez** spinning a 14-hour dance marathon inside. The party features a live performance of "If Madonna Calls" and a show by house diva **Joi Cardwell**. Of course, all of the regularly scheduled clubs and bars will be pumping all week and into Monday morning. **Twilo**, **Roxy, Tunnel**, plus every dance floor and hole-in-the-wall from the Hudson River to Alphabet City. Look for our extensive Pride listings in June. Darling, you'll simply be lost without them.





We never tire of the drama that unfolds each week at Mona Foot's Star Search. This is the show that pits drag queen against drag queen in a bitter battle of beauty and brains. It all started at Crowbar at the dawn of the decade, at a time when our favorite drag celebrities were struggling just to pay for panty hose. After a two-year hiatus, Miss Foot returned to the scene last fall and successfully resumed her show at both Barracuda and its original home, Crowbar-and things haven't changed a bit. The contestants show up so full of hope in their homemade dresses (and wigs, from the looks of some of them). They lip-synch their little hearts out, fumble through trick questions and, worst of all, endure a thorough reading by the surly hostess. In the end, though, all that matters is the reading on the applause meter-and who has the most friends in the audience. We love the triumph and the tragedy that can only be witnessed at Star Search. The glory and the heartache. The corny jokes. The hecklers. This week we'd like to introduce you to the lady behind the glamour. The real Mona Foot. This is her story, and you'd better pay attention.

# How did it all get started? Five years ago you were a fixture on the East Village scene, a star at Boy Bar, a Wigstock staple. Why Star Search?

Well, Crowbar approached me when they first opened, and they wanted me to do a night—a low budget night. So I was doing the East Village circuit, you know, I didn't have my own night. A friend of mine and I said, "Let's have a contest," and I came up with the name Star Search. We thought a contest would be perfect because only one person would have to get paid, and of course I get paid! And they don't have to pay that one person very much, either. Fifty dollars is not a lot, but if you want to get noticed you have to swallow your pride a little bit.

# So that was back in 1991?

Oh, I guess it was. I was only 17 then.

# Why does Star Search appeal to so many people?

Well, I don't know, but I think people are mostly there for me! I know that I do make a complete fool of myself up there. I mean, a lot of those amateurs are just that amateurs. And a lot of them are really great. But I think the appeal of it is watching me read everyone and destroy them and make them feel like shit, and raise them up all at the same time! I'm always accused of saying "Oh, you're great, but..." That's just one of my little tricks.

### How do you find the talent?

They find me, honey! Thank God for them because I'm just too much of an airhead to be bothered. I do my show, they want to do it, they give me their number, and I lose it. I can't tell you, there's so many queens' numbers I've lost. I know they're out there thinking I hate them, and I do. Just kidding. I don't hate them, I just forget things.

# Some of your contestants aren't really amateurs, though. Isn't there a criteria for entering the show?

If we had real, real amateurs it would be a real, real boring show. So they just can't be out there on every pass, in every magazine, all over the place. Somebody who wants that, but who is not that.

# Can you name some Star Search success stories?

Oh, there are many. Girlina is the biggest success. I don't want to say I created her or anything. I know I didn't, but I know she got a lot of recognition there. She was the biggest winner, 13 weeks in a row, to the point where I quit and gave the bitch the whole night. Over itl Then there was Dolores. She's hilarious. Varla Jean Merman was a big loser at Star Search, but in turn she got a lot of bookings for that, she told me. I'm not saying I made her, either, because I know I didn't, because she's incredible. Candis Cayne was another loser, she lost once or twice. I'm giving you all of itl LaRitza DuMont is not my discovery either, but I think she is the next big thing. She is so hot. She's still winning right now at Barracuda...but this is her last week.

# Which leads us to the question on everybody's mind: Is it fixed?

The contest is not fixed! The audience decides. I sometimes wish I could make that decision, but like I always say, you gotta give the people what they want. Even if they are from Chelsea.

# What's the difference between the East Village and Chelsea?

Umm, mmm. The Chelsea queen...uh, is probably a little bit more forgiving than the East Village queen. Sometimes the worst queen will go over really well in Chelsea. But it depends! Diva, for instance, couldn't win, couldn't even get an applause in Chelsea, and she was the reigning champion at Crowbar. There was this queen named Rachel who was a big winner at Crowbar, and she came over to Barracuda, and those queens didn't even see her. They saw right through her. I love her, but they just didn't get it. I think perhaps the East Village queens are bit more charitable with their affection and applause. But those Chelsea queens sure know how to tip. They better keep it up.

### Has your fame affected your private life?

I don't think so. Mona doesn't really have sex at all. I hide all week in a closet, on a hanger and in a box.



# How would you respond to those hecklers who say you're just a loud drunk onstage?

I would say I am! But I'm still getting paid. Mona + Drunk = Paid. Print that, honey! No, I'm just kidding. That show is completely unrehearsed, and I'm sure it looks it. But I am not a drunk.

# Mona, do you have any last words-or plugs-before we wrap it up?

I'll say this for myself, but I don't want to sound like I'm tooting my own horn. I'm proud of reaching a certain level of success, then dying down, because I was over it. I stopped doing it because I wanted to do other things with my life. But now I'm back with the same show on two different nights. And people are paying to see it! Well, they're not paying at Barracuda, but...well, they're paying attention, honey! Oh, and I want to say that DJ Tennessee was with me from the very beginning at Crowbar, and I love him. Then Gant Johnson came along for Barracuda, and he's also really great. I've loved working with him at Salon. I can't believe I'm plugging his club in my interview, but I still need a booking there, sweetheart. Anyway, I love working with both of them, and I hope we're together for a long, long time-until I replace them.

y job is getting easier and that's a bad thing. Last year, my special funer Summer Movie Preview was so full, it had to run in two issues. This year, I found

myself desperately digging and stretching for more stuff, tempted to include films with minor queer content



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Maybe... Maybe Not Directed by Sonke Wortmann

(like Pat Morita as an extremely fey waiter in **Spy Hard**) just to make it look like the '96 queer summer at the movies is going to be bigger than it really is. But there's some good news. Last year, we may have had quantity, but this year we have quality. There may be fewer offerings, but none

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are as bad as **Lie Down With Dogs** (ouch!). Read on, but remember: release dates are always subject to change.

Director Alexandre Rockwell (as in Jennifer Beal's hubby) directs Rosie Perez, Harvey Keitel and Steve Buscemi in **Somebody to Love**, a story about the shabby fringes of hopes and dreams in an East L.A. dance hall. Buscemi, who starred in 1986's **Parting Glances** as a gay rock star with AIDS, plays queer again a decade later, this time in drag as a copper-wigged taxi dancer for hire.

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The winner of nine international awards including Best German Film, **Kasper Hauer** details the true story of Europe's most infamous "wild child." Imprisoned in a dungeon by the King of Bavaria, Hauer was released at 16 barely able to walk or speak (like a gay Nell). His adventures, including his love affair with Lord Stanhope in 1825, inspired various theories on the nature of human development.

Miramax and Quentin Tarantino plan to re-release a 20-year-old camp classic about an avenging butch female street gang titled **Switchblade Sisters** (although the gang's name is actually "The Daggers"). Directed by Jack Hill, (of **Foxy Brown** and **Spider Baby** fame), this lowbrow flick sounds like "so bad, it's good" non-PC fun.

What happens when a straight playboy shares an apartment with a love-struck gay couple? Lots of nudity, indecision and mayhem in **Maybe... Maybe Not**. Billed as the most successful German comedy ever (what kind of standard is that?), this **Flirting With Disaster**-type farce should have **Birdcage** appeal.

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**Batman** no more, Michael Keaton has two clones and one of them is gay in the comedy **Multiplicity**.

The gayest film of the Summer opens post-Pride and promises to add another chapter of folklore to the story of **Stonewall** (I know what you're thinking—why not two years ago?). Late director Nigel Finch's

semifictionalized account of the bad-hair day that spurred a revolution spins a tale both heartfelt and hopeful. This low-budget affair has a stellar cast (these queens can really act)) including modern-day DQ goddesses Candis Cayne and Sherry Vine.

**Celestial Clockwork** is another **French Twist** when a budding Spanish opera diva marries a hefty Parisian fag, everything starts turning up roses. But no one warns her that happily-ever-after might include falling in love with a zany female tele-therapist.

And of queer interest, former Madonna gal-pal and dyke model Jenny Shimizu does some girl bonding in Foxfire, and the family so square everything they do is queer returns for a '90s trip to Hawaii in A Very Brady Sequel.

Of course, I'd pay any amount of money to be **Bound** to Gina Gershon ("Cristal" from **Showgirls**), but the lucky lady in this film is the not-so-squeaky clean Jennifer Tilly. Destined to be a good-time lesbian mobster-moll, shoot-'em-up road movie, I hear the actresses weren't at all shy

shooting these hot love scenes. Can't wait! Hal Hartley kills two birds with one movie,

Flirt. Criticized for populating his films with only straight white characters, this flick contains a vignette about a gay couple having commitment anxieties. Openly gay African-American actor Dwight Ewell (also in **Stonewal**l) plays one of the men. Can't complain about the Chinese film

stereotypes—the young man in the film sells burial plots. Like the other characters in the film, he's looking for love in all the wrong places.

# Cowboys LaCage and More

magine yourself in a keen Midwestern gay nightclub named something clever like "Reflections" or "Contacts." You've come early for the special-all-you-can-drink Schlitz on tap for s2, no cover!-and slurp contently as you stare at men playing darts against the varnished, plywood walls. Tonight you've already seen five people you've slept with, and they all work here. As usual, Black Box's "Strike It Up" has filled the dance floor; in one corner, some brawny lads attempt to two-step. The DJ-a "Glamour Shots' employee during the day-talks over the music to cover the fact that he can't beat-mix to save his chubby, Chess King-attired ass. Oh. but then it's Yaz! You have to dance! Tightening your tan, weaved belt, you run the dance floor and boogie under the four impressively flashing red lightbulbs that comprise the lighting system. Despite the scratched record and the college freshman who tries to grind with you, you're having a gay old time.

And then the drag show! A fat man in a dress who's well-known in the Des Moines drag community hosts the show, which consists of several corn-fed men dressed as their favorite divas and moderately lip-synching to muted mono recordings.

Are you having a hard time picturing this? Hmm? Then you must see The Blue Angel's *Cowboys LaCage and More*, an ancient relic of a drag show that feels like a regional "Star Search" competition.

Dennis Russell, in various guises, hosts this quaint evening of obvious, non-offensive drag performance. The painted faces of *Cowboys LaCage* attempt to channel a deluge of divas, from Judy and Barbra to Reba and Aretha, in a revue rife with so much old-pop lip-synching you'll believe the evening was orchestrated by a continuous-playing K-Tel record.

As with any revue—or any string of drag queens—the quality varies greatly. Certainly the greatest resemblance is that of Michael Framme to his chosen impersonation, Reba MacIntyre: sonic red hair, sunken cheeks and that vacant look of a displaced cowgirl. Dane Chase captures Dolly Parton's laminated glow with a rousing "Apple Jack/9 to 5" combo. And even host Russell triumphs in a mild Patsy Cline duplication by sheer fact that he's the only one that actually sings.

But mostly this is too much makeup and not near enough talent. You can feed this cross-dressing cabaret to straight people from Westchester, but plunk it into the Manhattan gay scene, and it's drag kindergarten. When you've seen the raw talent of Charles Busch, the natural beauty of Candis Cayne and even the flawless impersonations of Jimmy James, *Cowboys* evokes nothing but mild nostalgia.

Even the premise is shaky. They promise scads of country drag but then give us Judy, Whitney, Bette and Barbra. Wouldn't this be a heftier hoedown with impersonations of cow goddesses such as Loretta, Crystal, Lorrie and Sylvia? And—need I dare add—k.d.?

If you want true feminine country, try the sharpshootin' *Cowgirls*. If you want true feminine Blue Angel, try the lap dancers. But if you want a predictable evening of dime-store glamour and overpriced drinks, then *Cowboys LaCage and More* is your cosmetic potion.
